THE COURT OF APPEAL in Montreal on the 26th inst., judgment was given in the libel suit of Ledwain v. Toronto Mail. The decision of the lower court was confirmed, and \$10,000 damages awarded to the plaintiff.

The Canadian National Park, at Niagara Falls, was opened on the 21st. There were over 10,000 persons present. A NORTH STREVEY despatch of the 22nd inst. says: "A very sad accident occurred last Tuesday afternoon at Four o'clock harbor, whereby a young man named Joseph Hooper, of the above place, met his death by drowning, under very painful circumstances. He was coming to harbor under sail in a lobster boat, with a load of lobsters, when a small struck the boat, filling and sinking her immediately. John Macdonald, in company coming in, in another lobster boat, looked round, and seeing no sign of him and found some of the gear of the boat floating round. The boat was found and recovered the same evening, but the body was not found till Thursday morning owing to the quantity of help which had kept in under water. The deceased was 23 years of age and leaves a young wife and one child."
