TO MENACE GIBRALTAR

New York, July 11.—A Paris dispatch to the Times says: According to M. Juan Hess, the well-known traveler and author of an important work on Morocco, who is credited with great personal influence over the Sultan, Germany has passed a secret agreement with the Sultan for the construction of two ports on the Mediterranean coast which will directly menace Gibraltar.

The international conference, Hess says, arranged between the Sultan and German Emperor, will be very brief and amount to nothing more than a confirmation of the Sultan's political and commercial independence and the integrity of his empire.

Hess thinks, however, that the fear of provoking a European war, which inevitably would result in the conquest and partition of his own empire, may in the end prevent the Sultan from striking this dangerous bargain with Germany.

Ottawa, July 10. - The long-delayed iscussion of the militia reorganization ook place in the House today, and was marked by a suggestion by Sir Frederick Borden that all young mer under 21 should be required to attend three annual camps as a part of their duty to the state. An alternative to this was suggested in the military edu ation which might be imparted at schools throughout Canada, a uniform scheme for which he hoped to see adopted by a conference to be called of all the Provincial Governments in the Dominion. Sir Frederick made several other announcements, one which was that the Government are buying a number of large guns and that several English gunmakers propose building factories in this country. He discussed the taking over of Hali fax and Esquimalt, which had caused large increase in the expenditure. Lieut.-Col. Tisdale and Dr. Sproule opposed taking over those fortresses, and favored accepting England's offer to pay over a lump sum toward their sup-port. Earlier in the day a general discussion occurred on the date of holding the session, and Sir Wilfrid Laurie made a statement almost explicit, that the House would, beginning perhaps in






