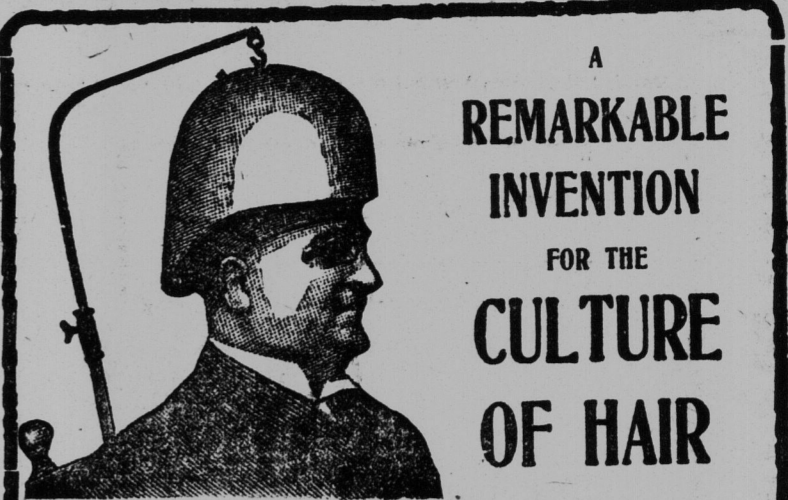

BIG FAILURE IN NEW YORK

Firm With \$6,500,000 of Liabilities Goes to the Wall This Week.

NEW YORK, June 12.—Milliken Bros., incorporated, structural steel and iron contractors and constructors, of 11 Broad way, had a petition in bankruptcy filed yesterday.

It was alleged that the corporation, on June 10, admitted in writing inability to pay debts and willingness to be adjudged bankrupt.

Liabilities are estimated at \$6,500,000 of which \$3,000,000 are unsecured and \$3,000,000 bonds secured by mortgage on the plant at Mariners Harbor, Staten Island.

The business is a very old one, having been established fifty years ago, by Samuel Milliken, who retired in 1883. He was the father of Foster Milliken and Edward F. Milliken who formed the firm of Milliken Bros. in 1884.

For several years previously the style had been Milliken, Smith & Co. Up to 1889 the firm of Milliken Bros. confined their attention to the iron commission business, but after that date they began iron and steel contracting and installing, making rapid progress and operating in various parts of the world.

They had branches at Pittsburg, San Francisco, Havana, City of Mexico, Honolulu, Johannesburg and Cape Town.

The business became so large that it was incorporated on May 17, 1902, with a capital stock of \$2,000,000, which was increased to \$2,500,000 in July, 1905, and again increased to \$5,000,000 in January, 1906.

Another reason given at the time of incorporation, was that, as a firm, in case of death of one of the partners, it might lead to legal complications. Edward F. Milliken became president of the corporation in 1903, and had increased its capacity to make it one of the best and largest of its kind in the east.

The officers boasted that it was the only plant of its kind in the city of New York and operated by New York city workmen. To make these large improvements a bond issue was made of \$3,000,000, secured by mortgage on the property, to the Standard Trust Company as trustee.

The corporation had many large contracts for building in this city, one of which, it is said, is the new Singer Building on Broadway near Liberty street. The corporation bought its supplies of pig iron in the open market and some also, it is said, from the United States Steel Company, and rolled it at Mariners Harbor.

STEEL FAILURE AND WAR TALK

These Were Factors in the Stock Market on Tuesday—No 2 Cent Rate.

(N. Y. Journal of Commerce.)

The two important developments on Tuesday were the vetoing of the 2 cent rate by Governor Hughes and the announcement of the failure of a large steel company.

The first is distinctly encouraging; the later is ominous. An effort was made to create a ware over friction between this country and Japan, but the most ordinary sense of decency ought to revolt at such tactics.

There are many which the stock market bear may resort to in order to depress securities, but the line must be drawn somewhere; at this moment it is nothing short of criminal, as well as being idiotic, financiers assert, to stir up war feelings. The subject need not be further touched upon.

The action of Governor Hughes ought to go far towards demonstrating to corporate interests that while he has been instrumental in securing the passage of a Public Utilities bill, he is not blind to the rights of vested interests. Perhaps it is too much to expect that his example will have sufficient influence in other parts of the country to stay the busy measures that are being considered along the same lines.

The steel failure, the easy logic indulged in that the firm had simply miscalculated the cost of its own building. But here is more significance than appears on the surface of this unfortunate occurrence. There are other concerns that have misjudged the cost of not only making additions to plants, but also of running these same plants, the consequence being that bulging order books have not been tantamount to bulging treasuries.

In other words, operating costs in all fields of industry have swollen at a rate that has resulted in meager net profits. Railroads and industrial corporations must face this problem squarely.

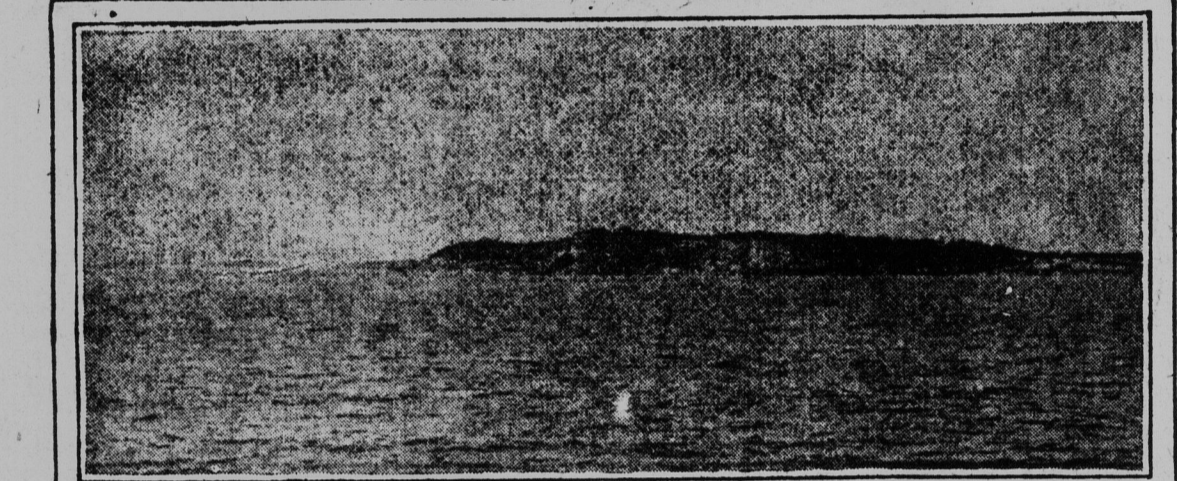

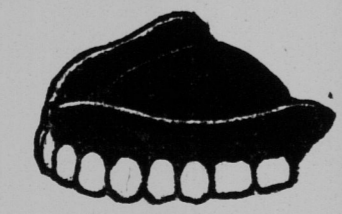
