Horses, Carriages, &c.

For several days past three swindlers have been coming money in its streets by "curing" all diseases. Unhappily the sceptical police interfered and the miracle workers had to disgorge.

A party of lumbermen at Pontiac, Canada, the other day, one of their number, a man named Somerville, being very drunk, agreed to convince him on his regaining his senses that he was a Canadian, a native-born Canadian. This exultingly humorous idea was worked out so conscientiously that Somerville broke for the woods in the funniest possible manner, and was not seen for ten days, when, having mania from fear, lack of food and exposure, he taken to the asylum.

The steamer "Ontario" on her recent trip to England, encountered the most fearful weather. Of 1,028 head of live stock on board 250 were washed overboard or injured so that the poor animals had to be destroyed. When the storm was at its height, the owner of a fine draught stallion, Star of Denmark, tied the end of the rope of cutting the harness loose and letting him shift for himself. Result: The horse did not receive a scratch and was sold on landing for \$1,500, while many of the others in their boxes were killed or badly bruised.

A CAPT. WALKER is now shipping from California to Peru, for plantation work, 10,000 Chinamen. It is said that Guatemala is also very anxious to secure several thousand of them. In both countries, it is asserted, there are no antipathies in the races, nor obstacles to free inter-marriage.

The last of Lafitte's buccaneers, Achille Arnaud, died a few days ago in Louisiana, aged eighty-seven. His death was due to a visit last winter to Illinois, where change of climate prostrated him. His tomb lies on what was formerly known as the "German coast," not far from the scenes of his most memorable exploits—the Great Pass of Barataria and the island of Grande Terre.
