IF ANOTHER AMERICAN TORPEDOED, THEN WARSHIPS TO SCENE OF FIGHTING

New York Herald so Interprets The Note to Germany

General Satisfaction Over President Wilson's Declaration of American Position—The Onus as to the Future Now is Put Upon the Kaiser and His Advisers

New York, May 14.—Intense interest in the American government's note to Germany was shown here today by thousands of persons, gathered before dawn outside the offices of the morning newspapers, waiting for editions containing the text of the communication.

What he had to do Mr. Wilson has done with utmost simplicity, clarity, completeness. Speaking for a whole nation, he has set forth the American case against the German government in language that cannot be mistaken.

London, May 14.—The Chronicle thinks that the unofficial forecast of the American note, if correct, allows that President Wilson is adhering firmly to the spirit of his original despatch with reference to strict accountability.

Paris, May 14.—The unofficial version of President Wilson's note is highly praised by the morning papers, which show that the era of banal protests is over, and Germany must give formal guarantees that it will not permit similar crimes in future.

Press For Return of Any Improperly Paid Contractors and Prosecute the Guilty—Any Conservative Resignations Are Purely Voluntary

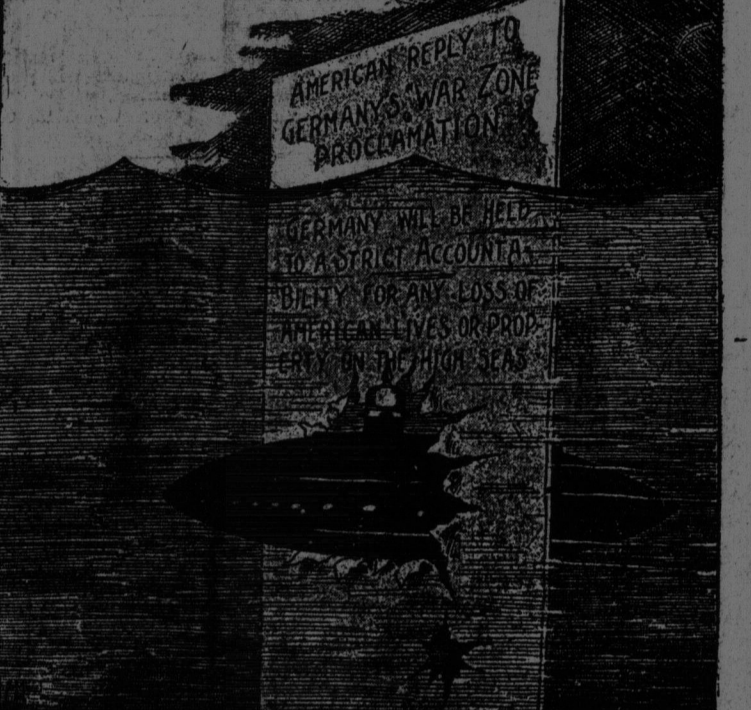
Winnipeg, Man., May 14.—Hon. T. C. Norris, new premier of Manitoba, assumed office yesterday.

Asked about policy, Mr. Norris said: "The general policy of the Liberal party is well known to the people because it was so fully defined and dealt with during the general election last July, and in the legislature during the recent session."

"If Germany takes offense at the president's note, it may declare war upon the United States if it wishes. On the other hand, if the German reply does not fulfill the idea of right as clearly expressed by President Wilson, then another bridge is to be crossed."

SEEK TO DESTROY GREAT GERMAN GUNS

British and French Aeroplanes Attack Enemy on Belgian Coast—French Make Gains in Downpour of Rain

Paris, May 14.—A fleet of British and French aeroplanes has delivered another aerial attack upon the German position along the Belgian coast, destroying several bridges.

Paris, May 14.—The French War Office this afternoon reported: "It has been raining without stop since yesterday morning.

GERMAN SUBMARINES IN THE MEDITERRANEAN: London, May 14.—"Owing to the reported presence of German submarines in the Mediterranean," says Reuters' Athens correspondent, "the British legation has offered a reward of \$2,500 to anyone supplying information which will lead to their destruction."

ROMANCE OF LUSITANIA: London, May 14.—Engineer John Welsh of the Lusitania and Miss Gertrude Nelson, a milliner, were married in Manchester, the home of the bridegroom yesterday. They first met on the liner, and became engaged during the voyage.

FIREMEN CRUSHED UNDER WALL IN FIGHTING BLAZE: Newark, N. J., May 14.—Six firemen were crushed under a falling wall today, while fighting a \$80,000 fire, which burned through four story buildings of the Leather Manufacturing plant of George V. Engel, Inc. here. Some of the injured firemen may not recover.

TODAY'S DRILL: The 26th Battalion carried on company drill today, and also continued trenching operations near Courtney Bay, marching there with picks and shovels and throwing up trenches as they would be required to do in foreign service.

### Germans Admit French Success; a Little More And Line Is Broken

London, May 14.—For the first time in six months the German and French official reports agree. The Germans admit the more important claims made by General Joffre as to the great success won by the French between La Bassee and Arras. If this attack can be pushed home, the consequences will be still more marked, in the opinion of British military commentators, who are claiming today that a little further advance by the French will open a conspicuous gap in the German line which would necessitate the falling back of the Germans on a wide front.

To the north of La Bassee the British are doing little more than holding their own, but at the same time they are keeping great masses of Germans engaged, troops who otherwise would be available against the French offensive.





UNUSUAL WILL OF NOVA SCOTIA MAN

Bequests to Son and Daughter Dependent Upon Marriage and Number of Children

The will of George N. Crosby, of Bear River, N. S., is of unusual interest. He leaves to his daughter, Doris, \$2,000 on the occasion of her marriage, and an additional \$1,000 on the birth of each child. He also provides \$90 a month for his daughter during the time that she remains single. By the time she reaches the age of thirty-six, if his daughter is still unmarried, and his son, Theophilus Crosby, is married, the estate is to be divided between them. If his son is then unmarried the entire estate is to go to the daughter.

The bequests to his daughter also become void if she marries the son of a Digby county man, whom he names in the will.

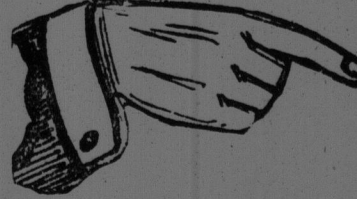

THE AMERICAN NOTE

Washington, May 13.—In the note published to Ambassador Gerard, today for presentation to the German government, attention was called to the grave situation which has resulted from a violation of American rights on the high seas, culminating in the sinking of the Lusitania with a loss of more than 100 American lives.

The communication expresses the confident expectation of the United States that the Imperial German government will disavow the acts of which the government of the United States complains, that they will make reparation, so far as reparation is possible, for injuries which are without measure, and that they will take immediate steps to prevent the recurrence of anything so obviously subversive of the principles of warfare, for which the Imperial government of Germany in the past, so firmly contended.

In conclusion the note states that the Imperial German government will not expect the government of the United States to omit any word or any act necessary to the performance of its sacred duty of maintaining the rights of the United States and its citizens, and of safeguarding their free exercise and enjoyment.

 This shipment will mean very much to those ladies as it is now practically impossible for them to obtain any more cotton thread in France owing to a regulation under which the sale is restricted to one spool for each person. At present they are compelled to do their sewing with black silk, which is very expensive and, as given this supply is very limited their future work is really dependent upon the receipt of thread from outside countries, which raises very great difficulties.  
 The box will be packed on May 22 so, to make it easier for ladies to cooperate baskets with above them the sign: "Drop in a White Cotton Spool for the Belgians" will be placed for a few days in the stores of Manchester Robertson Allison, Ltd., Macaulay Bros & Co., F. W. Daniel & Co., and F. W. Dyerman Co. by their kind permission, and ladies shopping will in this way be enabled to drop in their contributions.
