

Schenectady, N.Y., July 5 .- A white man guiding a wheelbarrow contain ing a colored man through the downtown streets early last night precipi tated a riot here. It was in payment of a bet as to the result of the Jef fries-Johnson fight. Feeling ran high for several hours, and before it subsided ten negroes had been badly handled. Fully half a score sought refuge at police headquarters. In one case the fugitive was pursued to the very door. Police scurried hither and thither, but succeeded in arresting but few of the rioters. The most serious injury resulting from the disturbances was sustained by J. J. Hurley a saloon keeper. He was slashed across the face by an unknown negro

Militia Was Ordered Out.

Norfolk, Va., July 5 .- Many negroes are in the hospitals with broken heads and bruised bodies as the re sult of conflicts with three hundred sailors, who, following news of the fight at Reno, marched through the streets last night hunting for negroes. They beat one negro almost to death against the post office building. Practically every cell at police headquarters and the second precinct station is filled with negroes, sailors and young white citizens. Mr. Kiser, the chief of police. requested Major L. W. T. Waller, at the Navy Yard, to send assistance, and a detachment o marines and sailors, heavily armed was hurried to the city. The situation was under control before morn-

Chattanooga, Tenn., July .5 .- Clashes between blacks and whites were numerous last night, following the result of the Johnson and Jeffries fight. A negro was knocked down by a militia man and the police had to stop the riot following. Arrests followed, and the militiamen began forming for an attack on the negroes This was broken up by the police Half an hour later, on the same street, J. T. Bullen, private of the 3rd Mississippi Infantry, was seriously cut by a negro, who was saved from a mob by the police.

Columbus, Ohio, July 5 .- Rioting n which noses were broken and heads were cracked, marked a parade through the streets organized by hilarious negroes late last night. The trouble was caused chiefly by drunken whites, who sought to break up parade of the blacks. Washington, July 5 .- In a fight between two negroes and white men over the championship battle at Reno, Thomas Mundle, an enlisted man of the United States Marine Corps, had his throat cut and is at the Casualty Hospital in a serious condition. Another white man, who was found unconscious late at night in Pennsylvania avenue, after a free for all fight, was taken to the hospital, where it was discovered he had sustained concussion of the brain.
