This Gives Liberal Majority of Fifteen in Nova Scotia

Premier Murray Elated at General Result—Statement of Opposition Leader.

Halifax, N. S., July 28-Over the long distance telephone today, Hon. R. M. McGregor, of New Glasgow, a member of the Murray government, stated that he had been defeated in Pictou county. He was unable to give the figures. This makes the standing as follows;

Liberals elected, 29. Conservatives elected, 1. Farmers elected, 7.

Labor elected, 6.

Government majority, 15. The last house of assembly was composed of 82 Liberals and 11 Conserv-

R. W. Rogers, one of two women candidates in the field for the first time in Nova Scotia, led the defeated Conservative ticket in Cumberland, and Mrs. J. M. Donaldson, the other one of two Labor candidates in Pictou, footed the poll in her constituency.

In a statement given to the Canadian Press last night, Premier Murray, who is in Victoria county, Cape Breton, stated that he accepted the victory, not exultingly, but as the verdict of an honest electorate in favor of good government and a token of the great loyalty of the men and women of the province to the cause of Liberalism. He continued:

"We fought a fair fight and the people have given me a support of which I am very proud. It will be an inspiration to me to merit their confidence."

The premier expressed deep regret at the defeat of Hon. E. H. Armstrong in Yarmouth, and Col. Ralston in Cumberland.



Embargo Against Tidewater Shipments Practically Shuts Off Export.

NEW ENGLAND

Washington, July 28-Adequate orders have been issued, members of the interstate commerce commission believed today, to relieve the coal shortage in New
England. Beginning next Monday, under the priority orders promulgated yesterday by the commission, coal will be
moved through five Atlantic ports to
New England consignees at the rate of
1,250,000 tons a month.

Coal dealers were agreed that if shipments were maintained at this level, a
fuel famine would be averted.

Orders of the interstate commerce
commission included provision for an
embargo against tidewater shipments
until daily consignments to New England are filled. This restriction, coal

off export of coal.

Secretary Houston, of the Treasury Department, has approved the new ruling, which repeals Section 74, Regulations 60, authorizing procurement of liquors for use in "first aid" treatment at manufacturing, industrial and other establishments hitherto.
