England Declares War

London, Aug. 5.—King George declared war against Germany last night. The momentous decision of the British Government for which the whole world had been waiting came before the expiration of the time limit. Britain in the ultimatum to Germany demanded a satisfactory reply with respect to Belgian neutrality. Germany's reply was a summary rejection of the request that Belgian neutrality should be respected. The British Ambassador at Berlin, the Foreign Secretary, Lord Grey, and the British Government, notified Germany that a state of war existed between the two countries.

Proclamation

By His Excellency Sir Walter Edward Davidson, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies.

WHEREAS, by the 25th Section of "The Customs Act, 1898," it is enacted that the Governor in Council may prohibit the exportation or carriage coastwise of the following goods:—Arms, ammunition and gunpowder, military and naval stores and any articles which He, by and with the advice aforesaid, deems capable of being converted into or made useful in increasing the quantity of military or naval stores, or for purposes of hostility, or destruction in war, provisions, or any sort of victual which may be used as food by man.

And Whereas I, by and with the advice of my Council, deem it expedient and necessary that I should exercise such power of prohibition in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, I, by and with the advice aforesaid, do hereby order and direct that from and after the date hereof the following goods, being articles which I have judged capable of being converted into or made useful in increasing the quantity of military or naval stores, that is to say:—

Acetone;
Aeroplanes, airships, balloons, of all kinds, and their component parts;
Animals, pack, saddle and draught, suitable for use in war;
Arms, rifles, of all kinds, and their component parts;
Benzol;
Blast furnace oil;
Carbons required for searchlights;
Cartridges, charges of all kinds and their component parts;
Chromite and ferro-chrome;
Cloth, hempen;
Copper ore;
Cotton suitable for use in the manufacture of explosives;
Cotton wastes;
Creosote;
Dimethylamine;
Engines and lorries, internal combustion, capable of carrying a load of 25 cwt. and upwards, whole or in part;
Fuel oil shale;
Fulminate of Mercury;
Gunpowder;
Mineral lubricating oil;
Nets, torpedos;
Nickel and ferro nickel;
Oil, coal, tar;
Oil oil;
Petroleum, fuel oil;
Petroleum, gas oil;
Petroleum, spirit or motor spirit (including Shell spirit);
Projectiles of all kinds and their component parts;
Sacks, coal;
Silk cloth, silk braid, silk-thread, suitable for cartridges;
Silk noils;
Surgical dressings and bandages;
Toluol;
Zinc;
shall be; and the same are hereby prohibited either to be exported from the Colony or carried coastwise.

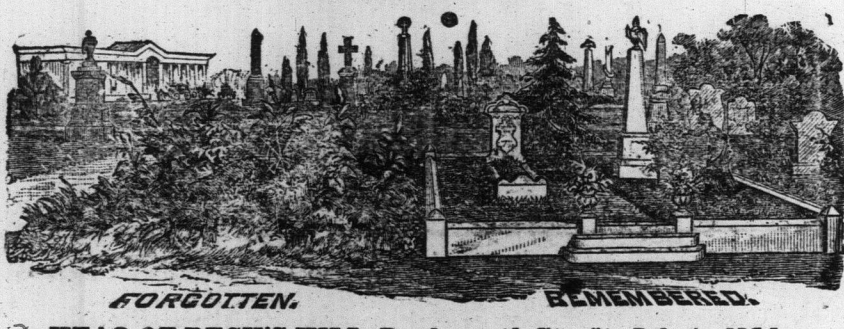

Religion and Amusements

S. J. M. COMPTON.

(Continued.)
As an example of the attitude of Jesus to these things, take the incident of His presence at the marriage in Cana of Galilee. From that incident there issue one or two principles that are fundamental for the guidance of the disciples of Jesus in every age. What are these principles?

There is first of all this principle—amusements have a legitimate place in the Christian life. It is difficult to miss that truth as it lies on the very surface of the incident of Cana. An invitation had been sent to Jesus and His disciples to the wedding and one of the pleasures of the day. Did Jesus refuse both for Himself and His followers, thinking that to accept would be wrong? Was Jesus afraid that the great work of the kingdom of God to which He had just dedicated Himself in public would suffer by His acceptance? Not at all. He accepted the invitation and went. Then for all who can hear Him, say to them: 'One is your master, even Christ; the principle is established that amusement has a perfectly legitimate place in the Christian life. And the kindest way to think of the doctrine that taboos all amusement is that such doctrine is not of Christ. John the Baptist came neither eating nor drinking. That is, John took no part in the social pleasures of his time. But Jesus came, and He said of Himself, eating and drinking. That is, Jesus did countenance and take part in the lighter side of social life. Jesus understood how to make merry and be glad. The fact is that so different was the mentality of Jesus from the austerity of John that the gossips of His day looked upon Him as a glutton and a winebibber, one too fond of the pleasures and gaieties of life.

Now for those whose mental image of Jesus is that of a man of sorrows with a bleeding and thorn-crowned brow, it may be unweelcome to have this somewhat different image of Jesus held before the mind and heart. Jesus as a genial and joyous but withal an earnest spirit may be a source of discomfort for some. But what is the use of shutting our eyes to the facts of life? Jesus did not shun the joy and gaiety of His time. And no man will deny whose heart Jesus altogether controls. For such a life there is one thing certain: there is a legitimate place for amusements and recreation.

But there is another principle bearing upon these things. The amusements of a disciple of Jesus must contribute to the main business of the Christian life. Turn to the account of Jesus at the marriage again. How does it record the impression that Jesus created there? Thus, 'He manifested forth his glory and his disciples believed on him.' Now what is the main business of the Christian life? What is its chief end? Simply to glorify Christ, to make men feel the wonder and charm of His life and love. And everything in the life of a disciple must be a means to that end. It is here that we emerge the second guiding principle governing the amusements and recreation of the Christian heart. Does our amusements contribute to faith, our own and other's faith? Is there some subtle quality about our amusements that makes some one pause and bethink himself of the beauty and charm of the Christian spirit as it plays? In other words, can we glorify our Master in our recreations? If we can, let us go on with never a fear. In such a case there need be never a question about our amusements. It is told us that the saintly Carlo Borromeo began a game of chess with some friends, and as they played the propriety of such amusements was questioned. Suppose they knew they were to die within the hour? Borromeo was asked what he would do in such a case. And the saint, knowing the secret thought of his own heart, replied: 'I would go on and finish my game, as I began it, for the glory of God.' That is the Christian spirit. If in our deepest heart we know we go into our sports and amusements desiring to make others feel how clean and healthy can be the life that is Christ's, we may be sure of the Master's 'Well done.' And for the Christian heart that is enough.

War News

London, Aug. 3.—In a naval conflict reported to have occurred in North Sea, Germany is said to have lost seven ships; British two. Reported England has declared war.

London, Aug. 3.—Despatch to telegraph from Paris says the German troops have taken possession of the Belgian town of Arlon.

Paris, Aug. 3.—Two defeats of German troops invading France are announced here. It is stated that in one engagement on the frontier the Uhlans, the famous cavalry of the Kaiser's army were routed by French troops, 2,000 prisoners captured, and two German Officers and 20 soldiers killed.

Since Germany Will Have it, She Shall Have it in Full Measure

London, Aug. 3.—Sir Edward Grey stated in the House of Commons today that the House was free to decide what the British attitude in the present European conflict should be. Sir Edward added that Britain had not committed herself to anything but diplomatic support. Grey requested the Commons to approach the consideration of the European situation from the point of view of British interests, British honor and British obligations.

The Cabinet, after a conference that lasted just a few minutes less than two hours, recessed at 1:10 p.m. No hint of what matters had been discussed could be gathered immediately after the session. 'At last the suspense is at an end. We believe every Briton with any sort of manhood in him will hear the news with relief. Since Germany will have it, she shall have it in full measure,' said Sir Edward Grey. 'No nation went into war with better heart or clearer conscience than Great Britain does now.'

Royal Naval Reserve Called to the Colours

Early Sunday morning Commander MacDermott of H. M. S. Calypso was appointed that the Admiralty had issued an order calling the Royal Naval Reserves to active duty, and was instructed to put the order in force here forthwith. Copies of the order were posted about the city, and telegraphed the Magistrates requesting them to make it known to the reserves as quickly as possible. Capt. Parsons of the S. S. Kyle was also wired to pick up the men at the various ports coming north, and the captains of the other coastal steamers to also give passage to all reservists, so that they could reach here as soon as possible.

The full force of the Newfoundland Reserves is about 600, and about one-third of these are expected to be aboard ship by to-day. The order posted about the city, and as issued by the Admiralty reads as follows:

'Special Admiralty Order Mobilization of Royal Naval Reserve men called out for service in the Royal Navy.

His Majesty the King having issued His Proclamation ordering and directing that Royal Naval Volunteers (commonly known as the Royal Naval Reserve) under the Royal Naval Reserve Act, 1859, or so many or such part of them as the Admiralty may direct, be called into active service. Notice is hereby given that men in the Newfoundland Royal Naval Reserve are required to report themselves in person forthwith on board His Majesty's Ship Calypso. Men at sea, or for other unavoidable cause unable to attend as above, must report themselves as soon as possible on board His Majesty's Ship Calypso. Men are to appear in uniform and bring their certificates R. N. 2, and any necessities with them. Reasonable expenses incurred in travelling to the rendezvous will be allowed. Men serving in the Royal Navy for a period of Naval training will continue in active service. Any man failing to report without delay in compliance with this order will be liable to arrest as a deserter. By Command of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.'

A Sane Proposal

London, July 29.—The Times urges the Government to exclude, Tyrone and Fermanagh from the Home Rule Bill, on the distinct understanding that such arrangement be devised to meet temporary exigencies, adding: 'It is imperative to patch up our domestic difference without delay in order to strengthen Britain in Europe. A general election as a remedy for the Irish difficulty is out of the question when the great Powers are burning their armour.' With equal candour the Times admits that it prefers Sir Edward Grey to continue at the Foreign Office. 'Were postponement of the Irish Bill will not suffice after Sunday's events,' continues the Times. 'Whatever is done must be tangible and concrete. If Asquith would take the statesmanlike step of including in the Amending Bill the exclusion of the six counties, he would probably relieve Ireland from the immediate risk of strife, and have the nation at his back, during the troublesome time ahead.'

Narrow Escape

Ottawa, July 29.—H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught, the Duchess and Princess Patricia narrowly escaped drowning last Saturday. Two motor boats, on which they were passengers on the Lake of the Woods at Kenora, struck floating logs with such speed that hoses were driven through their tin sheeting. The boats began to fill. Other boats dashed to the rescue, and succeeded in taking the Governor-General, his family and suite off the boats, just before they sank.

War News

London, Aug. 3.—In a naval conflict reported to have occurred in North Sea, Germany is said to have lost seven ships; British two. Reported England has declared war.

London, Aug. 3.—Despatch to telegraph from Paris says the German troops have taken possession of the Belgian town of Arlon.

Paris, Aug. 3.—Two defeats of German troops invading France are announced here. It is stated that in one engagement on the frontier the Uhlans, the famous cavalry of the Kaiser's army were routed by French troops, 2,000 prisoners captured, and two German Officers and 20 soldiers killed.

Italy Remains Neutral

London, Aug. 3.—Italy, by proclaiming neutrality, has virtually separated herself from her German and Austrian partners in the Triple Alliance. Although she has put 500,000 of her 2,400,000 troops under arms she will fight only if attacked.

British Cruisers Protect British Gold

London, Aug. 3.—The steamship Kronprinzessin Cecilie of the North German line, carrying \$18,000,000 in gold and silver, has been intercepted by four British cruisers. They are said to be escorting her to Southampton. It is understood the Cecilie received orders from her owners to proceed to Hamburg without calling at any British port. Her gold cargo was shipped from New York and was consigned to British and French bankers. It is assumed England determined to see that it is properly delivered to the consignees.

Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word. A Government cable to Capre, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraphic Service in existence.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00. A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50. To Great Britain, France or Germany—85 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round to Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within the radius of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Ray.

Telegraph messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.



Report of the Carnegie Hero Fund

An Amount Considerable in Excess of One Million Dollars Has Already Been Distributed

The pecuniary awards from the Carnegie Hero Fund so far total \$1,225,147.60, of which \$855,685.54 went to heroes and their dependents (including pension payments, \$169,402.90 to funds for relief of sufferers from disasters and \$200,000 to special purposes. The pensions in force amount to \$72,690 per annum.

The following Newfoundlanders have participated in the awards:

J. Louis Little, aged thirty-seven, fisherman, helped to save four men, and assisted in an attempt to save two others from drowning, Bonavista, N. F., September 19, 1907. During a storm at night, a schooner was torn from her moorings in the harbor and wrecked on the rocks that bound it. She went ashore stern foremost and struck between two rocks at the shore-line. The darkness was intense, the wind was blowing sixty miles an hour, and the waves, from twenty to thirty feet high, dashed up on the rocks for a distance of forty feet. Holding to a line in the hands of fishermen upon a large rock, Little climbed down its steep and dangerous face and attempted to cast the line to the vessel but failed. He hastily scrambled upward to escape an incoming wave, but it caught him and surged up around his knees. He coiled his rope again and, as the water receded, scrambled rapidly down the rough surface until he was right under the stern of the schooner. He cast his line to the deck, twelve feet above, where it was made fast. Little was caught by an incoming wave, and, clinging desperately to the rope, was washed into a gulch beside the rock, but was pulled back on it. The men left the wreck rapidly, and Little approached close to it and assisted two of them. Several times he narrowly escaped being swept to sea. Two of the vessel's crew were washed overboard and drowned. Silver medal and \$1,500 for a worthy purpose as needed.


Robert Brown, aged fifty-five, sub-collector of customs, helped to save four men, and assisted in an attempt to save two others, from drowning, N. F., September 19, 1907. Brown descended far down the rock and attempted to cast a line on board the wreck before Little. He made another unsuccessful cast; and then, remaining in a position of much danger, he helped get the seamen up the rock, several times narrowly escaping being washed away by the waves. Bronze medal and \$1,000 for a worthy purpose as needed.

James C. Little, aged forty-five, fisherman, helped to save four men, and assisted in an attempt to save two others, from drowning, Bonavista, N. F., September 19, 1907. Little descended to a point far down the rock, and, in a position of much danger, helped the seamen up. He was swept off his feet once, but prevented himself from being washed away by clinging to the rope. Bronze medal and \$1,000 for a worthy purpose as needed.

William Ford, aged thirty-five, fisherman, helped to save four men, and assisted in an attempt to save two others, from drowning, Bonavista, N. F., September 19, 1907. Ford descended on the rock to a point of much danger and assisted in the rescue work. When one of the seamen fell on the rocks, Ford grabbed him and helped him up the rock. He saved himself from being swept away by clinging to the rope. Bronze medal and \$1,000 for a worthy purpose as needed.

James Ford, aged forty-one, fisherman, helped to save four men, and assisted in an attempt to save two others, from drowning, Bonavista, N. F., September 19, 1907. Ford assisted to the rope with the other rescuers and assisted the seamen to get up the rocks. His grasp on the rope alone prevented him from being swept away. Bronze medal and \$1,000 for a worthy purpose as needed.

Eli Paul, aged forty-two, fisherman, helped to save four men, and assisted in an attempt to save two others, from drowning, Bonavista, N. F., September 19, 1907. Paul assisted in the rescue work, from a place of great danger, helping the seamen up the rock. Bronze medal and \$1,000 for a worthy purpose as needed.

Vienna, July 27.—According to a rumor, the first encounter between Austria and Servia has occurred near Semendria on the Danube, 24 miles southeast of Belgrade.

Some vessels conveying Austrian infantry are said to have been fired on from Servian side of the Danube and to have returned the fire.

Won't Give Any Guarantees

London, Aug. 2.—England has asked Germany if the Kaiser's armies will respect the treaty guaranteeing the neutrality of Belgium in the event of war with France.

The German ambassador to-day presented a tentative reply from the Kaiser, which is that Germany is unable to answer the interrogation at this time.

Redmond's Assurance

London, Aug. 4.—Wild cheering from all parts of the House greeted John Redmond, the Nationalist leader, when he assured the Government that every soldier in Ireland might be with drawn to-morrow, and the coasts of Ireland would be defended against invasion by her armed sons — The Catholics of the South and the Protestants of Ulster.

Paris, July 29.—Madame Caillaux, wife of ex-Premier Caillaux, was acquitted last night after a trial lasting nine days, on the charge of murdering, on March 16th last, Gaston Calmette, Editor of the Figaro.

News by Telegraph

St. John's, Aug. 4.—Germans crossed the French frontier but were repulsed by French forces.

Kitchener is to take command of the British army. He is expected to give a good account of his forces.

Four British cruisers have seized steamer Kronprinzessin Cecilie, North German Line, carrying \$3,000,000 in gold and silver, and are conveying her to Southampton.

Two German cruisers were sighted today off St. Pierre and are thought to be going to Sydney to coal.

The de la now cast and Europe is to be plunged into a general war.

The first shots in the Russo-German war were fired yesterday between patrols near Prostok.

Italy has resolved to remain neutral, thus breaking the Triple Alliance.

No Desire for Hostilities

London, July 28.—There is absolutely no enthusiasm in England for war, the desire for this particular war which confronts Britain, yet there is a general belief that her obligations to her partners in the Triple Entente as well as her interests as a great European power will force her to support Russia and France in any steps they may take.

The dark developments of the day were received without excitement, but with the deepest gloom, and the immediate effect of the war cloud is likely to be a compromise on Home Rule since all parties feel that domestic dissensions must be settled at all costs in face of the peril from without.

The force demands of the Conservative papers for a general election have been wholly hushed. The Foreign Office has become the most important branch of the Government. No one wants to risk the possibility of losing Sir Edward Grey with his exceptional influence in the councils of Europe.

The Government is confronting the situation with perfect calmness and there is no sign of unusual events at the Foreign Office, except the Prime Minister Asquith, who seldom visits that office, called there this evening and conferred with Sir Arthur Nicol and the permanent Under Secretary.

The ships of the British fleet everywhere were taking on supplies soon after it became definitely known that Austria and Servia were at war.

Official Declaration

Vienna, this morning.—The declaration of war was gazetted here late yesterday afternoon. The text is as follows: "The Royal Parliament of Servia not having replied in a satisfactory manner to the note remitted it by the Austro-Hungarian minister at Belgrade, July 23rd, the Imperial and Royal Government finds itself, to safeguard its rights and interests, to have recourse for this purpose to force of arms. Austria-Hungary considers itself, therefore, from this moment, in a state of war with Servia." The document was signed by the Austrian Minister of Foreign Affairs.

Burns Resigns

London, Aug. 4.—John Burns, president of the local Government Board, has resigned. He disagrees with the war policy of the Government. It is believed in unofficial circles in London that he will be declared within 24 hours.

Italy Neutral

London, Aug. 2.—Italy by her proclamation of neutrality has virtually separated from Germany and Austria, her partners in the Triple Alliance.

Although she has put five hundred thousand of her two million troops under arms, she will fight only if attacked.

The man Hare, who escaped from the Lunatic Saturday afternoon was captured at his former home, Harbor Grace, by Head Const. Sheppard and brought back to the institution on last night's train. He is thought to have made the trip round the Bay on top of one of the railway coaches, gaining that position at Waterford Bridge.

PUBLIC NOTICE

The following sections of Chapter 28 of the Consolidated Statutes (2nd Series) and the Act in Amendment thereof, are published for general information:—

Sec. 12.—When any death takes place in this Colony, information of the same shall be furnished or posted within 48 hours thereafter to the proper officer appointed under this chapter to receive the same in the form of Schedule A, under a fine not exceeding Ten Dollars for every neglect to do so. The obligation to furnish this information shall rest, in the first instance, on the medical attendant; secondly, on the undertaker; and failing these, on the next of kin to the deceased person.

Sec. 14.—No sexton or other person having charge of a cemetery or burial place shall permit the burial of any person in such cemetery or burial place without first having received a certificate signed by a MEDICAL ATTENDANT, a CLERGYMAN, or TWO RELIABLE PERSONS cognizant of the facts certifying to the death of the person for whom burial is required, and setting forth as far as is known the cause of death; and all such certificates shall be forwarded monthly to the registering officers concerned.

This law does not apply to the City of Saint John's, where special and more strict regulations are enforced.

"Wait And See"

The public are still waiting for an answer to some of the questions propounded in last week's issue re present political moves in this country. The amalgamation story; the anti Confederate delegation story and the trip to Whitebourne are being freely discussed, but a policy of 'discreet silence' is being maintained by the movers.

Mr. Coaker's return from the north and his report as to the feelings of the northern people in relation to current rumors is anxiously awaited, so we understand, in certain quarters.

One story going the rounds is that Coaker, Morris, and Morins have formed a combination. Morins to be Minister of Justice; Coaker Minister of Fisheries (in Picot's place); Kent goes on the Bench; Harder to the Upper House and Lloyd on the Executive. Another story is a little different, and gives Morins charge of the Fisheries Dept. with Coaker a seat in the Executive.

Some of the other politicians are to be pitched forked and sandwiched into one position and another, and then the announcement is to be made that these steps are taken in the 'public interest.'

An entire absence of sincerity seems to be dominating the councils of the clique, and the country's real and lasting good is apparently being played with. Let every true and patriotic son of Terra Nova make a note of current events, and intelligently consider every matter in a sincere manner and for his country's good.

King's Message To British Fleet

London, Aug. 5.—Immediately after midnight King George sent a personal message to the British battle fleet now sailing against the German armada, cleared for action.

I have every confidence that the British fleet will revive the old glories of the Navy. I am sure that the navy will again shield Britain in this hour of trial and that it will prove the bulwark of the Empire.

This was the first message sent to the fleet since it cleared from Plymouth Harbor and sailed to a secret rendezvous in the North Sea.

Ever since the wireless has been silent and no word will be permitted to go forth until to-night when the signal for the most tremendous naval battle ever fought will be sputtered out through the darkness from the great Naval Wireless Station.

Sunday last a message was received here from St. John's requesting that all Naval Reservists be notified to go to St. John's immediately. Only five or six were found to be home, and these went to St. John's on Monday evening. Others from all over the country and Labrador are quickly responding to the call.

The dredge is engaged this week dredging the bottom on the west side of C. & A. Daw's eastern wharf, so that a large coal laden steamer may discharge her cargo. The firm have a number of men employed putting an addition to their large fish store, and when completed it will be used as a coal shed with a capacity of over 1200 tons.

His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to direct that the following Order in Council of His Majesty the King in Council, with reference to the application to this Colony of the procedure respecting the treatment of neutral and enemy merchant ships in time of war, shall come into effect on the date hereof.

AT THE COURT AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE, THE 4TH DAY OF AUGUST, 1914.

His Majesty being mindful, now that a state of war exists between this country and Germany, of the recognition accorded to the practice of granting "days of grace" to enemy merchant ships by the Convention relative to the Status of Enemy Merchant Ships at the Outbreak of Hostilities, signed at The Hague on the 18th October, 1907, and being desirous of lessening, so far as may be practicable, the injury caused by war to peaceful and unsuspecting commerce, is pleased, by and with the advice of his Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. From and after the publication of this order no enemy merchant ship shall be allowed to depart, except in accordance with the provisions of this Order, from any British port or from any ports in any Native State in India, or in any of His Majesty's Protectorates, or in any State under His Majesty's protection or in Cyprus.
2. In the event of information reaching one of our Principal Secretaries of State not later than midnight on Friday, the Seventh day of August, that the treatment accorded to British merchant ships and their cargoes which at the date of the outbreak of hostilities were in the ports of the enemy, or which subsequently entered them, is, in his opinion, not less favourable than the treatment accorded to enemy Merchant Ships by Articles 3 to 7 of this Order, he shall notify the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury and the Admiralty accordingly, and the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury shall forthwith give public notice thereof in the "Gazette," and Articles 3 to 8 of this Order shall thereupon come into full force and effect.
3. Subject to the provisions of this Order, enemy merchant ships which—
 - (i) At the date of the outbreak of hostilities were in any port in which this Order applies; or
 - (ii) Cleared from their last port before the declaration of war, and, after the outbreak of hostilities, enter a port to which this Order applies, with no knowledge of the war;
 shall be allowed up till midnight (Greenwich mean time) on Friday, the 14th of August, for loading or unloading their cargoes, and for departing from such port:

PROVIDED that such vessels shall not be allowed to ship any contraband of war, and any contraband of war already shipped on such vessels must be discharged.

4. Enemy merchant ships which cleared from their last port before the declaration of war, and which with no knowledge of the war arrive at a port to which this Order applies after the expiry of the time allowed by Article 3 for loading or unloading cargo and for departing, and are permitted to enter, may be required to depart either immediately, or within such time as may be considered necessary by the Customs Officer of the port for the unloading of such cargo as they may be required or specially permitted to discharge.

PROVIDED that such vessels may, as a condition of being allowed to discharge cargo, be required to proceed to any other specified British port, and shall there be allowed such time for discharge as that port may consider necessary:

PROVIDED, also, that, if any cargo on board such vessel is contraband of war or is requisitioned under Article 5 of this Order, she may be required before departure to discharge such cargo within such time as the Customs Officer of the port may consider to be necessary; or she may be required to proceed, if necessary under escort, to any other of the ports specified in Article 1 of this Order, and shall there discharge the contraband under the like conditions.

5. His Majesty reserves the right recognized by the said Convention to requisition at any time subject to payment of compensation, enemy cargo on board any vessel to which Articles 3 and 4 of this Order apply.

6. The privileges accorded by Articles 3 and 4 are not to extend to cable ships or to sea-going ships designed to carry oil fuel, or to ships whose tonnage exceeds 5,000 tons gross, or whose speed is 14 knots or over, regarding which the entries in Lloyd's Register shall be conclusive for the purposes of this Article. Such vessels will remain liable on adjudication by the Prize Court to detention during the period of the war, or to requisition, in accordance, in either case, with the Convention aforesaid. The said privileges will also not extend to merchant ships which show by their build that they are intended for conversion into warships, as such vessels are outside the scope of the said Convention, and are liable on adjudication by the Prize Court to condemnation as prize.

7. Enemy merchant ships allowed to depart under Articles 3 and 4 will be provided with a pass indicating the port to which they are to proceed, and the route they are to follow.

8. A merchant ship which, after receipt of such a pass, does not follow the course indicated therein, will be liable to capture.

9. If no information reaches one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State by the day and hour aforesaid to the effect that the treatment accorded to British merchant ships and their cargoes which were in the ports of the enemy at the date of the outbreak of hostilities, or which subsequently entered them, is in his opinion, not less favourable than that accorded to enemy merchant ships by Articles 3 to 8 of this Order, every enemy merchant ship which, on the outbreak of hostilities, was in any port to which this Order applies, and also every enemy merchant ship which cleared from its last port before the declaration of war, but which, with no knowledge of the war, enters a port to which this Order applies, shall, together with the cargo on board thereof, be liable to capture, and shall be brought before the Prize Court forthwith for adjudication.

10. In the event of information reaching one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State that British merchant ships which cleared from their last port before the declaration of war but are met with by the enemy at sea after the outbreak of hostilities, are allowed to continue their voyage without interference with either the ship or the cargo, or after capture are released with or without proceedings for adjudication in the Prize Court (or are to be detained during the war or requisitioned in lieu of condemnation as prize), he shall notify the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty accordingly, and shall publish a notification thereof in the "Gazette," and in that event but not otherwise, enemy merchant ships which cleared from their last port before the declaration of war, and are captured after the outbreak of hostilities and brought before the Prize Courts for adjudication, shall be released (or detained or requisitioned) in such cases and upon such terms as may be directed in the said notification in the "Gazette."

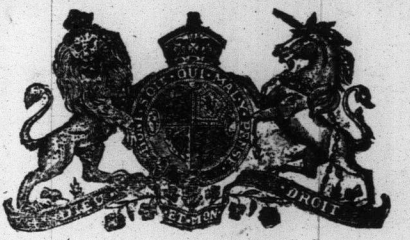
11. Neutral cargo, other than contraband of war, on board an enemy merchant ship which is not allowed to depart from a port to which this Order applies, shall be released.

12. In accordance with the provisions of Chapter III of the Convention relative to certain restrictions on the Exercise of the Right of Capture in Maritime War, signed at The Hague on the 18th October, 1907, an undertaking must, whether the merchant ship is allowed to depart or not, be given in writing by each of the officers and members of the crew of such vessel, who is of enemy nationality, that he

will not, after the conclusion of the voyage for which the pass is issued, engage while hostilities last in any service connected with the operation of the war. If any such officer is of neutral nationality, an undertaking must be given in writing that he will not serve, after the conclusion of the voyage for which the pass is issued, on any enemy ship while hostilities last. No undertaking is to be required from members of the crew who are of neutral nationality.

Officers or members of the crew declining to give the undertakings, required by this Article will be detained as prisoners of war.

And the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and each of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and all Governors, Officers, and authorities whom it may concern are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.
