The Conference opened in Broadway Tabernacle, Toronto, Thursday, June 9th, 1898, at 2 p.m. The Conference prayer-meeting was conducted by the President, Rev. Dr. Stone.

ANSWER.

The Committee on Conference Relations met in pursuance of notice, and beg leave to report as follows:

1. That the minute of the Toronto East District regarding the case of Rev. George Webber, be adopted, and that he be granted a superannuated relation. The Committee desires to place on record its unfeigned regret at his enforced retirement from the active work of the ministry, and its sincere appreciation of the forty years of faithful and distinguished service which he has rendered the Church. They also desire herein to assure him that he will be followed with the prayers and best wishes of his brethren that the eventide of life may be calm and full of blessing, and that the Church may enjoy for years to come the advantage of his godly counsels.

2. That your Committee concur in the recommendation of the Uxbridge District, and grant Rev. William Thornley superannuation for one year. They wish to convey to him the sympathy of the Conference in his affliction, and also the expression of their hope that he may speedily be restored to health and resume the active work.

3. That in the case of the recommendation of the Barrie District your Committee approves, and would grant the superannuation for one year of Rev. W. C. Washington, M.A. They would bear to him their sympathy and their hope that the year's rest may lead to his resumption of the work.

4. That the record of the Toronto West District, referring to the case of Rev. J. F. Metcalf, be adopted, and that he be granted a superannuated relation for one year. The Committee hear with sorrow of the illness of our brother, and herein extend to him their brotherly wishes.

5. Your Committee had under their consideration the matter referred to them in relation to the standing at the time of his decease of the late Rev. John Smiley, M.A., with regard to the Superannuation Fund. From a careful review of the question it is evident that he had travelled twenty-five years, and your Committee consider, therefore, that his family are justly entitled to such recognition by said Superannuation Fund.

REGULATIONS REGARDING THE CONTINGENT FUND.

1. The Superintendents of Circuits shall pay as soon as convenient the collections taken up on their respective circuits to the Financial Secretaries, who shall remit the same to the treasurer.
2. All applications for grants from this Fund shall be presented to the Committee by the Chairman of the District from which the claim is made, or by such other person as he may appoint.
3. No application for special claims shall be entertained by the Committee unless they have passed the fourth Quarterly Meeting, and have been signed by the Recording Steward and recommended by the District Meeting; also, no special claim shall be entertained where the claimant receives \$900 or over as appropriation from his circuit.
4. All applications for expenses incurred in the service of the Church, or for claims not otherwise specified, shall be submitted in detail to the Committee for their investigation.
5. No grants shall be made for ministerial supply on account of affliction when the Circuit is deemed competent to pay for such supply, and in no case shall a grant be made for more than the salary of a single minister.
6. If grants be made to Districts to assist dependent circuits, said grants shall be fairly apportioned to the circuits claiming aid by the Financial District Meeting.
7. That \$40 be the maximum allowance for funeral expenses.

REPORT OF MISSIONARY COMMITTEE.

Your Committee, having fully considered all matters submitted to them, beg leave to report as follows:

1. Relative to a resolution from the Algoma District, praying for the prompt and full payment of the moving expenses of domestic missionaries as early in the Conference year as possible, and also for the payment in full of each quarter's ordinary grant when it falls due, your Committee recommend the Conference to request the proper authorities to comply with the request embodied in said resolution.

2. We note with regret that the salaries paid to our domestic missionaries are altogether inadequate to meet their pressing needs, and recommend the setting apart of such a percentage of the missionary income each year for home missions as will insure larger salaries to our domestic missionaries, and that, at the same time, some method be devised to increase the liberality of the people on the home missions in the support of their own ministers.

3. With a view to preventing needless expenditure of missionary money, we recommend that such readjustments of the work, as may be practicable, be made in order to strengthen existing missions, and thus reduce the number of missionaries employed on our home fields; and, secondly, that no new home missions be formed to find places for either married ministers or probationers.

4. Concerning the proposal to substitute a Home Mission Fund and a Foreign Mission Fund for the General Fund as now existing, your Committee recommend the Conference to express its disapproval of such a course, it being out of harmony with the best interests of the missionary cause.

5. As a large amount of money is expended each year in the way of interest on money borrowed by the General Treasurer to meet the claims of missionaries on the home and foreign fields, we urge the holding of missionary meetings as early in the Conference year as possible, and the prompt remittance to the General Treasurer of all moneys collected for missionary purposes.

6. In this connection we call the attention of all our members to their duty to set apart a certain portion of their income for missions, and strongly advise all our congregations to adopt some systematic method whereby they may contribute more frequently than once a year to this worthy cause.

7. We feel that we cannot emphasize too strongly the necessity of enlisting the sympathy and intelligent interest of the children of our Sunday Schools in the missionary enterprises of our Church, and to this end suggest (1) that they be made familiar with our work on the mission field; (2) that frequent collections for missions be taken in the Sunday Schools; (3) that the scholars be encouraged to collect money for missions by cards, mite-boxes, etc.

8. It is with much pleasure that we note the development of the Young People's Forward Movement for Missions. We commend this latest birth of missionary zeal among our young people as worthy of the cordial sympathy and hearty support of all our preachers and church

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members, and we recommend that the Missionary Secretary be requested, as far as possible, to place the various amounts given by our young people's societies to the Forward Movement for Missions in the Missionary Report, in connection with the circuits with which they are associated and included in their totals.

9. Recognizing the fact that the missionary enterprises of our Church are capable of great expansion if sufficient funds are provided, your Committee recommend that all our people support our own Missionary Society, rather than independent schemes outside the control of our Church.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF THE
TORONTO DEACONESS HOME AND
TRAINING SCHOOL.

To the Toronto Conference.

The Board of Management are very much gratified to report a year of striking advancement and expansion in every department of the work committed to their charge. As examples of the work done we may cite the facts that the Deaconesses have made 2,070 canvass calls, 5,059 missionary calls, and 1,362 visits to the sick. They have spent 2,598 hours nursing the sick; they have given away 2,119 half-worn garments and 371 new garments, and they have spent \$305.97 in relieving emergent cases of distress. They have abundantly bestowed Christ-like labor in many other ways for the helping of the needy of the city.

In addition to the contributions for the Emergency Fund, the friends of the institution have generously responded by placing the sum of \$937.93 in the hands of the Treasurer of the Board of Management and \$1,480.17 in the treasury of the Deaconess Aid Society, for a large portion of which latter sum we return thanks to the Executive Committee of the Epworth League Convention and the Board of Directors of the Methodist Social Union.

A notable advance during the year was marked by the opening of the long-contemplated Training School. Through the kindness of the Board of Trustees of the Carlton Street Church, the classes of the school were held in the lecture-room and vestries of that most convenient edifice.

The staff of instructors number thirty-one, and include such names as Revs. Prof. McLaughlin, M.A., B.D., Prof. F. H. Wallace, M.A., D.D., W. S. Blackstock, D.D., W. J. Smith, B.A., A. C. Courtice, M.A., D.D.; S. D. Chown, D.D., W. R. Parker, M.A., D.D., J. F. German, M.A., D.D., James Allen, M.A., W. H. Withrow, M.A., D.D., L. W. Hill, B.A., G. J. Bishop, G. R. Turk, W. H. Hincks, LL.B., A. B. Chambers, LL.B., Miss E. Jean Scott, Superintendent; Miss Cora Gralton, graduate of Drexel Institute, Philadelphia; Miss Ada Marean Hughes, Miss Winnifred Macdonald; Misses Fraser and Greenway, undergraduates of the Woman's Medical College; Miss Ogden and Mrs. Hudson, elocutionists; also, H. Hough, Esq., LL.D., F. N. G. Starr,

M.D., A. D. Watson, M.D., N. A. Powell, M.D., J. B. Willmott, D.D.S., Dean of the Toronto Dental College; J. G. Adams, D.D.S., and R. A. Reeve, M.D., Dean of Toronto University Medical School.

All these ladies and gentlemen entered enthusiastically into their respective work. Many of them are distinguished specialists, and all gave their services without fee or reward, save the pleasure of doing work for Christ and securing the advancement of their pupils. They deserve, and are hereby heartily accorded the cordial thanks of the Board of Management.

Instruction was given in the following general studies, which were subdivided into departments according to the needs of a first-class training school, viz.: The Bible, Old and New Testaments; Bible Interpretation, Church History, Evidences of Christianity, Christian Doctrines, Early Christian Art; Methods in Field, Industrial, Sunday School, Evangelistic and Kindergarten work; in Elementary Medicine, Applied Christianity, Missions, Elocution and Physical Culture.

A truly wonderful amount of work has been done and of a quality unsurpassed in any similar institution. The zeal, earnestness, enthusiasm and efficiency of the instructors is beyond praise, and their uniform testimony to the great possibilities of the school is inspiring.

The industry, application and success of the students has been most gratifying. Miss Mallough, one of the graduates of this year, leaves to enter foreign missionary work.

We are confident that we stand upon the threshold of greatly enlarged usefulness and opportunity. In this school we shall have facilities for many years to come for training all the deaconesses, evangelists and home and foreign workers and Sunday School teachers to supply the demands of our Church.

Already the candidates of the Woman's Missionary Society spend three months in the home life and work of the Deaconess Home, and we welcome them in augmented numbers to the advantages we can offer them.

An Examination Board has been organized and suitable regulations established, under which the course of study will be completed and acknowledged by graduating diplomas. A catalogue giving full particulars will soon be published. Meanwhile we desire our ministers and membership to know that all these educational advantages are open free to all, gentlemen as well as ladies, the only charge being a small entrance fee of \$2 to cover incidental expenses.

We cannot close this report without expressing devout thankfulness to God for all the blessings which have attended this venture of faith, and particularly that in His kind providence He sent to our aid one so eminently adapted in every way for her work as the Superintendent of the Home, Miss E. Jean Scott.

The last occasion for gratitude is found in a gift from the executors of the estate of the late Hart A. Massey, Esq., to which reference is made in the following resolution unanimously passed by the Board of Management:

"The Board of Management of the Methodist Deaconess Home and Training School of the Toronto Conference desires to record its deep sense of gratitude to the trustees of the estate of the late H. A. Massey,

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Esq., for their munificent and generous gift of certain valuable property, situate on Jarvis Street in this city, and which is intended for a Deaconess Home and Training School.

"The timely aid given to this new, encouraging and commendable Christian enterprise is appreciated by the Board to an extent to which they cannot adequately give expression. Larger and more suitable premises than those at present occupied were felt to be necessary. The lack of means to secure them stood in the way, and, for the time being, seemed to be a serious difficulty; but a kind Providence continued to smile upon the undertaking, and by this loving offering to the cause of God the hearts of the members of the Board, the Superintendent and the Deaconesses have been made to rejoice. This princely gift will stand as another monument to commemorate the name of our late benefactor, H. A. Massey, Esq."

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee having endeavored to obtain all the information within their reach bearing upon the state of the work of God within the bounds of the Conference, and having given to the facts and suggestions which have come before them their most earnest attention and thought, beg leave to report as follows:

In the first place, we have been most deeply impressed with the completeness of the organization of our Church for Christian work. So far as machinery is concerned there seems to be absolutely nothing wanting. Everything essential to the efficient and successful working of our Sunday Schools appears to have been brought to a state of perfect

tion never attained before. In the opinion of those who have given most thought to the subject, the Epworth League possesses great possibilities of usefulness. The King's Daughters seem to be well calculated to serve a useful purpose in training the girls and young women of our congregations for works of mercy among the poor and the afflicted. And the restoration among us of the ancient and apostolic order of Deaconesses promises great good. Though dating back to apostolic times it is but a thing of yesterday with us, but already it has become an important arm of the Church service.

All these things are matters of congratulation and of devout gratitude to God. But with increase of power comes a corresponding increase of responsibility. From those to whom much is given, it is but reasonable that much should be required. With these increased facilities for carrying on the work of God we should look for increased results of our labors. With this vast and complex system of agencies and instrumentalities superadded to the ordinary means by which Methodism has made its way in the past, and by which it gained such signal victories in the days of its poverty and weakness, what ought not we to accomplish for the glory of God and the salvation of the souls of men? It is this aspect of the subject which has produced the most profound searching of heart in your Committee, and induced them to ponder deeply the serious question whether the results of our labors that have been secured during the past year can be regarded as altogether satisfactory.

We know that the numbering of the Lord's people is a serious matter, and beset with difficulties; that it is quite impossible to tabulate or fully express in figures spiritual results, and that it is not always safe to draw sweeping conclusions from statistics however carefully compiled. Besides, we are not disposed to make little of the facts which the statistics of the year reveal. The number received during the year, as reported, is 4,333, and had not the leakage been so great the case would have been much more satisfactory than it is. But the net increase is less than one-fourth of that number—only 1,071. This reveals a leakage which, in the opinion of your Committee, ought not to be passed over by them in silence, and that deserves the serious attention of both our ministers and people.

Your Committee would not play the part of croakers or alarmists. They have lost none of their confidence in either the ministers or the people of the Methodist Church. And if they had given way to pessimistic views or feelings before coming here, these views and feelings would have been dissipated by what they have witnessed since they came. In view of what we witnessed on Friday evening and the character of the religious services of the Sabbath we may well thank God and take courage. But neither our feelings nor our faith should prevent us from looking facts fairly in the face. The net increase in our membership is smaller this year than it has been in any year during the last decade, and this is a fact too serious for us to not lay it to heart.

Unfortunately, we are not alone in the predicament in which we find ourselves. This spiritual dearth, resulting in barrenness and stunted growths, is felt elsewhere. Among the Methodists of the United States it is well known that there are great searchings of heart. Some of their papers do not hesitate to say that they have ceased to be a revival

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Church; that while Methodism continues to be an educational, civilizing, and socially elevating force, it has very largely ceased to be a sin-destroying and soul-saving power. What we need, what Methodism the world over needs, is a great revival of spiritual religion, in which God shall come as near to us as He did to our fathers, and the supernatural and the divine shall become as real to us as it did to them. Thus would sin become to our apprehension exceeding sinful, and deliverance from it and its consequences the one thing needful, in comparison with which everything else would sink into insignificance.

So deeply have your Committee been impressed with these things that they have had little time to give to the consideration of matters of detail. Two or three things, however, have been so earnestly urged upon our attention that we can hardly with propriety pass them by in silence. It has been represented to us that there is a danger of a schism being created between our young people's societies and the Church, and thereby neutralizing the influence of these societies for good, and making it detrimental rather than useful. It is alleged that in some places the meetings of the society are regarded as more important than the services of the Church; that absence from class, for example, is supposed to be made up for by attending the meetings, say, of the Epworth League. And that it is so of other services. We pass this over as it came to us without further comment, trusting that it will receive all the attention due to it.

A resolution of the Brampton District has been referred to us, to the effect that that District meeting requests the annual Conference to appoint a standing committee to devise a plan of redistribution of Circuits and Districts within its bounds and report to the several Districts concerned at the next May meeting for action. From the statements made before us, we are of opinion that this Committee ought to be appointed.

THE CHURCH PROPERTY COMMITTEE.

(*Synopsis of Report.*)

Your Committee on Church Property report as follows:

After duly considering the various cases presented we beg to recommend:

Re KLEINBURG CHURCH PROPERTY.

1. That permission be granted the trustees of the Kleinburg church to sell such of the ground connected with the old Primitive Church as is not required for the burying ground, the proceeds to go to the Building Fund of new church.

Re CEDARDALE CHURCH, SUTTON WEST CIRCUIT.

2. That permission be granted the trustees of the Cedardale church on the Sutton West Circuit to sell their property, the proceeds to be applied towards the old indebtedness.

Re CRAIGHURST CHURCH.

3. That permission be granted for the sale of the Craighurst church, the proceeds to be devoted to the payment of the debt on the property, and the balance to be divided among the churches on the Mining mission.

Re ELMVALE PARSONAGE.

4. That permission be granted for the sale of the Elmvale parsonage, the proceeds to be used in building a new parsonage.

Re SINGHAMPTON PARSONAGE PROPERTY.

5. That permission be given to the trustees of the Singhampton parsonage to sell all the property, except three-eighths of an acre on which the new parsonage stands, and three-eighths of an acre, more or less, on the east side of the lane separating it from that on which the new parsonage stands, the proceeds to be applied to the parsonage fund.

Re BANDA CHURCH, AVENING CIRCUIT.

6. That the request of the trustees of the Banda church on the Avening Circuit, for permission to sell their property and the church organ, be not granted, and that the Chairman of the Collingwood District be respectfully requested to try and settle the case by the appointment of a committee or otherwise.

Re HUNTSVILLE CHURCH.

7. That permission be granted for the sale of the old church at Huntsville, the proceeds to be applied toward the Building Fund of the new church.

Re ZION CHURCH, PORT FINDLEY MISSION.

8. That permission be granted for the sale of the old Zion church on the Port Findley mission, the proceeds to be applied towards payment of debt on the new church at Echo Bay.

THE ENTERTAINMENT COMMITTEE.

Your Committee rejoice to record its grateful appreciation of the continued hospitality of the Methodist people of Toronto, as manifested in the opening of their homes for the entertainment of another annual Conference. It desires also to acknowledge its indebtedness to the city pastors for their kindness in securing homes in their respective congregations; to the financial secretaries for their promptness in forwarding the district lists of requests for billets; to the brethren billeted, for their gracious acceptance of the homes assigned them, even when distant from the seat of Conference.

Your Committee reports that it was unable to locate all the brethren within easy walking distance of the Conference church. It deplors the indifference with which a few of the brethren have treated those regula-

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tions by which it was hoped to satisfactorily entertain all the members of Conference. A few have enjoyed a free home without paying the required fee of one dollar; others have not reported at the billets allotted them, thereby disappointing kind friends who had placed their homes at the disposal of the Committee, and necessitating additional charges upon the funds of your Committee.

Your Committee regret to have to complain of these little irregularities on the part of a very few, but it does so with a keen appreciation of the fact that the billeting system in the city of Toronto can continue in its effectiveness only through the hearty co-operation of all the brethren with such billeting regulations as the Conference may make from year to year for the entertainment of its members.

In the event of the Conference being held in Toronto next year, your Committee would recommend the following regulations:

1. That the Entertainment Committee consist of one layman from each of the Toronto districts, to be named by the President, and a corresponding number of ministers, to be appointed by the Toronto Methodist Preachers' Meeting, whose duty it shall be to billet such members of Conference as may request a billet.

2. That any person requesting a billet, or receiving a free billet through the kindness of a friend, shall pay a billet fee of one dollar to the Financial Secretary at the May District Meeting.

3. That the Financial Secretaries, immediately after District Meeting, shall forward the names and fees of those requesting billets to the Secretary of the Billeting Committee.

4. That all requests for billets be in the hands of the Secretary of the Billeting Committee one week before the opening of Conference.

Your Committee recommend that any balance in the hands of the Secretary after billeting the Conference be paid to the Treasurer of the Billeting Committee of the General Conference.

THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

(Extracts from Report.)

Mr. President and Gentlemen of the Toronto Conference:

Your cordial response to our request for an opportunity of presenting a report from the Woman's Missionary Society assures us of your sympathy, and is abundant evidence that you do not regard it as in any sense a rival of other departments but as an important branch which seeks the development and upbuilding of our people.

There exists a Branch in each Conference. The aim is to have an Auxiliary in each church and every woman a member. Our roll now includes over 15,000 women and about 6,500 young people.

There are fifteen missionaries representing the Woman's Missionary Society in five cities of Japan. Three boarding schools in which 172 are

enrolled. Two orphanages caring for about thirty children. A school of fifty carried on by the King's Daughters. Two industrial schools with teaching in the evening. Over 600 meetings last year for women and children; 5,566 visits made with a view to leading to Christ or instructing in the faith. Eight pupils and twenty-six women baptized.

Four ladies represent us in Chentu, China. After numerous delays we now possess a good commodious property on which are some native buildings fitted up for hospital purposes. We have built a home for our missionaries, and a school and dormitories for children. There are about thirty day pupils and eight boarders, besides two little waifs to whom we have given shelter and home. Meetings are held with women, and the good seed is being faithfully sown.

In the French work the Woman's Missionary Society shares equally with the General Society the running expenses of the Institute, where there are seventy or eighty in residence. Two French day-schools in Montreal are maintained, some of the teachers also doing the work of Bible-women, thus reaching many living in poverty and the darkness of superstition. Country schools are also aided.

Ever since our organization as a Society our sympathies and contributions have gone out toward the Indian work. One of our first efforts was the uplifting of the girls at Port Simpson, British Columbia. About forty of them are now in our Home under the care and instruction of three teachers. In Dr. Bolton's hospital, in the same place, we maintain two nurses and their work is most highly valued.

The Coqualeetza Institute at Chilliwack, which has developed from the Home planted there by the Woman's Missionary Society, is now supported jointly by the two societies, who have the joy of knowing that one hundred boys and girls are receiving the benefit of an industrial training as well as being nurtured in the ways of the Lord. An appropriation is made for the care of thirty children at Kitamaat and also for another group at White Fish Lake. \$300 was donated for the refurnishing of the McDougall Orphanage. Thus we are interested in five homes for Indian children. \$500 has also been given for several years to the Methodist Orphanage at St. John's, Newfoundland.

Honorable mention should be made of the work of the Supply Committee, a department designed to assist our home missionaries. Bales of clothing, books, bedding and useful Christmas gifts are sent to the different missions and distributed by the minister in charge. The secretary receives many letters expressing heartfelt appreciation of these practical evidences of interest in the poor and distressed. During the past year sixty-nine places have been supplied with goods valued at \$5,000, which the Committee received from Auxiliaries, Mission Bands and Epworth Leagues. Can we estimate the good being done by these gifts?

This is in addition to the regular receipts of our Society, which were, for the year ending September, 1897, \$39,016, of which amount \$5,563 was contributed by the Toronto Conference Branch.

Firmly believing that this work must commend itself to you, we earnestly and confidently ask that you will "help those women who labored in the Gospel."

REPORT OF PRISON REFORM COMMITTEE.

The Committee appointed by the last Conference to co-operate with the Prisoners' Aid Association, in seeking prison reform, have done so to the extent of meeting with them for consideration of the subject, and interviewing the Government, and now report the promise of a favorable consideration of the same.

We desire to urge on the Conference the importance of the subject in view, viz, the diminution of crime in the community. That we strongly approve of the principle of indeterminate sentences as a substitute for the present arbitrary system. That we think a thorough reorganization of the Mercer Reformatory for Women is necessary. That we also believe there should be better classification of prisoners in the county goals, and also that judicious help, when necessary, should be devised for the families of prisoners. From various facts which have come to our knowledge we also regard it as of the first importance that in each county, as soon as practicable, there should be established a county house of industry.

REPORT OF SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg to report as follows :

1. We are deeply sensible of our obligation to the Head of the Church for the success attending our Sabbath School efforts during the year.
2. Your Committee feel that the Sunday School work has sustained a great loss in the death of Rev. Dr. BARRASS, who for so many years had sustained the most active relationship to our Sunday School work, as well as holding the honorable position of Treasurer of the Sunday School Aid and Extension Fund.
3. Your Committee would beg to urge upon officers and teachers the necessity of leading the children of our schools into the membership and fellowship of the Church, and we would also suggest to this Conference the advisability of memorializing the General Conference with regard to preparing a suitable form of reception into the Church for such children, and have such form printed in the Discipline.
4. Your Committee wish to express their gratitude to Almighty God for the large number of the children of our schools who have been converted during the year and added to the Church.
5. Your Committee beg to emphasize the Home Department idea, and strongly advise all our schools to take steps to organize this department in connection with their work.
6. Your Committee express their gratification respecting the large increase in the number of our scholars learning the catechism, and would very heartily advise every superintendent to introduce this important study into every school throughout the Conference.
7. Your Committee beg to call the attention of this Conference to the small proportion of our scholars who are reported as having taken the total abstinence pledge. We are firmly of the opinion that the most permanent temperance work can be done among the children.

8. In our opinion there is room for improvement in the tone and quality of the literature which finds its way into our schools, and would strongly suggest that all persons desiring Sunday School literature would correspond, first, with our Book Room before placing their orders elsewhere.

9. Your Committee beg to urge upon all our Sabbath School superintendents the necessity of encouraging the children of their respective schools to contribute more systematically to our church funds, especially to missions and Sunday School Aid and Extension Fund, for while \$23,835 is reported as raised for school purposes, \$3,396 has been collected for missions, and only \$439 for the Sunday School Aid.

10. Your Committee desire to express the pleasure they feel in recommending this Conference to extend to Rev. Wm. Herridge the thanks of our Church for his kindness in offering the four prizes for proficiency in Yale Lectures on Sunday School work. Our young men are thus encouraged to take this most important course of study, and this year the prizes have been carried off by four of the rising young men of this Conference.

11. Your Committee beg to recommend that the Rev. L. W. Hill, B.A., be appointed Treasurer of this fund.

THE EPWORTH LEAGUE COMMITTEE.

(Synopsis of Report.)

The Report of the Epworth League Committee notes the increase in missionary contributions and attributes it to the influence of the Forward Movement for Missions, and recommends the formation of missionary libraries in the Leagues; notes the success of the Forward Evangelistic Movement in the Hamilton Conference, and recommends the adoption of similar methods by the League in this Conference; urges the necessity of greater interest in the annual collection for the General Epworth League Board; endorses the action of the General Conference in appointing a General Secretary of Epworth Leagues, and bears testimony to the efficiency of the work of the Rev. A. C. Crews, the present General Secretary; calls attention to the importance of the work of the Junior Leagues, and recommends the forming of such in every circuit; commends the work of the Intermediate Leagues, and expresses the opinion that they should be officially recognized by General Conference; notes the gratifying increase of interest in the Reading Courses, and recommends their introduction into all Leagues.

REPORT OF THE SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMMITTEE.

1. While thankful to God for the standard of our Canadian Sabbath, which still distinguishes us from kindred nations, we nevertheless deplore the evidence of a growing tendency to a more liberal interpretation of the exceptions to its strict observance than is warranted by the law of God, *i.e.*, the substitution of the expediency of *pleasure or profit* for the law of "necessity or mercy," which law was the only exception sanctioned by Christ to the plain demand of the Decalogue. This growing laxity as expressed by the use of railway and street cars and steamboats, of social visiting as well as the pursuit of secular avocations on the Lord's Day, for purposes other than those of "necessity and mercy," we deem to be in flagrant violation of the fourth commandment, and would urge upon the membership of our Church the clear obligation to defend the holy Sabbath against such dishonor, both by example and precept:

(1) By inculcation of this reverence for the Sabbath in our homes: (a) by the removal of the obtrusive presence of secular newspapers, books and occupations, and the substitution therefor of such reading and conversation, pertaining to the higher relations of the day, as characterized the Sabbath home and home Sabbath of our fathers; (b) by requirement on the part of every member of our homes, not hindered by the law of "necessity or mercy," of regular attendance upon the public service of the sanctuary which is surely involved in any legitimate use of the Sabbath.

(2) By discouragement of society and military parades which, though they may end at church, are enemies to Sabbath quiet and reverence, especially in the case of our young people, who are thereby distracted from the influence and training which our Sabbath Schools and Epworth Leagues are designed to confer. We would urge our ministers and people to consider whether the good attained on the one hand is a sufficient offset to the antagonism to the spirit of the Sabbath otherwise engendered.

Your Committee would express its cordial appreciation of the aggressive efforts of the Lord's Day Alliance and kindred organizations in defence of the Sabbath laws, and would commend such efforts to the cordial support of our people until such legislation has been secured and enforced as shall be effective in conserving our Christian Sabbath.

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REPORTS OF COLLEGES.

REPORT OF VICTORIA UNIVERSITY.

To the President and Members of the Toronto Conference:

FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—It affords us pleasure at the close of another year to acquaint you with the progress of the important work committed to us by the Methodist Church.

During the year we have enrolled in our two faculties 315 students, 200 of whom are properly students in Arts and 115 students in Theology. The total enrolment in Arts classes has been 255, and in Divinity classes 171; 111 students taking work in both faculties. The net increase of students for the year is 33. Our Arts students are distributed as follows: General Course, 62; College Honor Courses, 51; University Honor Courses, 57; Partial Courses, 30. Our Divinity students have been distributed as follows: Graduate Courses, 34; Conference, 81. These simple figures convey some idea of the extent of our work and of its influence on the future of our Church and country.

While aiming at the highest university scholarship, in which many of our gifted sons and daughters are winning for themselves the highest honors, our College is becoming more and more a home in which every element of true Christian culture is regarded; and as rapidly as the means placed in our hands permit, we are seeking to supply all those accessories of university life which will further this important end.

The normal condition of such an institution as ours is financial embarrassment. A college with a surplus in its treasury would mean a decadent college, a college without the expansive strength of growing life. Last year we were sorry to report a deficiency of \$8,758, and the estimate for the present year was for a like amount. We are glad to say that the

income for the year has been somewhat increased notwithstanding a fall in the rate of interest, the fees this year being \$1,100 in advance of last year, and also collections on subscriptions being somewhat in advance. Our deficiency is thus reduced to \$7,878, an improvement of nearly \$1,000. This deficiency has, notwithstanding this slight improvement, been the occasion of the gravest anxiety and consideration on the part of your Board of Regents. In consequence of questions and suggestions made last year, and especially of a resolution of the Toronto Conference, a committee for the investigation of the entire work and expenditure was appointed early in the year. The committee consisted of the General Superintendent, the Secretary of Education, the President of the College, and Drs. Mills, Maclaren, Hough, Dewart, and Sutherland. The professors in the various departments were called and examined as to the extent and character of their work. Information was obtained from sister colleges who are doing parallel work as to the strength and cost of their staff and the amount of work required of their men. After a most careful and anxious investigation the Committee have summed up their report in the following words: After saying that "equal work is done much more cheaply in Victoria than in the other colleges," they say, "The whole scope of this inquiry has shown your Committee the importance and the necessity of maintaining the full efficiency of the work now done in your University. Indeed, we are persuaded that such efficiency should be increased rather than diminished. But if we are able to do this we cannot possibly employ either fewer or cheaper men. Honor work in all such institutions is expensive. But it is that which gives a college like ours its character and status, and if we abandon that part of the work we may as well abandon the teaching of Arts altogether. If progressive students cannot get their honor work in their own college, they will most certainly register where they can. As it is this which attracts the best and brightest students, its relinquishment would be the signing of the death-warrant of our college." "The only suggestion offered to your committee was that in some of the languages a lecturer might be replaced by a tutor at a lower salary. It was thought that, at most, \$400 a year might be saved in this way. The majority of the Committee did not see their way clear to support this suggestion, as it involves the risk of employing untried young men and probably frequent change, while the financial advantage is very slight." After full consideration of the report, of which the above is the conclusion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted by the Board:

Moved by Rev. J. S. Ross, D.D., seconded by Senator Cox,

Whereas, the income from the Endowment Fund of Victoria College has decreased in late years on account of the lower rate of interest obtainable from investments; and

Whereas, we have not obtained more than half the endowment originally proposed, and which was considered absolutely necessary; and

Whereas, in the opinion of this Board, after careful examination, there is no possibility of further reducing our estimates without seriously impairing the usefulness of the Institution; and

Whereas, it is also the opinion of this Board that there is no remedy available except by an increased endowment; therefore

Resolved,—That this Board earnestly appeals to the Methodist Church through the coming Annual Conferences and General Conference for the inauguration of a plan to secure an additional endowment through the proposed Twentieth Century Million Dollar Fund, sufficient to meet the current expenses of our University.

The project to which reference is thus made is one which has already commended itself to the most liberal and godly minds in our Church. As we enter upon a new century almost co-equal with the second century of the history of Canadian Methodism, it is but right that we should pause and gird ourselves for the work and responsibility of a new and glorious era. The next century may see the conversion to Christ of the entire heathen world. The next century may see our emancipation from all the blights which now mar Christian civilization. It may witness the coming forth of a moral and spiritual perfection of Christian character, as well as of institutions which shall be as the New Jerusalem coming down out of heaven from God. And if so, "wisdom and knowledge shall be the stability of the times and the strength of salvation." What then more fitting than that in its dawn we should lay upon the altar of God, an offering such as will enable our whole army to move forward to the final millennial victory and glory. With intelligence and spiritual power and consecrated men and means, let us go forward to possess the new age in the name of the Lord.

SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ALMA
COLLEGE BOARD.

To the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church :

The Board gratefully bears testimony to the goodness of God in His care over the College during another year, and is thankful to be able to report encouragingly concerning every department of the school.

The moral and religious life has expressed itself in deepening regard for duty and exceptionally large attendance upon the regular voluntary religious services of the school and the meetings of the Young Women's Association. The enrolment has been made of our first company of workers in the Students' Forward Movement for Missions.

There has been marked attention to those matters of deportment and bearing so important to the best and widest influence for good. The kind, social attentions of many of the friends in the city of St. Thomas have made the year especially agreeable to the many members of the school.

In scholarship, faithful work promises large success in the current examinations, as has been the result in those already held. Affiliation has been effected with the Sabbath School Association of Ontario for Normal-Bible studies, a school of domestic science and cookery established, and greatly increased attention given to physical training. In collegiate studies, music, fine art, elocution and business, excellent work is being done by enthusiastic classes.

The financial results of the year are of peculiar interest. The retrenchments effected aggregate \$2,000, and without impairing the high efficiency of the school. The profit and loss account is the most satisfactory for years; the attendance of students has steadily increased every term, and the withdrawals have been only 40 per cent. of last year's number. The Board considers this a most encouraging state of affairs. But a floating debt of \$15,000 against the College so jeopardizes all this promise that the citizens of St. Thomas have undertaken, without cost of agency, to raise \$10,000 as their share, provided the entire \$15,000 be wiped out. The canvass has already secured the largest subscription ever given at one time by St. Thomas to the College, and although the effort is very arduous, yet there is a very fair prospect that within a few weeks the practical liquidation of the debt will have been effected.

These financial struggles sometimes cause the question to be raised as to the necessity for such schools as Alma College. The reply in brief is :

1. The State system of schools alone cannot give all the conditions required for the best development of the whole being as made up of mental, religious, social and domestic attributes.

2. The convent system and the ladies' colleges undertake to supply the deficiency; but as the convents in Ontario have more Protestant girls in attendance than the Protestant ladies' colleges have, the latter, it would seem, are failing to provide adequate facilities. This success of the convents is because they are at least largely founded on the benevolent basis as to buildings, equipment and service, and can, when necessary, afford lower rates, and do afford certain special advantages as the result of devotion to particular lines of education.

3. Alma College is founded on the benevolent basis, and aims eventually to give at least the buildings and equipment to the work of woman's education. In seventeen years this aim has been more than half realized in an institution that has cost to establish over \$100,000, and which has helped in the education of over two thousand students from many of the best homes in the land. The spirit of Christianity and of Methodism and the needs of the times demand that the best educational advantages be afforded to the largest number possible.

4. As the country grows older there will be increasing demand for these colleges. It has been so in Old England and in New England, and will be so here. If we wish to do our share of this important work we must be equal to opportunity and meet the demand.

5. Residential colleges afford to young women contemplating a university course especially advantageous conditions during the earlier years of formative student life.

In conclusion, the Board would express to the Conference its confidence that once the mission, the work of the College and the necessity for it are properly understood, there will be no further difficulty in sustaining it in increasing efficiency and in making it more and more a bulwark for all that which is true, beautiful and useful in education and religion.

ALBERT COLLEGE.

To the Members of the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church:

DEAR BRETHREN,—We are able to report another year of success in connection with Albert College. Two hundred and four students have been enrolled—108 males and 96 females. The health of the students has been exceptionally good.

The literary work of the College is most thorough and efficient, as is shown by the very high standing secured by the students in both departmental and University examinations. In 1897, of five senior matriculants all were successful; of eight senior leaving candidates seven were successful; of eight junior leaving all were successful, making ninety-five per cent. successful—a most gratifying record. It is very doubtful if this high record was reached by any High School or Collegiate Institute in the Province. Students are prepared annually for all grades of teachers' certificates, and for both junior and senior matriculation.

The departments of music, fine arts, elocution and commercial science maintain their efficiency and are largely attended. In each of these departments students have repeatedly brought honor to themselves and to the institution by taking the highest place, year after year, in competition with students of other colleges.

The aim of the Board of Management is, in the first place, to secure the highest possible efficiency and at the same time to make the charges as moderate as possible. We confidently assert that equal advantages are

not offered in Ontario at so low a cost. The institution still attracts a large number of earnest, godly young men seeking to prepare for the work of the Christian ministry. A special examination is held for Conference candidates in May of each year.

The Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A., as also the various missionary societies, have been most active and earnest in their operations during the year. Many of the students are enthusiastic leaders in the Student Volunteer Movement, and take an active part in campaign work.

In short, continued and increasing success marks every feature of the college work.

Hundreds of young men and young women have, during their attendance at Albert College, been brought to a higher standard of Christian helpfulness, and have gone out to do splendid work for the Christian Church both at home and abroad.

We are profoundly grateful to God for the successes that have already crowned the work of this institution, and we enter upon the incoming year with bright hopes of still greater success.

REPORT OF THE ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE, WHITBY.

To the Toronto Methodist Conference :

We, the Directors of the Ontario Ladies' College, Whitby, take pleasure in presenting to this Conference our twenty-fourth annual report. The total enrolment of students for the year has been 140, of whom 121 have been boarders and 19 day pupils. The average attendance of resident students has been the largest in the history of the College. In this practical proof of the growing strength and popularity of the College we feel that we have the strongest ground for encouragement in prosecuting with still greater vigor the important work in which we are engaged. It has been our constant endeavor to keep the various departments of the College in a healthy state of growth and development, and to be willing to incur the necessary expense to accomplish our purpose, and it is gratifying to be able to state that the present unique position of the College in the favor and confidence of the Canadian public affords abundant proof of the wisdom of our course. Our motto has been, and we trust ever shall be, "Forgetting the things that are behind, press forward to those that are before," and thereby make the successful work of one year the stepping-stone to still greater achievements.

The fact that our College is the only Ladies' College in Canada that has successfully undertaken and completed the work of a well-equipped Collegiate Institute as well as the work of a University through two years, needs no further comment. Numerous commendatory letters from parents and guardians indicate their hearty appreciation of the work being done.

Our Musical Department is known as the Ontario Conservatory of Music, and the course in piano, pipe organ, violin, guitar, voice-culture and theory is as thorough as that of our leading Conservatories. The

recent addition of a new concert hall, provided with a magnificent two-manual pipe organ and concert grand pianos, gives us facilities for recitals and advanced and satisfactory work that are not equalled in any similar College in this country. We trust that our exceptional facilities for the study of pipe organ music will not only draw many students to the department, but will have its desired effect upon the musical service of many of our churches.

In the Fine Art Department some work of exceptional merit has been done in painting in oils and water colors as well as china painting.

The Department of Oratory has become one of the most successful in connection with the College. The Commercial Department has been strengthened by the purchase of additional equipment. At the solicitation of several intelligent women, in whose judgment we have confidence, we have opened up a new department of Domestic Science, in which all subjects, relating more especially to home life, will receive careful and thorough attention, such, for example, as the chemistry of foods, the detection of adulteration of food, the different methods of cookery, the dainty arrangement of table appointments, plain sewing, etc. Already about thirty have entered upon the work of this department, and it is likely to prove an important adjunct to the work of the College.

For many years the College has had a reputation for pleasant, healthful surroundings. During the past two or three years an effort has been made to raise still higher the standard of physical vigor amongst students by a daily physical culture drill in the middle of the forenoon session. As a result the general tone of health has been higher than ever before.

We cannot close our report without referring to the marked degree of good-will existing between students and teachers, and between teachers and the Board of Directors. We consider our College singularly fortunate in this respect, and believe that if unity and co-operation combined with enterprise mean anything, they mean that our College will continue to grow and spread its helpful influence far and wide over this country. To reach our ideal we need more capital, and we trust that all friends of sound education will do what they can to help us in this respect.

Thanking you, the members of this Conference, for your support in the past, and trusting that our standing amongst the educational institutions of this country may make it a pleasure for you to recommend our College, we promise to do all in our power to merit your continued confidence.

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OBITUARIES.

JOHN HODGSON

Was born in the year 1825, in the township of Cavan. His parents were of the sturdy and heroic pioneers who cleared the forests and founded homes in this land of ours in the early years of this now dying century.

From boyhood days Mr. Hodgson manifested a mind eager for knowledge, and when but a youth had acquired such an education as fitted him for the position of school-teacher. All through the years of active toil in the ministry he endeavored faithfully to acquaint himself with the treasures of good books.

Along with his love of knowledge, Mr. Hodgson very early in life manifested strong desires for the higher knowledge of God. Under the preaching of a Methodist missionary who had pushed his way into the settlement, he found Christ as his Saviour and accepted Him as the Lord and Master of his life.

Blessed with a definite and growing religious experience he soon felt himself called of God to preach His truth, and so at the age of twenty-three he offered himself to the ministry of the Bible Christian Church, and in Peterboro' and the surrounding country labored for six years as a minister of that Church. Resigning from this branch of Methodism he was received into the ministry of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in the year 1857, under the presidency of the Rev. Enoch Wood. He labored on the following fields: Amherstburg, Mooretown, Romney, Florence, Stouffville, Brock, Kleinburg, Teviotdale, Hall's Bridge, Cartwright, Maxwell, Bruce Mines, Silver Islet and Coboconk.

He was superannuated in the year 1883, and after a short stay in the United States settled in the town of Walkerton. There in the love of home and the fellowship of other superannuated brethren, he enjoyed for four years a well-earned rest. In 1894, that his family might enjoy its educational advantages, he moved to Toronto. But shortly after this he was so stricken with paralysis that for two years he walked in the valley of the shadow of death, until on the 21st day of June, 1897, God called him home to his rest. The writer, as pastor of the church with which his family was connected, officiated at the funeral, and there were present Rev. Mr. Bishop, Chairman of the District; Rev. Dr. Dewart and Rev. W. J. Barkwell, all of whom took part in the service.

Mr. Hodgson was married in 1856 to Miss Elizabeth Gee, sister of the late Rev. D. F. Gee and the Rev. Thos. Gee. Two sons, one of whom entered our ministry, but after a short time was compelled by ill health to retire, and two daughters survive their father, and with their widowed mother cherish his memory.

Years in Ministry.

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THOMAS STOTT KEOUGH.

Thomas Stott Keough was an Englishman by birth. He was born in Salford, England, September 28th, 1823, and with his parents came to Canada two or three years later. The family settled in New Ireland, Province of Quebec, not far from what is now the city of Sherbrooke, and here Thomas spent his childhood and youth, received his education and grew up to early manhood. In 1841 he came to Toronto, and entered upon his training for mercantile life. When Mr. John Macdonald became the head of the great commercial house which still bears his name, Mr. Keough became his book-keeper, a position which he filled for several years.

The son of godly parents, brought up in a Christian-home, reared in the doctrine and discipline of Methodism, it is not wonderful that even when a child his mind was deeply impressed with divine things, and that while but a youth he became the subject of a sound scriptural conversion. Though he did not enter the Christian ministry until somewhat advanced in life, long before that he had won distinction among his brethren as an intelligent, devoted and successful Christian worker. In the great revivals which occurred under the ministry of Rev. James Caughey and others, between forty and fifty years ago, he was one of a band of devoted Christians who did much to make those great religious movements as successful as they were in the conversion of sinners, in the sanctification of believers, and in promotion of all the interests of the Church.

It was not, however, until he had reached his thirty-sixth year that the way opened for him to enter the Christian ministry, and to devote himself fully to the work of God. In 1856 he was received on trial, and in 1860 he was received into full connection with the Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church and ordained. During the four years of his probation he was stationed successively at Kingston, Belleville and Grimsby. In subsequent years he served the Church on the following fields, in the order named, viz., Welland, Glanford, St. George, East Zorra, Zorra, Cobourg (as agent for Victoria College), Yonge Street Centre (Thornhill), Cooksville and Sunderland. In 1879 he was Secretary of the Toronto Conference. From 1881 to 1885 he filled the position of Assistant Missionary Secretary. Afterwards he spent eight years as the accountant of the Superannuated Ministers' Fund.

He died in great peace at his residence in the city of Toronto on the 29th of July, 1897, being at the time of his decease in the seventy-fourth year of his age and the forty-first of his ministry.

WILLIAM SHANNON.

Brother Shannon was born in the County of Sligo, Ireland, January 20th, 1821. He was brought up in a home which was blessed with the priceless advantage of a godly mother's nurture and example. She had been led to religious decision by hearing Wesley's sermon on the New Birth read in the parish church. The stalwart and saintly ministers of Irish Methodism were welcome and frequent guests in that home, and

their conversation and prayers gave shape and elevation to his religious ideals and standards. Rev. Gibson McMillen was superintendent of the circuit at the time of his conversion, which occurred in 1839, he having been a member of class for four years previously. Almost immediately after his conversion he was appointed prayer and class-leader, and his eminent fitness for the work given him was made evident by the conversion of three persons at the first prayer-meeting that he conducted. Very soon his talents and graces marked him out for the pulpit, and he was made local preacher. He continued in these forms of usefulness until, in 1850, he emigrated to this country, after acting as school-teacher and local preacher for several years of usefulness. In the fall or winter of 1854 he was sent as chairman's supply to Osprey, and in 1855 was regularly received on trial for the ministry. During probation or in full connection he labored zealously and with good success on some twenty-one circuits. Traditions of his long tramps through the bush, of wading unbridged rivers, preaching sometimes in undried habiliments and without preliminary rest or refreshment, still linger on some of his earlier fields. He was known always as a faithful and laborious minister, winning souls to Christ, edifying saints, and building such church edifices as were suitable to the circumstances of the people. His physical organization was excellent and enduring, and he did not spare its powers in his work for the Master.

His superannuation, which took place in June, 1889, was hastened by a disabling accident in the previous winter. He resided a few years in Orangeville, and also in Toronto, from which city he removed in June, 1897, to Sault Ste. Marie, Ont. On the 6th of August he went to lead a cottage prayer-meeting, and arriving a few minutes before the time of opening the service, he took a seat and in a few minutes passed away in peace. Thus did he "cease at once to work and live;" and there seems an interesting coincidence in the fact that the last work he attempted to do for God was of the same order as that in which he was honored with his first soul-saving success. He had assisted his pastor on the preceding Sabbath in the administration of the Lord's Supper. The funeral services were conducted by the Rev. C. E. Manning, assisted by Revs. E. E. Scott, of Toronto, and C. T. Scott, of St. Thomas.

He married Miss Sarah Adams, of Hungerford, Hastings County, in 1861. She, the faithful helpmeet and devoted mother, survives with five of the seven children which were born to them.

Brother Shannon was exceedingly humble in his estimate of himself. In matters merely personal he was the reverse of the egotist, but in matters concerning the truth of God, his utterances were always definite, conscientious and fearless. Nothing saddened him so much as when he thought he saw evidence of a worldly spirit in church movements or enterprises, or any toning down of the theology of that Methodism which had shaped his early religious life, and which it was his delight to preach.

He was remarkably well read in the theology of early Methodism, and could quote verbatim the words of Wesley, Fletcher, Watson, Clarke and others on many subjects, especially those which relate to repentance, faith and the witness of the Spirit.

When we say that our late brother was a good man, a humble and conscientious Christian and a successful minister, no discount need be deducted because of the general feeling which prompts to say the kindest things of the deceased, and no doubt shadows the conviction that the "Well-done" of the Master is now his great reward.

MICHAEL FAWCETT.

Michael Fawcett was born in Scargill, Yorkshire, England, April 2nd, 1816, and died at Guelph, Ont., December 18th, 1897, in his eighty-second year. He came to this country when he was about eighteen years of age, settling near Tilsonburg, and was soon thereafter converted to God. He entered the ministry in 1841 as a married man, was ordained in 1845, and travelled continuously until his superannuation in June, 1885, being forty-four years in the active work. He was a born preacher, and delighted in the work. There was always a great clearness, directness and evangelical zeal in his preaching, mingled often with a natural vein of humor. He was original in his conception of a subject, marked out a path for himself, and yet took special pains to store his mind with gems from the best literature. He hungered for souls, and the blessed revivals that attended his ministry testified to the singleness of his aim, while at the same time he was vigorous in his ethical teaching and diligent in caring for the flock of God.

In his domestic relations he was an affectionate husband, a kind and loving father, but requiring obedience from his children without question. He was a man of high social qualities in the prime of his life, and as full of mirth as would well become a minister. He was the life of the social circle, apt in repartee, witty as a son of the Emerald Isle, and yet sturdy as a true Britisher. He loved his brethren in the ministry; their character and reputation were sacred in his eyes, and he never permitted adverse criticism of any of them without a prompt defence.

He was a man of simple faith, always taking God at His word, and thus fighting his battles for God and humanity. He was mighty in supplication, and his prayer at times would seem to bring heaven and earth together. Throughout life he made it a principle to give a tenth of his income to the cause of God. He was one of the pioneers of our Church in Ontario, and for some years one of the few remaining links binding us to the Methodism of the past. Hundreds saved through his ministry mourn with us saying, "Know ye not that there is a prince and a great man fallen in Israel to-day?"

The following are some of the circuits where he labored: Sidney, Bowmanville, Grimsby, St. George, Brampton, Markham, Oakville, Bradford, Weston, Thornhill, Cooksville, Scarboro', Maple, beside four years spent in missionary work in Manitoba at High Bluff and Portage la Prairie.

He received his summons to "depart and be with Christ" while visiting in Guelph in December last, and we quote from the address of the Rev. J. G. Scott at his funeral some brief words of his closing hours.

When he knew the end had come he said, "I cannot trust to anything I have done now. It could not save me. The grace of God alone has saved me, and through grace I shall triumph." Tenderly his son, Dr. Wm. Fawcett, of Chicago, read to him out of the Word of God and sang with him, at his request, such hymns as "Rock of Ages, cleft for me," "Alas and did my Saviour bleed," "When I survey the wondrous cross."

After leaving tender messages to his family he was asked if he had any messages also for his brother ministers. And like a dying prophet, with his feet touching the threshold of the eternities, he turned backward one glance and said: "Tell them there is no one but Jesus. Tell them to preach the old-fashioned gospel and never mind the new fol-de-rols. Say to them, in these days when the tendency is to forget that Jesus is indeed God, don't forget to preach the Divine Christ. Give my love to all the old pilgrims I have known so well, and my blessing to the young men who have come up to stand for God and Methodism." Then quietly, peacefully, after a long life of arduous and successful toil, he passed on to his well-earned rest, and the higher ministries above.

E. BARRASS, D.D.,

Was born in Durham, England, in 1821. In his twentieth year he entered the ministry of the English Primitive Methodist Conference, laboring with ardor and success in both town and country circuits. In 1853 he came to Canada, and for forty-five years continued to toil with consecrated zeal in many parts of the Canadian field. He was superannuated in 1891, but with scarce an intermission of labor, and at times resuming active work. He was a soul-saving preacher, and his ministry was accompanied by the demonstration of the Spirit and with power for the revival and the upbuilding of the Church of God.

Dr. Barrass held a facile pen, and was extremely fond, even in his busiest circuits, of literary work. In 1852 he published his first volume, enlarged and reissued in 1868 under the title of "Gallery of Distinguished Men." He issued in 1878 another little book of sketches from life, entitled "Smiles and Tears," a title which well characterized its themes and their treatment. His familiar acquaintance with the personnel of Canadian Methodism made his recent work on the *Christian Guardian* and his correspondence in the American religious press of special value.

Where many men of his age gave only a passive support, he took an active interest in every Christian and philanthropic movement.

His friends observed that Dr. Barrass seemed for some time in failing health, but up to within three weeks of his death he was found daily at his work in the *Guardian* office. On the evening of Sunday, February 13th, after preaching in Simpson Avenue Church, and riding home through the cold weather, he experienced a slight stroke of paralysis. But he was cheery and buoyant in spirit and conversed freely with his ministerial friends, who showed the closeness of the Methodist brotherhood by their kind visits and sympathy. He enjoyed in his soul the comforts and consolations of that Gospel which he had so long preached to others. He

especially enjoyed the old Methodist hymns in which his voice had so triumphantly rung in many a revival campaign. "No hymns like these," he said, "are so full of experimental religion." "His hope was full. O glorious hope of immortality." He especially enjoyed before his illness the revival services, conducted in the Queen Street Methodist Church, by Messrs. Crossley and Hunter. He said that it seemed a preparation for his departure from the service of the Church on earth to the joys of the Church on high. He walked in the land of Beulah, quite on the verge of heaven.

A few days before his death, when scarcely able to speak, his face lit up with a heavenly smile as he answered to his old comrade, the Rev. Charles Fish. He declared the preciousness of that name which is above every name, and his unflinching trust in the Lord whom he had so long loved and served. But his long life of arduous and successful toil for the Church of his choice—this is his best testimony, this is his truest monument.

Devout men bore him to his burial, and scores of his comrades in the ministry, many from distant parts of the Province, assembled to pay the last sad tribute of respect to the memory of one of the best beloved ministers of our Church.

JOHN SHUTTLEWORTH

Was born in Sheffield, Yorkshire, England, in the year 1816, and there received his early education. He was converted to God under the ministry of the Rev. John McLean, of the Methodist New Connexion Church. A year later, at the age of eighteen, he became a local preacher, and in due time entered upon the full work of the ministry. For thirteen years he preached the Gospel in Yorkshire, and subsequently labored in the West of England. His early religious training was in the midst of revivals such as prevailed in the old land in those early days. He was associated more or less with such fervent souls as William, better known as "Billy" Dawson, John McLean, Robert Newton and Gideon Ousley.

In 1848, just after the famine in Ireland, Mr. Shuttleworth was sent to that country, where he succeeded the Rev. William McClure in the charge of the Bangor Circuit. Mr. Shuttleworth took a very active part in attending to the temporal as well as the spiritual wants of the people generally, regardless of sect, during the prevalence of the famine and cholera in that land. He seemed absolutely fearless of infection, and often took very serious risks, sometimes assisting in burial preparations, and occasionally, as in the instance of the town bellman, performing the duties of gravedigger as well as those of the minister, adding "dust to dust" in more than symbolic manner.

He continued some time in the North of Ireland, being stationed successively at Lurgan, Lisburn and Priesthill. It was at the latter place God blessed him with what he regarded as the most gracious revival of his ministry. The services continued nightly for six months. Large numbers were added to the Church, necessitating the enlargement of the

building. Among the converts were some who were noted as great sinners, as well as many of the highest standing in the community, one of whom afterwards became the Rev. Thomas Carlisle, who was used of God in accomplishing a great work in the city of London. In 1857 Mr. Shuttleworth again became the successor of Mr. McClure, this time in the Temperance Street Church, Toronto, where his ministry was greatly owned of God. From here he went to London, thence to Montreal, Tilsonburg, West Brome, Schomberg, and on the consummation of union between the Methodist New Connexion and Wesleyan churches he was appointed to Aurora Circuit, where he suffered the bereavement of his gifted and devoted wife. After his superannuation he remained in comparative retirement, responding gladly, however, to calls for his services when his health permitted, and entering as fully as possible into the life and work of the Church where he worshipped.

Brother Shuttleworth was a man greatly beloved for his saintly Christian character. He loved the Methodist Church, and believed and preached all her doctrines with all his heart. He was a preacher of great power and eloquence. His faithful ministry will be held in grateful recollection in many parts of this as well as of the old land. He was a man of clear and strong convictions and had courage to express and defend them. Of large and tender heart, with a high sense of honor he maintained through his whole life an unblemished record. His son, Edward Buckingham, is well known in connection with medical and pharmaceutical education in Canada, more especially as founder and Dean of the Ontario College of Pharmacy and Professor of Materia Medica in Trinity Medical College. Our dear and honored brother served his generation according to the will of God, and when beyond the fourscore years he fell asleep. The funeral services were held at Central Methodist Church, Bloor Street, Toronto, with which he was connected during the late years of his life, March 21st, 1898, when a large concourse of his brethren paid their last tribute of respect to the memory of a good man.

WILLIAM BIRKS

Was born in Staffordshire, England, on February 1st, 1829. From childhood he was taught to walk in the ways of truth and righteousness. Through his father's faithful teaching and earnest prayers, when seventeen years of age he was converted and entered upon a life-long service for God. At the early age of twenty his name was placed on the Longton Circuit Preachers' Plan, where he gave full proof of his ability to preach the Word. In 1852 he was married to Miss Julia Plant, and in 1855 he was set apart for the work of the ministry of the New Connexion Methodist Church, and came to Canada to labor with that body. He entered upon his work full of hope, and of zeal for God and the salvation of souls. His various fields of toil gave evidence of diligent and faithful application. Solid Christian work marked his stay on a circuit, and gracious revivals were frequent. As a result there was much spiritual progress, and a general increase in membership and in the funds of the Church. His preaching was clear, scriptural and forcible. A present

salvation was a prominent feature in his preaching. As a pastor, he was thoughtful and sympathetic, and the homes where there was sickness and sorrow were especially cheered by his visits, his counsel and prayers.

For forty years he engaged faithfully and successfully in circuit work. His first appointment was Goderich, then successively Crosby, Owen Sound, Mount Forest, and many other well-known circuits. He was contented with what appointments were given him, regarding the action of the Church as the will of God, and thus went cheerfully to the fields assigned him. For a time he occupied the position of chairman of a district.

In 1866 he was deeply afflicted in the death of his wife, who had lived a most useful and devout Christian life. His second marriage was to Miss Mary Latimer, of Lmsdowne, Ontario, who survives him, and mourns his unexpected removal by death. In 1895 he took a superannuated relation, and moved to Toronto and connected himself with the St. Clarens Avenue Church, where he engaged most earnestly the three remaining years of life, with what strength remained, in helping on the work of God. He loved Methodism, and took a deep interest in every movement of the Connexion, and liberally contributed of his means to further the work.

His last illness was very brief, being less than a week's duration, but through it he was patient and peaceful. His Saviour was manifestly with him. He would join fervently in the quoting of the familiar promises of God and in the offering of prayer. Early in the morning of June 2nd, in his seventieth year, he passed away to the presence of the Lord he so greatly loved and faithfully served. A deeply impressive memorial service was held in the St. Clarens Avenue Church the day of the funeral. A large number of his brethren were present, and some of his old companions in service made touching references to his character and worth. His surviving children are W. J. Birks, organist of St. James Methodist Church, Montreal; Rev. A. K. Birks, B.A., LL.B., Stratford; Rev. D. D. Birks and T. W. Birks, British Columbia, and Florence, his adopted daughter, who remains with the mother at home. They are all looking forward to a happy reunion with the loved husband and father in the bright home above.

Moved by Rev. W. H. Withrow, D.D., seconded by Rev. J. F. German, D.D., Whereas our late lamented brother, the Rev. Dr. Barrass, for many years faithfully served the Toronto Conference in the capacity of Journal Secretary, and by his unwearied devotion, his painstaking accuracy, his cordial kindness, greatly facilitated the business of Conference and the preservation of its records; therefore

Resolved.—That we place upon those Journals, of which he was so long the custodian, the sense of our appreciation of his invaluable services in this regard, as well as in the many others by which to the end of his long and busy life he was enabled to work till the Master called him from labor to reward.

Moved by Rev. H. S. Matthews, seconded by Rev. Dr. Briggs, That we have heard with deep regret of the serious illness of Warring Kennedy, Esq., a distinguished member of this Conference. Mr. Kennedy has always taken a deep interest in every religious and moral work, and has devoted time, strength and means to the Church of Jesus Christ in general and the Methodist Church in particular. Mr. Kennedy has occupied important positions both in Church and State, and has used his influence invariably for truth and righteousness. We would express the hope and offer the prayer that our beloved brother may be speedily restored to health and strength.

Moved by Rev. A. Langford, seconded by Senator Cox, That this Conference has heard with great pleasure and satisfaction the proposal of the Rev. Dr. Potts, that the Methodist Church in Canada should contribute one million dollars to a Twentieth Century Million Dollar Fund.

We rejoice in the magnificent proposition of our fathers and brethren of the British Conference to raise one million guineas as their joyous contribution to a similar fund.

We hail our brethren of the sister Conference in our beloved Canada, who have pledged their willing, consecrated liberality to this devoutly desired consummation of the faith and hope of our Church.

We recognize the supreme importance of this heaven-inspired purpose, and believe that the Great Head of the Church is leading us out into larger spheres of usefulness and power.

We therefore respectfully memorialize the General Conference to devise such measures as will bring this great question before our Church throughout all our Conferences. We believe that the time has come to strengthen our Connexional colleges and funds.

We therefore pledge ourselves to accept loyally the decisions of our General Conference, and will cheerfully bring our consecrated offerings to a Twentieth Century Million Dollar Fund.

Moved by Rev. Dr. Badgley, seconded by Rev. Dr. Henderson, and
Resolved.—That the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church in Conference assembled, and representing one quarter of a million of Her Majesty's most loyal subjects, desires to place on record its gratitude to

Almighty God that, standing as we do on the threshold of the twentieth Christian century, and despite the increasing armaments and munitions of war of the professedly Christian Governments, yet the signs are multiplying on every hand that international differences, instead of being settled by an appeal to the sword, are more and more being adjusted by the wise and skilful diplomacy of Christian statesmen.

That in the van of this great and desirable movement we recognize the womanly heart of our beloved Queen and of Her Majesty's responsible advisers.

That we rejoice in the growing sentiments of sympathy and brotherhood between the British Empire and the United States of America, representing as they do two great branches of the Anglo-Saxon race.

That we recognize that to these two great powers is entrusted an important mission as leaders in all reform, freedom and progress; and

That we earnestly pray that all thought and movement towards these great ends of closer union, sympathy and co-operation may be divinely furthered, until the last shackle shall be stricken from the oppressed, and political and religious liberty and equality shall be the people's heritage on every continent and in every island of the sea.

Moved by W. T. R. Preston, seconded by Dr. Watson, That the class-leader delegates to the Toronto Conference desire to place upon record their heartfelt appreciation of the class-meeting as a vital source of the spiritual power of the Church, and deprecate any action tending to detract from the importance of the influence of this means of grace as a means of growth in Christian life, and it is recommended:

1. That every pastor be impressed with the advisability of preaching a sermon once a quarter upon a subject having a direct bearing upon class-meeting.

2. That special efforts be made on every circuit to organize class-leaders' conventions or gatherings for mutual consultation and encouragement.

3. That a class-leaders' conference be a distinct feature of the Annual Conference.

4. That a class-leaders' committee be appointed by the President, whose duty it shall be to confer as to the best means of promoting and stimulating an interest in class-meeting throughout the bounds of the Conference.

5. That the General Conference be memorialized that an addition be made to the active members' pledge of the Epworth League to the effect, "and shall be adjointed to attend class-meeting regularly."

6. And that every possible effort be made by pastors and class-leaders to preserve in tact the inestimable privileges incident to class-meetings as handed down to the Church by the fathers of Methodism.

Moved by Rev. Dr. Badgley, seconded by Rev. Dr. Dewart, That we have heard with pleasure the addresses of Rev. Professor Warriner and Mr. Day, representatives of the Congregational Union in session in this city; that we extend to them and the Church they represent our Christian sympathy and highest brotherly regard, and

heartily wish them the greatest success in the important work engaging their thought and care.

It was moved by Rev. T. Campbell, seconded by Rev. J. E. Lanceley, and

Resolved,—That we desire to express our regret at the transfer of the Rev. J. Mahan, Dr. Galbraith and the Rev. F. Langford from the Conference. We desire to assure these brethren of our love for them, and to pray that in their new fields they may be equally successful, and that we may all meet in the by-and-bye. Carried.

Conference also adopted resolutions :

1. Expressing appreciation of the work of the several Connexional officers, the Colleges, the Deaconess Home and the Woman's Missionary Society.
2. Approving of the purpose and plans of the Barbara Heck Memorial Association.
3. Thanking the ex-President and ex-Secretary of the Conference, the Trustees, Pastor and Choirmaster of Broadway Tabernacle, the Methodist people of Toronto for the hospitality extended to members of Conference, and the Press.
4. Thanking Rev. S. D. Chown, D.D., for the Ordination sermon, and Rev. Dr. Stone for his services in securing the sum required from Conference for the Broadway Tabernacle debt.
5. Reappointing Rev. L. W. Hill, B.A., Conference Statistician.

PASTORAL ADDRESS.

BELOVED BRETHREN AND SISTERS,—We respectfully and heartily offer our annual salutation to you “that have obtained like precious faith with us, through the righteousness of God and our Saviour Jesus Christ. Grace and peace be multiplied unto you through the knowledge of God and of Jesus Christ our Lord, according as His divine power hath given unto us all things that pertain unto life and godliness, through the knowledge of Him that hath called us to glory and virtue: whereby are given unto us exceeding great and precious promises; that by them ye might be partakers of the divine nature, having escaped the corruption that is in the world through lust.”

We are fully persuaded that you will delight to join with us in earnest and devout ascriptions of praise and thanksgiving to Almighty God for His abundant mercies that have crowned another year, not only in our fair and fertile Province of Ontario but throughout our broad Dominion and in the grand and extensive Empire of which we are proud to form a part, but also so largely throughout the whole world. Almost all the peoples of the earth have been graciously screened from the ravages of “the pestilence that walketh in darkness, and the destruction that wasteth at noonday.” Gaunt famine has, indeed, stalked over a limited portion of British India but to call out the profoundest Christian sympathy and the most liberal proffers of timely aid. There have, moreover, been breaches of the national peace, yet the sword has been unsheathed but to subjugate restless tribes fringing a contented people; or to display the heroic effort of the young Western Giant, himself born in the throes of a revolution, to wrest from the death-clutch of the tyrant of Europe a people so grossly oppressed for centuries, and to confer on them the rightful inheritance of a Christian civilization.

Singularly enough, this war, declared by the United States ostensibly in the interests of human freedom, and which has proved the auspicious occasion for a sympathy so proverbial as to constitute a virtual alliance between the Monarchical mother and her Republican daughter, was significantly coincident with the widely lamented death of the Right Honorable W. E. Gladstone, Britain's untitled Prince and most distinguished statesman, who had wrought such marvels during his long life to secure the unity and promote the brotherhood of the nations.

We have abundant reason to make grateful record of the spiritual mercies that have so richly fallen upon our own, among the grand confederation of Conferences of Canadian Methodism, as well as those that have watered the heritage of our honored sister communions. It must, indeed, be admitted that certain of the most vital elements and evidences

of a prosperous Church persistently refuse to be tabulated; nevertheless we feel obligated to specify the net increase in membership of over one thousand; the marked evidence of your continued liberality in the maintenance of our Circuit and Connexional Funds; in your holding fast "the form of sound words" and in coining them into holy deeds; and in your seeking to become scripturally enlarged and edified through the intelligent and faithful use of our public and peculiar ordinances, and by the patronage and perusal of our excellent denominational papers and publications. It must not be charged against us as denominational pride if we boast of the largest and best managed Publishing House in the Dominion of Canada, having quite an army of employees, running twenty-one printing presses and harvesting a very large net profit; that we own church and parsonage property valued at \$2,373,000 which is insured for over one million.

We cannot fail to congratulate our valued young people upon the efficiency and extension which have continued to characterize the organized endeavors of the Epworth League movement. If though youthful in experience or zeal they may have betrayed human infirmity, it should be the part of those matured and ripened to minify their failings and magnify their excellencies, praying that they, too, may "go on to perfection."

In these days, when the other churches are so largely imitating our example of recognizing woman's worth and work in the educational, missionary, temperance and philanthropic departments, and in view of the significant fact that one-third of the 140 laureated at the late commencement of Toronto University were young women, and especially as Victoria College had her full proportion of these, it would be unpardonable to omit the mention and commendation of the most worthy project of "The Barbara Heck Memorial Association." You will be pleased to know that the ladies of this society have already secured the promise of one-half of the \$7,000 they are to raise for the site and furnishing of the residence for women students to be erected through the bequest of the late H. A. Massey, Esq. May we not appeal to you to assist them to the other half?

Cognate to this is our scriptural enterprise, copied from apostolic usage, the Deaconess movement. This experiment of but a few years with us has already become an assured and a gratifying success. But the immediate future is big with a richer promise and a widened usefulness, because the princely munificence of the gentleman just named, being perpetuated by the trustees of his estate, has conferred the absolute gift of a valuable property on Jarvis Street, in this city, which, with some modification and enlargement, will make most suitable and commodious quarters for our Deaconess Home and Training School, at the latter of which missionary candidates and any person seeking better equipment for Christian work are admitted to the lectures.

You will look forward with prayerful interest to the General Conference, to commence in the Metropolitan Church early in September next. In addition to the consideration and enactment of measures of vast connexional importance, there will be the launching of that princely project known as "The Twentieth Century Million Dollar Fund." Our Conference, as is true of all the others that so far have met, unanimously and

most enthusiastically concurred in this sublime purpose. We are persuaded you will abound in the grace of liberality when the appeal is formally made, and jubilant in embracing the unique opportunity furnished by the conjunction of two centuries, and which so divinely appeals to our memory and our imagination, to our Christianity and our patriotism, you will bring all the tithes unto the Lord's storehouse, or, it may be, make restitution for the withholding of more than was meet, that so He may pour out a general blessing, such that there may not "be room enough to receive it."

You do not need our exhortation to perfect your organization and duly rally to the ballot box, to crystallize sentiment into votes favorable to Prohibition in the Dominion Plebiscite, happily freed by the Government from the handicap of taxation, or any other qualifying clause, suggested by the liquor vendors or their solicitors.

Suffer us to remind you, as we do ourselves, that "all flesh is as grass, and all the glory of man as the flower of grass." During the year our ranks have been thinned, as well as your own. Three of these honored and beloved ministers, Brothers Fawcett, Barrass and Shuttleworth, were almost the last representatives in our Conference of the second generation of Canadian Methodist preachers. Although our numbers are thus diminished, the field of active workers is yet overcrowded, and the Conference this session received but two young men as probationers, one of whom is an Indian, a most desirable acquisition for native agency.

Finally, pray for us, that we may faithfully and lovingly preach Christ, "warning every man and teaching every man in all wisdom, that we may present every man perfect in Christ Jesus." "Now the God of peace make you perfect in every good work to do his will, working in you that which is well pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory forever and ever. Amen."
