


In the present temper of the British people, following the Lusitania horror, the bombardment of peaceful towns and villages, and other crimes conscutted by the Germans, this action appeers to have been forced upon the government. The government and peo-ple had been very tolerant. German prisoners of high rank, on parole, had

been treated not only with courtesy but genuine hospitality. Moreover, Germans in business in Britain were not molested. Now, however, in the face of the whole-sale murder of women and children, with the approval of the German government and the applause of the German press, the outraged feelings of the British have found expression in such outbursts against Germans in Britain that the gov-ernment is forced to take action.
