SCORE 101 TO 1 IN TAFT'S FAVOR

Roosevelt Gets Solitary Counter as Result of Compromise Over Kentucky Delegates, While President Added 17—Gross Corruption Alleged by Heney of Frisco.

CHICAGO, June 11.—(Can. Press.)—One delegate for Col. Roosevelt, the first awarded him since the national committee began the hearing of contest cases last Friday, and 17 for President Taft, were the net result of today's session of the Republican national committee.

In all 102 delegates have been accorded President Taft since the committee opened its hearings. This one placed in the Roosevelt column to-day was D. C. Edwards, from the 11th district of Kentucky. The Taft forces on the committee refused by a vote of 92 to 12, to seat both of the Roosevelt delegates whose places were contested, but agreed to a split, which gave Col. Roosevelt and President Taft each one delegate from the district.

BOSTON TO GET HISTORIC GUN

Ottawa Government to Give Up Evidence That British Troops Won Battle of Bunker Hill.

OTTAWA, June 11.—(Special.)—The department of militia has just received a request from the Bunker Hill Memorial Association of Boston, that one of the revolutionary guns captured by the British troops at that battle, and which were stored at the Citadel at Quebec, be returned to the United States.

CITY WANTS ELEVATED METROPOLITAN TRACKS

PRIZE AWARD IN TWO WEEKS

Thousand Dollars for Technical School Plans Will Be Presented to Successful Architect.

Within two weeks the winner of the thousand dollar prize for the accepted plans for the million dollar technical school will be announced.

Principal McKay told the committee yesterday afternoon that it would take his fellow-experts, Messrs. Nobbs and Wickson, and himself the greater part of next week to go thru the plans which must all be in by Saturday next. When the experts have made their selection the committee on industrial education will be immediately summoned and the winner's name be made public.

The competing plans will be exhibited afterwards for a week at the technical school.

The committee yesterday decided to purchase by tender a printing outfit for the training in that department.

A committee comprised of Trustees Taggart, Principal McKay and Supt. Bishop was appointed to confer with the city solicitor regarding the closing of Herriok-street.

BOOKIE SUES RACETRACK MEN

J. Scully Alleges That Presidents of Racing Associations Conspired to Exclude Him From Tracks.

J. Scully, a bookmaker, is suing the racing associations, claiming that on Aug. 12, Madigan, Hendrie and Monk, the presidents of the racing associations in Canada, agreed among themselves to exclude him from every track in Canada over which the Canadian Racing Association holds jurisdiction. He went to the Hamilton Jockey Club meet, and paid the ordinary entrance fee of \$1.50, but was put out and given back his money. He alleges the whole procedure was a conspiracy, was irregular and that he was not given a fair hearing. Besides damages for alleged assault at the Hamilton track, he wants a court order to cancel his banishment from race tracks.

STRANGER WAS ROBBED. A Norwegian girl, Ingerid Hjelde, 17 years of age, was robbed of \$50, her ticket to Wisconsin, and her baggage check by some dirty sneak thief in Smith's Falls, Monday night while en route from Montreal to Toronto. Immigration officers in the city have provided her with transportation to her destination, and are otherwise looking after her.

Postmasters Work Harder With Rural Free Delivery

Routes Are Not Revenue Producers and Never Will Be, Says Mr. Wright of Renfrew, Who Presented Claim for Increase in Salary—W. B. Rogers of Toronto Tells How Postmen Lose Valuable Time.

How postmasters are forced to do a large amount of extra labor without special remuneration, was related by Postmaster Wright of Renfrew, when he told of the workings of the rural mail system at the convention of the association yesterday afternoon. As an example of the work entailed by the rural delivery route without extra money, Mr. Wright cited his own route. There are from 60 to 70 patrons on the route. Before the adoption of the scheme these people all rented boxes at the office, and the money thus derived recompensed the official for his trouble. With the loss of the subsidies one of the greatest sources of revenue was cut off. The routes extended a distance of 20 miles, and the mail had to be arranged and delivered to the courier upon its arrival.

Newspapers Make Work. According to Mr. Wright a large amount of the work was made by persons taking several daily newspapers and one or more periodicals, providing the postmaster with an abundance of labor, but no revenue.

Great Educational Force. A great Canadian daily in the hands of a farmer would do more for his intellectual welfare than three such papers read by a business man, simply because the tiller of the soil had more time to digest the news than did the city man.

Public Can Assist. Several ways in which the public could assist the postoffice were pointed out by W. B. Rogers, postmaster of Toronto. The absence of letter slots in the doors caused a loss of time when the carrier had to ring the bells. Large firms in the city made a practice of holding their mail back until late in the day, with the result that it was all unloaded together, and the sorting of it was thrown on the staff simultaneously. If these companies would get their mail in during the earlier hours of the day, it would be delivered more promptly.

Newspaper Delivery. Great difficulty was experienced in the handling of newspapers. People changed their places of residence and did not notify the printing concerns.

Consequently a large staff of men had to hunt in the directories to find them. Where the label was lost off the papers, Mr. Rogers said that they just tied them up and sent them back to the press and drew attention to it. One source of worry to the officials at Toronto was the arrival of Christmas baskets from the old country without addresses or directions. The trouble was that they were not tied securely and the slips were lost. The only course left for the officials to pursue

was to wait until the intended receiver wrote inquiring for the parcel. In reply to a question, Mr. Rogers admitted that Canadian special delivery stamps were not honored in the United States, but neither were American special letters delivered as such. The stamp vendor in Toronto is always instructed by the general office to have sufficient American stamps on hand for visitors, so that they can make a special delivery to friends in the States. A vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Rogers at the conclusion of his address.

The association put itself on record as disapproving of the charges made that postmasters were being dismissed thru political animus. They unanimously commended Hon. Mr. Pelletier for the work he was doing for the postmasters and the system.

CHARGED WITH COUNTERFEITING. St. CATHARINES, June 11.—(Special.)—True bills were returned by the grand jury in the cases of Menno Culp, charged with counterfeiting, and John Knox and Frank Black, Calator, on a charge of assault.

WILL USE HYDRO
Library Board Decides to Take Power From Civic System.
Public ownership received a boost again last night when the library board decided to use hydro power instead of electricity sold by private companies. J. Turnbull and A. E. Huestis were appointed as Toronto delegates to the American Library Association convention. This conference is the largest in the world and ten different countries will be represented. The convention will be held in Ottawa from June 28 till July 5. Four more ladies were added to the permanent staff. They are Miss Stauffer, Miss McConnell, Miss M. Smith and Miss E. McFayden. Arrangements were made to entertain a delegation of 150 American librarians who will pass thru the city on June 25. Supper will be served to them in the Public Library in the evening. They will also be taken for an auto trip around the city by the council. Thereafter a garden party by the University of Toronto and luncheon provided for them by the government and Victoria College.

SET OF SILVER GIVEN TO HARRIS
Employees of Property Department Remembered Their Former Chief, Who Spoke Highly of Their Assistance—City Auditor's Annual Report.
In recognition of their esteem for their late chief, about 100 employees of the property department met in committee room number one in the city hall at 5:30 yesterday afternoon and presented R. C. Harris with a beautiful cabinet of silver, while the commissioner's wife and mother, who were present, were given flowers. The presentations were made by Wm. Fitzgerald, claims agent, and Andrew McGraw, chief clerk of the department. In reply, Commissioner Harris expressed his gratitude. His relationships in the department were always the best, he said, and he expressed the wish that his successor might find things as congenial as he had.

Despatch and Efficiency. Mr. Harris modestly referred to the recent expressions regarding his own ability as due to the fact that the work of the property department had been carried on with despatch and efficiency due to the competency of the staff. The department, he said, had met the demands made upon it, and hence had gained the confidence of the city council and the public. He had always found his associates loyal, and the co-operative spirit of the department had been the key-note of its success. He believed that tributes recently paid to him were in reality tributes to the department as well.

Permanent Officers. At a meeting of the members of the Toronto C-partnership Garden Suburbs Limited, in the city hall yesterday, the permanent officers were chosen as follows: President, G. Frank Beer; vice-presidents, Thos. Findlay, Mayor Geary; treasurer, G. T. Somers; secretary, W. F. E. Armstrong; directors, A. R. Clark, Alex. Laird, Thos. Bradshaw, Thos. Rodden, Prof. Ed. Ward Kyle, A. M. Ivey, Dr. Helen Mac-Murphy, Mrs. H. S. Stratton, Mrs. A. W. Grasett, and Miss S. K. Currie. Members of the executive committee, A. M. Ivey and A. R. Clark.

Auditor's Report. In his report for 1911, City Auditor Sterling expresses his disapproval at the action of the city council in creating commissions for the management of public utilities, and then not taking the necessary precautions in having their books placed at the disposal of the civic audit department for audit. "I am of the opinion," he states, "that were this carried on in all cases, an added public confidence would be imparted to the various managements of these bodies, and I would urge that in future this matter should be carefully guarded, and that in the case of existing bodies they should be brought into line as soon as practicable."



MR. ROGERS' ANNOUNCEMENT.

The announcement by Hon. Robert Rogers that the Dominion Government has acquired a site and will at once construct and operate a terminal grain elevator at the head of the lakes, with a capacity of 3,000,000 bushels, will meet the charge made by the Liberals of Saskatchewan against Mr. Borden of breach of faith upon the question involved.

Mr. Borden's campaign in the west last year was a campaign in itself of public ownership. He set up the great national advantages which would flow from government ownership and operation of national abattoirs, of the Hudson Bay Railway, of terminal grain elevators, against the practical advantages which might flow from the restriction by Canada of the Taft-Laurier reciprocity agreement.

It will follow that the people of the west, now that they have the duty reduced on cement, will immediately call for a reduction of the duties on agricultural implements and on other things. The World's program, however, has always been that the great thing to give the people of the Canadian West is reduced railway charges, and to give this reduction by way of direct legislation of parliament—to give the people the same rates in the west as in the east and to give them a uniform passenger rate of two cents a mile; to give them cheap telegraphs and cheap parcel post in the way of express charges and the like.

But the western provinces, especially Saskatchewan and Alberta, and their cities and towns, are leading this continent in their devotion to and maintenance of public ownership. Provincial-owned telephones and creameries, municipal lighting, street car, working men's boarding houses and skating rinks, testify to this, while provincial loans to farmers at low rates of interest will soon be effective. Mr. Rogers is a comparatively young man, but he is an able politician, too long-sighted to remain permanently bracketed in the public mind with Sir Wilfrid Laurier and R. P. Roblin.

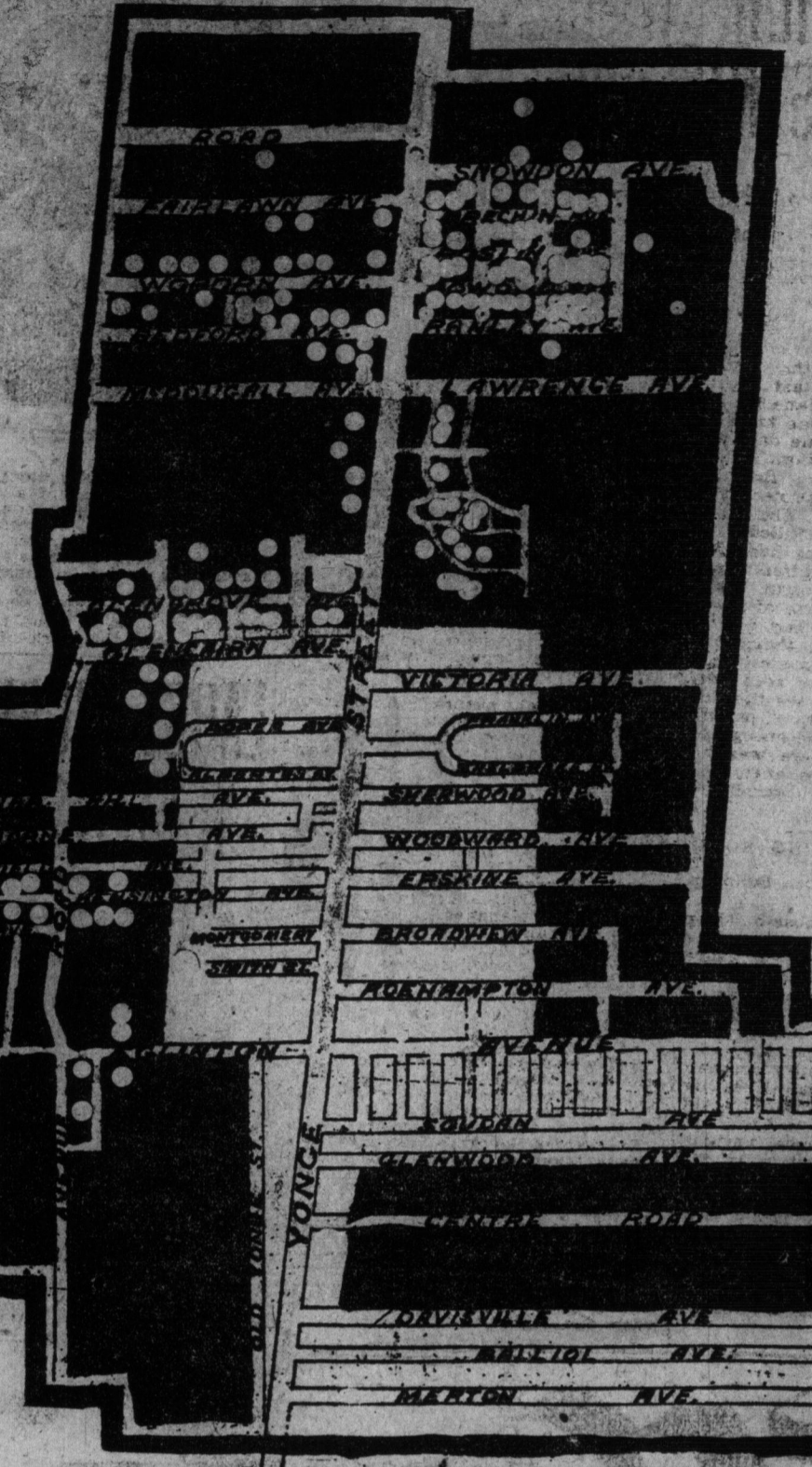
But the fate of public ownership must not depend upon Mr. Rogers or the counsels of those who are not sincerely devoted to the principle itself. Mr. Borden will find that not only in the west, but also in Ontario, he will build upon a solid rock if his governmental policies reflect the progressive aspirations of the people for public ownership and operation of all great public utilities.

ARE THE MANUFACTURERS THE SCAPEGOAT?

The cutting in two of the duties on cement will be a concession to the west, but it will be a cause of alarm to manufacturers generally. It opens the door to the revision of the tariff act, which is a matter for parliament, by way of the Audit Act, and which is in the jurisdiction of the government.

The Audit Act was chiefly intended to enable the government to make restitution of unfair collections, and it

The World herewith has revised the Telegram's map of the populated portions of North Toronto, which were left in white. The white dots scattered thru the dark portions represent houses now erected. In some places, especially at the north of the town, the houses are too close together to mark individually.

Now we must add to the houses already up in the Telegram's black spots and which are indicated, fully two hundred more that will be built this summer. In Lawrence Park for instance, high cost residences will be built; in Alexandra Park, twenty big homes will go up this year. In the Glebe property, which is the black strip at the lower right of the map, fifty brick houses will be built this summer. Right to the top end of the town new houses are planned. And all thru the portions which are marked as unoccupied spaces of excavations and foundations for new houses can be seen.

True, at the present time, there are not more than two people to the acre in North Toronto, but then, many of the houses have 100,000 lots and some more. Surely it is 200 a site to live in a detached house. Then, again, private individuals own large single tracts of North Toronto. It was not until this spring, for instance, that the Anglican Synod's big Glebe property could be thrown open for occupation, altho the land on both sides of it was built up long ago.

THE CEMENT DUTY.

Finance Minister White's statement to the press does not explain why one-half of the import duty upon cement is to be refunded to the consumer and the other half retained by the government. When the western coal mining owners could not supply coal to the people, the government met the situation by refunding all custom dues collected in the west upon coal imported from the United States.

LAND OPENED FOR SETTLERS

More Farms Needed For Increased Number of People Locating in Vicinity of Cochrane.

Since the opening of spring there has been a considerable influx of settlers in the vicinity of Cochrane, some two hundred applications having been received by the crown land agent at that point for lands in the Township of Blake, Gackmeyer, Lamarche and Brover. These, with previous applications, have pretty well exhausted the lands in these four townships open for settlement under the Cochrane agency. From the volume of enquiries made by people desirous of settling in the clay belt it is evident that public interest has been awakened to the possibilities of that fertile region.

BAY ST. CORNER DEAL REPORTED

Northwest Corner of Temperance Bought by Land Company—Said to Be Around \$3000 a Foot.

The northwest corner of Bay and Temperance streets has been sold by Thomas Dill at a price that cannot be learned for a certainty, but it is rumored to be in the neighborhood of \$3000 a foot. The purchaser is said to be Charles Robertson for a small central operating company. It will be held for investment. Credence is given to the story that Mr. Robertson made the purchase by the fact that he and an associate bought the property adjoining at the north from Charles Tully four or five months ago for \$2100 a foot.

The purchaser now have a corner composed of three properties, one being to the rear of the corner piece, with a total of about forty feet front on Bay and eighty-five feet on Temperance street, all covered with three-story brick buildings. The property adjoining on Temperance street, the Grip Building, is owned by W. Carrick, who is reported to have leased it recently for a five year term. The Grip Company expects to move out early this fall into the Graphic Arts Building. Last winter negotiations were going thru on behalf of a Montreal insurance company for the acquisition of the three properties comprising the Carrick property, but the deal thru when it was made.

Permits for Seven Days \$713,000

Building permits issued from June 1 to 8 inclusive aggregate \$713,900 in estimated cost. Of this total 112 permits are for dwellings at an average cost of \$3950 each, or practically \$4000. The balance, 15 permits, totals \$271,000 and is for 15 factory extensions, garages and stores. Yesterday morning a permit was issued to the Doherty Manufacturing Co. to erect a six-story brick and stone warehouse at 315 Spadina-avenue, to cost \$50,000.

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Actual Status of Porcupine Camp--Hollinger Town Again

EARLY BUIGE WHEAT IS ENTIRELY WIPED OUT

Sharp Break in Values in Chicago Pit Follows Big Advance Occasioned by Crop Report--Corn and Oats on Down Grade.

CHICAGO, June 11.—Alto the wheat market responded promptly to day to the bullish crop report from Washington, the effect faded on account of demand proving to be not of a lasting sort. The close was weak at a range slanting from last night's level to 5-8c lower. Corn finished a shade to 1-4c lower, oats 1-4c to 1-8c and wheat 1-4c to 1-8c lower. The market was quiet except for a rush of buying orders at the start. The government report brought no excitement or increased business, but upheld the market at a substantial advance until the last half hour, when the dead weight of limited account began to tell and prices crumbled. Beneficial rains counted somewhat against wheat values.

Corn Also Weakened. Corn reluctantly advanced on rumor that a large amount of the stock here had become hot in the elevators. Dealers, fine weather and the wheat collapse led afterward to selling. The close was weak.

The bullish crop news from Washington put a drag all day on oats. Temporary strength of wheat and corn acted as a mild opposing influence. Provisions took on a steady tone than had been the rule of late.

RIO SHOWS ITS WHEELS AGAIN

Traction Security Makes Another Sharp Spurt, Duplicating Former Record—Failed to Enthuse.

A revival of enthusiasm in Rio, which scored one of its recurring sharp advances on the morning of a decidedly strong buying demand, was the outstanding feature of the Toronto Stock Exchange yesterday. Outside of this particular instance, there was decidedly little of interest in the transactions. Some of the more active issues reflected to some extent the buoyancy in the big traction stock, but on the whole prices did little more than hold their own around previous levels, with a few instances immaterial weakness was shown.

Higher prices on Rio were inspired by the raising of bids on the security in the London market. Early cables told of a sharp advance in the quotation and this was followed by a gain of here under the sustained buying. 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FIRM TREND MAINTAINED IN MONTREAL

MONTREAL, June 11.—General conditions on the local stock market were satisfactory during the first four months of the year. The tone on the exchange was a sharp advance in the volume and price changes for the most part small. An outstanding feature was a sharp advance in Rio, which carried the price to 132 1/2, or within an eighth of the high record achieved last month. Concurrently, Sao Paulo also showed strength, selling up to 244 1-2 ex-dividend for a net gain of 1-1/2 points.

Winnipeg Railway rose to 226, reacting before the close to 225, leaving a net gain of 1-1/2. Winnipeg new stock sold at 224 for a gain of four points. Montreal Street Railway, selling at 240, about five points over its highest of the year. The advance followed a sharp rise in Montreal Tramway stock on the curb. Apart from the issues mentioned above, price changes for the day were confined to small fractions and showed a mixture of gains and losses.

SOFTENED UP IN STOCK MARKET

Wall Street Proves Sensitive to Influence of Investigations Under Way—Prices Succumb Rapidly.

NEW YORK, June 11.—With two important federal investigations under way in this city, it is hardly to be wondered at that today's stock market reflected more than a moderate degree of sensitiveness. It is clear from what has already transpired that the enquiry by the congressional committee into the relations of the stock exchanges to the public is larger in scope than was at first believed. This is evident from the fact that several of the leading commission houses have already been notified that it is the intention of the investigators to have them appear before the committee and give information relative to recent transactions. This is understood to apply especially to a certain industrial security whose meteoric advance earlier in the year excited considerable comment.

Disappointment arising from the failure of the United States supreme court to take action before the summer recess on several important cases, in which the financial community and investors have a legitimate interest, including the status of the coal transportation companies and the Union Pacific-Southern Pacific merger, helped in no small measure to dampen the feeling of dissatisfaction prevalent in various quarters. This was shown in the pronounced weakness of the anthracite shares.

The greater part of the selling took place in the morning, when Lehigh Valley and Reading declined 3 and 4 points respectively, while Union Pacific and some of the Grangers sold off over 2 points. St. Paul's fall marking its lowest quotation in five years. There was also heavy trading in U. S. Steel and other favorite industrial shares, amid other recessions, while some of the last year's strong specialties, notably the Tobacco stocks, also reacted sharply.

Partial recovery set in about midday and further hardening of prices occurred in the last hour, when some of the issues made up gains of 1/2 to 1 point. Trading diminished in volume on the slight rebound, with an undertone of extreme caution being maintained until the dull and rather heavy close.

CONSOLS DROP TO LOWEST IN MANY YEARS

British consols, the security representing the debt of the British Empire, sold yesterday at 75-16, the lowest quotation which they have changed hands since 1904, when they were quoted down as low as 74.

The highest price ever recorded for consols was obtained in 1907, when, on account of a scarcity of stock, the price of sinking funds, and the demand for the investment of savings banks, the price was advanced to 114. The price at which they sold was 47 1/2, on September 20, 1907, when the new issue of the municipality at the North Beach London. The average price between 1885 and 1907 was a little under 85, but during that period there were wide fluctuations. Consols were inflated between 1907 and 1909.

In 1908, when the rate was 4 1/2 per cent, as low as 1908, gradually fell to 82-16 and changed at 7 1/2 per cent. Since then, it has been a low point of 78 1/2, and so far this year the high and low quotations have been 82 1/2 and 79 1/2 respectively.

LONDON FEARS LABOR CRISIS

LONDON, June 11.—Money was in fair demand and discount rates were steady today. The nervousness of the settlement restricted operations on the Stock Exchange, and foreign securities were dull. Home rails had a setback at the opening, owing to the transport workers calling a general strike; but the half-hearted response of the stockmen caused a firmer tone in the afternoon. Marconi shares eased off, and the mining section, where traders were occupied by the carry-over, showed irregular changes.

American securities opened steady and a fraction higher. Trading was light during the forenoon and prices moved irregularly. The market was dull until the late trading, when values sagged following the decline in Wall-Street. The closing was flat.

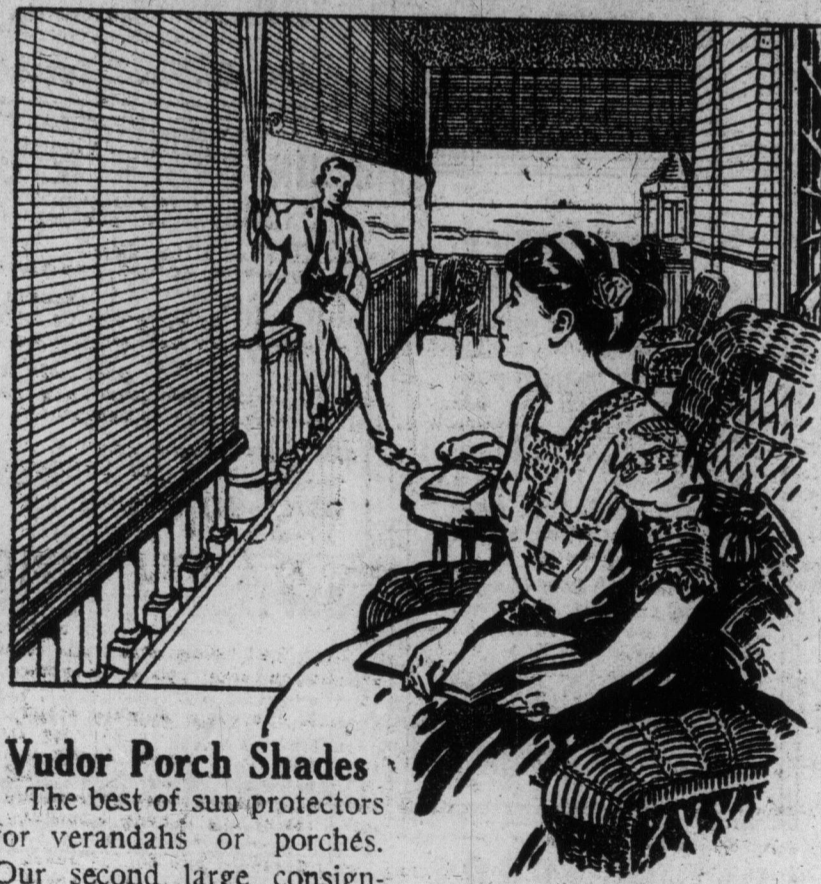
