**WHOLESALE BRIBERY.**  
In New Brunswick the constituents were bribed by  
detail when they could not be sufficiently frightened by  
the London Emancipator to vote for Confederation.

In Prince Edward Island a most audacious attempt is  
now made to bribe the whole constituency at once.

Mr. P. Pope, the leader of the well-understood  
Island, avowedly in the name of the Government of the  
Island, at the time our delegates went. We thought his  
conduct somewhat suspicious at the time, and feared that  
the delegates of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, at  
the feelings of the people of the Island and the state  
of parties in their Assembly would permit. We are  
sorry to find that our suspicions are now fully confirmed,  
and that Mr. Pope, contrary to the well-understood  
wishes of nine-tenths of the people, went home for the  
purpose of devising a new plan to induce the Island to  
accept of independence and liberty.

He has brought a new proposition to which so far, only  
the delegates of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick have  
parties. The Islander, an organ of the Prince Edward  
Island Government, announces that—

"The Delegates sent representing Nova Scotia and  
New Brunswick, at the Colonial office, recently took into  
consideration the position of Prince Edward Island, and  
regarding the proposed Confederation of the British North  
American Colonies; and with a view of doing away with  
the objection heretofore entertained by the Island against  
Confederation, they unanimously resolved to advocate  
the proposition, that the Confederation should, in addition  
to the terms offered by the Quebec Report, be modified  
in the following manner:—

"The resolution of the Nova Scotia and New Brun-  
swick Delegates was handed to the Earl of Carleton, and  
by his Lordship transmitted to the Governor General.  
A copy of the resolution was also sent by the Hon. the  
Colonial Secretary to the Lieutenant Governor of this Is-  
land, and by His Excellency laid before the Executive  
Council on Tuesday last.
