Such DRUNKEN BULLY GOT Flames Spread With Rapidity in East Tenement That Scores of Persons Were Cut Off From Escape—The Bodies

Y., July 29.—Eight hundred guests of the Long Beach hotel one of the largest seashore hotels on the Atlantic coast had to flee for their lives early today when the hotel was burned to the ground. The fire was discovered on the first floor shortly after five o'clock. Hall boys and clerks hurried through the smoky corridors and roused the sleeping guests. The flames gathered quick headway in the great wooden structure and the guests had barely time to seize some scanty clothing and escape. The hotel burned like tinder and in a short time was a smouldering mass of ruins. Loss about \$200,000. The hotel was three stories high, and nearly 600 feet in length and was filled to capacity. Housed 1,100 persons.






