TAKING NO CHANCES

HON. R. M. MCGREGOR LOSES ELECTION

This Gives Liberal Majority of Fifteen in Nova Scotia

Premier Murray Elated at General Result—Statement of Opposition Leader.

Halifax, N. S., July 28.—Over the long distance telephone today, Hon. R. M. McGregor, of New Glasgow, a member of the Murray government, stated that he had been defeated in Pictou county. He was unable to give the figures. This makes the standing as follows: Liberals elected, 29.

Conservatives elected, 1. Farmers elected, 7. Labor elected, 8. Government majority, 15.

The last house of assembly was composed of 22 Liberals and 11 Conservatives. Among the more prominent candidates defeated were Hon. E. F. Armstrong, commissioner of public works and mines, one of two Liberal candidates in Yarmouth; Lieut. Colonel J. L. Halston, C. M. G., one of three Liberal candidates in Cumberland; and W. L. Hall, leader of the opposition, one of two Conservative candidates in Queens. Mrs. R. W. Rogers, one of two women candidates in the field for the first time in Nova Scotia, led the defeated Conservative ticket in Cumberland.

Mr. Donaldson, the other one of two labor candidates in Pictou, footed the bill in her constituency.

In a statement given to the Canadian Press last night, Premier Murray, who is in Victoria county, Cape Breton, stated that he accepted the victory, not exultingly, but as the verdict of a honest electorate in favor of good government and a token of the great loyalty of the men and women of the province to the cause of Liberalism. He continued: "We fought a fair fight and the people have given me a support of which I am very proud. It will be an inspiration to me to merit their confidence."

The premier expressed deep regret at the defeat of Hon. E. H. Armstrong in Yarmouth and Col. Halston in Cumberland.

The Opposition Leader.

Halifax, July 28.—In a statement on the result of the election, W. L. Hall, defeated Conservative leader, said: "The result of the election demonstrates that for the time being the country is apparently content with the present government. This is the verdict of the people and it must be accepted. The reason is difficult to explain, but I prefer to analyze the vote before making any extended remark or attempting to assign a cause for it."

"On the part of the Conservatives, our defeat can only be ascribed to the brief period at our disposal for organization—the remarkably short notice we had that an election was pending. For some reason on the part of the government, an enormous number being away from home, and a still greater number finding it at this time of the year to leave their farms to come and vote."

Hon. W. S. Fielding, addressing an impromptu out-door meeting last night, said that the victory had been one of good government, as well as for the Liberal party and he was certain that the Conservatives had had a part in the matter. He stated that among the salient features of the campaign in his judgment was the return of all five Liberals in Halifax. He felt that the election of but a single Liberal in the Conservative indicated that the old time Conservative party, which had included many great and good men, had been almost annihilated. Whatever dissent there had been to the Liberals was composed of a few stragglers.

Surprise at Ottawa.

Ottawa, July 28.—(Canadian Press)—Election returns from Nova Scotia have occasioned much surprise at the federal capital. The return to power of the Murray government was expected by practically all the political prophets, but the results in some of the constituencies occasioned surprise.

The surprise included the defeat of Hon. E. H. Armstrong, commissioner of public works, and W. L. Hall, the Conservative leader, who went down in Queens county.

The election of two Farmers in Colchester was also unexpected, and the news was received with considerable interest because it is in this constituency that Hon. F. B. McCurdy, the new federal minister of public works, will present himself for election within the next week. Government supporters last night asserted that despite the success of the Farmer candidates in the provincial contest, the minister will not experience much difficulty in securing the endorsement of Cape Breton, Antigonish, Pictou and Halifax.

Columbus, Ohio, July 28.—The third day's programme at the Columbus track, which is entertaining the Grand Circuit this week, will be featured by the American Trotting Horse Breeders' Association racing stake for three year old colts.

Dunlop racing stake, purse \$3,000, for 2,000 paces, will be the big event with such starters as Red Landolt, Calgary Park, John Henry, Symbol S., Forest and Colonel Bidwell entered. The remainder of the card will consist of a 2,000 class pace and a 212 class pace.

REDUCTION OF STAFFS FOLLOWS FUEL SHORTAGE

Estimate Decrease of Two Per Cent. in Iron and Steel Groups in Dominion.

Ottawa, July 28.—(Canadian Press)—Reports from over 5,100 employers to the Dominion headquarters of the department of labor employment service indicated that, disregarding loss of time due to strikes, there was another increase in the volume of employment during the week ending June 26. For the following week, however, these firms estimated that they would have a net decrease in staffs of 1,140 persons, or two per cent. The anticipated decline was attributed to estimated curtailment of operations in the iron and steel group of industries because of a shortage of fuel.

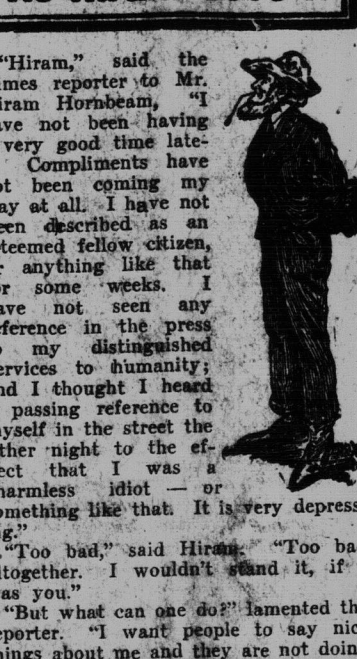
AMHERST COMING

TAYLOR AND ENTIRE STAFF CAPTURED

Turkish Commander at Adrianople Taken with City—Nationalist Resistance Ended.

Constantinople, July 28.—By the Associated Press.—Colonel Jafar Taylor, Turkish Nationalist commander at Adrianople, and his entire staff, were captured by the Greeks when the latter entered the city yesterday.

Consequently Nationalist resistance in Thracia virtually has ended as there is no other important leader there.

Athens, July 28.—Greek military operations have been relatively bloodless, but successful because of rapidity of the Greek movements. They seem to appear at the right time and place with overwhelming forces, causing the morale of the Turks to break both in the Asia Minor and Thracian campaigns.

When the Greeks debarked at Rodosto a week ago, the soldiers throwing themselves into the sea to get to shore quicker, the Turkish commander of the 68th division is reported to have telephoned the nationalists at Adrianople, Colonel Jafar Taylor.

"I cannot hold out; my soldiers are running away like chickens."

JAPAN AIMS TO IMPROVE RELATIONS WITH CHINESE

Tokyo, June 28.—(Associated Press)—The Anglo-Japanese alliance does not run counter to the League of Nations, wrote Premier Hara, favoring a renewal of the pact, in the course of a contribution to the current issue of the Japanese Diplomatic Review.

Mr. Hara declared that the English alliance is indeed for the preservation of peace and order in the Far East, with no particular country its objective. The Japanese were determined to improve the relations with China and to develop the rich natural resources of China. It was a good thing, he thought, that the United States was taking an economic interest in China. But while the interest of the United States with China was really a question of life and death for the nation, he hoped this fact would be appreciated in a sympathetic way by the American people.

Concerning Siberia, the premier wrote: "The original object of Japan's expedition to Siberia was to check the Czechs-Slovaks. In the meantime, however, Siberia has undergone serious upheavals, endangering the life and property of Japanese residents and disturbing peace and order in Manchuria and Mongolia. This is the reason why Japan cannot evacuate the country as soon as she expected. However, when peace and order have been restored in Siberia, safeguarding the life and property of Japanese residents and ensuring freedom of communications, the Japanese troops will be withdrawn, with the repatriation of the Czechs-Slovaks."

"CANADAS THINKING AHEAD OF EUROPE"

Lord Burnham Delivers Congratulatory Message at Halifax—The Entertainment of Press Delegates at Sister City.

Halifax, July 28.—Delegates to the Imperial Press Conference, who landed at Sydney yesterday from the steamer Victorian, arrived here this morning on two special trains and were welcomed by Mayor Parker and other city officials. They will spend the day in Halifax tomorrow morning and will go to Kentville, then to Truro on their way to the conference at Ottawa.

Halifax, N. S., July 28.—(By Canadian Press)—"We have come to recognize that not only is Canada thinking and speaking today ahead of Europe, but she is thinking ahead of herself," said Lord Burnham today, in acknowledging the welcome of Halifax and the province of Nova Scotia tendered the overseas delegates to the Imperial Press Conference. "It is because we believe that you will continue to think and speak ahead of yourselves that we are so glad to be here today."

At the formal reception this morning, Hon. F. Verwin, of Australia, spoke for the delegates from the dominions in acknowledging formally the welcome extended to the conference, and his hopes for its object, the prosperity of the Empire.

Hon. W. S. Fielding, and Hon. F. B. McCurdy made three-minute speeches of welcome, and Hon. R. E. Finn, of the provincial cabinet spoke for the province. Mr. Gill, who was out of town Mayor Parker spoke for the city.

Replying to the lieutenant-governor, Lord Burnham said: "As an old parliamentarian and although I am fast growing old I was once the youngest member of the British House of Commons. If it is an honor to be here in what is one of the oldest legislatures and I think the second oldest in the British Empire today. Nothing has touched us more than the telegrams we have received from the governor-general, the lieutenant-governors, the premiers and the mayors of, I think, every town in this dominion. We are glad to be here and we are glad to be able to congratulate you on having retained his seniority as a premier in the British Empire."

"We all felt a very deep sympathy with you in that terrible disaster which befell your historic city in the great holocaust of 1917."

WAR HERO MAKES WIFE LEAVE HER HUSBAND

West Virginia Soldier, a Former Soldier, Threatens to Kill Man She Married if She Refused.

Framingham, Mass., July 28.—Thomas Drake, wearer of a Distinguished Service Cross for heroism in the World War, was taken in custody by a West Virginia officer and started back to Clarksville, in that State, charged with telling her that unless she accompanied him he would kill her husband, M. P. Gill of Clarksville. Mrs. Gill is the daughter of Henry Colburn, president of a coal and gas company of Clarksville. Drake has been employed here for some months.

According to the Framingham police, who held him pending the arrival of Mr. Gill and the West Virginia officer, Drake was a former sailor of the young woman and when she returned from the war and learned that she had been married was unable to conquer his infatuation.

The police say that after several unsuccessful attempts to induce her to separate with him, Drake went to her home several days ago in the absence of her husband and, displaying a revolver, compelled her to pack a grip and accompany him north. From Washington the young woman managed to send a telegram secretly to her husband, and when the train reached Framingham Drake was detained by the police. He waived extradition, telling the court that he was ready to go back and face the music.

STAMPAGE RATE INCREASED TO \$5

Third Increase During Foster Administration.

Fredrickton, July 28.—Announcement of stampage regulations for the crown lands of the province of New Brunswick is contained in the royal gazette of this week issue. The rate has been increased to \$5 per thousand feet of sawed lumber, other—hardwood, softwood, spruce, pine, fir, hemlock, etc.—from \$3.50 to \$5.00.

This is the third increase in stampage rate made by the Foster administration since it took office in 1917. The rate at that time was \$3.50. Since then it has been increased to \$2.50, to \$3.50 and to \$5.

The provincial opposition although clamoring loudly for an increase to \$7 per thousand during recent sessions of the legislature, while itself in office attempted to fix the rate at \$1.50 for a period of ten years.

Next in significance to the triumph of the government is the utter collapse of the Conservative party. They were very badly fourth in the running. It was said in yesterday's despatches, the result of the Nova Scotia elections was awaited with keen interest by the government at Ottawa, that result will hardly tend to encourage Premier Meighen and his colleagues.

The farmers did very well in yesterday's battle. They have only been in the field for a very short time in Nova Scotia and yet they carried seven seats. Labor also will have a compact though small group of spokesmen in the new house.

The future trouble of his party will come from that direction rather than from the Conservatives. The farmers especially will have to be taken largely into account in future counsels.

Is Confined to Grounds, However, and Seldom Sees a Strange Face.

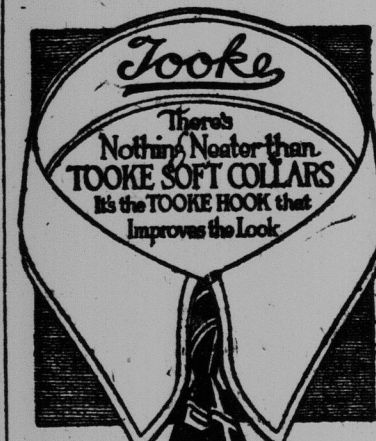

MOVE TO CREATE MOHAMEDAN STATE

Warsaw, July 8.—(Associated Press Correspondence)—A strong movement designed to create a large Mohammedan state in trans-Caucasia, extending from the Caspian sea to Erzerum, has been started recently according to word received here. It is designed to make the new state a satellite of Turkey. A purely national idea is said to be behind this movement and which has nothing in common with bolshevism, according to reports excepting dislike for the Allies.

It is said Lenine, the Russian premier, and Mustafa Kemal Pasha, Turkish Nationalist leader, both have the same aim—to attack Great Britain. But while Kemal cannot admit Moscow's supremacy over Armenia and the Mahomedan Caucasus, Lenine does not wish to see creation of a large Turkish state in the Caucasus.

Consequently, though Allied, the two leaders are really rivals.

Quebec, July 28—(Canadian Press)—Hon. Mr. Taschereau, the new premier of the province of Quebec, was the guest of honor at a banquet which was held at the Chateau Frontenac here last night and attended by two hundred guests from all parts of the province.

The time has come, it appears to us, to regularize the cutting on limits by fixing a maximum of the annual cut to prevent the destruction of the forests, and a minimum to stop speculation and to assure us a reasonable revenue from the cutting rights.

Following the premier's speech, the chairman Hon. Mr. Turgeon, speaker of the legislative council, further aroused the enthusiasm of the guests when he announced the results of the Nova Scotia elections.

SAYS COMPLETE AGREEMENT HAS BEEN REACHED

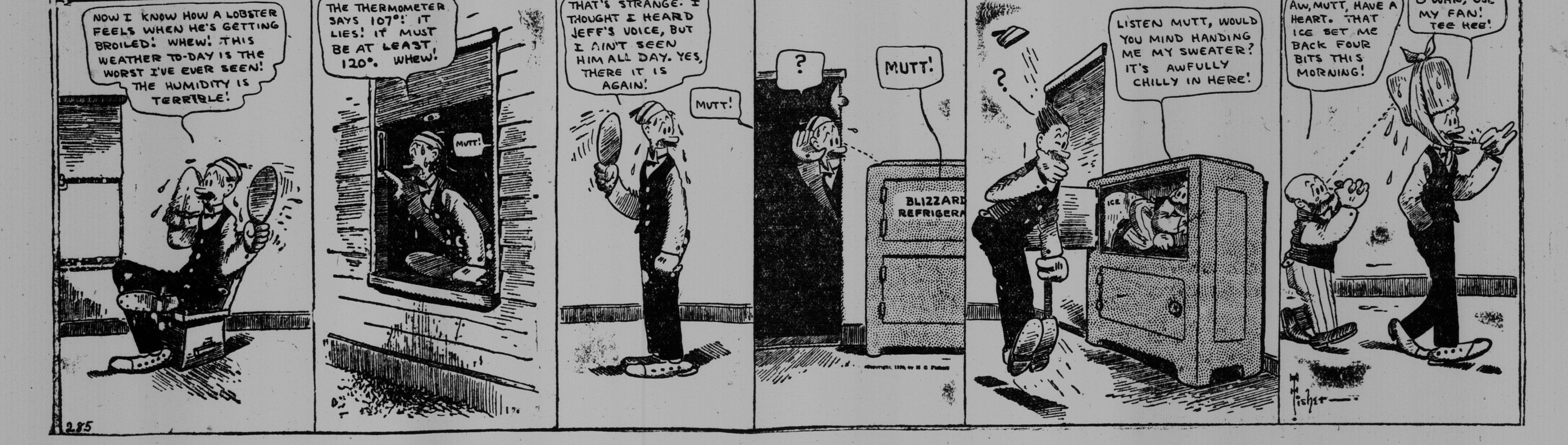
Lloyd George Says That Primary Object of Conference With Soviet Is Peace for All Europe - Good Work Done.

London, July 28—Lloyd George before leaving Boulogne informed the Reuters correspondent that a complete agreement had been reached on all points. It had been decided, subject to Italy's approval, to send a reply to Russia, asking that certain things must be made clear before the Allies will attend the proposed conference. Poland and other border states must participate in the conference whose primary object is to establish the peace of Europe. Then the conference could discuss the questions between Russia and the Allies relative to establishing normal relations.

If the Soviet replies that it could make only peace separately, the conference falls to the ground, according to Mr. Lloyd George. If the Soviet complies, the conference can meet within a month.

The British premier added that Premier Millerand and he agree that a good piece of work was done at Boulogne yesterday.

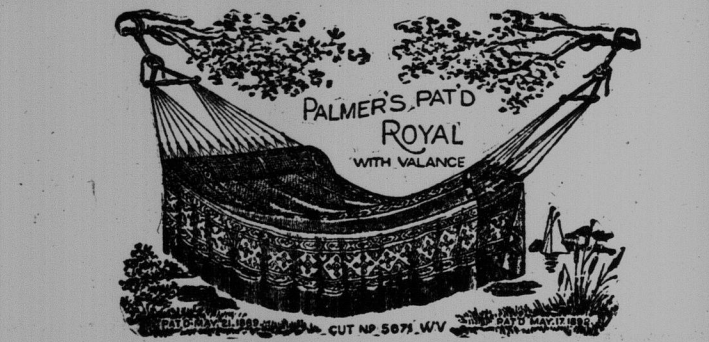

The retreat for the Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent's Convent, City street, will be concluded tomorrow morning. The retreat sermons and services were conducted by Rev. J. Keane, S.S.C., Rector, and a Redemptorist missionary from Montreal.

BISHOP HOME.

His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc returned home last night from St. Stephen, where he officiated yesterday morning at the ceremonies of investing Right Rev. John M. O'Flaherty with the insignia of the honor of the Doctorate. His Lordship also spoke about the honor conferred by the Pope.

CONTRACT AWARDED.

The contract for trenching and well for the water service from the city main to the Boy's Industrial Home has been awarded to Thomas French of St. West & Co. The specifications call for a two-inch service from the city main in front of the Almshouse to the Almshouse Industrial Home building and a new terra cotta service from the house to the Almshouse. The work also includes clearing and scraping of the brook which crosses the road this side of the Almshouse.

MISS ELIZA SEELY.

The death of Miss Eliza Seely occurred yesterday at her home, West St. John. She was the eldest daughter of the late John and Ellen Seely, and was in the eighty-first year of age. She was one of the oldest and best known residents of West St. John, where she spent the greater part of her life. She is survived by one brother, John, and one sister, Mrs. William A. Dougherty, of the west side. The funeral will be held on Thursday afternoon from O'NEIL'S undertaking parlors to St. John's Hill. The funeral will be private.

HAS A NOTABLE RECORD.

Dr. Miller, who will shortly address the Canadian Club, is now teaching vocational courses and giving lectures on behalf of the Navy League of Canada in Woodstock. He is assistant director of vocational education in Ontario and was director for Alberta, and district vocational officer for the Department of Soldiers' Re-establishment. In 1918-19 the Canadian government loaned him to Washington to direct the organization of vocational work for American soldiers. He holds a degree from Columbia University, and is one of the best informed men in Canada in relation to vocational training.

NAVY LEAGUE CAMPAIGN.

A despatch from Montreal this morning says that preliminary steps for the launching of a financial drive in October on behalf of the Navy League of Canada were discussed yesterday. It is to be a Dominion-wide drive, the objective of which is \$750,000 and Montreal's quota is set at \$100,000. Toronto is to raise \$45,000. The meeting approved the proposals for the campaign and an executive was appointed to take the initial steps.

In answer to the question as to what steps the local branch of the Navy League would take in this matter, R. E. Armstrong, the president, said that it was decided at the last council meeting in Toronto to put on a drive down here under the auspices of the League sometime about Trafalgar Day which is October 21. A meeting of the executive of the Navy League and associated organizations will be held soon to formulate plans for the campaign.

Duke. The bride was becomingly attired in a traveling suit of navy blue broadcloth with white picture hat and wore a black fox fur and carried a bouquet of American beauty roses. She was attended by Mrs. Leonard Sweeney, who was attired in brown satin and picture hat and wore a mink stole. Leonard Sweeney, brother of the groom, was the best man. Many beautiful and valuable presents, including cut glass and silver, were received, testifying to the popularity of the bride and groom. The bride is a graduate nurse of the General Public Hospital and has a host of friends in this city and elsewhere who wish her much happiness. After the ceremony Mr. and Mrs. Sweeney left on a motor tour to New York, stopping at St. Andrews, where they will stay a few days at the Algonquin.

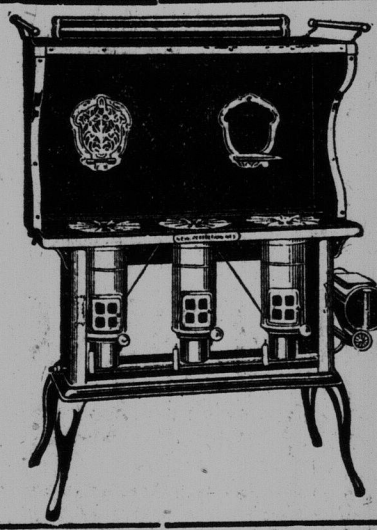

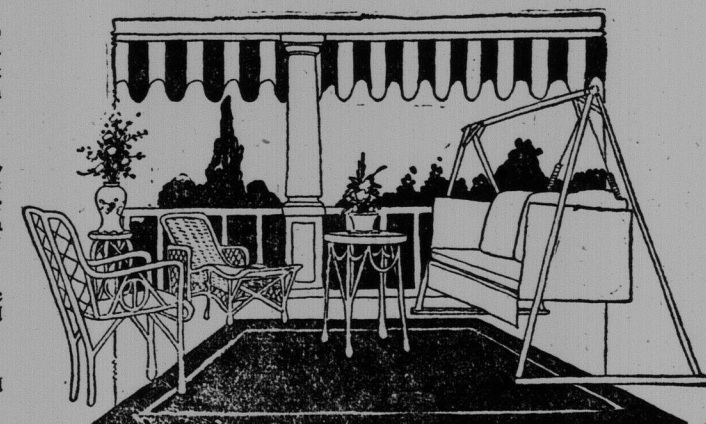
