

Although he was specifically warned as to the submarine danger off the South Coast of Ireland, he considered that the whole of the Channel up to Liverpool was equally dangerous. Ills and Clothes.

IMPROPER DRESS CAUSES ACHES AND PAINS.

Does your head ache? Do the pains in your back make you bend double? Are your feet always tired? You can trace the cause of these aches and pains in many cases to the improper dress, Miss Ina Cowles, associate professor of domestic art, Kansas State Agricultural college, says.

"One-piece dresses of medium weight which hang from the shoulders are best for the average women, especially the working woman, whether she works in the shop or in her own home," Miss Cowles said recently. "If the dress hangs from the shoulders the weight is more nearly equalized and there is not so much strain on any one part of the body.

"Headaches often may be traced to hats which are too tight for the head. If they are unequally trimmed, more weight is thrown on one side of the head than the other, causing a strain on one side of the neck. Hats and caps which are too tight, cause dandruff and eventually they will cause

"To much clothing and clothing which is too tight fitting will make your back ache. The clothing should never hinder the movings of the different parts of the body.

"Extremely thin soled shoes should not be worn for street wear by the woman who is seeking good health, for the feet will be damp and wet in cold weather. Since seaming machines were introduced here, the packing of salmon has interested many who hitherto found the salmon fishery unprofitable, and as canned salmon brings splendid returns, this industry should be stimulated. We learn that a few days ago, at the request of the Minister of Fisheries, a number of persons closely identified with the canning of salmon, cod and other fish products, came together to discuss methods of encouraging the tinning of all kinds of local food products. The next few years will very likely show such an increase in the quantity of canned products that this feature of the trade will become one of considerable importance."

This recognition of the importance of engaging in the tinned food industry is too valuable to be lost sight of, and it is hoped that every stimulus will be given prospective packers by the Government and the Board of Trade so that instead of the annual export returns of the future showing the insignificant number of twenty-eight cases of canned salmon as did those of 1919, the complement will be increased to as many, if not more, thousands. 

WAR SERVICE CHEVRONS MER-CANTILE MARINE.

Authority is hereby given for Chevrons to be worn by members of the Mercantile Marine and others who have served at sea or have been captured or interned during the War, in cordance with the following Regu lations:-

1. One Chevron may be worn in respect of sea-going service, or cap-tivity or internment in an enemy country, during the period from the 4th of August, 1914, to 31st December, 1914.

2. One Chevron may be worn in respect of each or any of the three calendar years 1915, 1916 and 1917, provided that at least three months of the year have been spent affoat in sea-going service, or in captivity in an enemy coun-

3. One Chevron may be worn in respect of the remainder of the war, when twelve months have been spent since 1st January, 1918, in sea-going service (with or with-out a period of captivity in an enemy country), provided that the period of twelve months has commenced before 11th November, 1918, when the armistice was

The Chevrons for 1914 are:—
(1) For Captains and Officers

(2) For men, red worsted. The Chevrons for the other years, 1915-1918: (1) For Captains and Officers gold.
(2) For men, blue worsted.

The Chevron shall be similar to those worn in the Royal Navy and shall be worn on the forearm of the right sleeve or uniform, searig or shore-rig. The sliver and red worsted chevrons respectively shall be worn below the others. No permission to wear the Chev-rons other than this general au-

thorization will be required. Chevrons will not be provided by the Government, but they should be purchased by those authorised to wear them. No unauthorised person may wear a Chevron.

NOTE.-Chevrons earned for Serice in the Mercantile Marine in ac-ordance with this authorization may be worn on Naval and Military uni form; when worn on Military uni-form the Chevrons should be of the Army pattern.



on the breath of laughter and speers. He was a humbug, a mountebank, fool, a rogue, a coarse-minded, self-seeking, and blasphemous character. "I saw pictures of him, and dis-liked him horribly. What a dreadful person—a Svengali of the religious. tubl I can see those pictures now. They represent a tall man in a passion, the face pale, the eyes blazing, the oily black hair disordered, the clenched right hand raised furiously above his head, the frogged coat flung open, the red jersey shining

was always a text about Hell Fire. "Later in life. I must have been about eight-and-twenty, I met this extraordinary person. He was a patriarch living in a little red-bricked hing of an opportunist. I went away wrote an article which gave a leased me. I felt I had got at the very soul of William Booth, Forgive me, I was eight-and-twenty, young for my years.

"Instead of being angry with the proofs of that article, William Booth took a fancy to their writer. I began to see him with a fair frequency. I became fond of him. I thought his ideas were ridiculous, but for the man himself it was impossible not to feel a warm affection. I never knew a fanatic so gentle and human.

"Then I saw him on two occasions when he spoke to me intimately of his spiritual passion. On the last of these occasions he was blind. He sat close to me. I could feel the strain of the old man's soul as he struggled to make me realize the agony of God for the salvation of the human race. That day I loved the man, but with no sense of his great-

"When it came to writing his life that is to say, reading his private diaries and his more sacred letters, I found myself in a very different frame of mind. There were days and days when he seemed to me the truest-hearted and the profoundestminded man of his century. I could not help feeling that he towered above such scratchers of the surface soil as Gladstone, and was infinitely nearer to the tremendous secret of Christ than Newman. I kept asking myself: Suppose every man had done what he demanded? For example, who will deny that this revivalist did not see the uttermost truth of politics when he said, 'You | cannot make a man clean by washing his shirt'?

"I began to see more clearly what was his aim. The dogmas which ruled him, and which once had bothered me, slipped out of sight. I saw that he was simply hungering and I saw that he had embraced religion because God had flashed into his soul the sublimest truth of human life, and because he knew that without a change of heart, without a new birth of the spirit, no man can be happy. There were moments when a Tolstoyan spirit of self-annihilation almost took possession of me. I had to fight for the discriminating and critical spirit of the biographer; and when I had got it I felt farther from the Kingdom of Heaven, and wonder-

fully insignificant. "As I look back on the works of this biography I am struck by two main characteristics of William Booth. First, the passion, the beauty, and the self-sacrifice of his love storyrevealing him as one of the tenderest men that ever loved and idealized a woman; and second, the courage of his heart from boyhood upwards.

"Those who read these two volumes will find that it is the story of as valiant a spirit as ever lived, perhaps the very bravest man of all time. 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



