Another duel took place on Sunday, in a field near the railroad station at St. Germain, between M. Pierre Bonaparte and M. Adrien de la Valette, principal editor of the Assemblés Natignale. This meeting arose out of a letter of M. Pierre Bonaparte to M. de la Valette, on the subject of an article which appeared in his Journal, of which he was not the author, but of which he had assumed the responsibility. The terms of the letter heing considered insulting, M. de la Valette demanded antisfaction of M. Bonaparte. After firing a shot each at twenty paces, the affair was declared terminated, and the parties left the ground. In consequence of these frequent duels, arising out of debates in the Assembly, it is said the Attorney-General will demand authority to prosecute.
