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REPORT OF THE KIRK SESSION.

The time having arrived for presenting the various reports of our congregational work for the past year, the Kirk Session, in accordance with their usual practice, submit the following statement concerning those matters which are entrusted to their oversight.

The past year has been an eventful one in the history of the Congregation. A change has taken place which was not anticipated at the last annual meeting. Then, we had a pastor endeared to us by many years of faithful ministerial labor and affectionate intercourse; but, in the providence of God, he has since been called to another sphere of labor; and we are now left, for a time, "as sheep without a shepherd," exposed to the dangers and inconveniences incident to the flock of a vacant pastorate.

Rumors of the Rev. Mr. Gordon's probable acceptance of a call to another charge were in circulation for some time before anything was definitely known in Ottawa of his future intentions respecting the matter. It was only on the first day of May last, that he intimated to the Session that he had received a call from Knox Church, Winnipeg, and that the claims of the Church in that city, and of Presbyterianism in the North-west Territories, impressed him so strongly that he felt he would be constrained to accept the call which had been extended to him, and, at a meeting of Presbytery, held a few days later, he finally decided to accept the call. Thereafter, he proceeded to the meeting of the General Assembly and did not again return to Ottawa; so that the Congregation had not the benefit of his personal services after the twelfth day of June last. The Church, however, was not declared vacant until the twentieth day of August, at which date Mr. Gordon's pastoral connection with the Congregation terminated, and, by appointment of Presbytery, the Rev. Joseph White assumed the duties of interim-moderator of the Kirk Session.

The severance of the pastoral tie, which had for so many years happily connected Mr. Gordon with the Congregation, occasioned deep and general regret; and the Session, conjointly with the other office-

bearers of the Church, endeavored by all reasonable means to retain him in the pastorate of this church.

The Session, without attempting to give anything like a full account of the proceedings, deem it proper to refer in this Report to the united action which was taken by your office-bearers, on hearing of Mr. Gordon's probable acceptance of the call to Winnipeg. They, after consulting together, appointed a deputation to present the following address :

Address to the Rev. D. M. Gordon, B. D., Minister of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa :

"The undersigned, members and adherents of your Congregation and occasional worshippers in St. Andrew's Church, learn with the deepest regret that your translation to another charge is seriously contemplated."

"We have respectfully addressed the Presbytery of Ottawa, giving expression to our warm personal attachment to you, and our earnest hope that, after considering all the interests involved, they will consent to our wish that the proposed translation may not be effected, and that we may continue to profit by your remaining amongst us."

"We trust that the course we have taken will be agreeable to you ; and we hereby express to you personally our heartfelt wish, that you will consent to remain in your present charge."

"Whatever your future, our prayer will be, that you may long continue, with as much acceptance as in the past, to fill a field of usefulness."

Dated Ottawa, May 8th, 1882.

This address, signed by eight hundred persons, was presented to Mr. Gordon who was pleased to reply as follows :

"*Friends and Fellow Office-bearers of the Church,*—I thank you very heartily for this address, so largely signed by members of our Congregation and by others who occasionally worship in St. Andrew's Church."

"When asked to enter on another field of labor, it is most gratifying to me that you, among whom I have labored so long, should bear such testimony to my work."

"You are kind enough to plead against my removal. I need not assure you, that this matter has received my most careful consideration; indeed, no movement of my life has caused me more anxious thought than this."

"It is with pain that I contemplate leaving Ottawa. The attachments formed in the course of my ministry here have been such, that only a constraining sense of duty could lead me to think of severing them."

"Personal comfort and the manifest regard of a forbearing, harmonious and generous Congregation plead strongly that I should remain; but, on the other hand, I have reason to expect that I may, physically and otherwise, be able to work with more vigor in Winnipeg than in Ottawa, and I am persuaded that the Church has more need there than here of such services as I may be able to render."

"The decision of Presbytery is necessary before final action be taken; but while the members of Presbytery will of necessity give due weight to the considerations urged by you, as well as to those urged by the Congregation at Winnipeg, they will also no doubt have regard to my own personal convictions of duty."

"It would be a very painful disappointment to me if my departure should seriously affect the work of the Church in Ottawa. I trust, however, that the action of every member and office-bearer of the Congregation may be such, that no injury nor loss may be sustained by my removal, and that all will be hopeful and zealous for the Church's welfare."

"Brethren, 'The Lord reigns.' He will guard the work and welfare of His Church; and I have no reason to doubt that when He calls me elsewhere, He will send you another to whom you will extend the same considerate affection and support that you have always shewn to me."

"I must ask you to convey the assurance of my gratitude and regard to those who have signed this address, and to all the other members of the Congregation."

"The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you."

(Signed,) DANIEL M. GORDON.

The Manse, Ottawa, 15th May, 1882.

The petition referred to in the foregoing address, signed by four hundred and fifty persons, was presented to the Presbytery by commis-

sioners appointed by the Congregation for that purpose, but after receiving Mr. Gordon's decisive reply, it was deemed inexpedient to embarrass him, by offering any strenuous opposition to his translation to Winnipeg, and after hearing all the parties, the Presbytery granted the prayer for translation.

Previous to Mr. Gordon's departure from Ottawa, a very enthusiastic farewell meeting with him was held in the Church, called at the special request of members of the other Protestant Churches in the city, at which meeting the following resolution was moved, seconded and supported by a number of prominent lay and clerical speakers, viz :

Resolved: "That this public meeting of citizens of Ottawa, being pastors, members and adherents of the various Protestant Churches, gladly avail themselves of the opportunity, now afforded them, of expressing, as they hereby do, their sincere respect and very high personal esteem for the Rev. D. M. Gordon, B. D., their warm appreciation of the distinguished public services he has rendered, for well nigh fifteen years, in connection with the educational, religious and philanthropic institutions and interests of this city; their deep regret at his removal, for they regard it as involving themselves and the community at large in a great and painful loss, and their very cordial desire that Heaven's richest blessings may ever attend him, as also Mrs. Gordon and his family, and that, in the new and important sphere, on which he expects soon to enter, he may be abundantly strengthened and encouraged amid all his duties, and find his labours crowned with signal success."

Thereafter, the Ottawa Auxilliary Bible Society and the St. Andrew's Society followed, with addresses and presentations, to all of which Mr. Gordon replied with much feeling; and at the close of the meeting, as the audience passed out of the Church, he shook hands with his many friends, and bade them farewell.

Since the Church became vacant, the pulpit has been regularly and efficiently supplied by several ministers from other parts of Canada, who, in response to the invitation of your Committee, kindly gave the required supply. The Congregation must still be dependent on the ministers of the Church for a continuance of their services; but in the present favorable prospect of the speedy settlement of a minister in this charge, it will probably be only for a short time, and it is not anticipated that there will be any difficulty in securing the necessary future supply.

The Session would take this opportunity of thanking those ministers, from a distance, who have rendered the Congregation such excel-

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lent services, and also to thank the ministers of our sister churches in this city, for their kindly offices to the members of our Congregation, in seasons of sickness and times of family bereavement that have occurred in the course of the past year.

During the vacancy the Weekly Prayer Meeting has been discontinued, and the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper has been dispensed only half-yearly instead of quarterly.

It has hitherto been usual in our Reports, to refer to the Christian life and work of the Congregation; and if the Session under existing circumstances may presume to speak of this matter, they would say, that there has not been in all respects the same degree of vigor manifested in our life and work during the past year as has appeared in some previous years of our Congregational life—whilst the attendance at Divine Service has generally been equal to that of previous years, yet the ordinance of the Supper has been neglected by many—there has been no increase in our membership,—and the claims of the schemes of the Church upon the liberality of the Congregation have not been so generally responded to by the members as in former years. These instances may be taken as indications of dullness in our Christian life, and loss of vigor in our Congregational work, which the Session have noticed with regret. They trust, however, that when the Lord provides us with a pastor, He may also, so quicken us by the influences of the Holy Spirit, that these unfavorable indications shall give place to the better condition of a living Christian Church—in which, every member shall seek to advance the welfare of the whole, by earnest effort and Christian liberality. ●

The work in the Sabbath Schools connected with the Congregation has been efficiently carried on during the past year, as may be seen by reference to the report of the several schools. There has, however, been a recent interruption in the work of the Stewarton School, in consequence of the school-house having been required for Railroad purposes in that neighborhood. It is hoped, however, that some arrangement may shortly be completed whereby the work thus unexpectedly brought to a close, may be resumed in some other building in that locality.

The Bible Class for young men was continued as in the previous year by the Rev. Mr. Gordon up to the time of his removal to Winni-

peg ; since then the class has not been resumed. It is hoped, however, that this important work among the young men of the Congregation will be undertaken by the future pastor, whom the Session hope to see inducted into this charge before many months shall elapse. The Bible Class for young women has been continued as heretofore with encouraging results ; the attendance, however, has not been quite so large as in the previous year.

The District Visitors have, as heretofore, rendered valuable service in their sphere of Congregational work—in visiting their districts monthly—in distributing tracts and receiving the contributions promised to the schemes of the Church.

The work of poor-relief in the Congregation is entrusted to the Ladies' Aid Society. From their Report it will be seen that \$97.97 have been expended for this purpose during the year, calls for relief having been fewer than usual.

The numerical strength of the Congregation appears to be rather less than when last reported. The present number of families connected with the Congregation is 262, being a reduction of five in our list of families. The number of communicants on the Roll is ~~370~~³⁶¹, being 32 less than the number reported last year,—there having been 12 added to the Roll during the year, whilst within the same time 42 names were removed from it,—four by death, 16 by certificate, and 24 by the purging of the Roll.

In accordance with the expressed approval of the last annual meeting of the Congregation, an effort was made to liquidate a portion of the Church debt by means of direct subscription. This movement was commenced last Spring and met with a cordial response from some of our wealthier members ; and had it not been interrupted by the withdrawal of our late pastor, it would in all probability have then been made entirely successful ; and the Session would, at this time, have had the pleasure of congratulating the Congregation on its reduced indebtedness. But the effort then so well begun suddenly subsided, when there came upon us the impending shadow of a vacant pastorate, with all its uncertain future. It is hoped, however, that when the vacancy has been filled, the effort will be again made with renewed energy, and yet prove successful ; so that we may be free to render greater assistance to the general work of the Church.

While the several sums contributed by various members of the Congregation to the schemes, and the total of such contributions are, under the circumstances, very gratifying ; the Session, nevertheless, regret that all the members of the Congregation have not availed themselves of the opportunity of contributing at least something to those Schemes which represent very largely the spiritual life and work of the Church, both at home and in the foreign field—work which they feel, it is both the duty and privilege of every one desiring the advancement of Christ's Kingdom to assist in promoting.

In conclusion, the Session recognize that while there is much in the record of our past year which calls for humiliation, there is also great cause for thankfulness, in view of the commendable spirit of unity, harmony and hopefulness which has hitherto prevailed in the Congregation, and they trust that the same good feeling may still continue and manifest itself in the consideration of the important matters that require to be dealt with in the ensuing year—especially in the choosing and calling of our future minister. They pray that the Congregation may be guided in this matter by a wise discretion—and that the Great Head of the Church may so overrule all our proceedings that we may ultimately obtain a pastor whose labors amongst us the Lord will abundantly bless—to the advancement of His cause and Kingdom.

These show a slight increase in ordinary revenue over last year—the only falling off being in the money received from the Kirk Session on account of interest.

In presenting their Annual Report, the Society have much pleasure in stating that they have had a successful year. The average attendance at the weekly meetings has been eighteen, and during the year three entertainments have been given, the last, the anniversary entertainment, on the 26th of January, having been more than usually successful. At the closing meeting of the season, 1881-2, it was decided to appropriate the funds then on hand towards re-seating the Lecture Room. At the opening one for this season, this decision was reconsidered, and it was then resolved to pay off the debt on the Slater lot.

In consequence of the removal of the Rev. D. M. Gordon to Winnipeg, the Society have to regret the loss of Mrs. Gordon, whose efficient administration of the office of President had so largely contributed to the harmonious working of the Society. She carries with her to her new sphere of labor the best wishes of all those who worked with her here.

They have to thank the many friends in and around the city for the kind assistance and patronage which in so great a measure contributed to the success of their entertainments. They would again express their regret that the membership is not larger—a large attendance conducing not only to the efficiency of the Society, but also to the promotion of a friendly feeling among the ladies of the congregation.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT.

UPPER TOWN SCHOOL.

During the past year the number of Scholars on the roll has increased from 191 to 213, an increase of 22; but, we regret to say, without a corresponding increase in the number of Teachers. The result is that most of the classes are too large, and more Teachers are urgently needed. We hope and pray that the Lord will put it into the hearts of some to come forward and take hold of this work for Him.

The loss of our beloved Pastor has been greatly felt by the School. We formerly enjoyed his presence every Sabbath, except when he was with the Lower Town or Stewarton Schools, and we miss his sympathy, and counsel and participation in our work. Mrs. Gordon, who for years took charge of the Infant Class, is no less missed in the School. Our prayer is that they may be long spared to perform like labours of love in their new sphere in the Far West.

In order to cultivate an interest in the Missions of the Church, the children have been encouraged to contribute weekly for this object alone, the result being that \$135.32 have been raised. This sum has been divided between the Home, Formosa and India Missions. The weekly offerings of the children being wholly devoted to Missions, the Teachers look to the congregation to provide the means for the ordinary expenses of the School, confident of a liberal response when the annual collection for this purpose shall be taken up.

The Library will need replenishing at an early date.

"Lesson Leaves," to encourage Bible study at home by the Scholars, are being supplied this year for the first time. The cooperation of parents in the home study of the lessons is earnestly desired by the Teachers.

As in former years the Teachers meet weekly for the study of the lessons, in conjunction with the other Presbyterian Sabbath Schools in the city. A monthly meeting for prayer, after the close of the School, has recently been begun.
