The Amherst Press says: The dead body of Fred Sheppard, colored was on Monday morning found lying on the kitchen floor of the house he occupied on Acadia street. The deceased was lying partially on his side with his feet near the stove and his head near the doorway.

Deceased was known as a hard drinker. On Saturday he and another man, John Stewart, were drinking together in the saloon, just across the street from the house in which he lived alone. Stewart, who was sober, saw the deceased drinking and the drinking was carried on again Sunday. He left the deceased about eight o'clock Sunday night, and Monday morning when Stewart went to the deceased's house for his working tools he saw the deceased lying on the floor. He found that he was dead, being stiff and cold. On the table was found a bottle containing a small quantity of liquor, which was identified as one the man had been drinking out of the night before. An inquest was held. Deceased's life was insured for the sum of \$1000.
