He Describes Leithridge, Its Coal Mines, Railways and Business Facilities.

The territory of Alberta is divided into no less than ten districts, Leithridge, High River, Calgary East and West, Banff, Red Deer, Edmonton, St. Albert, Victoria and MacLeod.

The cattle industry here, as in other districts, is a very important one and about \$25,000 is paid out annually in this district, including the territory as far south as Cardston.

Leithridge is also quite an important place also from the extensive coal mining interests located there. Although the coal is of a high quality, it is not so rich in bituminous content as the coal of the Carboniferous period.

CLAIM FOR LIFE SALVAGE.

The Allan Line's Suit Against the Ocean Transport Company—Captain's Duty Towards Passengers.

From The Liverpool Post, June 24. In the Admiralty Division of the High Court yesterday Mr. Justice Gorell Barnes, who was assisted by Captain Byrne and Barlow, Masters, heard the case of James & Alexander Allan and others v. The Ocean Transport Company (Limited). The plaintiffs were suing on behalf of themselves and all other owners of the Allan Line's Sardinian and Austrian, and they claimed salvage remuneration for services rendered to the steamship Mariposa, owned by the defendants, but which at the time was running to the Dominion Line and flying the Dominion Line flag. The Mariposa became a total loss.

The case set up on behalf of the Sardinian was that on September 24 last, she, in the course of a voyage from Montreal to the Kingdom of Sardinia, with 139 passengers, a valuable cargo, Government mails, and a crew of 106 hands all told, was in the Straits of Belle Isle when those on board observed the schooner Telegram approaching from the west. The Sardinian's engines were stopped and a boat from the Telegram came alongside, and the master of the Sardinian was informed that the Mariposa in the course of a voyage from Montreal to Liverpool, with 21 passengers and a valuable cargo, had gone ashore during a fog on the west coast of the Mariposa, about 10 miles west of Porteau Bay, and was in great danger and that the passengers were nearly ashore, but exposed to great risk and considerable hardships. Those from the Telegram also delivered a message to the master of the Sardinian requesting him to proceed to the assistance of the Mariposa and her passengers and crew. The Sardinian did so, and one of the Mariposa's boats, with an officer in charge, brought the Mariposa and crew to the Sardinian and proceeded to proceed to a fishing village five miles along the coast of Labrador towards Fox Harbour, and brought on board the Sardinian 49 persons (passengers and crew). The Sardinian provided the cabin passengers with first-class accommodation and the crew with the best accommodation, and then proceeded on her voyage to Liverpool, where the rescued persons were landed.

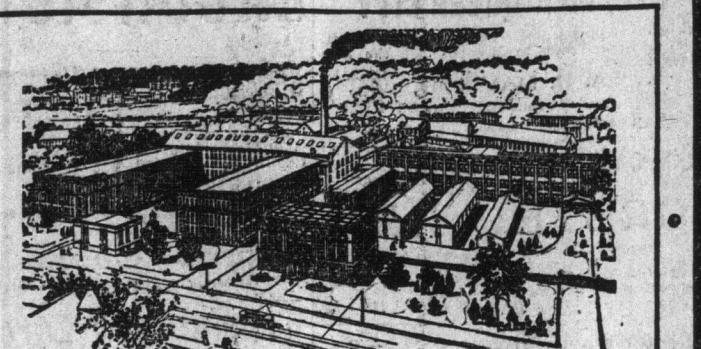
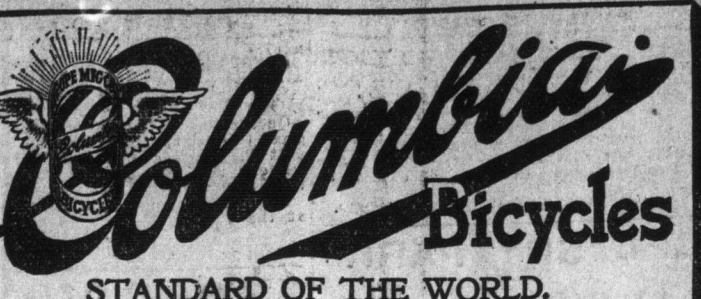

What is meant by "Free Coinage and Independent" Coining of Silver—Effect on World.

New York Herald. By free coinage it is meant that anybody—individuals and corporations, natives and foreigners—may send bullion to the United States mints and have it coined into dollars free of charge, except the cost of the alloy employed.

Our mints and those of all the great commercial nations of Europe are to-day open to the free coinage of gold. None of them is open to silver. Our gold coin is accepted in any market in the world at the equivalent of its face value, not because of the mint stamp, but because the bullion in it is worth that amount.

But if the United States placed its mints at home, and allowed every citizen who chose to have fifty-three cents worth of silver stamped into a dollar with which he could then discharge a hundred cents of debt to our own citizens with every mine in this country and every owner of gold spoons turning his silver into dollars without end—it stands to reason that the government could not keep this vast unlimited mass of silver dollars at a parity with gold, and they would circulate at home at a value of only a few cents.
