

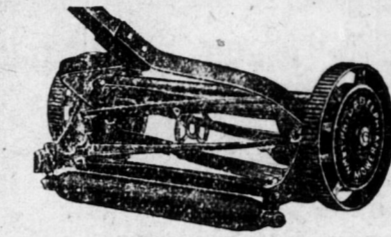

Printers' Strike.

About two weeks ago the St. John's Typographical Union presented to the proprietors of the daily newspapers a revised schedule of wages, which involved an all-round increase of wages to the extent of 20 per cent. The proprietors gave careful consideration to the new schedule, and made a reply setting forth how far their business would permit them to go. They were willing to accede to the fixing of a minimum wage and also to pay the men according to the value of their services, but they were not in a position to agree to the schedule presented, which in effect amounted to a demand for an all-round increase of 20 per cent. This reply proved unsatisfactory to the Union and they sent back an ultimatum, which was rejected and has been followed by a strike this morning.

The result will be that the publication of news may be somewhat curtailed and late advertising may not be handled very promptly. Our advertising patrons can facilitate the publication of their advertisements by sending them into the office as early in the day as they possibly can.

Yesterday morning the pastor of the Congregational Church, Rev. J. Thackeray, gave notice of his intention to resign his charge and he asked to be relieved of his duties as soon after August 1st as might be in accordance with the interests of the church. It is a somewhat singular coincidence that the three clergymen

who were in the forefront of the fight for Local Option in the city will have left our shores in a short time. Two have already gone. Rev. J. Bell left the Cathedral parish some months ago and is now engaged in temperance work in England. The Rev. Charles Hackett left Newfoundland last Tuesday for Hamilton, Ontario, and now the Rev. Jos. Thackeray is going. Another ardent total prohibitioner, Lieut.-Col. Rees, of the Salvation Army, also left in the winter to take up work in Canada.

The May Myree's Loss.

Capt. Alex. Carter and the 5 men of a crew of the wrecked schooner May Myree arrived here to-day by the Portia. She left Louisburg on June 27th coal laden for Point Verte, White Bay, and on the 28th a S. W. wind which had been blowing increased to a hurricane with dense fog. They heard Powell's Head whistle, but took it to be Cape Race, as the captain had run his log a distance which should give him that promontory. Shortly after the whistle sounded the vessel stranded. It still became densely foggy, they did not see any land for some time and were ashore on the west side of Cape Mutton. A big sea ran and the men left her in their boat and narrowly escaped being swamped. Had the accident occurred further out the bay not a man would have been saved, as the ship would be in amongst the breakers. The men lost most of their clothing and effects and Capt. Carter lost all his nautical instruments. The vessel is a total wreck. The hull was insured for \$3,000 and the cargo was uninsured.

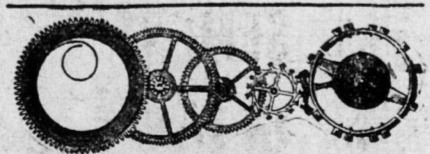

ROME, June 30.
 Another serious battle is reported from Tripoli. On Friday a whole division attacked the heights and vicinity, where masses of Arabs and Turks, who had escaped the previous day, were entrenched and reinforced by native contingents. The Italian guns aided the attacking party, and three warships bombarded the positions. Then two columns advanced for the assault, and routed the enemy with bayonet charges. The Turks left 200 dead and many wounded. The Italians captured arms, ammunition and cattle. Italian losses, 19 dead and 75 wounded. In the previous engagement, they lost 24 killed.

WINNIPEG, June 30.
 A storm swept over Central Saskatchewan this afternoon, the centre being Regina, where many buildings were unroofed. An unconfirmed report from Regina says 200 killed, and many buildings demolished. Relief gangs are taking the dead from the debris.

NEW ORLEANS, June 30.
 Two thousand flood refugees, made homeless by the Hymettia crevasse waters, were housed at the United States Naval Station here. Several hundred others are being cared for at nearby points.

BERLIN, June 29.
 Herr Schaadt was killed to-day while testing a military aeroplane.

House and Contents Destroyed.

By the Fogota we learn that the residence of E. King in Grate's Cove was completely destroyed by fire on Friday night with all its contents and \$90 in cash, which the owner had in a trunk. The house was enveloped in flames when the inmates awoke, and they barely escaped with their lives in their night clothes. The ship arrived there Saturday forenoon, had a short stay and the crew had only very meagre particulars. It is thought a defective chimney caused the accident. Home and contents were uninsured. Had a high wind been blowing the whole settlement might have been wiped out.

Fishery News by the Fogota.

The Fogota brings poor fishery news. Caplin have struck the shore but in small quantities, and last week at Twillingate, Fogo and other places nothing was taken worth while. A good deal of fish has been taken, but last week cod became abnormally scarce. At Fogo and Joe Batt's Arm line men got a barrel a day, but at Twillingate and Seldom they are doing nothing. When the main body of caplin strikes the shore good trapping is looked for. Dogfish are making their appearance everywhere.

WOMAN DESTITUTE.—People who reside in that section say that there is a widow named Vey residing on the Blackmarsh Road who is in very destitute circumstances. She lost her husband about two years ago, has one little boy, and her condition is one that should bring to her the attention of the charitably disposed.

Homestead Burnt Out.

Shortly after 8 o'clock this morning a fire broke out at Kenny's old homestead on Portugal Road and in little more than an hour nothing was left except the massive old type chimney stack. It is supposed that a spark from the chimney stack fell on the old dry shingles of the roof and set the fire going. The shingles were old and dry and in a short time the roof of the house was burning, like kindling wood. The families of Patrick Kenny and Thomas Kenny live in the house, but both men were away. Patrick works away and was not living at home at the time. Tom had gone out to town with his horse and long cart. Richard Kenny, who lives in a new house built close by, was also in town delivering milk to his customers. Mr. Bulger, who lives near was the first to see the blaze, and ran to the house and called attention to it. The women folks were in bed, and the children rushed out to gather help from the neighbours, who responded quickly. Mr. Bulger got on the roof and attempted to douse the fire with buckets of water, but found it impossible to check the blaze. Willing hands got out the furniture and saved a sleigh and some farming implements, but a new mowing machine could not be got out and was destroyed. It was soon seen that it was impossible to save the house and attention was directed to saving Richard Kenny's house to the south of it, and the stables and barns behind. The heat was intense. We by soaking blankets, &c., and placing them on the roof of the house and keep the house and barn damp by the aid of a bucket brigade, these two premises were saved. We understand that there was no insurance on the premises. Two firemen quickly came from town and took charge of saving these two buildings, and were successful in their efforts.

Latest From the Wreck.

The s.s. Wilhelmina, Capt. Eugo, went ashore at Strutten Cove, off Shag Rock, in Peter's River, at 1.20 Sunday morning. She was bound from Escommales, which is 150 miles from Quebec, to Yarmouth, England, with a heavy load of deals when she met disaster. No passengers were on board and the ship carried twenty-six persons all told. Twenty-three members of the crew were brought here by the Portia to-day, the captain, chief officer and chief engineer remaining on the scene of the wreck pending instructions from the owners as to salvage. To be brief, the second officer of the Wilhelmina met a Telegram reporter to-day and told that the ship left Quebec on Wednesday last and proceeded to Sydney for bunker coal. She left there at noon on Friday for her destination. The following day it became foggy and the ship came along at slow speed. Towards midnight the fog increased in density, so much so that the forecastle was not discernable from the bridge, and at the aforementioned hour she went upon the bottom of the cliff in Strutten Cove. The crew put out in lifeboats and reached St. Mary's, where they were cared for and taken on board the Portia. The Wilhelmina struck bow on, but when questioned as to the amount of damage wrought, our informant was unable to state, as he said it was too foggy to see anything. There was a heavy sea running and the ship pounded heavily, so that the possibilities are that she will become a total wreck. The work of salvage will likely begin to-day. The s.s. Portia made an unsuccessful attempt to tow the ship off the rocks. The Wilhelmina was 1,700 tons register, owned by Messrs. Stevens & Co., and was over 20 years old.

Fishermen in Peril.

BOATS DRIVEN OFF—ONE WITH TWO HANDS MISSING.

By the *Fogota* we learn that on Friday last there was great uneasiness amongst the residents of Musgrave Harbor, Cat Harbor, Greenspond and Ladle Cove. All the fishermen left in their boats with a moderate breeze in the early morning for the fishing grounds, but as the day advanced the wind increased blowing off shore, until in the early afternoon a hurricane raged. The *Ladle Cove* men left at 6 a.m., going a mile from their homes, and none had grub in their boats. When the *Fogota* sent her boat ashore with the mails the people, who were distracted, told what had occurred and asked the mail officer to request Capt. Barbour to go in search of the men. The captain

did so quickly and picked up George Wellard and his two sons under the Island. The ship ran up as close to the Island as possible, and the men in the boat cut their rhode and drifted down on the steamer, were thrown a line and towed home. The same was done with other boats which had not the steamer been about, would have been driven to sea and lost. The boats' crews from the other places mentioned above landed on various islands and got home in most cases late Friday night or early Saturday morning when the wind abated. One boat is missing. This was manned by Albert Osmond and Darius Meadus. Mr. Osmond's brother, Samuel, is steerage steward of the *Fogota*. His friends promised to wire him if the missing ones turned up, but as he had no message up to the time the *Fogota* left for the scene of the *Wilhelmina* wreck yesterday, he fears the men are gone.

VESSELS DOCKED.—The *Waterwitch* and three small schooners went in on the dry dock Saturday for repairs.
