Manila, April 2.—(6.30 p.m.)—The American troops under General McArthur, are still resting at Malolos, where everything has been quiet to-day. Hostillites elsewhere—so far as officially reported—have been limited during the last 24 hours to an occasional exchange of shots between the insurgents and the troops forming the lines of General Lawton and General Hall, extending from the water works to Lalonia. But this shooting has just been active enough to make the lives of the soldiers a burden, and to compel the officers to gleep in the trenches, clothed and in readiness to repel possible attacks.

Americans.

As the Spaniards View It.

The Spaniards, reasoning from their experience of the natives, refuse to believe that the rebellion is anywhere near put down. They declare that the Filipinos will not take their defeat at Malolos with the loss of the city and the removal of their so-called government seriously to heart. On the contrary, the Spaniards predict that the insurgents will hover near the American lines, bothering them as much as possible, and when attacked in force, dissolve, only to reappear at other points. This sort of tactics—the Spaniards say—will be followed until the wet season compels the Americans to be housed in barracks, and then the Filipinos will return and re-occupy such towns as the United States troops do not garrison. With the next dry season a repetition of the present operations will begin. Time alone will show how much is in this theory; but, as against it, it must be borne in mind that the Spaniards in all their domination of the Philipines never gave the inhabitants a demonstration of power comparable in effectiveless to that given them by the Americans.

Caloocan is now full of friendlies, mostly
women, children and old people, who are returning to their homes, carrying white
flags. The Americans are trying to gain
the confidence of the inhabitants by proving
to them that if they will return and attend to their ordinary work peacefully, no
harm will befal them. Two hundred and
fifty civilians came back to their homes in
Malolos on the east side of the city, and
afterwards sneaked away, carrying all the
goods they could.

WHAT AGONCILLO SAYS. The Capture of Malolos Not So Important as the Americans Want to Make Out.

Paris, April 2.—Agoncillo, the agent of Aguinaido, in the course of an interview published in La Patrie, says:

"The capture of Malolos is not as important as the Americans are trying to make it appear. The Filipino Government and already determined upon removal to San Fernando, and a small detachment of troops was left with orders to burn the town and thus to draw the Americans inland. Two months of rain and fever will save the Filipinos their ammunition and a good deal of trouble, and the war will not end while a single Filipino remains to bear arms. He charges Major-General Otis with opening hostilities, and holds the Americans responsible for the transfer of the Spanish prisoners and for preventing the Filipinos negotiating a treaty with Span. Agoncillo is confined to his room with the induenza.



Editor World: I notice in a report of a recent meeting of the Trades and Labor Council the following in reference to Aid. Tenderness for the poor workingman was of course the pretext for the enactment of this bylaw, but to suppose that the author did not really know that he might as well have attempted to legislate value into a bushel of potatoes or a barrel of flour, is almost too absurd for belief; and whether it was the effect upon the next city election that was really the main object in view, is the question that naturally arises. The bylaw was an example of fool legislation, easier to start than to remedy after once put in motion, which has resulted directly contrary to what might have been expected, and which, until rescinded, goes on from bad to worse.

I venture to say that there is hardly a member of the City Council who is not privately of the opinion that the fitteencent bylaw is a most iniquitous and disastrous plece of municipal legislation, but I presume it is equally true that there is screely a member of the Council who would dare to act in accordance with his honest conviction in taking active part in the movement to wipe it out of existence. So far as present indications go, we are inclined to believe that the increase in acreage will fully compensate for the injury to the crop, but there is no reason for getting short of the market while speculation has the reins. The market ranged between 72% and 74%, closing at 72% for May.

I cordially approve of the measures adopted for supplementing the revenues of the Province. By the Act of last year, which required the manufacture of saw-logs in Canada, it was inevitable that the receipts from the Crown Lands Department would be impaired, and, when to the probable loss of revenue is added the expenditure arising from the increase of population and the growing needs of the people, the public interests required that provision should be made for all necessary expenditure and for the maintenance of the financial standing of the Province. I am glad that you have been able to effect this by a moderate tax' upon the accumulation of capital and by a reasonable increase in the duties upon distillers'. Drewers' and ilquor licenses. It is gratifying to believe that the taxes imposed will not be burdensome to any of the classes affected.

In order, however, that the agricultural resources of the northerly and westerly parts of Ontario may be opened up for further settlement and that the valuable mineral deposits now generally believed to exist in great abundance in the same districts may be brought within the possibilities of development and that the timber and other resources of those districts may be made available the further extension of our railways sys-Aid to Railways. the timber and other resources of those districts may be made available the further extension of our railway systems to those sections becomes necessary. I am pleased therefore to think that within two or three years access will probably be obtained by railway to agricultural lands in the Rainy River district and the mineral and timber lands lying between Hainy Lake and Port Arthur.
