OUEEN WORKS FOR PEACE OF WORLD

Friendliness With Russia.

London, April 11. - The Associated Press learns that the exact status of the much forecasted Anglo-Russian understanding is:

After King Edward had given his ersonal assurances to Emperor ceding election. Nicholas that the anti-Russian comments in the British press did not represent the feeling of his government, Foreign Secretary Lansdowne informed the Business TO the Russian ambassador at London, Count Benkendorff, that he would be glad to reopen the negotiations looking to a settlement of all matters now in dispute between Russia and Great Britain, Lord Lansdowne did not stipulate any basis or enter into any details. Ambassador Benkendorff expressed his pleasure at the offer and transmitted it to St. Petersburg, where Lord Lansdowne's action is understood to have been taken as a material expression of King Edward's personal messages. There, for the moment, the

matter stands. Negotiations beyond Lord Lansdowne's offer have not been opened and are not likely to assume any particularly definite phase in the near future. Both King Edward's personal action and the step taken by his foreign secretary are due in a great degree to the untiring solicitation of Queen Alexandra, who has been greatly distressed over the war which has involved her Russian relatives and Great Britain's

The Associated Press learns that and Great Britain secretly regotiated to the same end eighteen months ago, but the attempt to draw up an agreement came to an abrupt "when Lord Lansdowne announced in the House of Lords that under no consideration would Russia be allowed a port on the Persian Gulf." Since then that question has been regarded as a deadlock. Under the changed conditions and with the good offices of th French Government, secured through the recent agreement, Lord Lansdowne is said to genuinely entertain the hope of an eventful settlement by which the Anglo-Russian spheres of influence throughout the world may be determined and the ceaseless and costly rivalry between the two nations ended

forever.
On all sides here it is pointed out that an agreement on outstanding matters with Russia is far more difficult than the recent arrangement with France. paramount questions are the delimitation of the Afghan frontier, access to the Persian Gulf and the spheres of influence in Persia.

It is surmised in well-informed quarters that Great Britain is willing to cede to Russia a sphere of influence in Northern Persia if Russia agrees not to interfere in Southern Persia.

It is thought that Russia's request for a port on the Persian Gulf never will be granted, but the Associated Press learns that Russia lately has exhibited a keen desire to acquire interests in Abyssinia, so as to grain access to the Red Sea. This might be arranged in lieu of a port on the Persian Gulf. The Emperor Menelik, it is reported here, has been informed of the Russian designs and his amiability in opening up his country to American enterprise is attributed here to his

desire to secure American support against any possible intention on the part of Russia. The delimitation of the Afghan frontier is not believed to present insurmountable difficulties, providing Russia is willing to denounce the designs always accredited to her in Great Brit-ain on the Indian Empire.

The questions of the far east and the Balkans are not thought likely to enter into the pending negotiations, though Russia doubtless will endeavor to secure British influence towards re scinding the provision of the Berlin treaty which closes the Dardanelles to the passage of Russian fleets.

PROMPT BOE ELECTIONS

Works Automatically. PEACE OF WORLD

Toronto, April 11.—According to a piece of legislation introduced in the Legislature Saturday by Hon. J. M. Gibson, Attorney-General, long delays in the holding of bye-elections, such as took place in the case of North Renfrew, will no longer be possible in the Province of Contario.

The clause of the bill provides that if The clause of the bill provides that if the writ for the bye-election is not issued within a certain time after a vacancy is created, it shall be the duty of the clerk of the crown in chancery to issue the writ, set the date of the election, and carry out the other necessary details. In this way, the bye-election will come automatically, without any action on the part of the Government.

Although there was formerly a separate office of clerk of the crown in chancery, that office is now merged with that of the clerk of the Legislature, on whose shoulders will consequently fall the new shoulders will consequently fall the new responsibilities. Russia Wants to Settle Claims for Two Sealers Only—The Canadian Side.

Ottawa, April 11.—A report has been made to the Dominion Government on the efforts to assess the Canadian claims against Russia for seizures made in the Northern Pacific. There were six vessels seized altogether, and the net result of recent discussions in London is that the Russian agents have intimated their willingness to recommend to their Gov-ernment the payment of damages on ac-count of only two vessels, the Carmelite and the Vancouver Belle. Whether the Canadian Government will accept this Diplomats accredited to the court of St. James express surprise at the fact that Lord Lansdowne has gone even so far as he has.

The Associated Press learns that and endeavored to secure a reopening of the regulations. To this the Canadian agent, Mr. Little, acting upon the in-structions of the Ottawa Government, flatly refused to agree. The discussion of damages for the six vessels was then entered upon, two by two. In regard to the first two, it was claimed by the Russians that the vessels had been warned against encroaching in Russian waters. JAPS WERE SEEN BUT STAYED AWAY

Expected Attack On Port Arthur Did Not Come Off.

RUMORS OF HEAVY FIGHTING

One Says Japs Are on Line Tung Peninsula-Mikado's Tansports Captured.

St. Petersburg, April 10.-The generilly anticipated attack on Port Arthur lid not occur last night, although a telegram received from Grand Duke Cyril reports that the enemy's ships were sighted on the horizon. It is presumed that the Japanese were warned of the extra precautions which had been taken to guard against a surprise. There was no Easter merry-making at the front. By special dispensation the soldiers and sailors there were relieved of all seligious observances on account of the necessities of the mili-

tary situation. Vice-Admiral Makaroff's corpedo flotilla patrolled the open sea, while the warships, with full steam up, remained outside Port Arthur. Elsewhere throughout the war region all is reported quiet.

MORE UNCONFIRMED RUMORS. A PROTECTORATE

Anglo-French Treaty Leaves Latter Supreme in Western

North Africa.

Paris, April 1. - Although the Anglo-French colonial treaty, just signed, protectorates, it is now recognized that between the lines the means the establishment of a French protectorate over Morocco, similar to the present protectorate of France Tunis, and that it makes permanent the British protectorate over Egypt. Thus the effect of the treaty is to transform the entire political geography of Northern Africa, with Great Britain dominating the eastern

It is believed, however, that the French will abandon altogether their territorial claims to the Newfoundland coast, with the cod and lobster fishing rights along exposition ever held. the littoral. 


