HEARD FROM.—J. H. PRESBYTERY OF STRATFORD.—At the recent session of the Presbytery of Stratford, Rev. J. W. Bell was elected an additional commissioner to the General Assembly. Rev. Mr. Watt's resignation of the Shakespeare and Hampstead charges, on account of health, was accepted by the Presbytery. It is proposed to re-arrange the ecclesiastical field in North and South Easthope at an early date. The report on the proposed Lynn Book was received and adopted, proposing to remit the book for modification by an enlarged committee. It was agreed to call a general assembly to take action in order to provide for the accumulation of debt and remove that existing in connection with the schemes of the church. The Presbytery adjourned to meet for ordinary business in St. Andrew's, Stratford, on the first Tuesday of July next, at 7.30 a. m.

YESTERDAY the adjourned Easter vestry meeting of Christ church on the 28th ult., Rev. Mr. Cooper named Mr. T. G. Fennell as the incumbent of the contemplated sale of the church to Mr. John Page, it was proposed to raise the revenue necessary to meet the expenses of the church for the year by quarterly subscriptions. It is thought that in the course of another year the congregation will be in a position to erect a new church on the property recently purchased from Mr. Livingston, which is in a more central locality than the old site, should the sale of the present church be effected, it is likely that the Osborne hall will be used temporarily for holding services in.

R. ran a special train through to St. Boniface, the train being made up with passengers and freight cars of various kinds, including the main line and branches of the road. Simpson and Mr. Grant, from the township of Palmetto; and the names of the others we did not learn.
