

AN AMERICAN SENATOR'S OBJECTION

At the peace table, the United States is in a strong position. It was its influence, which when thrown into the scale, tipped the balance in favor of the Allies. Under the old scheme of things, it ald have bargained for its assistance and obtained

large slice off some continent. did not do this. Instead it enunciated the principle that there should not be a division of spoils and proposed that it be a peace of justice, with propreserve the peace of the world.

For two months, the Allied nations have been ing with the league proposition and have suceeded in whipping into shape a constitution, under which the powers who are to sign it, will agree to submit their differences and disputes to arbitration.

It is a long step forward in the march of human affairs. Emanating from the mind of President Wilson, one would have expected that there would have been animity among Americans to see the covenant adopted and war eliminated. For a century, the repubhas avoided participation in world politics, and made no entangling alliances, because it desired to avoid war with other nations. Yet news reports show at in their senate there are politicians who denounce

the league. Senator Poindexter, of Washington, asked whether the United States is "to surrender to an international cil and body of delegates those high functions of overeignty which heretofore we have exercised for and to rest in the jurisdiction of an interational league the determination of our armamet the decision of peace or war, even in the most vital stions affecting our honor, integrity, or material

The people of the United States assert that theirs the freest government in the world, yet its hus-ands may not with impunity thresh their wives, illreat their offspring, wantonly destroy their own nor ir neighbor's property; run, amuck with a butcher nife; overspeed motorcars; become hoboes or public narges, nor do as they will in a thousand other articulars. Sane citizens readily submit to these ictions for the general good.

It follows that if it be wise to eurb, disarm and ol would-be disturbers of the peace in the national na, there should be an international code, supported the family of nations, preventing any nation from

oaching on the rights of others.

Were the United States senate, which is the treatyking power of the republic, to decline to ratify the ground. Owing to its past aloofness from world ties and its freedom of desire to annex other naterritories, the United States' recommendations rity of President Wilson is fully accepted. What

With this surplus before it, the public will benefit. It is understood they will share. By way of lowered rates, the consumer will be given a slice of the melon. Likewise it is expected that the Light Commissioners

will lower the price of street lighting.

When we pass on to a view of the other two utilities, the situation is still satisfactory but not as rosy as the power story. The Gas Department had a profit of \$1074 and the Street Railway one of \$1314. Unlike the Electric end these were dependent upon the general market for supplies and other necessaries and e obliged to pay the prevailing prices.

In the Gas end for instance, the cost of coal was

high, as were other necessities. Yet it came out on the right side, and is to be credited with furnishing our citizens with the lowest-priced gas of any muni-cipally-owned plant in Ontario. The price of gas here is 5 cents per thousand cubic feet lower than in Guelph. That city, it may be said, sells its gas at \$1.30 per thousand and its coke at \$7.25 per while this city sells gas at \$1.25 and coke at \$8.50.

The reason why it is not attempted to meet the Guelph price on coke is that our Commission has between 3500 and 3700 gas consumers and only 200 coke users. To increase the price of its gas 5 cents per thousand would yield it \$4000 and enable it to lower the price of coke to the Guelph level, but it considers the welfare of 3500 patrons of the gas department are paramount to those of 200 consumers of

The Street Railway has a surplus of \$1314 to divide ies, on a basis of three and one. It has had larger handouts but the prevailing high costs of operation cut into profits. It treats its staff fairly and during the year increased its wage bill by 30 per cent.

The showing made under the Light Commissioners deserves a good word. They are energetic in the public's service. They had the judgment to select a capable manager. For their services and for results,

For about a quarter of a century the general hospital has been serving the twin city. It has rendered good service and endeavored to cope with the Instituted as a philanthropic work and owing

in a large measure, its success to voluntary giving and voluntary work by large-hearted citizens, it was never possible as a rule to gather together more funds than were required to meet current expenditures.

Consequently the Board of Trustees finds that

time and use have made serious inroads on the equipment and furnishings. The lavatories are particularly in a poor condition. With the growth in the number of patients, in-

reased accommodation for these and the nursing staff has become absolutely necessary. It is estimated that \$50,000 are required to rehabilitate the institution and provide a new nurse's home.

This sum might be raised by obtaining the consent of the electors of the two municipalities to an ssue of debentures for this amount. They could possibly be persuaded to do so, though strange to say people who are in good health are frequently indifferent about institutions which care for the sick.

Having been established as a philanthropic institu-tion, whose object is to relieve the distress of suffering humanity and having thus far largely relied upon volun-tary donations, the Board considered it advisable to continue this course






