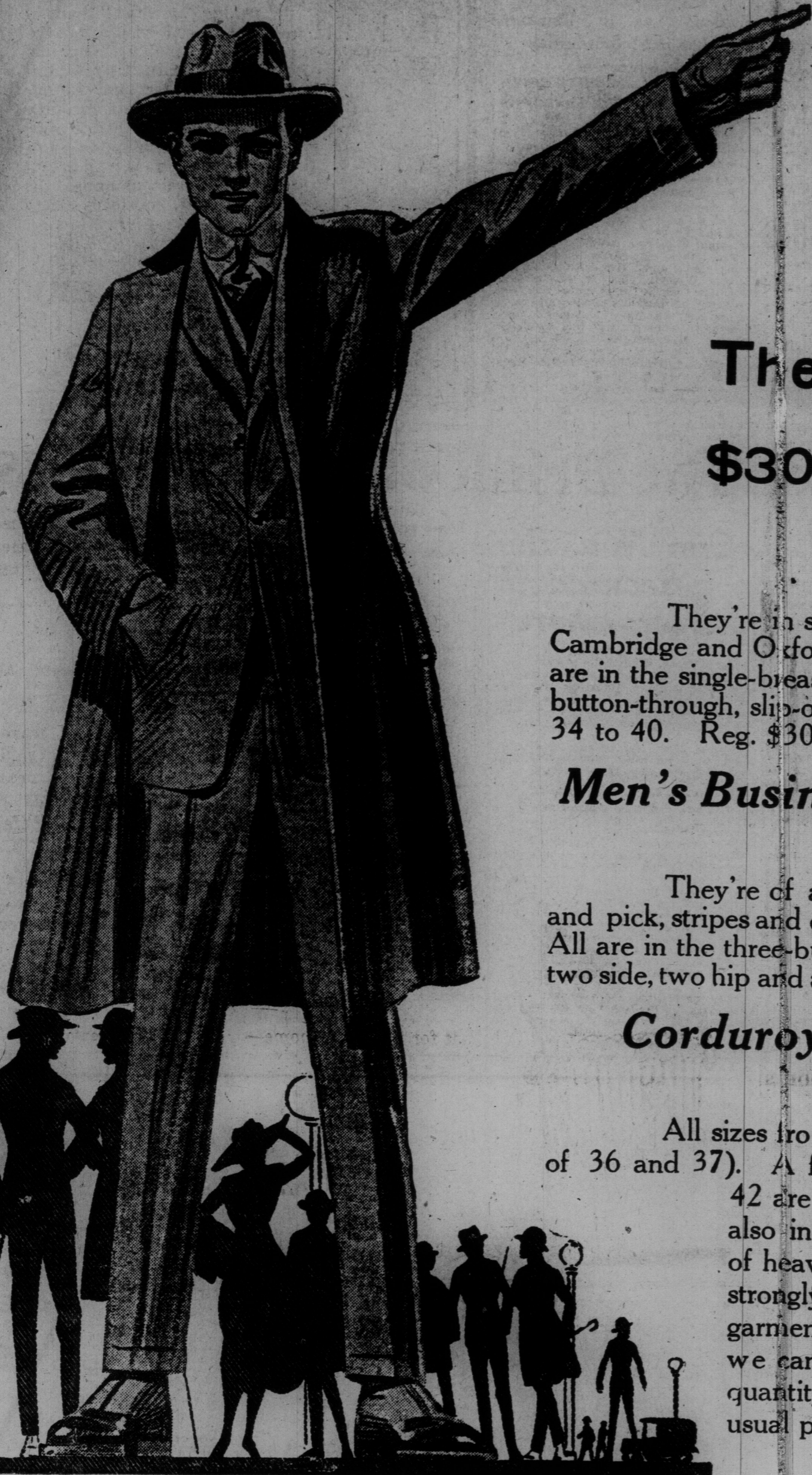

An Unwise Monopoly. Official intimation was received in the city yesterday that the province had been refused the license for which it had applied to the Ottawa government for the manufacture of salvarsan, the German patent for the cure of venereal disease, the spread of which is largely dependent upon the supply of this remedy.

In Massachusetts salvarsan is prepared at 25 cents a dose. The Ontario government desires to manufacture it and distribute it free, so as to check the deadly disease for which it is a specific.

Strong representations have been made to the responsible ministers, but it is surmised that the decision has been left to minor officials, with the result that for the trifling advantage to the monopoly of the profits on ten per cent of their total output by their own admission, the virulent and loathsome disease of syphilis is allowed to go unchecked in the land.

The attention of Hon. Mr. Calder and Hon. Mr. Rowell should be given to this matter personally and licenses issued to such provinces as have asked for them, when the free distribution of the remedy will enable innumerable lives to be saved and much suffering, often among entirely innocent victims, to be avoided.

Province Must Control Water Resources.

Sir Adam Beck's plea for the inviolability of provincial rights in the ownership and development of the water powers of Ontario is unanswerable. There is a possibility, however, that the merits of the case may be confused or lost sight of by the introduction of racial railway issues, or something else on which there might be disagreement.

The federal government's concern with water-power is only indirect in connection with the navigation of the St. Lawrence and the international questions involved. Whatever improvements the government carries out to improve navigation and which may benefit the development of water-power as far as expense is concerned should be debated against the provincial government as may be determined justly.

The federal government desires power for any purpose it can be had from the province, and on the most favorable terms—power at cost. The installations of the Hydro-Electric Commission have not been excelled and cannot be beaten.

This issue should be quite straight and clear. The province must control and develop its own water resources. The generation and distribution of power at cost is vital to Ontario.

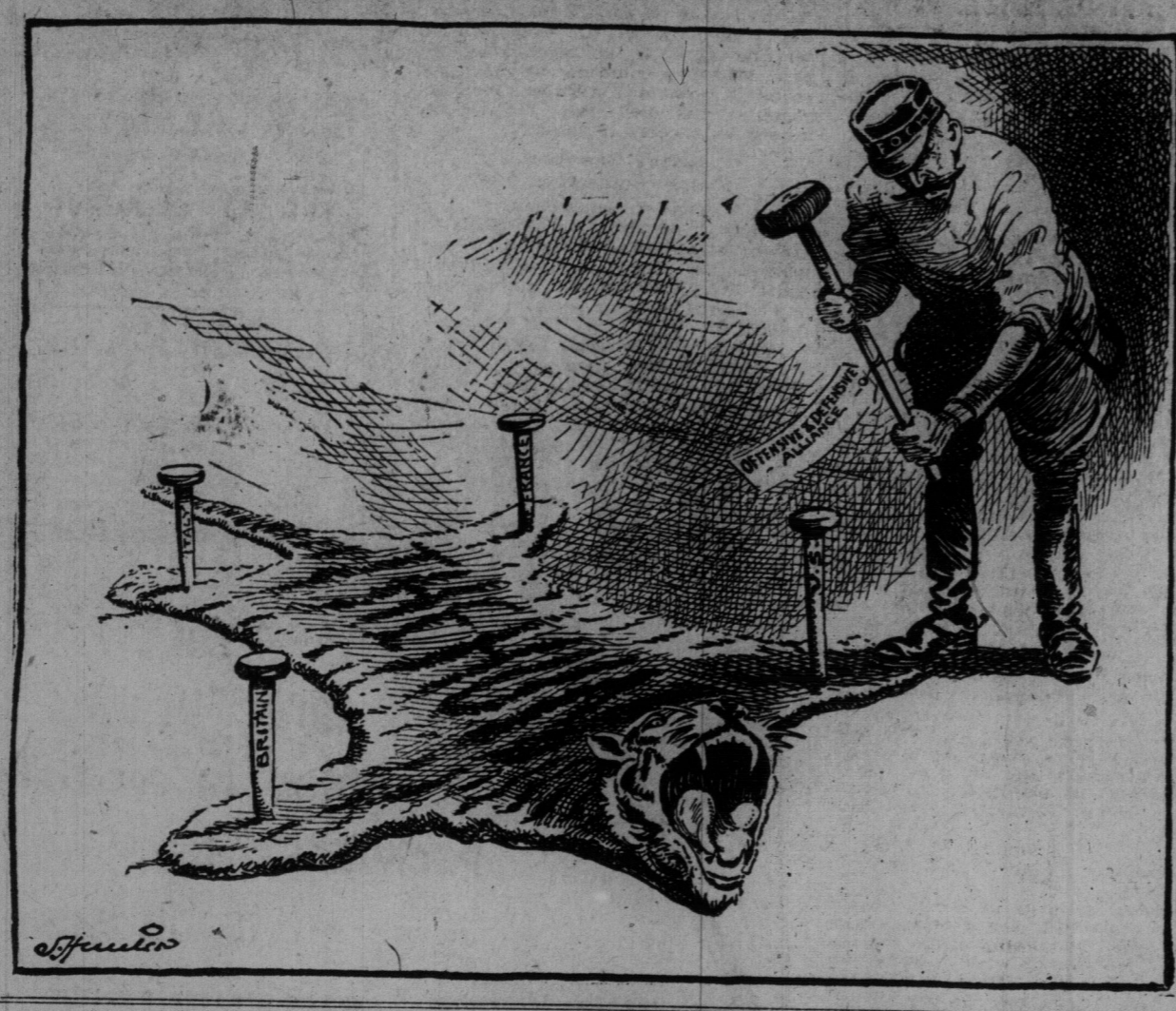
Major Mowat, M.P., has brought in a bill to amend the criminal code in the matter of capital punishment by substituting electrocution for hanging.

Major Mowat's bill provides that executions take place at the nearest penitentiary, where a room shall be set apart for the purpose. This provision also obviates the possibility of the escape of the condemned.

If we are to have executions, it is undoubtedly wise to adopt the most humane and painless method. Electrocution has been in use in the United States since 1889, and there are not such opportunities for disagreeable accidents at an electrocution as have too frequently attended unskilful attempts to hang criminals.

There is no reason why Canada should not adopt the method now generally recognized and approved in civilized communities for carrying out the capital sentence.
