Rum-runner Says He Made \$7,800,000--Whiskey Costing \$11 Sold for \$50 in New York.

Sydney, April 20-"We landed in the City of New York last year 200,000 cases of choice whiskey," said Captain Jabez White, of Newfoundland to a Sydney Post reporter, "and, you have it from me, son, that we gathered in some coin on that deal."

This grizzled master mariner and veteran smuggler is en route to Gotham, where he will push off and join his vessel, which at present is anchor-ed in Rum Row, off the New Jersey

"Is there anything in these storids of enormous profits made by liquor bar-ons in the rum running trade?" he was asked

"Last year," he said, "we made four trips between Scotland and St. Pierre, and on each voyage carried back 50,-000 cases of choice whiskey. 

U.S. TO PROCEED TO MAKE WAR ON THE RUM-RUNNERS

Confidence Expressed That Some Method of Dealing Effectively With Smuggler Fleet Will be Found.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Washington, April 20.-Federal action against the rum-running fleet operat-ing off the New York-New Jersey coast was promised today at the White House. Details of the Government's plans were withheld, but it was said that the Government did not intend to remain inactive against the liquor smuggling fleet if there were any means to prevent it. Confidence was expressed that some method of effectively dealing with the situation could be found. Prohibition Commissioner Haines has advocated the use of light naval vessels against the rum-runners. Secretary Denby of the Navy Department objects on the ground that prevention of liquor smuggling is not

a proper naval duty.




