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Protecting Our Fisheries.

Mr Robert Orr, our Fishery Commissioner has just returned from an upriver trip in the fishery service. He thus informs a STAR reporter:

"I started for Woodstock on Friday by rail, taking with me a man and a boat. Having reached Woodstock we started for Bel River, where my district commences. The object of my visit here was to see if parties were 'illegally fishing' by which fishing I mean the setting of nets in such portions of the river as would interfere with the passage of salmon, up and down, and fishing on Sundays. I found nothing wrong here; but was told the salmon was very scarce. Saturday I was joined by Warden Brown, a faithful and diligent officer. He came down with me to Mackinac, where we reached Saturday evening. We were on the island it was about 8 o'clock. We came upon a net which we seized. The law provides that no net shall be out between the hours of 6 p m Saturdays, and 6 a m on Mondays. The owner, Mr Long, overtook us and said he thought he could keep the net out till 8 o'clock. At the island we found three others which belonged to H. Strang. We also seized these. Below the island we found another which we also seized. All the parties pleaded ignorance of the law, but ignorance is no justification. We came from this down to Spring Hill, and though we caught no one, I am sure there is a good deal of illegal fishing carried on. There are so many islands down along here, that it would take half a dozen men to watch each place properly. At the Grand Pass they set nets which are like sheep-booms to turn the salmon into their nets. I saw the pickets, but the poachers were on the alert, and had their nets up."

The Lords of the Admiralty have issued a circular which sets to rest all questions with regard to the cat in the future. They have decided that flogging in the navy shall be abolished, and have issued instructions to all flag officers and captains that seamen or marines who may be tried by court martial for an offence punishable with the lash, are to be subjected to another form of punishment.

LONDON, July 20. A Berlin despatch says an interchange of views is proceeding between the Powers in regard to the possibility of bringing pressure to bear on the Porto. No definite proposals have yet been made, nor has anything been arranged in regard to a naval demonstration by the fleets of the six Powers.

The Afghan Revolt.

LONDON, July 20. A despatch from Candahar via Kabul dated 19th, states that as Wali Sher Ali, who commands a detachment of Afghan allies of the British army, had ordered his forces to retire from Camp Kadank towards Girish, the movement for the purpose of supporting Abdur Raman Khan if necessary, the infantry deserted in a body with their arms and ammunition. With them Mr. Wali's cavalry and officers were not disaffected, and remained faithful. The chests containing his treasury were saved and he has since arrived at Colonel St James' Camp. The desertion of the infantry was quite unexpected, and it is feared it is a sign of spreading opposition to the pretensions of Abdur Raman under English patronage.

A later despatch gives the sequel of this very extraordinary affair. General Burrows crossed the River Helmitz with a force of light cavalry, and pursued the deserters. They were routed and dispersed and some 200 of them killed. General Burrows' men are now recovering the guns and baggage which fell off by the deserters, and all will be saved. The whole of Sher Ali's officers remained faithful to him and the revolt was confined wholly to the men in the ranks.

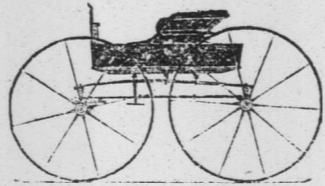
