Home Hints.

Washing Silk Stockings.

When washing silk stockings always use luke-warm water and a good soap lather. Never mangle them, and allow them to dry slowly, hanging them up by the toes. The majority of French women wash their silk stockings through after each time wearing. and many declare that the lives of their silk stockings is trebled by this

The Oil Duster. Have you ever used an oil duster for dusting polished beards, or polish-

ed wood of any description? Soak a clean duster in parafin and leave it for two or three hours before using to allow the superfluous oil to evaporate. This will be found an excellent method for dusting. Every smut will be taken up as it will adhere to the surface of the cloth and not merely fly into a fresh spot.

Care of Off Stoves.

For a smoky oil stove there are many little "dont's" which should be observed. To begin with, never fill the tank to the brim, also a short wick is best. If the wick is too long, it gathers all the dirt in the oil, thus causing it to smoke and hurn hadly. If the stove is in constant use, take the fittings apart occasionally and boil them in soda water, rinse well and dry thoroughly before refitting. A new wick should be steeped in vinegar and dried well before using when it will burn well and give a clear, steady

light. Makeshifts in the Kitchen. If there are few pennies to spend on furnishing the kitchen, any number of makeshifts will answer just as well

as the real article A beer bottle filled with cold water makes a much cooler rolling-pin than the wooden affair. There is no need to spend money on pastry cutters, when a cup or glass or any lid of a small tin will answer the purpose just as well. A small biscuit box, or other small tin box; enamelled white and bored with holes, is a splendid substitute for a sink drainer, and a small pot of enamel will freshen it up several time when shabby.

Sun's Rays Drive an Engine.

The sun's rays are used to generate power in a miniature engine which was the subject of a demonstration at the college of the city of New York by Mr. Bernard Grossman, a gradu-

A parabolic copper mirror focused the rays on a test tube of water, the heat causing steam, which in turn operated the tiny engine at a high

Mr. Grossman said that his invention could be used to provide light, heat, and power, or to operate motor

"Coal," added the inventor, "will, efore very long, be obsolete.

"Every community will have its plant, where the sun's rays will be caught and concentrated. The millions of unites of energy from the sun which we now waste, while we continue to drain the earth of its oil and coal, will be put to use.'

The plan has been laid before several engineering experts, and an atempt to utilize it on a large scale

New Remedy for Rheumatism.

Medical School Doctors Report Sur-

New York, June 23.—No more pain and no more cripples because of rheumatism is a possibility of the future, judging from the results obtained in the last four years from an entirely new method of treatment of the disease at the clinic of New York University medical school. This treatment consists of serum injections administered twice a week.


More than 5,000 cases have been handled with 80 per cent. improved to a point just this side of what can be termed a positive cure, according to a statement from the school today. Many of the patients, however, have reached the point of calling it a cure because they no longer suffer pain and the conditions which hindered or prevented their movements have entirely disappeared.

The serum used is a graduated series of streptococcus viridans which the doctors in the clinic acknowledge to be the underlying cause of rheumatism. A small amount of the serum is used at the beginning and gradually built up to a comparatively huge dose. At least 20 treatments are administered and the immediate results are astonishing in some cases. One man who was brought to the clinic two weeks ago could not walk a step and recently he hopped off the floor with both feet. The improvement followed four doses of the

The doctors in charge of the clinic regard his reaction as an unusually quick one and due to his particularly body acceptance of the serum. Other patients show an equally great improvement, but after a longer period of treatment.

House-Fly Does Wonderful Feats.

BEATS THE BUSY BEE IN WING MOVEMENTS.

When a man walks four miles in an hour, he takes about 1,760 paces in fifteen minutes, or nearly a hundred and twenty a minute.

If this walk were quickened to a run, a thousand paces would be taken in five minutes. Sprinting, the rate might be raised to nearly three hundred paces a minute.

But if a human being could move his legs as fast as the ordinary housefly moves his wings, the pace would rise from three hundred paces per minute to 19,000, and the ground would simply be dashed over! Supposing that you stride a yard in walking, you would cover 19,000 yards, or more than eleven miles, in a minute.

If we had the quickness of muscular movement possessed by the fly we would indeed be wonderful athletes. This insect is able to move its wings at the rate of three hundred and thirty beats to the second. He is busier in wing-beat than the bee, for the latter has a wing-beat of only one hundred and ninety to the second.—Tit-Bits.

Evidence of Buccaneers Days Unearthed.

BIEDS, SEALS AND REPTILES

NEW YORK, June 28-The pedition to the Galapagos Islands, headed by Prof. Wm. Beebe, curator of the New York Zoological society, has returned with a wealth of ma-

The yacht Norms which carried the expedition brought many rare specimens of animal life, including a giant tortoise of the species which attains a weight of 400 pounds and lives for hundreds of years. These tortoises are practically extinct. The cargo also will include giant land and marine lizards which are peculiar to the Galapagos, and live flightless cormorants and penguins which heretofore have only been found in Arctic

The expedition also found evidence that buccaneers had landed on these remote islands generations ago, for remote islands generations ago, for the members found numberless wild dogs, wild hogs, wild cattle, wild cats and wild goats. The zoological life, however, still belongs to the age of reptiles. The expedition found the birds, seals and reptiles tame. Apparently they considered man just another species of animal life and showed no fear whatever.

The Galapagos Islands are of volcanic origin and are about 600 miles west of the coast of Ecuador. They extend about 200 miles, comprising fifteen islands directly under the Equator. The climate on the south coast is tempered by a cold current from the Antarctic Sea which causes the water on this side of the mountain a temperature of about 60 degrees, while on the north side the temperature of the water is 80 de-

Only one of the islands is inhabited, and the rest show practically no influence of man and are still in their

Hints for Housewives.

To clean rusty knives, drop them into thick sour milk and let remain overnight. In the morning they can be cleaned very easily.

The secret of removing a grease spot from silk, without any ring or shadow remaining, is to rub French chalk on the wrong side of the goods, Put away for a few hours, then brush off the chalk and apply it again on the back of the spot if necessary. The powder absorbs the grease and leaves the surface of the fabric as good as

When you wish to mend a slightly worn table-cloth, use an embroidery hoop. In this way it can be nicely darned by using threads drawn from the linen itself.

To mend hot-water bottles, clean the torn place with gasoline. Place a piece of vulcanizing rubber over the hole with glue on it. Then put a hot iron on the rubber and let remain overnight. This will make your bottle like new.

Never pick up tiny pieces of glass with the fingers. Wet a woollen cloth and pat it over the glass particles which will then cling to the cloth. Burn the cloth.

When making lemon pies, let the filling get cool before putting in the pastry shell and you will find that it will not run as it does when it is put

To loosen rusty screws, hold a redhot poker on the head of the screw for two of three minutes. It can then be easily removed with a screw-





North Sydney, June 28 .- L. W. Parsons, vice president of the French Candian Company for Fish and Cold orage, was a passenger on the S.S. ro Patria when she sailed for St. erre vesterday at noon.

The company which Mr. Parsons reesents has taken over the gigantic old storage plant erected at St. Pierduring the war by the Turner Conuction Company of New York for French Government. They purpose use it to store fresh fish caught by thirty five or forty French trawlers shich operate on the fishing banks on his side of the Atlantic for about ten onths of the year. All the fish now aught is salted and shipped to France salt from St. Pierre where the trawlers and their fares. The new company will take the fish from the boats fresh, tore it in the cold storage plant until eady for shipment and then send it o France, fresh, in two specially conition to shipping fresh fish to France the company will also supply bait, ice and water to all vessels desiring it. They will start freezing squid and her ring immediately. It is also possible that a canning plant may be opened to repare the large quantities of caplin hat are landed annually at St. Pierre or the market.

The plant which cost three million

ollars when it was built has never een operated except for the twenty ay trial required in the builder's conact. It is a concrete structure of six toreys and there are concrete docks at form part of it that have a low de depth of twenty-eight feet. It is said to have a capacity of two million ons of fish a year. During the war the rench Government planned a great old storage system to consist of three nits, one at Bologne, one at St. Nazaire and one at St. Pierre to be used whelp the food situation in France by ransporting large quantities of fresh fish from St. Pierre to the plants at logne and St. Nazaire and to be disited from there to the people of country. The plant at St. Pierre not completed until shortly after end of the war and the plan was er put into operation. Cold Storengineers and experts who have aspected the plant pronounce it as being as well equipped as any in the world. A cold storage engineer is now St. Pierre working out details for operation, Mr. Parsons will be genral manager of the plant. He states hat refrigerating engineers and fish experts have been engaged and they expect to have the plant in operation thirty days. It is in excellent condiion at present and it could be put in peration in twenty four hours if necssary. The company has a five year ease of the plant.

The Company has its head office in aris and while it was formed primarto operate in conjunction with the rench trawlers in supplying France with fish, it will also cater to the fishng interests of both Canada and the nited States.

Mr. Parsons was formerly connectwith the Anderson Company of Canda which disposed of a fleet of trawers in this country for the British adniralty. Later he was connected with he Anderson Overseas Corporation of rance.—Sydney Post.


