

GERMANS ADMIT BRITISH OF.

FENSIVE. BERLIN, To-day. A German official statement says that in Flanders a second great battle has burst forth, the British infantry attacking German positions on an eleven mile front. The German general staff reports the cathedral at St. Quentin was set on fire by French shells, and that it has been ablaze ince yesterday evening.

HOLLAND PROTESTS.

THE HAGUE, To-day. An official announcement was made o-day that the Netherlands Minister at Berlin has been instructed to protest seriously to the German Foreign Office against the violation on August 7th of Dutch territorial waters by German airplanes and torpedo boats

ENCOURAGING TONNAGE OUT-LOOK.

LONDON, To-day. Lloyd George said that in the first six months of this year the new tonnage built was 484,000, while in the last six months, including purchases of new tonnage, it would be 1,424,000. The Premier also said that a considerable addition had been made in the programme of naval construction. With the co-operation of America, the Premier said, there would be sufficient tonnage for all of 1918 and if necessary 1919. Although the tonnage had decreased during the last year, he added, more goods had been carried from overseas.

CANADIANS HOLD THEIR GAINS.

British Front in France and Belgium (By Associated Press)-Meanwhile the Canadians were holding strongly Hill 70 and all other positions which they wrested from the Germans about Lens. Yesterday, after having beaten off ten furious counter attacks in which the enemy suffered heavy casualties, the last German counter attack of the night occurred at half-past nine o'clock. This morning comparative quiet reigned in this sector.

THE GERMAN CLAIM,

LONDON, To-day,

The combined British and French attack over a front of more than 18 miles in Flanders, was shattered by the Teutons, according to an official communication issued last evening. Only local successes on the Yser Canal and in the vicinity of Langemarck were obtained by the Entente, who suffered heavy losses.

THE PREMIER ON THE SHIPPING SITUATION.

The unrestricted submarine campaign was begun in February and by April, the Premier said, England had lost 560,000 tons of shipping. In one month the German official figures, he added, claimed that England was losing between 450,000 and 500,000 nonthly. After allowing for new construction the figure of 560,000 tons for April was gross. In June the losses had fallen to 320,000 tons gross. This announcement was cheered loudly. In addition, the Premier said, he had taken steps for quickening ship-building, and he had ordered a good many ships abroad. In 1915 the new tonnage built was 688,000 tons; in 1916 it was 538,000 tons; for the first six months of this year it was 480,000. The tonnage acquired during the last six months would be 1,-420,000 of which 1,100,000 had been built in Britain. The total for the year would be 1,900,000 tons. The Premier declared that the net shipping losses were far from being what the Germans claimed. They were 250,000 tons monthly, and if the present improvement was maintained the loss for July and August will be 175,000 tons each. The figures showed that the Admiralty was meeting with considerable success. Lloyd George read a message from Field Marshal Haig about the fighting in Flanders and concluded, "This is the supreme hour for patience, for courage, for endurance, for hope, for unity . Let us go through this hour with a temper that will enable us to destroy the great military despotism. Let us go through this hour with the old temper of our race, so that next year we shall begin, and then the world will begin, to reap the fruits



Our Prisoners In Germany

Sir,-I notice in your Saturday's edition of the Evening Telegram a report of the meeting of St. John's Patriotic Association, which contains a letter received by His Excellency the Governor from A. D. Steel-Maitland, Esq., Chairman of the Newfoundland War Contingent Association,

the expenses incurred by the War Contingent Association for our prisoners of war, and makes a suggestion that the expense of the prisoners

should be borne by Newfoundland. There is also another suggestion that part of the men's pay should be used to defray some of the expense. Now, sir, against this I most emphatically protest. I have myself written to the War Contingent Association and others about sending to my son, who is unfortunately among the prisoners, and the answer to repeated letters both to London and St. John's is, that it is not allowed to send any, thing to the prisoners, as the Associ-

ation sends everything necessary. I should be only too glad to myself contribute towards my lad's maintenance, but to suggest taking their pay on any pretext whatever is, to my

mind, almost sacrilege. Have the boys not gone through enough without this insult? Does anyone suppose they easily surrendered? What name does the Nfld. Regiment bear in this war? Are there any of the prisoners who were unwounded when captured? I doubt it, sir. I do know that my boy has a bullet in his thigh, and it is likely to stay there. And then someone in "office" suggests taking a part of their !!

pay to save a few dollars. One way to help would be for every Patriotic Association throughout Newfoundland to follow Grand Falls' lead and send monetary help for the prisoners. When we sent our subscription to St. John's (without being asked) we were told it could not be used, but it seems now that someone was a little premature, and that considerably more than our \$250 would be welcome. Another way, and far more reasonable than taking the boys' pay, would be to bring into existence a 150 measure of compulsory military service, to compel the slackers (and they are are many) to go and do their part. This would bring the Nfld. Regiment to full strength and keep it so, besides being fairer all round, and help ass to get the war over sooner, thus sav

At the same time there is no question that any money subscribed for the purpose will be gladly welcomed and used on behalf of the prisoners. The refusal of the Association had to do with parcels only, and it has very sound reason for refusing to send these. There is no foundation whatever for any idea that our prisoners are being neglected or treated badly by the authorities here or in England .- Ed.]


