A Bible Class meets on Wednesdays, and Lectures are delivered on Saturdays. These are open to all candidates for the ministry, both in the College and the Academy.

MATRICULATION.

Candidates for matriculation will be examined in Arithmetic, English Grammar, Geography, English, Grecian, and Roman History; and in Algebra, as contained in the first six books of Davies' Bourdon—or an equivalent.

They must be thoroughly acquainted with the Latin and Greek Grammars, and be able to translate and parse accurately two books of Cæsar, two books of the Æneid of Virgil, two Orations of Cicero, and two books of Xenophon's Anabasis.

No Candidate will be admitted unless he has completed his fifteenth year.

Candidates may enter advanced classes after undergoing satisfactory examination in the previous studies of the Course.

Persons desirous of attending the recitations of particular departments, are allowed to do so, provided they have the requisite preparations for the studies of those departments, and become subject to the laws of the College, so far as required by the Faculty.

THEOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

The Course of Instruction embraces the following studies:—

- 1.—The Hebrew Language and Literature.
- 2.—The principles of Biblical Criticism and Interpretation, illustrated and applied in exegetical exercises on portions of the Hebrew and Greek Scriptures.
- 3.—Theology in its various branches.
- 4.—Ecclesiastical History, with special regard to the Christianity of the first five centuries, the Reformation from Popery, and the rise and progress of the Baptist Denomination.
- 5.—Ministerial and Pastoral Duties and other subjects, in courses of Lectures.
- 6.—The composition of Sermons. Students in the Theological Department are required to furnish written sermons or skeletons of sermons, and essays on theological subjects, during the whole course.

Candidates for the ministry, who are not members of the College, may enter the Theological Department, with this proviso, that they will be subject to all the regulations of government and discipline which may be in force in the College at the time.

It is desirable that students in the Theological Department be recognised by the Churches to which they belong as suitable candidates for the ministerial office.

DAILY RECORD.

The value of each student's recitation in class is regularly recorded by the Professors. For a perfect recitation the number is 10; for a less perfect one, a smaller number; for a deficiency, 0. If the deficiency is not satisfactorily explained, a mark of *demerit* is affixed to the name.

Unexcused absence from morning or evening prayer, or from class, incurs a demerit of from 2 to 10.

Should the demerits of a student, during any Term, amount to 50, a communication to that effect will be made to his parent or guardian, or to the owner of the Scholarship under which he studies.

Should they amount to 100, expulsion from College will be incurred.

At the close of each Term a general average is drawn, and the Students are divided into three classes. Those whose averages are 7.5 and upwards constitute Class 1;—those whose averages amount to 5, but are less than 7.5, constitute Class 2;—those whose averages amount to 2.5, but are less than 5, constitute Class 3. If any are below 2.5, they are not reported, and may be required to leave the College.

At the close of every Term, the standing of each student is ascertained, and a report of the same, together with a statement of the number of absences from prayers, or recitation, is sent to his parent or guardian, and to the owner of the scholarship, the benefit of which he enjoys.

DISCIPLINE.

Extracts from the "Laws and Regulations for Students":—

The Students shall occupy such rooms as shall be approved by the Faculty. Room-rent, tuition, fuel and library fees, must be paid in advance at the commencement of each Term, and the Treasurer's certificate to that effect must be delivered to the President, by whom a ticket of admission to the Classes will be given.

Inattention to study, and misbehaviour of any kind, will subject the offender to private or public reproof, a record of demerit in the weekly report, the loss of a Term, or suspension, at the discretion of the Faculty.

All the Students are required to be present at Morning and Evening Prayer, and to attend some place of worship, in the village or its vicinity, every Lord's day.

No Student shall be allowed to be absent from the College for a night, during Term (residents in the village excepted) without the permission of the President, or, in his absence, of the senior Professor.

The use of intoxicating liquors is absolutely prohibited.

No person shall be allowed to use gunpowder on the College premises.

LIBRARY.

The Library of the College is accessible under proper regulations to members of the College and Academy.

The College is provided with proper Apparatus for Experiments in Natural Philosophy, Chemistry, Surveying, &c. Also, a commodious Cabinet well furnished with contributions from various parts of the World, illustrative of the departments of Geology and Mineralogy, in which the rich deposits of Nova Scotia bear a conspicuous place.

EXAMINATIONS.

First,—Of all the classes twice in each Term on the studies of each half term.

Secondly,—Of all candidates for the degree of A. B. on the studies of the whole course.

ANNIVERSARY.

A public anniversary is held in the month of June in every year, when Candidates for Degrees deliver public exercises; addresses or essays may be given by persons connected with

the College, or otherwise selected for this purpose; a meeting of the Governors takes place; and Degrees are conferred.

Exhibitions of original compositions are also given publicly at the close of the first term.

DEGREES AND CERTIFICATES.

The Degree of Bachelor of Arts is granted to those Students who sustain a satisfactory examination on all the studies of the Course.

The Degree of Master of Arts may be received at the expiration of three years after the bestowment of the first Degree—subject to such regulations as the Faculty, with the approval of the Governors, may from time to time establish.

Certificates of standing and attainments will be given to such students as may leave the College during any part of the Course, and are entitled to honourable dismissal.

The fee for a Degree in course, including Diploma, is four dollars, payable in advance.

TERMS.

The First Term commences on the 1st of September in each year, and ends on the 20th of December.

The Second Term commences on the 6th of January, and ends on the 6th June.

VACATIONS.

First, from 20th December to 6th January. Second, from the 6th June to the first of September.

EXPENSES.

Board is provided at the Academy Boarding House for 10s. per week, in which is included washing and the necessary care of the Studies and Bed Rooms. There are other Boarding Houses in the village.

ROOMS.

Apartments for a limited number of Students are provided by the College, for which a rent is paid by each occupant towards a fund for the general repairs of the College Buildings.

SCHOLARSHIPS.

There is no charge for tuition to students entered on the foundation of a scholarship in the Endowment fund.

In other cases, the tuition fee is £6 per annum, or at that rate per term.

MORAL AND RELIGIOUS GUARDIANSHIP.

The utmost care is designed to be taken in the education of the Students, to promote their moral and religious, as well as intellectual culture.

All members of the College are expected to attend public worship regularly on the Sabbath; and parents and guardians are requested to give instruction as to the place of worship they wish the Students under their care to attend.

ACADIA ATHENÆUM.

The object of this Society is the improvement of the members in discussion and public speaking. It meets weekly.

Arrangements are made for a course of public Lectures during each college year.

There is under its control a Reading Room, where may be found a select variety of newspapers, provincial and foreign.

The Athenæum is under the sole management of the Students of the College, subject to the approval of its laws and regulations by the Faculty. Graduates may become honorary members.
