Papalova and Prosenik in Greek Macedonia Occupied by the British Forces-British Cavalry Now Close to Seres.

(Canadian Press.)

Saloniki, Oct. 11, via London.-British troops yesterday occupied two more towns to the east of the River Struma, in Greek Macedonia, it was announced today in an official statement issued at the British headquarters. They were Papalova and Prosenik, the latter town seven miles south of Demir-Hissar. British mounted troops have reached a point two miles south of Seres.

The text of the official announcement says:

"Struma Front: A hostile cavalry detachment was dispersed and driven back by a mounted brigade two miles south of Seres. Some activity was shown by enemy working parties between Barakli and Barakli-Juma (six miles northwest of Demir-Hissar).

London, Oct. 11.-The morning newspapers publish in conspicuous places the official order denying to the International News Service further use of the official press bureau, and the use of cables and all other facilities for transmission of news because of its "garbling of messages and breach of faith." The order appears under such headings as "No British News for Hearst," "News Made in America," and "American Agency's Garbling of Messages. The Daily Express says by way of comment:

Anti-British Lies. "The Daily Express repeatedly has

called attention to anti-British lies printed in American newspapers controlled by William R. Hearst-the New York American, the Chicago Examiner, and similar journals. This 'news' is supplied by the International News Service, which is entirely a Hearst organization. These papers will not have a line of Hearst 'news' today. This action follows repeated breaches of faith by the Hearst organization. One of the latest instances was a message in the Chicago Examiner headed 'London in Flames,' and purporting to describe a zeppelin raid. It was

never sent from here. Hearst Anti-British. In an extended editorial the Times

"The disciplinary measure taken against the International News Service is a satisfactory sign that the Government appreciates the importance of dealing drastically with lying news agencies. The tone of Mr. Hearst's newspapers is strongly anti-British, but the action of the Government has not been inspired by any resentment at their opinions. It is in consequence of deliberate falsification of intelligence, of which the International News Service has been repeatedly found guilty. No Slur On Press.

While we rejoice that our Government has inflicted proper punishment upon an unscrupulous news agency, we trust that the measures taken will not be regarded by the people of this country as involving any slur upon the character and conscientiousness of the United States press as a whole. The reputation of the great majority of American journals for fairness and honesty stands above reproach, and it has again and again been vindi-

cated during the war."
The Chronicle says: "The Gove ment has taken a well-justified step in depriving the International News Service of all telegraphic and mail facilities. The reason is not that Mr. Hearst's papers are pro-German, but that they have repeatedly published as coming from this country news which did not in fact come from it."

The Westminster Gazette says the Government "acted rightly refusing further facilities for transmission of news from this country by the International News Service, against the agency, concludes: "Readers of Hearst papers will know in the future that telegrams purporting to come from England have no origin there. 

GREAT FOREST FIRES OF HIS-TORY.

The Northern Ontario forest fire of July 29 last takes rank as the third most serious fire catastrophe in the history of this continent. The Hinckley fire in Minnesota, 1894, was responsible for 418 lives and the burning of 160,000 acres. The famous Peshtigo are in Wisconsin, 1871, killed 1,500 and devasted 1,200,000 acres of timber. 



Quebec Battalion Jumps Into the Fray Regardless of Life, Covering Itself With Glory.

#### HEARST SERVICE DEBARRED FROM BRITISH PRESS BUREAU; DUE TO PERSISTENT FAKING

Home Secretary Points Out in House of Commons That Alleged Cable News Furnished to Newspapers Is False and Is Not Sent Out From Britain.

The "International News Service," referred to in the following dispatch, furnishes "special cables for a London Conservative newspaper, as well as Toronto papers.

LONDON, Oct. 10.-The British official press bureau tonight issued the following:

"The following statement is placed at the disposal of the press for publication:

"In the House of Commons on June 27 last, the secretary of state for the home department stated that attention had been drawn to an alleged telegram relating to the Jutland battle, which appeared in certain American newspapers as having been sent from London by the correspondent of the Interna-tional News Service. No such message was included in any telegram sent from this country.

The home secretary referred on the same occasion to previous cases in which messages which purported to be from the London correspondent of the International News Service bore no likeness to the cablegrams actually dispatched. "On the first occasion referred to the manager of the Internationan incident should not happen again. On the second occasion he made like promises, stating that orders had been given that extraneous statements should not be inserted in cable dispatches.

"On the 3rd of September cablegrams were pi blished in the United States purporting to have come from London 'by International News Service' giving various false statements about the air raid of the previous night. None of the statements in question was in fact contained in any cablegram dis-patened by the London correspondent of the International News Ser-

"In view of this continued garbling of messages and breach of faith on the part of the International News Service, the secretary of state has directed that no representative of the International News Service shall be permitted to use the official press bureau, and that the agency shall be debarred from the use of all other facilities for the transmission of news un-til further notice."


