

Immediately after the cabinet meeting Secretary Bryan cabled Charge O'Shaughnessy, to demand of the Huerta government the punishment of those responsible for Vergara's death. An explanation will be sought by the American government of why any harm befell Vergara when assurances had been given to the American consular representative that he was safe.

Incidentally the memorandum circulated by the Huerta government among the diplomatic representatives in Mexico City pointing out to the United States that the Constitutionalists were unable to protect foreigners and therefore ought to be deprived of the right to get arms in the United States, did not reach the state department. Secretary Bryan said it had not been received, and there were intimations from high officials that the memorandum meant little in view of the wanton murder of Vergara.

Practically every move that has ever been suggested for the protection of Americans and foreigners in Mexico and for the restoration of peace in that country, was discussed by the cabinet. No conclusion was reached as far as could be learned, except that there should be aggressive pursuit of the facts in both the Benton and Vergara deaths.

These specials, it must be remembered, are run in close connection with incoming and outgoing liners. Assuming that ten passenger cars in a train of twelve cars will carry forty passengers, each divided equally between first and second class, the I. C. R. would earn \$700 on the haul if the maximum clause, however, limits the earnings to \$300. That looks like a fine thing for the C. P. R., but the people's railway was not protected as it should have been by Mr. Gutelius.





It is certain that the writer of these lamentations did not consult the public accounts of the Dominion before he gave them expression. There he would have learned that the greater part of the cost of the National Transcontinental has already been met out of the surplus revenues of the country under Mr. Fielding's careful system of financing, a system which was followed by Mr. White during his first year in office. Here are the facts as to Canada's capital expenditures and debt charges during the past seventeen years, from 1897 to March 31, 1913. The total capital expenditures on canals, railways, public buildings, militia stores, and armaments chargeable to capital, and upon all other national enterprises and services during the period under review, was \$284,722,000. Of this colossal sum no less than \$139,511,000 represented expenditure upon the National Transcontinental and the Quebec Bridge.

During the seventeen years since 1897, while all this money was being expended on permanent works of great importance—railway building, canal deepening, harbor improvement, and aids to navigation—the net debt of Canada was increased only \$52,763,000, or less than a fifth part of the amount spent

on capital account.

In 1897 the net debt of the Dominion, according to the efficial returns, was \$261,538,000. In 1913 it was \$314,301,000. This year it will probably be twelve or lifteen millions greater because Mr. White did not take in sail last year when the linancial sky looked threatening. He probably considered that at a time when private expenditures were falling off the national outgo ought not to be curtailed, as such a course might tend to accentuate depression.

In 1913, at the close of the era of Liberal rule, the annual interest charge was only \$1.44 per head, notwithstanding the fact that a hundred and forty millions had been spent on a railway of the highest type of construction, owned by the people, and which in a few years will bring an annual rent of between four and five million dollars into the public treasury.

In this statement as to Canada's debt and interest charges no figures appear that cannot be verified by examination of the public accounts. The truth tells best and lasts longest.
