A Starting Exhibit.
An Ottawa despatch announces
the publication of Government re-
turns showing that there is a deficit
of \$833,000 on the operations of the
last fiscal year.

It is a remarkable fact that while the
Mackenzie Government controlled
the finances of the country and very
large expenditures were being made
on both the Intercolonial and Canadian
Pacific, the increase of the public
debt was not nearly so large as it
has been during the last four years
under the Macdonald ministry.

But it will be fairly said that the
gross debt is not a proper basis on
which to build a comparison. We,
therefore, turn to the net debt ex-
hibit and find that the increase dur-
ing the Mackenzie period of four
years was \$24,910,344, while during
the last four years of the Macdonald
Government for which we have re-
turns, it is \$45,152,925.

It has, therefore, increased by more
than \$100,000,000 in the last ten
years. When it is remembered that
we are engaged in war and that
the conditions are all in favor of
a prudent administration of the
country's affairs, there does not appear
to be any reason, based on sound state-
manship to justify the rate at which
we are running into debt.

reigned in Europe was broken in 1789,

subject of interest, the Revolution in

nobles but it shook the basis of political
affairs throughout Europe. The ex-
ecution of the French King, Louis XVI,
caused the British ministry to dis-
continue the reign of George III, which
was followed by a war which lasted
eight years. Whatever may have been
the intention of the court there can be
no doubt that Mr. Pitt was reluctantly
drawn into this war, and the history of
the remainder of his reign, as far as
it is chiefly that of the share borne by
England in the wars that grew out of
that great social convulsion, the French
Revolution.

Upon the defeat of Mr. Fox's India
Bill, in December, 1783, the Govern-
ment resigned and a new one was ap-
pointed with Mr. Pitt, the son of the
late Earl of Chatham, at its head. The
contest of parties which immediately

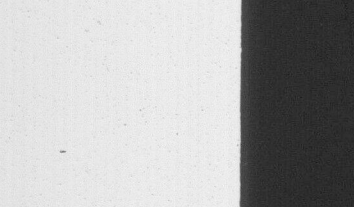

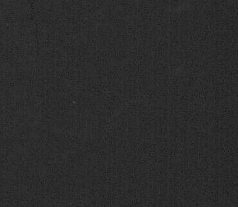
