It is reported that Count von Brockdorff-Rantzau, the head of the peace delegation, and in the House of Commons this morning Mathias Erzberger, chairman of the armistice commission, have presented the naturalization bill. NATURALIZATION BILL RECEIVES ITS FIRST

Proposed Measure To Consolidate Present Act As Presented Today.

INTRODUCED TOO LATE

Ottawa, June 18 .- Sir Robert Borden purpose of the bill is to consolidate the present Canadian Naturalization Acts tion granted in Canada where such certificates have been obtained by fraud; where the holder has shown himself by act or speech to be disaffected or disloyal to His Majesty; or, during the war unlawfully traded with the enemy; or was not of good character at the date of grant of the certificate; where he has continued to reside abread for

Introduced Too Late.

Mr. McKenzie, leader of the Opposition, remarked that, in view of the importance of the measure, he feared it had been introduced at to leared it had been introduced at too late a date in the session. Possibly it might stand over for another session. Sir Robert Borden replied that the purpose of the bill was to make Canadian naturalization uniform with that of the United Kingdom. The provisions were framed with that purpose, and did not depart in any important respect of the Peace Delegates framed with that purpose, and did not depart in any important respect of the provisions of the Imperial act of last year. It was extremely important that the proposals should be carried into effect at the earliest date.

SIGNING OF THE PEACE TREATY

Enemy Ministers At Same Time Realize the Possibility of Bolshevism and Chaos in Germany If the Terms Are Not pected of taking part in a seditious AVIATORS ENGAGED TO SEARCH FOR Signed—Frankfort Gazette Declares Germans Are in No Position To Refuse and Must Bow To the Inevitable.

Weimar, June 18 .- No statement has been issued by the German cabinet on the Allied reply to the German counter-proposals, but the Associated Press learns that sentiment in the cabinet is almost unanimously against signing the treaty, the only objection being the possibility of Bolshevism and chaos in Germany. Commenting on the Allied reply to the German counter-proposals to

the terms of peace, the Frankfort Gazette says: "Whatever we do will be terrible, Germany is in no refuse to sign the treaty when the signature is forced by an ultimatum. Let us resign ourselves to the inevitable and hope for a better future." In concluding a violent denunciation of the treatment given Germany by the Allies the Vorwaerts says: "If the Entente's covering note scribes the war as the greatest crime against humanity, it is certain there is yet another and greater crime against humanity. Paris, June 17.—Confidence in the Government was voted in the Chamber of Deputies today, 349 to 137, following a tumultuous session, during which the mutiny of the sailors of the Black Sea fleet was discussed. Closing the debate for the Government, M. Pichon, foreign minister, declared the trouble was due entirely to Bolshevik propaganda, and said the chamber "must decide between the democratic inter-Allied policy and the policy of the Socialists who want France to abdicate before the Bolsheviki." The minister provoked a violent outburst from the Socialists by declaring that, in his opinion, Bolshevism was lost.

M. De La Haye, a royalist deputy, created a violent scene by declaring that foreign money was being used for propaganda work in France, and the Socialist party had assumed the task of circulating it in the navy, notably at Odessa and Sebastopol. The Socialists demanded that the Government make a declaration on the subject, but M. Pichon said he had no knowledge of it.





Uncle Sam and Mexico

CLASS REPRESENTATION IN PARLIAMENT.
[Brantford Expositor.]

In Mr. Charles W. Peterson's book, "Wake Up, Canada!" a table is given showing of what classes parliamentary representation in Canada is composed. The list includes the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, and the different provincial legislatures. Of the total number of. representatives 222 are lawyers, 163 belong to other professions, 329 are merchants or belong to the industries, 161 are farmers, and there are only 5 Laborites. The provinces of Nova Scotia, Prince Edward, Island, New Brunswick, Ontario and Alberta have not a single Labor representative, while the House of Commons has but one. The table shows a peculiar state of affairs to exist. The lawyers, numbering less than 5,000 in the whole of Canada, and being only a fraction of the population, monopolize 25 per cent of the total representation. Labor is practically unrepresented, while the farmers, comprising almost one-half of the entire adult population, only have about 18 per cent of the representation. The lawyers, prob-




