Hantsport.

Besides these enterprises, which keep employed quite a large number of men, other industries are in operation and about being begun. The block mill of Mr. Mark Hathorn is doing a thriving business and employs a number of men.

Hantsport has pretty streets, handsome residences, comfortable churches, tasteful public grounds, and shows thrift and prosperity in all directions.

The people of Hantsport are kind hearted and hospitable and appear to have a big faith in the future of their town.

Dalhousie.

Dalhousie is a small, sparsely inhabited settlement in the south west of King's county. The immense granite boulders, which protrude from the soil in all directions, render the cultivation of the soil difficult.

The people here enjoy, to the fullest extent, social, tea meetings, &c. On the 26th ult. was held one of the former, which attracted from Berwick and other parts of the valley enough young men and some older ones to make a merry time.

As might be expected, it is difficult to make good roads in this granite country; but by the assistance of the Municipal Council and the Government, good roads are being found throughout the settlement.
