







In the course of a brief address the Pre-mier said the government regarded the import taxes as an integral part of the budget, which represented the unanimous judgment of the united cabinet. He thought his own free trade record above suspicion, and if he considered the budget to prejudice to the taxes, the Premier said, were being imposed to regulate foreign exchanges, and anything pro-posed in these abnormal times could not be taken as an example of the kind of taxation that would be imposed in time of peace. the building. He said, in an address to the chamber, that mobilization of the Greek forces was indispensable, on account of Bulgaria's mili-tary measures. He stated, however, that Bulgaria had explained to Greece that her object in mobilizing was to maintain armed neutrality, and that she had no intention of adopting an aggressive attitude towards Greece or Serbia.

"Notwithstanding the Bulgarian explanation, the situation remains grave," the Premier continued. "The state of affairs brought about by ation cannot continue indefinitely, the more so as it is known that Bulgaria no longer accepts the situation as established by treaty between herself and her neighbors."

The Premier concluded his address with the declaration that the Greek people stood ready to oppose efforts of any other nation to obtain a predomination position in the Balkans. He hoped an understand ing might be reached promptly which would permit of simultaneous demobilization by Greece and Bulgaria.

Former Premier Gounaris, leader of the minority, which has favor ed a policy of neutrality, approved the declaration of the government.

The scene within the chamber as the Premier announced the government's policy was a striking one. Numbers of Turks, in turb were notable among the forces opposed to the minister, while on the government benches were numerous Cretans in baggy blue bloomers, brilliant red sashes and embroidered jackets. Many held chaplets of amber beads. Here and there, rural members appeared in the native costume of plaited skirts and white cloth tights. Everyone who entered the galleries, which were filled to repletion, was searched by soldiers for possible concealed weapons.

ALL GREEK STEAMERS COMMANDEERED BY GOV'T London, Sept. 30 .- The commandeering of Greek steamers by the Greek government has already affected the freight marke rates from Cardiff to the Mediterranean having risen ten shillings per ton. It is estimated that quite fifty per cent. of the tonnage on this route is un-
