WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any maison over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine

three years arter earning montescate preent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Preemption patent may be obtained as soon
as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per



NATION WIDE CAMPAIGN TO BE WAGED AGAINST HESSIAN FLY



Millions of bushels of wheat can be saved from the ravages of the Hessian fly if farmers follow the method of fighting this pest now being advocated by advanced agricultural scientists and practical farmers, is the opinion of the Soil Improvement Committee of the National Fertilizer Association, which in session at Hot

Committee of the National Fertilizer Association, which in session at Hot Springs, Va., voted to wage a great campaign to combat the pest.

The key to the situation is knowing the fly's life history. This brings a better understanding of the simple method used to fight it, and minimizes the chances of your fields being ravaged. Literally it is a vampire sucking the life-blood from your wheat.

There are two broods of the fly—the fall and spring broods. With the fall brood the flies come out of the pupe or "flax-seed" stage. They live about two weeks and then die, or most of them are killed by the first frost. But during their lifetime they migrate extensively, going to other fields from where they hatched. ARGUMENT OVER ON BILINGUALISM

Judgment in School Dispute Expected About the End of Month.

London, July 18.-Argument of counsel in the Ottawa school case came to a conclusion yesterday, and .486 judgment by the Privy Council may .413 be expected about the end of the month. From those concerned in the French-Canadian side of the dispute. it is learned that they believe there is a fair prospect of success for their

The argument which was spread over several days, was too complicated to attract any audience; in fact, this case of vital and historic import to Canada was thrashed out before a core of men. comprising the judges and the advocates. The bench was composed of Lord Chancellor Buck-master and Lords Haldane, Shaw, Atkinson and Parmoor. The Lord Chancellor laid stress upon the point as to whether the Ontario law was ultra vires. Lord Haldane expressed the opinion that the appellants, by heir defiance of the law had put themselves in danger of forfeiting the rights and privileges which they claimed were disregarded.

Sir John Simon, appearing with Senator Belcourt for the appellants, the board of trustees of the Catholic schools of Ottawa, dis not dissect the evidence, but confined himself to the oint as to whether the British North America Act granted rights and pririliges, now contravened, to a cer tain section of the community, which included the appellants. He contended that section 93 extended to the schools, and not merely to relig-

ous instruction. Senator Belcourt traversed the evidence to some extent and pleaded that regulation 17 was ultra vires. On the respondents' side, W. N Tilley, K. C., appeared for the tawa Separate schools, Sir Robert Finlay for the Ontario Government, and Malcolm McNaughton for the Quebec Bank and the city of Ottawa.



note the Economist says: "It will be seen that a good deal of feeling has been evinced, and that great care and discrimination are required in order not only to meet the susceptibilities of friendly neutrals, but also to avoid the establishment of precedents which, under different circumstances, we should not tolerate ourselves as neutrals in a future naval war. Supposing, for example, there were a war between Spain and Sweden, and the belligerents claimd the right to intercept mails beween London and Paris or London and New York, and to open all private letters, would that pass? summing up of the Note is very strong. It declares that the rights of neutrals are as sacred as the rights of belligerents, and must be as strictly observed, and concludes: Only a radical change in the present British and French policy, restoring to the United States its full rights as a neutral Power, will satisfy this government.' Fortunately we have an arbitration treaty with the United tates, which Germany has not."

LEFT 'FRISCO FIVE MONTHS AGO.

London, July 18 .- (Corespondence f the Associated Press) -The little 23-ton yacht "Mana" has arrived safely in an English port after a voyage of a hundred thousand miles. Beonging to Mr.and Mrs. Scoresby Routledge, the vessel left England over two years ago on a scientific mission to Easter Island, in the South

The last stage of the little vessel's oyage was from San Francisco which she left five months ago. Altogther there were eleven persons on board, including two men from Pitcairn Island. Mr. Routledge had some interesting details of the voyage.
"After leaving San Francisco," he

said, "we came down the Mexican coast. Two hundred miles from land we came upon three islands marked as uninhabited, and I recided to land to try to get some meat. But our landing was delayed as the mouth of the cove was occupied by two whales who were feeding and who refused to move until the following day. landing we found a rough shanty, tosether with a derelict boat alongside a rough cross, evidently marking a grave. 

WEST LAND REGULATIONS.
THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion iand in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within alne miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader is good standing may pre-empt a quarter-ection alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each ef

stead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per
acre. Duties—Must reside six months in
each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and
erect a house worth \$300.
