

The entire waterfall and all the surrounding property have just passed into the hands of the Quebec Electric Light Company, the price paid being \$230,000. Already the company has been utilizing a portion of the water power from the river above the cataract as motive power for their dynamos, which, situated in a factory near the foot of the falls, furnish all the lights for the illumination of the streets of Quebec. Now they are likely to draw off so largely increased an amount of water for the proposed extension of their operations that been reduced in the last fifteen years from there will be little or none left, particularly in the dry season, to come over the precipice. A BIG THING FOR LONDON. The negotiations for the lease of the Lonlon and Port Stanley Railway for a term of years from 31st March next are progressing favorably. Mr. Ivey, solicitor for the Cleveland syndicate, left for that city today to settle some minor details with his client, and on his return it is expected that the agreement will be closed in a manner that will be highly satisfactory to the citizens of London.

General satisfaction is expressed that the council, with a unanimity that has done it credit, has moved sufficiently slowly in the matter to have the merits of the road brought fully before the energetic capitalists now interested in the proposed lease. The city has been a distinct gainer because the "rush through" policy has been avoided, and cautious, far-seeing business men have been at the helm.

The ADVERTISEE has reliable intelligence from Cleveland that the syndiwhich has practically leased cate the London and Port Stanley line has behind it strong mining companies, and that they intend, in addition to inaugurating a summer passenger service, to establish a commercial line between that city or adjoining coal ports and Port Stanley. Their purpose is to put on one or more ferry steamers, such as carry the railway cars across Lake Michigan between Grand Haven and Milwaukee. By this means a train load of freight cars can be run from the mines to Cleveland, or any neighboring lake port on the other side of the lake, shunted on the ferryboat, carried to Port Stanley, and up the London and Port Stanley Railway to London and ali Western Ontario points.

By this means the cost of loading and unloading at the lake ports, hitherto a bugbear, can be considerably decreased, to the profit of the controllers of the line and of the consuming public.

It would certainly be of immense advantage to the manufacturing community of London, as well as to the ordinary householder, if good coal could be laid down here by the new line at a cost of 50 cents or 75 cents a ton lower than under the present system. And if we add to this a material reduction in the cost of bringing pig iron, fire clay, fire brick and other articles required by our manufacturers, the extent of the benefits of the deal are such as to give promise of renewed industrial activity in this trade center in the near future. These advantages, secured by a strict agreement to maintain a low rate of freight on the London and Port Stanley, can hardly be over-estimated. They are really of greater importance to the citizens than the \$28,000 a year rental and the improved train service to and from our lake port which the syndicate guarantees.

These are present good results. When the restrictions on trade between the two countries are removed the benefits will, as matter of course, be far greater.

A Few Minor Amendments Made-What the Old Company hay as to Alterations - A Fetition from the Ratepayers.

The City Council held an adjourned
