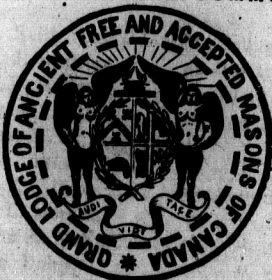

The Grand Lodge having been opened in ~~form~~ at 1.30 P. M., R. W. Bro. T. K. Ross stated that he had been deputed by M. Worshipful the Grand Master to perform the ceremony of laying the Corner Stone of the Methodist Episcopal Church about to be erected at Floating Bridge.

A procession was formed in accordance with the regulations as laid down in the Constitution of Grand Lodge, and proceeded to the site of the Church, when a halt was made, and the ranks opened out and faced inwards, when the Acting Grand Master, supported by the Grand Officers, passed to the corner of the building, where a platform had been erected for the Grand Officers and brethren.

The opening ceremony commenced with singing an appropriate hymn, after which the Rev. M. H. Howard, the Acting Grand Chaplain, offered up a suitable prayer, on the conclusion of which the Acting Grand Master delivered an address, explaining the presence of the Order, and the ancient nature of the ceremony.

The Acting Grand Secretary then read the following scroll:—

coin of the Dominion, and other matters, enclosed in a tin
box, were deposited in the cavity of the stone.

At this part of the ceremony the minister in charge of the
church presented the Acting Grand Master with a magnifi-

cent solid silver trowel of full size, and remarked that he presented him the trowel with a great deal of pleasure, on behalf of the Building Committee of the new church, and trusted that he would be long spared in his Masonic usefulness.

The Acting Grand Master expressed his sincere thanks for the beautiful gift, and remarked that he knew that nothing but a kindly and fraternal feeling dictated its presentation, and assured the Rev. gentleman that he would ever retain it as an honored memento of the day's proceedings.

The inscription on the trowel was as follows:—

The Acting Grand Master having spread the mortar, the stone was lowered, with three halts. When placed in its proper position, the Deputy Grand Master and Wardens tested the stone with the Square, Level, and Plumb, and the Grand Master pronounced it well made, and truly laid. Corn, wine and oil were poured upon it with symbolic explanation, and the Acting Grand Master entrusted to the architect and builder the tools with which to complete the building.

The Grand honors were given, and the procession re-formed, and marched to the extemporized lodge room.

The Grand Lodge was opened in ample form at 11.30 a. m., by M. W. Bro. James A. Henderson, Q. C., Grand Master, who stated that he had been requested by the Master and Brethren of Harmony Lodge, No. 870, to lay the corner stone of a building to be used as a Masonic Hall, and for the Township Hall for the United Townships of Bastard and Burgess South.

A procession in accordance with the regulations as laid down in the Book of Constitution was formed and proceeded to the site of the intended building, where a halt was made and the ranks opened out and faced inwards, when the Grand Master, supported by the Grand Officers, passed to the corner of the building, where a platform had been erected for the Grand Officers.

The opening ceremony commenced with the R. W. Brother, the Rev. John Gallaher, the Grand Chaplain, offering up the following prayer:—

Great Architect of the Universe! Maker and Ruler of all worlds! Deign from Thy Celestial Temple, from realms of light and glory, to help us in all the purposes of our present assembly.

We humbly invoke Thee to give us, at this and all times, wisdom in our doing, strength of mind in all our difficulties, and the beauty of harmony in all our communications.

Permit us, O Thou Author of Life and Light! great source of love and happiness, to erect this building, designed in wisdom, raised in strength, and finished in beauty.

May we all be characterized by Faith in God, Hope unfailing, and Charity towards all.

This Corner-Stone of the Town Hall

For the Townships of Bastard and Burgess, in connection with the Masonic Hall, was laid by the M. W. Brother James A. Henderson, Q. C., D. C. L., Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M. of Canada, assisted by the Grand Officers and a large concourse of Brethren, with the accustomed ceremonies and usages of the Order,

Which may T. G. A. O. T. U. ever protect and bless.

The scroll, with copies of the leading newspapers and several coins, were deposited in the stone. V.W. Bro. Sinclair, the Master of Harmony Lodge, then addressed the Grand Master and presented him with an elegant silver trowel. In receiving the trowel the Grand Master said he received the gift with pleasure, and as the passing of the Trowel was first held among Freemasons and was continued to be considered among operative Masons as an emblem of fraternal feeling, in that spirit he accepted the present, and should retain it as a pleasing memento of the work so happily begun.

The necessary mortar being laid, the Grand Master spread it with the silver trowel, and said: "I spread this cement as an emblem of that cement of peace and good will, which I trust will ever prevail in the edifice about to be erected; may the work of the Brethren be prudent, and tend to the advancement of our Order, and the well-being of each individual Brother, and may the deliberations and actions of the municipal authorities tend to promote the prosperity of the inhabitants of these townships.

The upper stone being properly placed, the acting Grand Junior and Senior Wardens, and the acting Deputy Grand Master, handed to the M. W. the Grand Master, the plumb-rule, level and square respectively, which he applied to the stone, and finding it properly laid, struck the stone three

times and said : " Well made, truly laid, true and trusty ;" may this undertaking be conducted and completed according to the Grand Plan in peace, harmony and Brotherly love.

Response,—“ So mote it be.”

As they were handed to him, he poured on the stone the customary libations, saying : “ I strew corn as an emblem of plenty ; I pour wine on it as an emblem of cheerfulness, and I anoint it with oil as an emblem of comfort and consolation. May corn, wine, and oil, and all the necessaries of life abound among men, and may the blessing of the Supreme Architect of the Universe be upon this edifice and all connected with it.”

Response,—So mote it be.

The plans having been handed to the Grand Master, after examining them, he presented them to the Architect, saying: “ The foundation stone of this building being now laid, I present to you the implements applied to it, also the plans, in full confidence that, as a skilful and faithful workman, you will use them in such a manner that the building may rise in order and harmony, being perfected in beauty and strength.”

The Grand Honors having been given, the Grand Master re-ascended the platform and spoke as follows :

MEN AND BRETHREN HERE ASSEMBLED :

At the request of the Brethren of Harmony Lodge, No. 370, on the Registry of the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Canada, I have laid with Masonic honors the corner stone of a building, the upper part of which is intended for a Masonic Hall and the lower part to be used for the Township Hall and the offices connected therewith. the plans submitted to me, will be a handsome and suitable one. It is an undertaking of which the inhabitants of this village and the township have every reason to be proud. I accept it as an evidence of their earnest desire to advance the growing interests of this place. That the Freemasons in this locality, and the corporation of the townships of Bastard and Burgess South have agreed to unite in such a laudable enterprise, I hail with pleasure, as a mark that our Brethren and the local authorities can work together, and as showing that we as Free and Accepted Masons, are allowed perfect freedom in our works of labor and charity. Such is the glorious liberty which we all enjoy under the benign sway of our Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, God bless her. It is an ancient Masonic custom, well worthy of observance on occasions like the present, that some brief remarks should be made upon our Order.

Freemasonry teaches four great and essential duties. The first is our duty towards God, to reverence His holy name, to implore His aid in all our laudable undertakings, to trust Him for protection, to esteem Him as the chief good, and to bow submissively to His will, and so, by imprinting on our minds and enforcing on the every day actions of men the first principles of religion, it may humbly strive to be accounted "her lowly handmaid." The second is our duty to our neighbor. We are taught to admonish and reprove him, to protect and defend him in his property, person and character, to aid if possible in his reformation from error, to encourage his feeble energies, and to rebuke his presumptuous follies with the kindness and courtesy of a brother, and ever to do unto him, in the spirit of the Golden Rule, as we would have him do unto us. Third, our duty to ourselves. We are enjoined to avoid all irregularities of intemperance and excess that may impair the mind or body, to use the talents given to our charge to the best of our energies, and, ever faithful to the trusts committed to us, to lead a just and upright life, full of honor and truthful-

ness. Fourth, our duty to our country. We are to be quiet and peaceable citizens, true to our Government and just to our country, not to countenance any act which may have a tendency to subvert the general good order of society, but pay due observance to the laws of the country in which we reside, and never forget the allegiance due to the Sovereign of our native land. Our Order has had its depressions, its ebbs and flows, at one time arising from want of proper zeal among its members, and at another time from the persecutions of crowned heads, of political, and I regret to say, of religious authorities, who understood not the noble principles on which Freemasonry is founded. But from its reverses it has arisen with renewed vigor. So long as the bulwarks of our Order are built upon the actions of the Brethren, no other aids or defence are needed to resist the attacks of enemies, composed mainly of those who have failed to gain admission to our ranks, and of those who are jealous of its well-doing. We do not set ourselves up to be better than other men because we are Masons. We are frail as well as others. We can only modify, not regenerate. All institutions, civil and religious, are liable to the same affliction, and our Order must not be condemned for sharing a similar fate. I am not here as the apologist of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons. Freemasonry has never needed an apologist. It has never appealed to public opinion for support. It ever guards its portals with vigilance, and none can enter who are not professedly earnest seekers after the light it dispenses. That it has a place in the public estimation is more than a tacit recognition of its existence, and its influence is evident this day from the very large assemblage of persons from the neighboring towns and adjoining townships who have met here to-day to witness the ceremony and assist with their approbation. Let the blameless conduct of our members, the many good and kind acts unostentatiously performed by the Brethren, ever continue to mark our progress and win the applause of the world at large.

The Ven. Archdeacon Ellwood then addressed the assemblage, giving a history of the church in Goderich during the 35 years he had been connected with it. He recited the difficulties his predecessor had to contend with, and stated that even he (the Archdeacon) had some obstacles to overcome. His congregation had sustained him manfully in all his troubles. He also mentioned the losses sustained by fire at different times, culminating in the recent one, which had determined them in putting up this new structure of which they had met to-day to lay the corner stone.

M. W. Bro. Kerr then delivered a historical and an eloquent address on Masonry; showing that in all ages and in all countries it invariably goes, hand in hand, with religion and morality.

Goderich, was laid by M. W. Bro. J. K. Kerr, Q. C., Past Grand Master of Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M. of Canada, assisted by the Grand Lodge Officers and a large concourse of Brethren, with the usual ceremonies and usages of the Order—

The scroll and copies of various newspapers, and current coins of the realm were then deposited in the stone.

The Ven. Arch Deacon Ellwood, presented M. W. Brother Kerr with a silver trowel of beautiful workmanship, suitably engraved.

The stone was then lowered with the usual ceremonies, and the plans were examined and returned to the architect.

cation of the Grand Lodge be characterized with that earnestness of spirit, that good will, and that fraternal courtesy which have ever marked our meetings. How much ought we to appreciate the inestimable privilege which we enjoy of being able to meet in a land of civil and religious freedom in open day, none daring to molest or make us afraid, and without the fear of any human power. The day has happily passed, never to return, when the highest hills and lowest dales witnessed, and indeed were necessary for, the celebration of our Mystic Rites. This freedom, the growth of years, has arisen from our Order being characterized by a stability unknown to political governments; its foundations rest upon an acknowledgment of the Supreme Being as the ruler and governor of the world, and its practice of Charity, that inestimable gift from God to man, commends it to the esteem of society at large, and secures to it that permanency as an institution of human origin, which has attracted the wonder and respect of succeeding generations.

I congratulate you on our holding this Communication at Guelph, a city whose growth and prosperity have earned for it a reputation extending throughout the Dominion. When this Grand Lodge was formed, a quarter of a century ago, Guelph was only a small town, and barely entitled to that designation. Now it is a city having over 10,000 inhabitants. It has nearly kept pace with the surprising and progressive increase of this Grand Body, which on its formation, in the year 1855, had only thirty-three Lodges under its jurisdiction, but now bears on its roll three hundred and forty, working with that earnest good will and fraternal feeling which should ever distinguish our Order. It is with commendable pride I mention that occupying prominent positions among those citizens of Guelph whose exertions have contributed to and advanced the prosperity of this city, and foremost among those who have extended the helping hand, irrespective of religion, politics and nationality, are many of

our Brethren—the Freemasons of Guelph. On this our first visit let us wish them “a long continuance in well doing.”

My first official acts were signing the Charters for the following Lodges, which were authorized at the last Communication of Grand Lodge:—

Harmony Lodge, No. 370, at Delta, County of Leeds.

Prince of Wales Lodge, No. 371, at Ottawa, County of Carleton.

Palmer Lodge, No. 372, at Victoria, County of Welland.

Copstone Lodge, No. 373, at Welland, County of Welland.

Keene Lodge, No. 374, at Keene, County of Peterborough.

Lorne Lodge, No. 375, at Omemee, County of Victoria.

Unity Lodge, No. 376, at Huntsville, Muskoka District.

Lorne Lodge, No. 377, at Shelburne, County of Grey.

King Solomon Lodge, No. 378, at Petersville, County of Middlesex.

Middlesex Lodge, No. 379, at Bryanston, County of Middlesex.

Union Lodge, No. 380, at London, County of Middlesex.

Dispensations have been issued for the undermentioned Lodges, satisfactory evidence being first produced to me that a necessity existed for establishing Lodges in the respective localities, and that the several brethren selected to fill the responsible office of Master are competent in the work:—

McColl Lodge, West Lorne, County of Elgin.

Doric Lodge, Hamilton, County of Wentworth.

Henderson Lodge, West Winchester, County of Dundas.

Lansdown Lodge, Lansdown, County of Leeds.

The Dispensation issued for Kinistino Lodge, at Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, N. W. Territories, has been continued, pursuant to the recommendation of Grand Lodge, until this Communication.

Gratitude is due to Him who holds in His hand the destinies of empires, and yet notes the fall of a sparrow, for the blessings of health and strength conferred on us during the past Masonic year. Death has, however, visited us, and I have to record the demise of two worthy officers of this Grand Lodge, R. W. Bro. John Turquand, of Woodstock, Past Grand Junior Warden, and V. W. Bro. Chas. Sharpe, of Guelph, Past Grand Director of Ceremonies.

Nothing has transpired to interrupt our amicable relations with foreign Grand Lodges, and the interchange of each other's proceedings affords great pleasure, and is a source of interest and valuable information.

I have appointed the following brethren as our representatives near foreign Grand Lodges:—M. W. Bro. J. S. Morrow, as the Representative near the Grand Lodge of Indian Territory; Ill. Bro. Belisario Conrado, as the Representative near the Grand Orient of Uruguay, in the place of Ill. Bro. Laurentin Ximenes, deceased; and W. Bro. Donald McKay, as our Representative near the Grand Lodge of Oregon; our former Representative, R. W. Bro. Alex. Watt, having removed from the Jurisdiction of that Grand Lodge. I also re-

stored to M. W. Bro. the Hon. W. N. Kennedy, his Credentials as our Representative near the Grand Lodge of Manitoba.

A detailed statement of our finances will be laid before you. It shows that our monetary affairs are in a flourishing condition. A sum of \$2,594.48 has been added to our available cash balance over and above the amount existing at our last annual return. With \$55,400 placed in good securities, and \$7,094.95 standing to our credit in the bank, the members of the Grand Lodge may truly feel assured that while our charity is judiciously extended not only to Brethren within, but also to those beyond our Jurisdiction, our finances are economically and faithfully managed. In no boastful spirit, but with feelings of thankfulness, I am able to announce that during the past year no less a sum than \$10,986 has been expended by the Grand Lodge in relieving the necessities of the widow, the orphan, and the distressed Brother.

The widow's tear—the orphan's cry—
 All wants our ready hand supply
 As far as power is given;
 The naked clothed—the prisoner free—
 These are thy works sweet charity,
 Revealed to us from Heaven.

I desire to see our funds largely increased not for the mere sake of accumulation, but that our circle of Benevolence may be still more enlarged. With that view may we ever go on as we have so far continued, clothed with the mantle of charity and guided by prudence.

Within the Jurisdiction of this Grand Lodge the past year may truly be mentioned as one of peace, harmony and good will. Nothing of general importance has transpired to disturb or hinder the progress of our Order in numbers or influence. One matter only has arisen which compelled me

to take decisive action; but I trust that a satisfactory explanation will be made. A brother of St. John's Lodge, No. 68, Carleton Place, complained of an irregularity in reference to the ballot taken for the initiation of a candidate. Under instructions the D. D. G. M. proceeded to the Lodge, after notice to the Master, for the purpose of inquiry and investigation, when the authority of the Grand Lodge, as represented by the R. W. Brother, was set at defiance, and the candidate initiated. The D. D. G. M. suspended the brethren who had taken part in such proceedings, and he reported the occurrence to me. I confirmed the suspension, and at once directed the Grand Secretary to summon the brethren to appear before this Communication of the Grand Lodge, and answer the charges laid against them.

I attribute the general successful working of our Order in a very great measure to the many intelligent and able Masters elected to fill the important offices of District Deputy Grand Masters, who have been able to settle amicably questions which arise, without reference to higher authority, and also to the zeal and careful attention of Masters of Lodges who, as a rule, make themselves conversant with our Constitution and Proceedings.

In pursuance of the authority granted at the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge in 1877, I have, after taking care that the proper safeguards were observed, restored, on a petition expressing due contrition, Brother Joseph Iredale, who had been expelled from the Order on account of his having attached himself to that spurious organization of the past, the Grand Lodge of Ontario. A number of persons, who through ignorance or inadvertence had become members of that body, have been healed and affiliated under, and following out the regulations prescribed by my predecessors. I have every reason to believe that these brethren who have thus attained their present recognized position, having stood the test of the ballot, will prove good and worthy Masons.

A Brother died while under suspension for non-payment of dues. The Worshipful Master of his Lodge telegraphed me that before his death his arrears were offered, but the Lodge could not meet in time to restore him, under the circumstances, and at the request of the Worshipful Master, I granted a dispensation that the deceased Brother might be accorded a Masonic burial.

I felt compelled, in a case where a Brother had died while under suspension for non-payment of dues, to refuse a dispensation, there being no existing reasons to call forth the exercise of my prerogative, and I could not allow personal considerations to prevail.

On more than one occasion I have been called on to grant a dispensation to initiate a candidate out of the jurisdiction of the Lodge where he resides. I have in every case, in addition to the good reasons for asking the exercise of my powers being shown, required the consent of that Lodge. Our Constitution confirms the inherent right of every Lodge to initiate residents within its jurisdiction, but allows the Grand Master a dispensing power, and though I would not limit that high prerogative, yet I feel that power should not be exercised to the possible detriment of the Lodge without the opportunity being given of expressing their consent or reasonable dissent. In two instances I have refused to shorten the month's term which our Constitution requires as requisite to intervene between the conferring the degrees. While on the subject of dispensations, I feel bound to remark, that so long as Masons are required to look to the Constitution for their governance, the power of dispensation should be most carefully used. The paramount duty of the Grand Master is not only to enforce the ancient charges and regulations, the Constitutions, the statutes, rules, resolutions and ceremonies of the Grand Lodge, but to observe and obey them himself; and certainly the dispensing power which is claimed as the inherent prerogative of a Grand Master (I

mean beyond those cases where dispensation is expressly permitted in the Constitution), should be exercised, if indeed at all, with the utmost prudence and caution, and these safeguards should be extended to those cases of dispensation expressly provided for. How can a Grand Master enforce proceedings against a Brother for breach of Masonic Rule, when he himself, though shielded perhaps by the unwritten law of prerogative, dispenses with the law laid down by the assembled wisdom of his Brethren and fellows, and creates for temporary purposes another. Better, I believe, that a single case of inconvenience should be suffered than that a positive violation of the Constitution by the exercise of the unprovided for dispensing power be allowed. I say inconvenience, because from the judicious care evinced by the Grand Lodge in their written laws, a case of hardship can hardly ever occur to require the unwritten dispensing power of the Grand Master. While he only puts in use his constitutional powers and does not attempt the exercise of his unwritten prerogative in his government of the craft, their allegiance to him will never be strained or jeopardized.

Application was made to me for permission for certain Brethren to attend as Masons the funeral of a Brother who desired to be buried according to the Ritual of a non-Masonic Society, to which he belonged, I held that the Brethren should not appear as a Lodge, or clothed as Masons on funeral occasions, unless the burial rites were performed under the exclusive control of the Lodge, and according to the procedure laid down in the Book of Constitution, which only allows the addition of the funeral services of the church to which the deceased belonged. The rights and privileges of the church or the minister in performing the burial services are never to be interfered with, but are fully and freely conceded. The Order of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons, the oldest existing secret Society, is not obtrusive, and we never thrust ourselves before the public clothed in the

Badge of a Mason, unless when carrying out those duties prescribed by Ancient Custom, or by the Constitutions, and even in these cases, a Masonic Funeral being the sole exception, a dispensation is made, under severe penalties, a previous requisite. As between the Lodge and the Association to which the deceased may have belonged, if the Brethren are to appear at all as Masons, the Lodge must have sole and absolute charge. No association can share in the performance of our Masonic funeral rites. Due respect can ever be paid by the Craft to the memory of a Brother who desired to be buried according to the rites of other organizations, by attending as individuals, and as a rule none are more ready to honor the memory of the deceased than Free Masons. However much personal feelings may urge us, it is not wise or prudent to break what may be considered a universal rule. The Grand Lodge at its annual Communication in 1874 endorsed the views of the then Grand Master, who held it improper to allow other Societies to take part in the conduct of Masonic funerals.

I was asked to grant leave to initiate a candidate who had lost part of one of his feet, and who used mechanical appliances to enable him to walk, and was unable properly to dispense with them during initiation, also a person who from a diseased hip joint could not stand upright, having both feet on the ground. Though both persons were well qualified in every other respect, yet on account of these physical defects I felt they must be debarred the privilege of being initiated. I hold that unless a candidate be in a condition to receive, perform and communicate all parts of the ceremonies and duties of the Order, he is not eligible for the degrees. He must be capable of making himself known in the dark as well as in the light. Beyond the mention in the charges "that he be a perfect youth, having no maim or defect in his body that may render him incapable of learning the art, of serving his Master's Lord, and of being made a Brother," no provision is made in our Constitutions

as to physical qualifications. Hence, if any doubt exists reference must be had to the Grand Master for his decision. As it now stands, each succeeding Grand Master may have more liberal or stricter views than his predecessors, and so the Brethren are left in doubt. I think it would be advisable, would give greater satisfaction to the Brethren, and would certainly relieve the Grand Master from the semblance of acting with unnecessary strictness, if some rule relating to the subject, and to the Masonic processions before alluded to, were laid down by the Grand Lodge, and made part of the Constitution, so as to withdraw these questions from among the *dicta* of Grand Masters.

I found as a general rule that the halls of those Lodges which I visited were well fitted and arranged. Within the past few years great progress has been made in these respects. In some instances, and I refer particularly to the Prince Edward Lodge, No. 18, Picton, and to the Masónic Halls at St. Thomas and Chatham, the Brethren have adorned their Lodge rooms in a highly artistic manner, reflecting the greatest credit on their taste and zeal. I have remarked that those Lodges which give attention to the proper embellishment of their Halls, carefully guard the approaches by a close scrutiny in the selection of those who enter.

During the year the following Special Communications of Grand Lodge have been held, namely:—

1. At Galt, on the 30th December, 1879, when the new Hall of Alma Lodge, No. 72, and Galt Lodge, No. 257, was consecrated by R. W. Bro. W. D. Hepburn, D. D. G. M.
2. At Langton, on the 8th January, 1880, when the new Hall of Langton Lodge, No. 385, was consecrated by R. W. Bro. T. B. Bain, D.D.G.M.
3. At Bothwell, on the 21st, of January, 1880, when the

new Hall of Bothwell Lodge, No. 179, was consecrated by R. W. Bro. T. C. Macnabb, D. D. G. M.

4. At Jarvis, on the 5th of March, 1880, when the new Hall of King Solomon's Lodge, No. 329, was consecrated by R. W. Bro. John W. Coy, D. D. G. M.

5. At St. Thomas, on the 18th March, 1880, when the new Hall of St. Thomas Lodge, No. 44, and Elgin Lodge, No. 349, was consecrated by me.

6. At Floating Bridge, on the shore of the Bay of Quinte, on the 22nd June, 1880, when the corner stone of a Methodist Episcopal Church was laid by R. W. Bro. T. K. Ross, D. D. G. M.

7. At Goderich, on the 24th June, 1880, when the corner stone of St. George's Episcopal Church was laid by M. W. Bro. J. K. Kerr, P. G. M.

8. At Delta, on the 24th June, 1880, when the corner stone of the new hall of Harmony Lodge, No. 370, was laid by me.

9. At Consecon, on the 9th July, 1880, when the new Hall of Consecon Lodge, No. 50, was consecrated by V. W. Bro. Thos. Thornton.

In conclusion, Brethren, while performing the important duties which we are now about to consider, may concord and moderation mark our deliberations. Being diligent in the work, let our conscience be our guide, the highest good of the Order our aim. Let us unitedly, and with all sincerity, use these words of the inspired Psalmist, "Prosper thou the work of our hands upon us; oh! prosper thou our handy work," and the blessing of the Supreme Ruler of the Universe will follow and crown our efforts to advance the Ancient Fraternity and

Order, that so justly claims our affectionate and loyal devotion.

It was moved by R. W. Bro. John McLaren, seconded by R. W. Bro. E. Allworth, and

Resolved.—That the address of the M. W. the Grand Master be referred to the Board of General Purposes, to report thereon.

REPORTS OF THE DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND MASTERS.

It was moved by R. W. Bro. Otto Klotz, seconded by R. W. Bro. W. D. Hepburn, and

Resolved.—That the reports from the various District Deputy Grand Masters be received, considered as read, and referred to the Board of General Purposes.

ST. CLAIR DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M. of Canada.

MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BROTHEREN,—In accordance with the requirements of the Constitution of Grand Lodge, and in the discharge of the duties entrusted to me, I have the honor to submit my report for the last ten months of the condition of Freemasonry in St. Clair District. During that time I have visited all the Lodges (24) in my District, except Sydenham, No. 255, and Highgate, No. 336, and with few exceptions find them working satisfactorily. I regret to have to state that all the Masters neglect to read and preserve in the archives of their respective Lodges, as ordered, the annual reports of the communications of Grand Lodge, and in many instances I found it impossible to procure a copy of the proceedings when required for reference. I think it is highly desirable that the Masters not only read the Grand Lodge proceedings in their Lodges,

but that each member should make himself familiar with them, so as to be fully conversant, as all intelligent Masons should be, with the workings of the craft throughout this jurisdiction, and that one or more copies be preserved in the Lodge, so as to be accessible when required for reference.

I found a very general complaint that a large number of Brethren were in arrears for dues, and by this neglect of one of a Mason's most important duties, placed their Lodges in the unenviable position of being unable to meet current expenses. I would beg leave to suggest that the Brethren pay their dues at short stated periods, say quarterly or half-yearly, and I think they will find it easier to meet the smaller amounts than the larger ones, as they will have to do when dues are allowed to run for one or more years. I have no doubt but the prevailing depression in the various businesses, trades and callings throughout the country during the past few years has made it more difficult for Brethren to meet their various engagements, but with the present prospect of an abundant harvest, this in a great measure, I trust, will soon disappear, and that we may confidently look for a great improvement in this respect in the near future.

Most Worshipful Bro. Jas. A. Henderson, Q. C., Grand Master, accompanied by R. W. Bro. G. M. Wilkinson, paid an official visit to this District on the 19th March, 1880, and I caused a summons to be issued to all the Masters of the Lodges throughout the District, inviting them and their Brethren to meet him in the Masonic Hall, at the Town of Chatham, Ont., when the following Lodges were represented as under, viz :—Thistle Lodge, No. 84, W. Bro. George Middleditch, W.M., and a large number of the members ; St. George Lodge, No. 41, R. W. Bro. E. Allworth, W. M., P.D.D.G.M., W. Bro. Wm. Malott, P.M., and a large number of the Brethren ; Wellington Lodge, No. 46, W. Bro. James

Holmes, W.M., Wardens, Officers and Brethren; Great Western Lodge, No. 47, W. Bro. W. F. Miller, W. M., W. Bro. Thomas Burnie, P. M., W. Bro. Robert McNaught, P. M., and a large number of the Brethren; Victoria Lodge, No. 56, W. Bro. Wm. Taylor, P. M.; Morpeth Lodge, No. 111, W. Bro. Ridley, W. M., and a few of the Brethren; Bothwell Lodge, No. 179, W. Bro. H. F. Smith, W.M., W. Bro. Thos. Boon, P.M.; Tecumseh Lodge, No. 245, W. Bro. Robt. Ward, W. M.; Sydenham Lodge, No. 255, W. Bro. John French, W. M., and several of the Brethren; Parthenon Lodge, No. 267, W. Bro. J. B. Jackson, W. M., Wardens, Officers and Members; Kent Lodge, No. 274, W. Bro. Thos. L. Pardo, W. M., and several of the Brethren; Leamington Lodge, No. 290, V. W., Bro. E. R. Shepley, P. M., and several of the Brethren; Pnyx Lodge, No. 312, W. Bro. James Scott, P. M., and a large number of the Brethren. The first degree was exemplified by W. Bro. James Holmes, W. M., Wardens and Officers of Wellington Lodge, No. 46, and Third Degree by W. Bro. W. L. Tackaberry, P. M., Wardens and Officers of Parthenon Lodge, No. 267, and the work was well and correctly exemplified, W. Bro. James Holmes, a young W. M., having only been installed in the previous January. The M. W. the Grand Master addressed the Brethren at considerable length, and expressed his great pleasure in meeting with so many of the Brethren in this western part of his jurisdiction. After the work was concluded, and the Lodge duly closed, an adjournment was had to the Garner House, where the Brethren partook of refreshments, followed by a few speeches and songs, when the J.W. gave his toast, "Happy to meet, sorry to part, happy to meet again;" all present expressing the wish that we might have just such another instructive, interesting and pleasant re-union in this District next year.

By request of the M. W. the Grand Master, I had the honor to perform in his name, the ceremony of consecrating

the new Hall of Bothwell Lodge, No. 179, on the 21st of January, 1880, and I was gratified to be assisted in the beautiful ceremony by a large number of the Brethren. The members of Bothwell Lodge, No. 179, are to be congratulated in having provided themselves with such a commodious and convenient Lodge Room; and I am sure they will fully appreciate it after having for so many years met in such a small and inconvenient room as they had.

There have been, I am pleased to say, but few deaths in the District during the past ten months, and the deceased Brethren were interred with the usual Masonic ceremonies.

There has been no complaint referred to me with the exception of a case of Jurisdiction between Burns Lodge, No. 153 and Forest Lodge, No. 263, and this occurred through Forest Lodge overlooking the change in Article 3, of proposing members in the Book of Constitution.

A bogus Lodge, called Temple Lodge, started more than a year ago, under the now defunct so-called Grand Lodge of Ontario, is now running a lone hand, and I would caution the Brethren to be careful when strangers visit, to be sure that they do not hail from this spurious Lodge, as I have heard it stated that they intend to try and get into some of our Lodges in the District.

When R. W. Bro. James Gowans was D. D. G. M., in 1872-3, he procured a Regalia for the District, as recommended by Grand Lodge in 1865, page 57 of the Grand Lodge proceedings; 1866, page 172; 1869, page 109; and as many of the Lodges have not yet paid their share, I trust they will do so at once, and relieve me from the amount I advanced to prevent costs being added through process of law against R. W. Bro. Gowans to recover the amount.

The usual dispensations for wearing Masonic regalia have been granted to the Brethren on proper occasions.

I cannot close this report without expressing my gratitude and sincere thanks to the Officers and Brethren of the District, for the univeral kindness, attention and fraternal welcome, with which I was received when paying my official visits; and pray that it may please the G.A.O.T.U. long to continue the harmony that prevails among the Brethren of St. Clair District.

LONDON DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of A F. & A.M. of Canada.

MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN,—I beg to submit the following report on the condition of Freemasonry in the London District, for the year 1879-80.

Owing to severe illness in my family, and my term of office being shortened on account of Grand Lodge meeting in July this year instead of September, I have not been able to visit all the Lodges in my District, still I have visited a large number of them, and I trust the Brethren of those Lodges which I have not been able to visit, will not attribute my seeming neglect to any want of zeal in the cause of Freemasonry, or a desire to evade an important duty.

During my official visits, I made it a rule to see some one of the Degrees exemplified, and in most instances the work was such as would satisfy the most fastidious, and was strictly in accordance with the requirements of Grand Lodge.

At the request of the M. W. the Grand Master, I constituted, dedicated and consecrated, King Solomon's Lodge, No. 878, Petersville; Union Lodge, No. 880, London, and the Middlesex Lodge, No. 879, Bryanston. I also consecrated the fine new Lodge Room of St. John's, No. 81, Mount Brydges; it is a great credit to the Brethren who erected the building.

In King Solomon's Lodge, No. 878, and Union Lodge, No. 880, I administered the healing-obligation to a large number of members who had been initiated by the organization calling itself the Grand Lodge of Ontario. I have given these two Lodges a great deal of my attention and supervision, and feel confident the Grand Lodge will never regret accepting these members of the so-called Grand Lodge of Ontario, which have been admitted; they take a great interest in Freemasonry, attend well, and I feel confident in saying they will make good, and loyal members of the Grand Lodge of Canada.

I held two general Lodges of Instruction during my term of office; one in Strathroy on the third of May, the other in St. Thomas on the seventh of June. I chose these places because they were the centres of the Eastern and Western portions of the District; I also thought the attendance would be better; in this I was not disappointed; in both cases the large Lodge-rooms were perfectly crowded. In Strathroy the work was exemplified by W. Bro. Wm. James Smyth, of Kilwinning Lodge, No. 64, and W. Bros. Payne and Grant, of Beaver Lodge, No. 88. In St. Thomas, by W. Bros. Grant, of Beaver Lodge, No. 88, and Jarvis, of St. Paul's Lodge, No. 107, assisted by W. Bros. Payne, of St. David's Lodge, No. 802, Ellis, of St. George's Lodge, No. 42, and Bell, of Elgin Lodge, No. 849. In both places the work was done in a manner that elicited the heartiest praise from the Brethren present, and afforded me the greatest pleasure to think the Lodges of Instruction were a great success.

I have granted several Dispensations for attending Divine service and for festivals, the funds for which have been forwarded to Grand Secretary.

I have been asked to recommend that Dispensations be granted to several new Lodges, but in each case I advised the Brethren to act with caution, as it was easy to start a Lodge, but in many cases a difficult matter to carry one on successfully. I am strongly of the opinion that there are a sufficient number of Lodges in the London District for a long time to come, and cannot recommend the granting of any more Dispensations, for where Lodges are too numerous there is a certain amount of rivalry and a great tendency to accept material that should never be admitted into a Masonic Lodge.

It gives me pleasure to state that the Lodges in the City of London have for some time been in possession of a large burial plot, not only for the purpose of interring Brethren, members of the Lodges in the city, but also "sojourning Brethren" who are summoned to the Grand Lodge above, while in a strange land.

I have been called upon to settle very few disputes during my term of office, and those that were submitted to me were of so trifling a nature as to be easily adjusted.

Very few deaths have been reported to me. The only ones that I have had any official notice of were W. Bro. J. C. Bennett, of St. George's Lodge, No. 42; W. Bro. John W. Giles, of Kilwinning Lodge, No. 64; Bro John W. Kelly, of St. John's Lodge, No. 20; and Bro. Lewis Hessel, of St. John's Lodge, No. 209a.

As your representative, I have been received with the greatest respect and cordiality, and I cannot conclude this

report without thanking the Brethren for their uniform kindness and courtesy towards me, not only on occasions of official visits but at all other times, and I shall always look back with pleasure to the time when I occupied the position of D. D. G. M. of the London District.

W. the Grand Master, (lately being members of the so-called Grand Lodge of Ontario.) The

M. of the Lodge of Strict Observance, No. 27, being the first Master, and, in reporting the success of this Lodge, I take this opportunity of tendering my thanks to W. Bro. Gunn for the very successful manner in which he carried out this special work entrusted to him.

During my official year, I have issued a number of Dispensations to attend Divine Service, and one for the purpose of holding a concert, and in each case a return has been made to the Grand Secretary.

NIAGARA DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Brethren of the Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M. of Canada.

MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN,—In accordance with the provisions of the Constitution, I have the honor to submit the following report:—

The fact of Grand Lodge holding its Annual Communication some two months earlier this year than last, has prevented my fulfilling as thoroughly as I would have desired the important duties devolving upon me as District Deputy Grand Master of the Niagara District.

I have, however, had the pleasure of visiting each of the twenty-four Lodges, of which the Niagara District is com-

posed, at least once, and several of them twice, and have been received in every instance with the greatest kindness and courtesy, and with that honor befitting a representative of your august body.

I have found with very few exceptions that the work, (according to the Ritual of Grand Lodge,) is ably and effectually performed, and in the very few cases where I could distinguish deviations from the Ritual work, I have at once hastened to correct, both by example and advice, and I am satisfied that at the present time, this District will compare favorably with any other under your jurisdiction, for both correctness and quality of work done.

I find that in many cases the country Lodges complain very much of a lack of attention on the part of some of my predecessors, which, although in all probability was unavoidable on their part, goes far to encourage a feeling of dissatisfaction and distrust, and creates an apathy that should have no existence in our midst, and I hope sincerely that this will be thoroughly atoned for by my successors.

Had the full year, instead of ten months, been the extent of my official term, I should have been able to have carried into effect a wish that I earnestly entertained at its commencement, viz: that of holding a District Lodge of Instruction in this city, which I am satisfied would have been largely attended, and would have fully availed in amply correcting the work of the very few Lodges in which I discovered any deviation from Grand Lodge ritual.

I have in each and every Lodge in this District addressed the Brethren on the importance of their duties to Grand Lodge, both with regard to the prompt payment of her demands upon them, and also with regard to their more thor-

ough and complete representation at her Annual Communication, and that in the former case my efforts have been successful, I have no doubt, and am certain that an examination of the books of the Grand Secretary and Treasurer will convince any one that the arrearage to Grand Lodge, which unfortunately existed at our last meeting, has been nearly, if not entirely, paid up, and, I trust, will not again accumulate.

As far as representation is concerned, I feel equally sure that at the coming Communication of Grand Lodge, (although not as convenient, as far as locality is concerned, as might be) there will be a much larger attendance than last year at Kingston, and, I trust, as large as any Communication has witnessed.

I have had the usual amount of correspondence that falls to the lot of a District Deputy, to attend to, which, I must say, (although large, and the duty onerous) has been a pleasure to me, and has been discharged to the best of my ability.

No questions of Jurisprudence of any importance have arisen within the District; in fact, there is altogether too much unanimity and good-feeling existing among our Lodges to allow of any bickering, and the questions laid before me for decision have been more of a technical nature than otherwise, and have been very easy to decide.

I am happy to inform Grand Lodge that the Brethren "laid to rest" during the year have been very few in the Niagara District, for which we are deeply grateful. One, however, I cannot allow to pass without notice. It is the death of W. Bro. A. S. St. John, of St. George's Lodge, No. 15, one of the first Masters of that Lodge, and who was called to the "Grand Lodge above," full of years and honors.

on 4th April, 5880. W. Bro. St. John was 82 years of age, and had been a member of the craft for over 60 years, respected by all who knew him, equally well as a man and a Mason. Would that our Order had many more like him!

I have during the year granted several Dispensations for the Brethren to appear in regalia, for the purpose of social gatherings, and also for attending Divine Service, and have been very careful to investigate the nature of the request before doing so.

By the gracious permission of the M. W. the Grand Master, I had the honor of representing him on two occasions, viz: at Welland, on the 16th October, 1879, when I consecrated, dedicated and constituted Copestone Lodge, No. 378, and installed its officers, and at Jarvis on the 5th March, 1880, on which occasion I performed a similar ceremony, at the request of King Solomon's Lodge, No. 329. On both of these occasions I had the honor of opening Special Communications of Grand Lodge, in form, and endeavored to carry out, as far as in my power, the beautiful and impressive ceremonies of our Order.

I will not take up the time of Grand Lodge by a description of the various Lodges of the District, but can only guarantee that my Secretary will forward my diary (wherein will be found a thorough minute of each and every visit) at any time to Grand Lodge for its inspection, should it be advisable or necessary to do so.

The Order in this District is now in a more flourishing condition than for years past; arrearages of dues have been paid up, there is a large influx of new and worthy men, and a more zealous feeling is now encouraging the older Brethren to redouble their exertions and endeavor to prove themselves

worthy members of our "Ancient and Honorable" fraternity.

I cannot conclude this report without expressing my thanks to the M. W. the Grand Master, and the R. W. the Grand Secretary, for their uniform kindness and promptness in answering my communications, and my gratitude to two of the Brethren of this District, for the very great assistance they have rendered me in the discharge of my official duties; the first, M. W. Past Grand Master Seymour, for his valuable advice and assistance, which was always cheerfully given; the second, my worthy Secretary, Bro. Leonard R. Smith, of Temple Lodge, No. 296, who was my companion throughout my official tour, and to whom I am under a deep debt of gratitude for his kind and untiring efforts in the cause of Masonry in this District.

In conclusion, I beg to return my thanks to the Brethren of the Niagara District for the uniform kindness and courtesy with which I have ever been treated on each and all of my official visits, which have been to me like "Oases" in the desert of a life of business reaction, and I trust that this same kindness will ever be extended to my successors in office.

TORONTO DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M. of Canada.

MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN,—In accordance with

the requirements of the Constitution, I desire to submit the following report upon the condition of Freemasonry in this District.

There are at present thirty-five Lodges in this District; thirty-four warranted Lodges and one under Dispensation.

I exceedingly regret having been unable to visit all the Lodges under my charge during this Masonic year, but am happy to say, from sure information had, that with perhaps one or two exceptions, they are all in a healthy condition, Masonically as well as financially.

I have during the year granted Dispensations to three Lodges to appear in Masonic Regalia for social purposes. They have been duly reported to the Grand Secretary.

At my recommendation, a Dispensation has been granted to Alpha Lodge, Parkdale, and I am satisfied that from the appearance of the books and the ability of the brethren who compose the officers, that it will be one of our best Lodges in the District. I have much pleasure in recommending that a Warrant be granted to said Lodge.

I have also installed the officers of a number of the Lodges in this District, and I feel satisfied that with the ability of the officers, and careful rendering of all the working of these Lodges, that the prestige of the Craft will not be impaired by any of the said Brethren.

Several questions have been referred to me for my opinion and ruling. I am glad to know that the decisions have been satisfactory.

The Brethren of Brock Lodge, Cannington, have express-

ed a wish that that Lodge should be placed under the jurisdiction of the Ontario District, and as it would be more convenient for that D. D. G. M. to have charge of said Lodge, I respectfully recommend that such change be made to meet the wishes of the Brethren in Cannington.

In reference to the Masonic charges made by Bro. Matthew McNair, against the W. M. of Richmond Hill Lodge, I beg to report that I have been unable to obtain any of the papers which were produced at the time of trial, and as the W. M. claims that he could not get justice unless these papers were forthcoming, I have not done anything in the matter. I may mention that this affair appears to have been a "legacy" left from one D. D. G. M. to another, for a number of years past, and I accordingly transmit it to my successor, hoping that the papers may be forthcoming, and he may arrive at a happy and satisfactory conclusion in the matter.

In the month of January, I received application from four members of a Lodge called "Good Intent," claiming to be under the so-called Grand Lodge of Ontario, requesting to have their petition transmitted to the M. W. the Grand Master, for a Dispensation for the purpose of healing them. I informed them that I should require the recommendation of one of the city Lodges to such petition; in accordance with which request they received the recommendation of King Solomon's Lodge, No. 22, Toronto.

Also another application from one of the members of a Lodge called Mizpah, and claiming to be under the same jurisdiction, to which is attached the recommendation of Alpha Lodge, U. D.

At the earnest request of some of the members of King Solomon's Lodge, No. 22, I withheld forwarding these docu-

ments to the M. W. the Grand Master, having been informed that an application had been received from the so-called body collectively. I now lay the papers before this W. body. Had I been satisfied that this manner of dealing with the difficulty would eventuate in finally healing the matter, and in the face of the fact of our being informed at the session of Grand Lodge, held in Kingston, that the difficulty had been settled, at the same time to prevent any confusion and dissatisfaction in the District, I withheld the papers until this session of Grand Lodge, at the request of a number of the Brethren in the city of Toronto.

On June 14th, I received an appeal from Bro. J. Fletcher Cross, against the action of Orient Lodge, No. 339, G.R.C., whereby that Lodge had suspended and recommended to Grand Lodge for expulsion, the same Brother. I have to report that I duly heard the appeal, examined the evidence, and the books of the Lodge, and concluded to sustain the action of said Lodge in the matter.

I place the papers before the Board for their recommendation.

In concluding my report, I desire to extend to the Brethren in this District my sincere thanks for the many acts of kindness and good wishes which I have received at their hands, and I feel that in honoring me they have in reality been honoring the M. W. Grand Master, whose humble representative I am, and I trust they will extend to my successor the same kindly feelings of sympathy and Masonic intercourse which they have so fraternally extended towards me.

I regret that my business engagements have prevented me from visiting every Lodge in the District, but I have visited all those where I thought my services were required.

In February last, I visited all the Lodges in the District of Muskoka and Parry Sound, and in each Lodge I had the W. M. and officers exemplify the work in the three degrees, and I am pleased to report that the work was well and satisfactorily done.

A Dispensation has been granted by the M. W. the Grand Master for a new Lodge, to be held at Beeton, to be called Spry Lodge; I am not aware whether it has been opened yet or not. I intrusted the Dispensation to R. W. Bro. Spry, who promised to see the Lodge opened in proper form.

I regret to report that there are two Lodges in the District which are not in a prosperous condition, viz: Kerr Lodge, No. 280, at Belle Ewart, and Caledonian Lodge, No. 249, Angus. In the case of Kerr Lodge, Belle Ewart has ceased to be a Village, in consequence of the mills having been burnt down, and the railway track removed. There is only one member of the Lodge left in the place. The Brethren built a new Masonic Hall there a few years ago, and I regret to report that several of the Brethren are involved financially with the building which is now rendered valueless. Caledonian Lodge is almost in as bad a position, there are not enough members left in the village to make a quorum—in

both cases I have suggested the removal of the Lodges to some more prosperous Villages within the District.

It gives me great pleasure to report that I have had no Masonic complaints laid before me during the year, and with the exceptions above mentioned, the whole of the Lodges in the District are working well and harmoniously.

In conclusion, I desire to express my thanks to the Brethren of the District for the kindness and courtesy extended to me on every occasion.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M. of Canada.

MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN,—I have the honor to submit my report as to the condition of Masonry in this District for the ten months between the last meeting of Grand Lodge and that now ensuing.

I beg to report that the condition of Masonry in this District is sound, and while no very extensive addition has been made to its members, the material received into the building has been carefully selected.

There are 81 Warranted Lodges in this District, including Brook Lodge, No. 854, Cannington, by misunderstanding of the wishes of that Lodge, attached last September to the

Toronto District. With the kind concurrence of R. W. Bro. Sargant, D. D. G. M. Toronto District, I assumed the supervision of this Lodge.

Since last September I have paid official visits to the following Lodges:—

I am happy to say of these eleven, I have heard either by information from members or other communications, that they are in a fairly prosperous condition.

DISPENSATIONS.

I have had pleasure in granting the following Dispensations to enable the Brethren to appear in Masonic clothing:

1. King Hiram, Lindsay, to attend a charitable concert.
2. Lorne Lodge, Omeme, to attend a concert reading and entertainment.
3. Brock Lodge, Cannington, concert and ball.
4. Orono Lodge, Orono, to hear an address from M. W. P. G. M. Kerr, and to attend a supper.
5. Brock Lodge, Cannington, to attend Divine Service on St. John's Day.

I had the pleasure of attending the gathering of the Brethren at Omeme, and also one given by Faithful Brethren, Lindsay, (not in Masonic clothing) which were both successful and pleasant affairs.

I also met many of the Cobourg and Peterboro' Brethren at a Masonic pic-nic on Rice Lake, which was a most enjoyable re-union of many old friends and new.

There have been no applications for Dispensations for new Lodges in this District for the last ten months, a fact not

much to be regretted, as the number at present instituted is large.

There have been no suspensions for un-Masonic conduct, and but few reported to me for non-payment of dues.

JURISPRUDENCE.

But few questions have arisen under this head.

I was asked to sanction the holding of Brougham Lodge, in a private house. Having examined the accommodations offered, I saw no reason against it, but referred the matter to the Grand Master for his opinion. He in return, has referred it to Grand Lodge.

I ruled that the W. M. is the sole judge of the "emergency" sufficient to alter the method of proposing candidates. Should he have any doubt, he should refer the matter to the D. D. G. M. for his opinion.

One or two enquiries as to how far physical infirmities will go to disqualify a candidate. I gave my opinion that if the candidate be able to communicate and receive the secrets of the three degrees by night as well as by day, he is not disqualified. The Grand Master agrees with this holding.

In one case I annulled a ballot which had taken place at an "emergent" instead of a "regular" meeting.

I also ruled that I had no power to grant a Dispensation for the election of officers on any other day than that fixed in the By-law. This is for the Grand Master's consideration.

I regretted to find that in one instance, contrary to ex-

press opinions and authority, a deceased Brother was buried with both Masonic and Oddfellows honors.

I was asked "Is a brother who is under a charge eligible to vote when the ballot is passed for a candidate?" I answered certainly yes; and pointed out that if the contrary were the case, all that would be necessary to silence a Brother, supposed to be unfavorable to a candidate, would be to bring charges against him whether well founded or not.

I disapproved the allowance of the use of a Masonic Hall for a ball not given under the auspices of the Lodge.

In one case the W. M. informed me that after the ballot had been declared in favor of the candidate, but before initiation, charges were made against him, which, if true, would render him an improper person to become a Mason. I directed him to suspend initiation until these charges were properly investigated, and, if proved, *not* to initiate.

I gave an opinion that a member paying up his dues, and asking for his dimit, was entitled thereto, and that the Lodge had nothing to do with his motives, as expressed in his application, unless they amounted to a specific charge.

SPURIOUS MASONRY.

A couple of impostors, claiming to represent the defunct and spurious "Grand Lodge of Ontario," made their appearance in my district this summer. Thanks to the prompt action of R. W. Bro. J. B. Trayes, the swindlers did not make much headway. I was able to second his efforts by procuring the insertion of his remarks in the Port Hope *Times* in the local press of this county.

I regret to find that several Brethren have been deprived

of their grant from the Fund of Benevolence, owing to the neglect of the W. M. or Secretary to forward the printed forms of application in due time. It should be remembered that this is required in *all* cases, whether renewals or first applications.

Financially, I found the Lodges in a prosperous condition and free from debt, properly furnished, and insurance kept up. The minutes and books are correctly kept.

I regret to find in many Lodges a neglect to enforce the By-law as to suspension for non-payment of dues. This is a mistaken lenity, and has a greater tendency to increase the ranks of the "unaffiliated." A brother who has been suspended for non-payment of accumulated dues amounting to \$20 or \$30, is far less likely to resume active relations with the Order than one who owes but \$4 or \$5. It is, in a sense, unjust to all parties to allow a too mistaken leniency to prevail, and the private Lodge to continue paying Grand Lodge dues for "drones in the hive."

The officers in general are in possession of the authorized work. I may mention with special commendation the work of the third degree, as exemplified at Port Hope and Newcastle.

While visiting at Port Hope I was asked to preside at a Masonic trial, which I did. I have pleasure in stating that the accused was acquitted almost unanimously. On this occasion no less than six Past Masters of the Lodge were present. The third degree was impressively conferred by W. Bro. Lambert for the first, and also for the last time, death having called him to the Grand Lodge above within a few weeks thereafter.

AT REST.

I have received notifications of the death of Bros. James

Oliver and C. E. German, of Verulam Lodge, Bobcaygeon; Chas. E. Fields, of Lebanon Lodge, Oshawa; Henry Stickler, of St. John's, Cobourg, and W. Bro. Lambert, of Port Hope. All, with the exception of the latter, were buried with Masonic honors.

During my term of office, I have received and examined 288 summonses, and 102 letters, and have written and sent 127 letters and telegrams.

I have held no Lodges of instruction. It was my intention to have called one for Lindsay, but a difference between the Brethren of the two Lodges in Lindsay, in my mind rendered it inexpedient to do so until the same was amicably settled. The dispute was, on its surface, one of a financial character, and both Lodges have submitted the same to me and agreed to abide by my decision. I adjudicated thereon, and found that although there was a legal debt due from King Hiram Lodge to Faithful Brethren Lodge, the former had received no value, and that it was inequitable and against the interests of Masonry to enforce its payment. I should have given a like judgment if presiding as a judge of a court of equity and good conscience. I have heard, so far, of no ulterior action beyond the reference to a committee of F. B. Lodge of my award.

In compliance with the instructions of the Delegates to Grand Lodge at Kingston, I issued a circular to the various Lodges in the District, asking them to assess themselves in the sum of \$5 each, for defraying, (1.) The personal and travelling expenses of the D. D. G. M.; (2.) His postages, stationery and telegrams; (3.) Repair of the District regalia; (4.) Acquisition of a District Masonic Library.

I have received this assessment from Lebanon, Oshawa; Peterborough, Peterboro'; St. John's, Cobourg; Ontario, Port

Hope, and Jerusalem, Bowmanville; Verulam Lodge, Bobcaygeon, also replied favorably. Corinthian Lodge, Peterboro', declined for reasons set out in their report of the Committee. These are in themselves so cogent that I beg to submit the report as an appendix to mine.

In conclusion, I beg to express my deep sense of the uniform courtesy, deference and kindness I have received at the hands of the Brethren of the District on all occasions when engaged in my official work. APPENDIX TO REPORT OF ONTARIO DISTRICT.

To the W. M., Officers and Members of Corinthian Lodge, No. 101,
Peterborough:

The Committee appointed to consider the communication from the

R. W. the District Deputy Grand Master of Ontario District, beg to report as follows:—

They cannot recommend compliance with any of the requests contained in said letter, for the following reasons:

1. As to the Regalia:—They consider that as the District Deputy Grand Master is a Grand Lodge Officer, his regalia should be supplied by Grand Lodge and should be held by the District Deputy Grand Master during his term of office only, to be handed over to his successor when that term expires—thus involving, of course, the renewal of the whole or any part of the regalia when required.

2. As to the sum asked to defray cost of stationery, postage, &c.:—The Committee are of opinion that the District Deputy Grand Master should have a sufficient sum placed to his credit by the Grand Lodge to meet this expense, unless the recommendation hereinafter contained were adopted.

3. As to the formation of a District Library:—The Committee consider that the position of District Deputy Grand Master is one of honor and that no one who is not well instructed and familiar with Masonic Jurisprudence should be elected to or hold that office, and that if a Library is required for that purpose it should be supplied by the occupant of the office himself.

The Committee further beg to suggest that the present system of District supervision is unsatisfactory, and would recommend that the following suggestions be forwarded to the District Deputy Grand Master:—

That from the position of those persons who usually fill the office of District Deputy Grand Master, as professional or business men, they are unable to visit the Lodges in their District even once during their year of office, and, as a consequence, some Lodges are not visited for years, and Lodges, even when visited, do not receive such benefit as they should; and to remedy this, the Committee suggest that in addition to the District Deputy Grand Masters, there should be appointed by the Grand Master Grand Lecturers at a stated salary, whose duty it should be to visit every Lodge under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge once a year, to inspect the books, examine and instruct the officers and members, and deliver a lecture or lectures on some Masonic subject. Such officers not to be allowed to engage in any other occupation, thus making it necessary to appoint only two or at most three. The District Deputy Grand Masters still to retain their authority over their Districts on questions of Jurisprudence and recommendations as to new Lodges, &c.

PRINCE EDWARD DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of Canada A. F. & A. M.

MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN,—I have the honor to submit the following report, in conformity with the requirements of the Constitution of Grand Lodge, as regarding the condition of Masonry in the Prince Edward District, over which I have with pleasure presided as D. D. G. M. for the year 1879-80.

I regret exceedingly that owing to the urgent nature of my professional duties, and also other unavoidable circumstances, I have been unable to visit all the Lodges in the District. To have visited each and every one was my fond desire and intention when I was last year selected and honored with the appointment which I now hold, and I trust that those Lodges unvisited will not attribute my absence to any apathy or want of zeal in the cause.

All the Lodges that I have had the pleasure of visiting, I found well skilled in their work, and the Lodges well and properly furnished. While reference is made to Lodges, I cannot but express my admiration of the Prince Edward Lodge, No. 18, Picton, which is I believe, without exception, the most handsome Hall in the Dominion. Its walls and the ceiling are beautifully and artistically frescoed in colors whose delicate tints of the softest hues delineate designs emblematical of the Order—and the furnishings are equally rich and in keeping with the surroundings. When illuminated by the three huge chandeliers, in all twenty-eight lights, the brilliancy of which in effect inspires a celestial sensibility over one while visiting the Lodge. The painting, decorating, &c., was under the able supervision of R. W. Bro. Donald Ross, P. D. D. G. M., to whom the Brethren of that Lodge are deeply indebted for his indefatigable exertions.

During the entire year the greatest harmony has prevailed with the Lodges throughout the District, and I am rejoiced in being able to state that not a single complaint of un-Masonic conduct has been formally brought before me.

The correspondence has been considerable, involving constitutional explanations which I have disposed of to the best of my ability.

I was pleased to grant a Dispensation to each of the following Lodges, for the Brethren to wear regalia to church, viz:—Prince Arthur, No. 228; Maple Leaf, No. 119; Prince of Wales, No. 146; and Union, No. 9, on Saturday, the 27th day of December—St. John's Day,—on which occasion I installed the officers of the above Lodges at the Masonic Hall, Odessa. I also granted a Dispensation to Stirling Lodge, No. 69, to wear regalia at a concert on the 26th of December; to Moira Lodge, No. 11, to appear in regalia at a concert on the 30th December, 1879; and to Lake Lodge, No. 215, to wear regalia at a picnic on 24th June, 1880.

Only two deaths have been reported to me during the Masonic year, viz: Bro. Wm. G. Harris, Star in the East Lodge, No. 164, and Bro. James Henry Tyler, Union Lodge, No. 9.

By authority of the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, I had the honor of laying the corner stone of a new Methodist Episcopal church, near Floating Bridge, on the shore of the Bay of Quinte, in the Township of Earnestown, on Tuesday, the 22nd day of June ult., at which ceremony I was ably assisted by W. Bro. E. J. B. Pense, acting D. G. M.; W. Bro. C. B. Huffman, acting G. S. W.; and W. Bro. Ogden Hinch, acting G. J. W.

I cannot allow the present opportunity to pass without

expressing my opinion, that if the several Lodges in this District were more particular in enforcing their By-laws, as regards the collection of dues, fewer reports of suspension for non-payment of dues would be the result, and I am sure the financial position of each Lodge would essentially be benefited thereby.

In conclusion, I beg to express my warmest thanks to the Brethren of this District for their uniform kindness and courtesy extended to me during my term of office as D. D. G. M., and I pray that the G. A. O. T. U. may long continue the harmony that exists among the Brethren of Prince Edward District.

ST. LAWRENCE DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master and the Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of Canada.

MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN,—The condition of Masonry in St. Lawrence District during the past year has been such as to enable me to present an encouraging report.

I have, during my term of office, visited all the Lodges under my supervision, with the exception of two or three, which were unable to hold meetings at the times paid by me, and one which I was prevented from visiting by unforeseen obstacles. I found the Lodges generally to be in a prosperous condition, actively engaged in the work of Masonry and

the promotion of its objects. I have to remark, however, that the general attendance has not been as large as it ought to be, and I have taken every opportunity of impressing on the Brethren the propriety of a diligent and punctual attendance at the meetings of their Lodges. In my opinion, the only effective means of securing such attendance is to make the meetings instructive and interesting, to excite a spirit of emulation which will induce the Brethren to aim at proficiency in their work. With the same object, I would recommend that promotion in the Lodges should be as rapid as is consistent with efficiency.

I have much pleasure in recording my satisfaction with the manner in which several of the Lodges exemplified their work during my visit. In fact, some of the younger Lodges exhibited the greatest proficiency. I took particular pains to give such instruction to the Brethren as I could give during the time of a short visit, and I have reason to believe that my suggestions have been of much service. The manner in which I was received by the Brethren proved their Masonic spirit and their loyalty to the Grand Lodge and their Order. Kindness and respect were shown to me everywhere, and I shall preserve a grateful recollection of my tour through St. Lawrence District.

During the past year dispensations have been granted for the formation of two new Lodges, namely, Henderson Lodge, at West Winchester, and Lansdown Lodge, at Lansdown. These new Lodges were necessary for the convenience of the Brethren in the localities in which they have been established, and if they apply for their charters I have much pleasure in supporting their applications.

The membership of the Lodges has, during the past year, been materially increased by initiations, but several Brethren

have been suspended for non-payment of dues—the result, no doubt, of hard times and of the departure of many members to Manitoba and other new Districts. I have impressed on the Brethren the necessity of being careful to admit to our Order such men only as will reflect credit upon it.

I have during the year granted dispensations to enable some of the Brethren to attend church and appear in public clothed in their regalia. Several of the Lodges have adopted the laudable practice of attending public worship, and they thus earn our recognition of and submission to the religious observances adopted and used by many of our people.

This practice, if continued and extended, as I hope it will be, will tend to remove from the minds of some of the uninitiated the false impression which is diligently created and fostered by the enemies of the Craft, that the profession of Masonry is inconsistent with a spirit of loyalty and devotion to our received religion.

No question of any importance has been presented to me for consideration by any of the Lodges, though I have had a large amount of correspondence with several of them, and I am glad to state that harmony exists amongst all the Lodges within my jurisdiction.

I have, during my term of office, installed the officers of several of the Lodges. This duty I performed for the last time at Rising Sun Lodge on the evening of the 8th instant.

OTTAWA DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master and the Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M. of Canada.

MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN,—In presenting this my third report on the condition of Masonry in the Ottawa District, I have much pleasure in stating that Masonry in this District is now in a more prosperous condition than it has been for some time past, although there are yet some Lodges in a very feeble condition financially, owing principally to the carelessness of their members in not attending to their Lodge duties. However, there has been fewer suspensions for N. P. of D, and a number of candidates are now offering themselves for initiation, and the Lodges generally have brighter prospects before them. Last October, acting by request of the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, I constituted Prince of Wales Lodge, No. 871, Ottawa; and this Lodge is in a flourishing condition, the officers are well up in their work and the members punctual in their attendance at their stated meetings.

During the year, I have received notice of the death of several of our Brethren in this District, all of whom were interred with the usual Masonic honors.

I have received but few complaints, and these of small moment, except in one case, that of a Brother of St. John's Lodge, No. 68, Carleton Place, who appealed to the Grand Master against the decision of the W. M. of that Lodge, in declaring the ballot for a candidate clear when, as he asserts, it was unfavorable, and the candidate should have been rejected.

At the request of the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, I went to Carleton Place to investigate this matter, but owing to the action of the W. M. and some of the Brethren of the

Lodge, in taking possession of the Lodge Room and locking the doors, I was unable to proceed with the investigation. I at once suspended the W. M. and the Brethren who took part with him in this very unmasonic proceeding, and have reported the matter to the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, and have no doubt full justice will be done to all parties concerned.

My official acts, with the above exception, have been mostly confined to answering numerous letters of enquiry from Brethren in the District, and I have not been called upon to pay any official visits except for the purpose of installing the officers of the several Lodges.

I again thank the Brethren of the Ottawa District for their uniform kindness shown to me during my term of office.

The attention of your Board having been directed to the claim made on behalf of Union Lodge, No. 380, London, for a remission of the amount charged for the Warrant issued to them, recommend that said application be not entertained.

Regarding the application for the issue of Certificates to

Brethren who have been healed in our Lodges, your Board recommend that a Special Certificate be prepared, under the direction of the Grand Master, and issued to those who may desire to obtain them, upon the terms as agreed upon by the Grand Master.

Referring to the application of Union Lodge, No. 9, Napanee, for the remission of Grand Lodge dues, amounting to \$184.00, owing to the depressed state of their finances, your Board are of the opinion that it is not desirable to depart from the course hitherto pursued by Grand Lodge in declining to grant all such applications.

On the 1st of December last \$851.67 of Dominion 5 per cent. stock was purchased for the purpose of bringing the amount invested up to the even sum of \$55,400.

Your Board recommend that the sum of \$5,000 be transferred from the General Fund to the Benevolent Fund, current account.

Your Board recommend that the Grand Secretary issue a notice inviting tenders, for a term of three years, for all printing required by Grand Lodge from and after the next Annual Communication. Such tenders to set forth the price per page, no allowance being made for blank pages, for printing Proceedings and Constitutions, and to be accompanied by specimens of paper to be used. Also, tenders for the printing of Circulars, or other printed matter required for use in the Grand Secretary's office.

And that the Grand Secretary prepare and forward to any person applying for the same specimens of the different kinds of work required by Grand Lodge, such tenders to be sent to the Grand Secretary under seal, marked "Tenders

for Printing," and to be opened in the presence of the Committee of Audit and Finance at the next Annual Communication.

Your Board desire particularly to call the attention of Grand Lodge to the statement of receipts and expenditure for 1879, from which it will be observed that the receipts, exclusive of interest, amounted to \$11,844.85, and the expenditure to \$12,866.12, or an excess of expenditure over receipts of \$1,021.27. It is quite true that with the interest received the receipts exceed the expenditure by \$1,594.48; but while such is the case, your Board are of opinion that every effort should be made to keep the expenditure within the income derived from all other sources excepting interest.

Your Board further recommend that the Grand Secretary notify all Lodges over two years in arrears, that unless their returns are made, and fees paid, Grand Lodge will at its next Annual Meeting suspend their Warrant, and summon them to appear before the Board to show cause why their Warrant should not finally be withdrawn.

REPORT OF THE BOARD ON THE CONDITION OF MASONRY

R. W. Bro. James Moffat, on behalf of the Board, presented and read the following

REPORT:

The Board beg to submit the following report on the Condition of Masonry:—

1. Reports from the D. D. Grand Masters of the St. Clair, London, Wellington, Hamilton, Niagara, Toronto, Georgian, Ontario, Prince Edward, St. Lawrence and Ottawa Districts have been received and examined, from which the Board are pleased to learn that Freemasonry continues to flourish in the Districts, that harmony prevails, and that very few causes of complaint were found, and these of such a trivial character as to be easily adjusted, with the exception of Carleton Place Lodge, in which a contention has occurred, wherein it appears to the Board that the conduct of the W. M. of that Lodge was highly reprehensible.

2. The Board regret that the District Deputy Grand Masters for the Wilson and Huron Districts have not sent in reports in accordance with the Constitution.

3. The Board notice with great gratification that the laudable practice of attending Divine service on the Masonic festival days of Saints John is largely increasing.

4. The Board are also gratified to learn that Lodges of Instruction have been held in London and St. Clair Districts, two in the former and one in the latter, which were well attended. The Board strongly recommend that this practice

be more generally carried out, whereby the principles of Masonry may become more thoroughly understood and generally disseminated amongst the Brethren, thus creating a greater unanimity of action amongst the Lodges.

5. The Board are also pleased to learn that several new Lodge rooms have during the past year been erected and dedicated, the one at Picton, in Prince Edward District, deserving special mention, this hall being handsome and commodious as well as expensively decorated, and forming an attractive resort for the Brethren.

6. The Board regret to learn that several of the Lodges are not in a thrifty financial position, and as a remedy for this would recommend that Lodges be requested to make provision in their By-laws for commutation of annual dues.

7. The Board find that seven dispensations have been granted by the M. W. the G. M. during the last year for establishing new Lodges, all of which are reported to be working well.

8. Applications have been received from St. Andrew's Lodge, No. 62, Caledonia, to withdraw from the Niagara District, and be attached to the Hamilton District, and from Brock Lodge, Cannington, to withdraw from Toronto District and be attached to the Ontario District. The Board beg to recommend that these applications be granted, subject to the conditions of the report of the Committee on Redistribution of Districts adopted at last meeting of Grand Lodge, page 108 of the proceedings.

REPORT OF THE BOARD ON JURISPRUDENCE
AND FOREIGN GRAND LODGES.

R. W. Bro. James Moffat, on behalf of the Board, presented and read the following

REPORT :

The Board beg leave to submit the following report on Masonic Jurisprudence and Foreign Grand Lodges:—

1. Brougham Lodge, No. 269, asks if it is constitutional to have a Masonic Hall in a private house.

The Constitution, page 86, provides that every Lodge should be solemnly constituted, &c., which, of course, implies that it should be held in a place fitted for the purpose—one that can be properly guarded and not exposed to the knowledge of those not belonging to the Craft. Private houses have not usually the necessary accommodation subject to these conditions; but there is nothing in the Constitution against a Lodge being held in a private house.

2. Kinistino Lodge, Prince Albert, N. W. T., asks to be allowed to install three members of their Lodge as Masters or Past Masters at one time.

It is quite impossible, and contrary to all principles of Masonry, to permit such to be done.

3. The Grand Lodge of Cuba, and the Grand Lodge of Colon,

having settled their differences and united under the name of the United Grand Lodge of Colon and the Island of Cuba, the Board recommend that the recognition asked for be granted, and the said Grand Lodge be welcomed as a regular Grand Lodge amongst the sister Grand Lodges of the world.

4. In accordance with the application, and from information and communications recently received, the Board also recommend that the Grand Lodge of New Mexico be recognized and welcomed as a regular Grand Lodge amongst the sister Grand Lodges of the world.

5. In regard to the Grand Lodge of Spain, it is recommended that action be postponed until further information on the subject is received.

The papers produced show that no regular trial was had; that no charges had been preferred in proper form, and that the Worshipful Master had, on the report of a committee, declared the brother suspended.

These proceedings are clearly irregular, as the Worshipful Master has no power to suspend a brother.

The suspension is, therefore, of no effect, and Bro. Weston is still in good standing.

5. NEW DOMINION LODGE, No. 205,
vs.

BRO. CHRISTIAN ERNST.

In this case Bro. Christian Ernst was declared to be suspended by New Dominion Lodge, No. 205, for unmasonic conduct, and his expulsion is called for by the Lodge.

The papers produced show that he was suspended by the Lodge upon motion, without any trial.

The suspension, therefore, is of no effect, and Bro. Christian Ernst is still in good standing.

6. KILWINNING LODGE, No. 64.
vs.

BRO. H. C. GREEN.

An appeal, dated the 9th of July, 1880, presented by Bro. H. C. Green to the Board against a decision of Kilwinning Lodge, No. 64, dated the 20th May, 1880, the nature and particulars of which do not appear in the papers submitted.

It is, therefore, recommended that the case be referred to the D. D. G. M. of London District, with power to act and report to the Grand Master, or to report fully at the next meeting of the Grand Lodge, as circumstances may require.

7. BRO. J. H. FLEMING,
vs.

NORTHERN LIGHT LODGE, No. 98.

This matter arises out of a decision of the Grand Lodge at its last meeting, in the case of Bro. John Sellery vs. Bro. J.

H. Fleming (See Proceedings, 1879, p. 107), by which a suspension of Bro. Fleming by Northern Light Lodge, No. 98, was removed. Bro. Fleming now complains that, notwithstanding this decision, the Lodge refuses to admit him.

The Board recommend that the matter be referred to the D. D. G. M. of the Huron District, with instructions to see that the decision of Grand Lodge is carried out, and that Bro. Fleming is not deprived of any of his Masonic rights or privileges.

8. VIENNA LODGE, No. 237,
vs.
BRO. M. S. BROWNELL.
- This matter has already been before the Grand Lodge on two occasions (See Proceedings, 1878, p. 133, and 1879, p. 91.)

The evidence on which Vienna Lodge acted has not been placed before the Board. They recommend, therefore, that the matter be allowed to stand over till next meeting of Grand Lodge for the production of this evidence.

9. OLD LIGHT LODGE, No. 184,
vs.
BRO. G. T. BURGESS.
- In this matter the papers show that Bro. G. T. Burgess was, on the 6th March, 1880, suspended by Old Light Lodge, No. 184, for unmasonic conduct, and his expulsion is called for.

Bro. Burgess appears to have left Canada and to have gone to Colorado, and a notice requiring him to appear before the present Grand Lodge was mailed to him, directed to Denver in that State, on the 18th June last.

The Board are of opinion that this notice does not give Brother Burgess sufficient time to appear.

They recommend that he be summoned to appear before

next Grand Lodge, and show cause why he should not be expelled.

10. STAR IN THE EAST LODGE, No. 164, } In this matter the
 vs. } papers show that
 BRO. WILLIAM PATTERSON. } Bro. Wm. Patterson
 was, on the 4th February, 1879, suspended by Star in the
 East Lodge, No. 164, for unmasonic conduct, and his expulsion
 is called for,

The Board recommend that Bro. William Patterson be summoned to appear before next Grand Lodge, and show cause why he should not be expelled.

11. ST. DAVID'S LODGE, No. 302. } In this matter the
 vs. } papers show that
 BRO. W. C. REID. } Bro. W. C. Reid was,
 on the 24th day of June, 1879, suspended by St. David's
 Lodge, No. 302, for unmasonic conduct, and his expulsion
 is called for.

The Board recommend that Bro. W. C. Reid be summoned to appear before next Grand Lodge, and show cause why he should not be expelled.

12. ORIENT LODGE, No. 339, } In this matter the
 vs. } papers show that
 BRO. J. F. CROSS. } Bro. J. F. Cross was,
 on the 1st day of June, 1880, suspended by Orient Lodge,
 No. 339, for unmasonic conduct, and his expulsion is called
 for.

Bro. Cross appealed from the decision of the Lodge to the D. D. G. M., Toronto District, who has, we are informed, after investigation, confirmed the decision of the Lodge.

The Board recommend that Bro. J. F. Cross be summon-

ed to appear before next Grand Lodge, and show cause why he should not be expelled.

18. ST. JOHN'S LODGE, No. 68,

vs.

W. BRO. C. G. STACKHOUSE, BROS. G.

DOUGLAS, P. McEWAN, E. CODE,

FLETT.

This matter involves the consideration of the action of the District Deputy Grand Master of Ottawa District,

who, on the 17th day of June, 1880, suspended the Brethren above mentioned, "for gross un-Masonic conduct and flagrant violation of their obligation as Master Masons."

The particulars of the offence, as stated by the D. D. G. M., are substantially as follows:—

On the 9th of June, 1880, the D. D. G. M. was requested by the Grand Secretary to investigate an appeal which had been made by a Brother of St. John's Lodge, No. 68, against the decision of W. Bro. C. G. Stackhouse, who was then Master of the Lodge, declaring the ballot clear on the application of a candidate for initiation. In pursuance of his duty, he requested W. Bro. Stackhouse to call an Emergent Meeting of his Lodge to consider the matter of the appeal, of which he sent him a copy. To this request W. Bro. Stackhouse made no reply, nor did he call the Emergent Meeting, though he alleges a satisfactory reason for not having done so; but on the summons for the next regular meeting, which was called for the 16th June, 1880, the initiation of the candidate was stated to be part of the business. The D. D. G. M. having been notified of this action, proceeded to Carleton Place, where the Lodge is held, on the evening appointed for the meeting, and before the Lodge was opened saw Worshipful Brother Stackhouse, whom he forbade to proceed with the initiation of the candidate pending the appeal. In defiance of this prohibition, W. Bro.

Stackhouse proceeded with the initiation, assisted by the other suspended Brethren, and caused the door of the passage by which the Lodge is approached to be locked about the time for opening, and after the arrival of the number necessary to constitute the Lodge, by which action the District Deputy Grand Master and several members of the Lodge were excluded from it, though they knocked repeatedly to gain admittance. The District Deputy Grand Master states that the outer door was locked before the time appointed for the meeting, and that he waited outside until W. Bro. Stackhouse came down stairs and informed him that he had initiated the candidate, and closed the Lodge. The District Deputy Grand Master further states that on the same evening W. Bro. Stackhouse informed him that, with the assistance of some of the other suspended Brethren, he had arranged the plan for initiating the candidate, and that he did not care for the authority of the Grand Lodge or the Grand Master.

The action of the Worshipful Master is also complained of by the excluded Brethren, and by Bro. Thos. Williamson, of a number of the Lodge.

As all the complaints relate to the same subject matter, we have consolidated them, and deal with in this report.

The Grand Secretary has, in pursuance of the direction of the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, duly summoned the suspended Brethren to appear before Grand Lodge to shew cause why they should not be expelled. None of them have appeared in person, but W. Bro. Stackhouse has sent a written statement of his defence, and Bros. McEwan, Edwards, and Douglas, have in *writing* disclaimed any knowledge of the affront offered to the District Deputy Grand Master, and any guilty complicity in the offence complained of.

We have carefully examined the correspondence and other papers relating to this painful case, and have come to the following conclusions respecting it:—

1. That W. Bro. Stackhouse was, in the matter complained of, guilty:

a. Of violating his obligation, in refusing to pay homage to the District Deputy Grand Master and to obey his order issued in the proper execution of his duty.

b. Of disrespect to the Grand Lodge, and of a violation of the Constitution, in proceeding with the initiation of a candidate pending an appeal from his ruling in respect of the ballot.

c. Of depriving the District Deputy Grand Master and the Brethren who were excluded from the Lodge, of their right to enter the Lodge and take part in the proceedings thereof.

d. Of setting an evil example to the junior officers and Brethren of the Lodge, and subjecting them to Masonic censure and punishment.

The defence forwarded by the Worshipful Master, in our opinion, in no way justifies or palliates the offences of which we find him guilty, and it is our painful duty to recommend that Bro. C. G. Stackhouse be suspended for the term of five years, and thereafter until he shall have, by writing addressed to the Grand Master, acknowledged his fault and expressed contrition therefor.

With respect to the charges made against the other Brethren, we have to say that the evidence placed before us does not justify us in finding them guilty. Some of them have

denied any intention of offence, and W. Bro. Stackhouse has stated that he alone was responsible for the action taken, and that none of the Brethren present with him at the initiation were aware of his having bolted the door of the Lodge. It is probable also that some at least were not aware that the initiation was being proceeded with contrary to the District Deputy Grand Master's prohibition.

In view of these facts and of the nature of the Master's authority in the Lodge, and the necessity for making him responsible for the manner in which its affairs are conducted, we recommend that the suspension of the Brethren, other than the Worshipful Master, be removed, and that they be restored to their rights and privileges.

It also appears to the Board that the affairs of this Lodge require searching investigation.

It was moved by R. W. Bro. James Moffat, seconded by R. W. Bro. Henry Robertson, and

Resolved,—That the report of the Board on Grievances and Appeals be received.

FISCAL YEAR CHANGED.

In accordance with notice given at the last Annual Communication, it was moved by R. W. Bro. Henry Robertson, seconded by R. W. Bro. Otto Klotz, and

Resolved,—That Clause 16, "of the Board of General Purposes," in the Book of Constitution be amended by striking out the word "December," and inserting therefor the word "May;" erasing the words "after which" and by adding next after the words "each Lodge" the words "at least one week prior to the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge."

MOTION TO CHANGE ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS LOST.

In accordance with notice given at the last Annual Communication, it was moved by R. W. Bro. Rev. C. W. Paterson, seconded by R. W. Bro. P. J. Brown,

That the order of proceedings at the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge, include the attendance of Grand Lodge at Divine Service, at such time and place as the Grand Master and Grand Chaplain shall arrange.

The motion having been put to Grand Lodge, it was declared *lost*.

NOTICES OF MOTION FOR NEXT ANNUAL COMMUNICATION.

1. By W. Bro. J. Parker Thomas.—That Clause No. 17, "of Grand Lodge," in the Book of Constitution, providing for the time of the holding of the Annual Communication of Grand Lodge, be amended by striking out the words "second Wednesday in July," and substituting therefor the words, "last Wednesday in June."

2. By W. Bro. Isaac Huber.—That the following be added to Clause 8, "of the Grand Lodge," in the Book of Constitution, that the Proxy be made in duplicate—one copy of which is to be forwarded to the Grand Secretary at least one week previous to the meeting of Grand Lodge.

3. By W. Bro. E. H. D. Hall.—"That the Constitution of the Grand Lodge be amended so as to provide for the appointment by the Board of General Purposes of Grand Lecturers, under salary, whose duty it shall be to visit all the Lodges under the jurisdiction of Grand Lodge once, at least, in every year, for the purpose of giving instruction in the Ritual, and explaining, by addresses or otherwise, the principles, traditions, and history of the Order, so that a uni-

form system of working may be introduced in the Lodges, and a knowledge of the science of Speculative Masonry acquired by the Brethren. The questions of the number of such Grand Lecturers, their tenure of office, and salaries, to be under the control of the Board. The jurisdiction of the D. D. G. M. to remain as at present."

4. By W. Bro. Geo. H. Kennedy.—That a new Masonic District be created, to be taken from the Georgian District, to be called the Algoma District, and to comprise the present Provincial District of Algoma.

5. By W. Bro. H. Sheard.—That the clause under the head of fees of private Lodges to Grand Lodge, in the Book of Constitution, be amended as follows:—"Every member of each Lodge shall pay towards the funds of Grand Lodge 25 cents per annum."
