

The effect of other concurrent rate reductions would be "too serious to contemplate" the C. P. R is prepared, however, said its Presi-

All of which is a further blow to the ambi ions of western Progressives. Melon-Growing in the Okanagan

They are grown on the usual "hill" system 5 x 5 ft. apart and weil-rotted mixed far m yard manure is applied in the spring. Great care has to be localities that have acquired a taste taken when irrigating the melons as they won't stand being chilled.

The grewer's "long suit" is saving his own seed and he has bred distinct strains of peppers, cucumbers and melons. The "Hoodoo" canteloupe is improving every year.

The seed is sown under glass in mid-Asril and is transplanted twice before being set out in the field between the 5th and 10th ef June. It is then ready to fruit at the end of August.

Egg-plants and peppers are profitable, too, in a small way, and about ¼ acre of the first and ½ acre of the latter is grown and shipped regularly to certain stores in market.—H. G. W.

A Wide-Spread War Memorial



In memory of the war-time efforts for King and Country, of eleven thousand C.P.B. employees and more particularly of 1,115 men who gave their lives for the cause for which the British people stood, the Canadian Pacific Railway has erected at Montreal, Winnipeg, and Vancouver a striking bronze memorial group, depicting in larger than life size an Angel of Victory bearing the body of a Canadian soldier upward towards perfect peace. These statues were simultaneously unveiled on Friday. April 28th, His Excellency Lord Byng, the Governor General, officiating at the Montreal celebration.

At the same time was unveiled the bronze tablet illustrated above. Exact duplicates of this tablet were also unveiled at all important points on the C. P. B. system between the Atlantic and the Pacific, as well as at its American, European and As'atic offices. The tablets re about five feet in width, and were designed by Archibald Pearce of the C. P. B. Chief Engineer's Depa tment, Montreal. The vessel on the left represents H. M. S. "Lion," Admiral Beatty's Flagship at the battle of Vuland, and that on the right the Canadian Pacific Steamship "Empress of Russia," which was engaged through the war as a fast cruiser, and later as a transport. Beside her stands a standard C. P. B. locomotive and train as having just brought in battalions ready to embark for overseas service. The solders in the centre represents all arms of the service. The base of the statues bear the same legend as do the tablets.

Enlistments of C.P.B. employees totalled 11,340 men, of which 1,115 were killed or died of wounds, and 2,105 were wounded. A total of 7,573 were re-employed by the company on their return to Canada, following out the C.P.B. policy of re-instating every man who left; in as good a job as that which he had when he went taway, and a total of 13,112 other returned soldiers have also been taken on the company's service. 

MANY YOUNG SALMON TO BE DISTRIBUTED

Twenty-five million young salmon will be distributed in the salmon streams of the Maritime Provinces by the officials of the department of Marine and Fisheries, fish hatchery branch this spring, it was stated by S.J. Walker, inspector of hatcheries, who arrived in St. John on an inspection trip on Thursday.

He said excellent results were being obtained in sending the young fish out in the fingering stage, instead of sending out the spawn shortly after it was hatched, as formerly had been the

Mr. Walker also paid high tribute to Captain Daniel Grady, the superintendent of the salmon pond at the mouth of Little River who has held that position since the hatchery was first established there. Captain Grady and his crew are now preparing the pond for the advent of the adult salmon, which are expected to be soon making their annual pilgrimage to their spawning grounds in local waters.

Civil Strife Caused Separation of Noted Churchmen.

Missionary Centennial Recalls Affect tion Between Bishop McIlvaine and Bishop Polk, on Opposing Sides.

A striking memory of Civil war history is awakened in connection with the centenary of the Episcopal Missionary society, falling this year, which centers about two devout bishops of the church, Bishop McIlvaine of Ohio and Bishop Leonidas Polk of Tennessee, life-long friends, whose consciences made them 'enemies' when the war divided the country.

Bishop McIlvaine was the elder of the two and was chaplain at West Point when young Polk, scion of the family which gave a President to the United States, arrived at the academy bent on a military career. At the end of four years Polk was graduated into the army: but so marked was the influence that McIlvaine had exerted that, a few years later, the chaplain having in the meantime been elevated to the episcopacy, Polk resigned from the army and took clerical orders.

With the passage of the years it fell out that McIlvaine and Polk became identified as leaders in the move ment within the church which resulted in the dispatch of missionary bishops into the unsettled areas of the country, and brought about those triumphs which are being acclaimed now in the missionary centennial. Polk was made the first missionary bishop of Arkansas and later first bishop of Louisiana. Then came the war between the states, which arrayed father against son and brother against brother; and these two devout men of the church

The kind of soldier Bishop Polk was is related in the general orders issued by Gen. J. E. Johnston, com-manding the army of Tennessee on June 14, 1864, the day Polk fell. It

"Comrades: You are called to mourn your first captain, your oldest com-panion-in-arms. Lieut. Gen. Polk fell today at the outpost of his army—the army he raised and commanded, in all of whose trials he shared, to all of whose victories he contributed. In this distinguished leader we have lost the most courteous of gentlemen, the most gallant of soldiers. The Christian, patriot, soldier has neither lived nor died in vain. His example is he fore you; his mantle rests with you."

There is a striking picture, too, of this warrior-bishop contained in a let-ter he wrote to his wife less than a month before he fell.

"You will be interested," he wrote, 'in hearing that the first night of my arrival with the army I baptized Lieut. Gen. Hood. It was on the eve of an expected battle. The scene was a touching one—he, with one leg, leaning on his crutches, a veteran in the midst of his and my officers and I the officiating minister. His heart

was fully in it."

A few nights later he also baptized General Johnston.


