council, transferred the Arctic archipel-ago to Canada. So far as discovery goes Mr. Stewart says that the title of Great Britain and thus of Canada, to the northern islands, is beyond question. With few exceptions all the known insular areas in the Cana-dian Arctic were discovered and formal-ly taken possession of by British com-missioned navigators from a century to three-quarters of a century ago. A list of English navigators would include Bylot and Baffin, who discovered Elles-mere Island in 1616; Captain John Ross. R.N., Sir John Franklin, Commander Inglefield, R.N., Captain Nares, R.N., and many others. and many others.

Energy Generated by Provincial Hydro

N. B. OPPOSES MOVE TO DELIVER 1,500 H. P.

C. P. R. and Power Commission Disagree on Period of Damage Claim.

MONTREAL, June 12-The Principle that the United States was entitled as a matter of right to power developed in New Brunswick partly through the flooding of land in that country was the rock upon which representatives of the contending parties split here today before the International Joint Commis-sion when that body resumed hearing of the application of the New Brunswick government to develop Hydro power at Grand Falls on the Saint John River.

The United States government through Attorney-General H. Hack-worth, this afternoon claimed that one worth, this afternoon claimed that one sixteenth of the power involved in the initial development or about 1500 horse-power, should be made available for use in the State of Maine. New Bruns-wick has already contracted to supply more than that, or 2,000 horsepower, to the International Paper Company at Van Buren, Me., and through Eu-gene Lafleur, K. C., their chief counsel, expressed willingness that this amount should be perpetually contracted for by United States interests, but the prov-ince refused to recognize that country's right to the power. The power would be sold in the United States as a busi-ness proposition only. sition only.






