

WARNS AGAINST POISON PLANTS

Dr. Dearness Describes Plant Which Killed L'Original Family.

Says At One Time Was Found Around Low Lands of Coves.

Although many residents of London and district are not aware of the fact, the plant which last week caused the death of seven members of one family at L'Orignal, Ont., and which is known as the water or spot ed hemlock, is quite common in Western Ontario.

Its habitat is low ground, and the borders of swamps, and Dr. John Dearness, principal of the London Normal School, who is an expert botanist, states that at one time this plant was quite abundant in lands at the southwest corner of the ves and around some ponds in Westminster Township.

While it is a member of the same vegetable family as the garden par ip, this deadly plant is readily distinguished by close scrutiny of the leaves and stems, which are much finer and smaller than the harmless The root assumes a more tuber-like form than that of the

Seeds Are Smaller.

Comparison of the flowers and seeds will show that those of the water hemlock are much smaller, and Dr. Dearness declares that any person familiar with the garden par snip would not confuse the two plants. He points out, however, that the smell and taste of the root are the most deceiving features.

varies according to its locality. Th Indians call it musquash poison, of which "beaver poison" is probably translation. It is best known by the names of spotted hemlock or water or spotted cowbane.

In ancient times the Greeks condemned their criminals to die by drinking hemlock-not a decoction of this particular species, but of a plan closely related to it. The derivation of the term "spotted" is readily dis cerned when one scrutinizes the stem of its peculiar markings.

Scientific Name. The scientific name of the deadly hemlock is Cicuta Maculata, which includes the spotted characteristics in its terminology.

An extract of the leaves of the water hemlock has been employed by some herb doctors as a remedy for nervous headache.

'Manufacturing pharmacists put a fluid extract for sale, but I do not think any regular physician ever preribes it," Dr. Dearness informed

OTTAWA, May 10 .- (By Canadian Press.)-Answering a question placed on the order paper of the Commons by G. G. Coote, Progressive, Mac-Leod, today, Hon. 
