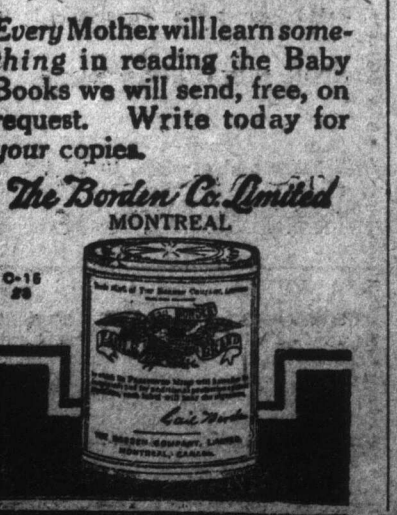

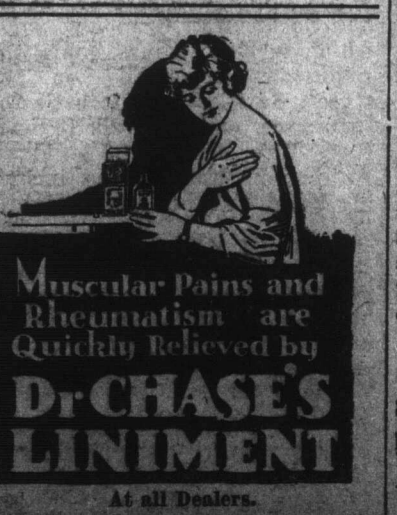

Quiet Prevails at Sydney

But Troops Still Pouring in—40,000 London Dock Workers on Strike—"Free State is Now Established Definitely," Says Governor Healey.

IRELAND TRANQUIL

LONDON, July 5. "Ireland to-day is as tranquil as Great Britain," said Timothy Healey, Governor-General of the Irish Free State, in an interview with the Daily Express prior to his return to Ireland last evening, after conversation with the Imperial authorities over Irish affairs. "The Free State is now established definitely, despite the internal assaults that have been made since the Governor-General said. He added that no peace had been established the Government was preoccupied with how to terminate the situation in which to its sorrow it found itself, still holding ten thousand Irishmen prisoners. The Government's purpose, Mr. Healey said, was to release these prisoners as rapidly as possible without exposing the public to a recurrence of disorder and they were now being freed at the rate of three hundred weekly.

LONDON DOCK WORKERS STRIKE

LONDON, July 4. An official dock strike, involving nearly 40,000 men, is causing considerable inconvenience, especially in handling food supplies of a perishable nature. Reinforcements pouring into Sydney. Sydney, July 5. Reinforcements for military guards were on duty in Cape Breton strike area on their way this afternoon by special trains from points as far west as Winnipeg, and recruiting for Provincial Police units is progressing in Halifax and other places, while unofficial reports emanated from Halifax to-day that the Militia could be mobilized if available, permanent forces proved incapable of coping with the situation in Cape Breton. Quiet has reigned among the ten thousand miners and steel workers during the past twenty-four hours and military occupation of the trouble centres is proceeding. Brigadier General Thacker, O.C. military district, No. 6, arrived in Sydney this morning inspecting operations of troops and will probably remain to personally supervise their activities in Cape Breton.

ALL QUIET AT SYDNEY

SYDNEY, July 5. (By Canadian Press Staff Correspondent)—Throughout to-day and until a late hour to-night the Cape Breton strike area was so quiet one might almost hear the proverbial pin drop. Steel helmeted soldiers guarded the property of the British Empire Steel Corporation at Sydney and mounted policemen roamed about the streets in the vicinity of the plant, but the residents of the affected district kept indoors for the most part and no outward incident developed. To-night the band of H.M.S. Wistaria, anchored off the Royal Cape Breton Yacht Club, played gaily to the evident enjoyment of hundreds lining the shore. Inspection of the colliery districts this afternoon revealed like conditions to those prevailing in Sydney. At Glace Bay a baseball match drew a slim attendance. The miners for the most part stayed about their own doorsteps and the streets were practically deserted. Only at Dominion No. 2, the heart of the colliery district, supplying as it does the electrical energy required to operate the ventilating systems of the nine other mines, was there evidence of the struggle. Here the plant is being picketed by 250 strikers, working in four relays on six-hour shifts. Earlier in the present strike coal cars were dumped on instructions of the pickets but to-day there was no interference of this nature and food supplies for officials operating the machinery required to protect the property, were permitted to enter.

GERMAN GOVERNMENT TO DEPRECATE SABOTAGE

BERLIN, July 5. The German Government is expected to issue forthwith a statement deprecating sabotage and all forms of active resistance in the Franco-Belgian occupied territory.

DANGEROUS DERELICT DESTROYED

HALIFAX, July 5. A radio message to the agent for the Marine and Fisheries Department here, reported this afternoon via Cape Race, reports the sinking by an ice patrol ship of a dangerous derelict

bearing distinctly the name of Lunenburg as the halting port, but with the schooner's name almost effaced; but it was thought to be "F. W. Lunenburg." The message also reported finding an unidentified man's body on the surface after the hull had gone down. No record has been discovered in Lunenburg of among the Marine Insurance offices of a schooner of the name given.

TRAIN WRECK IN ENGLAND

Huddersfield, Eng., July 5. Six persons were killed, including two railway guards, and seven injured in a train wreck at Disgle, near here, to-day.

LEEDS, July 5.

The Manchester express, drawn by two engines, collided with an engine outside a tunnel while riding at full speed. The crash piled up a mass of wreckage from which doctors and nurses and ambulance men recovered the bodies of six dead and seven badly injured.

MURDERERS OF JAMES WILL BE TRIED

OTTAWA, July 5. The ship Arctic is leaving again for the Arctic Circle on July 8, from Quebec. J. G. Craig, an engineer of the International Boundary Commission, is in charge of the expedition formed for the purpose of carrying supplies to two Royal Canadian Mounted Police posts and also to establish a new post at the north end of Ellesmere Island, at Cape Sabine. A party of surveyors, naturalists and engineers are going for the purpose of investigating the natural resources of the Canadian far North. Capt. Bernier will again be in command of the ship. The Arctic will carry the machinery of Justice North. Among the passengers will be Judge L. A. Rivet, of Montreal, F. X. Biron, Crown Counsel, Leopold Toller, District Counsel, and other court officials and interpreters. They will proceed to Pond's Inlet to try a number of held there by the Royal Mounted Police on a charge of murdering Robert James, a native of Newfoundland, at Cape Crawford, Baffin Land, in 1920. About 40 people will go North on the Arctic.

Two in Council of Twelve

Interesting Facts in Connection With Sir Frederic Fraser's Golden Jubilee.

Sir Frederic Fraser, who recently celebrated his Golden Jubilee as Superintendent of the Halifax School for the Blind and who was honored with a complimentary address by Lieutenant-Governor Grant, Premier Armstrong and Chairman George S. Campbell, and received several presentations, has a most interesting family history, and has had the unique distinction of having had two grandfathers in the famous Council of Twelve.

Sir Frederic is the son of the late Dr. Benjamin DeWolf Fraser, who resided and practised his profession in Windsor, N.S., for over 50 years. His paternal grandfather was Hon. James Fraser, a member of the old "Council of Twelve", whose residence was at the corner of Bell's Lane and Water Street, Halifax. His maternal grandfather was Hon. Joseph Allison, who served in both branches of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, and who resided at "Brookside", M. Dwyer. His paternal great-grandfather was Alex. Fraser, who emigrated from Farnhill, Scotland, and was the first to establish the lumber industry on the Miramichi, near Newcastle, N.B. His maternal great-grandfather was Hon. C. R. Prescott, of Halifax and Cornwallis, also at one time a member of the "Council of Twelve."

The old Council of Twelve, who were the rulers of the Province in 1820, was composed of the following: Hon. Sampson Salter Blowers, President; Rt. Rev. Lord Robert, Bishop of Nova Scotia; Hon. Michael Wallace, Charles Hill, Richard J. Unisack, Charles Morris, T. N. Jeffrey, James Stewart, John Black, Braxton Halliburton, James Fraser, Hibbert Binney, Rupert D. George, Secretary. Sir Frederic came to Halifax as a young man 60 years ago, founded the School for the Blind with a half dozen pupils, and has made it the wonderful institution it is to-day. A. Milne Fraser, of Halifax, is a brother of Sir Frederic—Acadian Recorder.

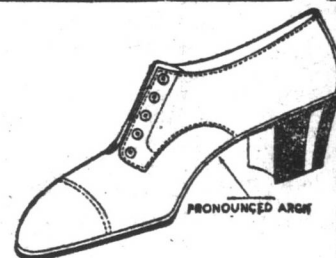

AT THE HOUSE.

Definite Charges Laid Against Hon. Dr. Campbell, Minister of Agriculture and Mines--Minister of Justice Says He Will do as He Likes.

The House was called at 3.15 p.m. when the following notices of question on Order Paper were read.
Mr. Hunt to ask Hon. the Minister of Justice (1) when it is expected that the Labrador Boundary question will be heard before the Privy Council; (2) what are the names of the English and Newfoundland barristers and solicitors at present engaged on behalf of the Colony; (3) what amounts have been paid to each up to the present time; (4) what amount has been paid to Sir P. T. McGrath for services rendered; (5) how it is intended that the sum of \$12,500.00 set forth in the estimates for 1923-24 will be expended.
Answer--(1) June next. I have with the past two weeks signed an agreement for the fitting and exchanging of the claim of each Dominion on order before December 31st, 1923.
(2) English Barristers--Sir John Simon, K.C., Mr. Barrington-Ward, K.C., Mr. W. T. Monckton; English Solicitors--The Attorney General, Sir Richard Squires, K.C.

What amount of money was allocated for the construction of the pier at Grand Bank; (b) a statement showing in detail amount expended; (c) what is proposed to be done with the balance, if any, remaining of the amount allocated.
The answer will be tabled when ready.
Mr. Hunt--To ask Hon. the Minister of Justice to lay on the Table of the House a statement showing what amounts have been paid since January 1st, 1922, under the head of Civil and Criminal Prosecutions, giving names of parties receiving same.
The answer will be tabled when ready.
Mr. Walsh--To ask Hon. the Minister of Justice to lay on the Table of the House a statement showing: (a) What public roads are in course of construction in any part of Newfoundland at the present time excluding any roads over which the Newfoundland Motor Association are exercising jurisdiction; (b) Is the work being done by contract; (c) who are the contractors; (d) were tenders asked for said contract; (e) how much per mile is being paid for any such road being built.
Answer--(a) Four miles of the Bonwood road from Grand Falls to Bishop's Falls; (b) Work done by contract; (c) Contractors are Goodwin Bros., of Grand Falls; (d) No tenders asked--a continuation of a former contract; (e) Seven thousand five hundred (\$7,500) per mile.
Mr. Higgins--To ask Hon. the Minister of Marine and Fisheries: (a)

amending the Consolidated Statutes re the auditing of public accounts. The Prime Minister replied that it was done to make provision for the appointment of Hon. Alex. Mow, late Editor of the Daily Advocate, to the position of Deputy Auditor General.
THE UNEMPLOYED QUESTION.
On motion to adjourn made by the Prime Minister, Sir M. P. Cashin pointed out the necessity of immediate action. He produced a letter signed by members of an organization who resented the treatment handed out to them by the Prime Minister when they called upon him to state their case and lay the situation before him. Mayor Cook said it was impossible for the Council to give further employment as the city funds would not permit it.
Mr. Higgins followed Sir Michael by suggesting that there is a great deal of work to be done along the railway, particularly in the vicinity of the city as outlined by the member for Carbonear.
Mr. Hunt endorsed all that had been said by his colleagues. He then made a short plea for the hundreds of men who of necessity must walk the streets day after day and return home at night to be greeted by hungry children, half clad, who all day long were hoping and praying the father had secured some work. He did not make a plea for those who wanted something for nothing; but of good citizens who, through no fault of their own had found themselves in this pitiful plight. He wanted his appeal to be accepted from a non-political standpoint. Private charity is not going to relieve the situation. Mr. Hunt's appeal was very impressive.
Mr. Fox pointed out the evidence upon all sides as shown in St. John's to-day, and supported the plea of the unemployed. These men, he said, do not want charity or paupers' dole, but employment that would be of value to themselves and country and agreed, that in considering same, that politics be forgotten.
DEFINITE CHARGE LAID AGAINST HON. DR. CAMPBELL, MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE.
Mr. Walsh, member for Placentia and St. Mary's said he was not satisfied with the answer given him by the Minister of Justice to his question which read as follows:--
To ask Hon. the Minister of Justice (a) if his attention has been drawn to a serious charge made in this House a few days ago against a Minister of the Crown; (b) does the Hon. Minister of Justice intend to take any action with regard to said charge, so as to vindicate the minister so charged if he is innocent, or to punish him if he is found guilty of using the public funds of the Colony to defray personal election expenses as charged by a member of this House.
The Attorney General replied, that no definite charge had been made.
The Railway Bill was then read a second time and other orders were deferred.
HON. MR. NEWS DEPUTY AUDITOR GENERAL.
In reply to Mr. Higgins' question the purpose of the Government in

whom, it is alleged, used public monies of the Colony to defray his personal election expenses, but in the event of the Minister of Justice wanting something more definite Mr. Walsh named Hon. Alexander Campbell, Minister of Agriculture and Mines, who had drawn cheques for amounts of \$51.00 and \$21.00 in favor of a driver named H. Bugden, which amounts were charged to Pitt Prop. Account. It was the first time he ever heard of people going around the West End of the city, buying pit props. Mr. Walsh now had the cheques in his possession to prove the charge.
PRIME MINISTER PRESSES MOTION FOR ADJOURNMENT.
At this stage of the proceedings Mr. Walsh asked the Speaker to summon the Minister of Justice to his seat in the House as he had absented himself. While Mr. Walsh was speaking the Premier sought to force the adjournment but was prevented by Mr. Higgins who gave notice of an amendment that the House do not adjourn until the Attorney General was called and heard the charges.
After some delay the Minister of Justice was sent for and he re-entered the Assembly. When he had taken his seat Mr. Walsh repeated the charge to which the Attorney General replied that now for the first time he had heard a definite charge against a Minister of the Crown. His position was that he could not take notice of every statement made in the House. The members made statements that if he were to take notice of them all he would do little else. The proper course for the member to pursue was to swear out a deposition in the regular way. He would then have it investigated by his department in due course.
QUIBLING TO SAVE AN ENQUIRY.
Sir M. P. Cashin who was the first to make public the charge two weeks ago, referred to previous happenings when suggestions, not charges, had been made against him some years back, and while he was out of town the Auditor General was put in his department to make certain enquiries about the bounty paid on the schooner "Lornina" by the present Prime Minister. He had demanded a stay when he returned to town but was told by the Attorney General of that day the enquiry had to proceed. This was done to him because he was not as pliable as they would like him to be. A far different procedure was taken now. It was the Attorney General's business. What are you going to do about it? asked Sir Michael. It is one of the most serious, if not the most serious charge ever made in the House against a Minister. He termed the Attorney General's answer as "hair splitting." If some poor boy had stolen a loaf of bread to satisfy his hunger a half dozen policemen would be sent after him and he would be jailed. Now a Minister of the Crown is charged with a serious offense and a hair splitting procedure is gone through to save an enquiry.
The Prime Minister ignored the charge made against the Hon. Dr. Campbell and spoke in defence of Sir Edward Morris.
Sir Michael Cashin continued to force the argument and complimented the Prime Minister upon his prowess as a stage actor. He knew the Premier would defend Lord Morris as he had a purpose in doing so. To sum up the proceedings the only satisfaction offered the Assembly was from the Attorney General who, in an excited moment, during the course of debate said "He would do as he liked and he was not the only one who was doing it." A statement which came as a bomb shell to the members of both sides of the House.
There was no further debate but now that a definite charge has been made, it will be interesting to see what action the Government will take.
The House adjourned until this afternoon.

The public accounts up to end of June were submitted to the members of the opposition yesterday and in the course of time some revelations as to the expenditure of public funds will be made known.

It is to be hoped the government will be requested to table the accounts up to June 30th. of this year together with the amounts listed under contingencies, which no doubt will prove very interesting to the taxpayers.

Readers will remember Hon. Mr. Coaker's trip to the West Indies which was thought to be of a private business nature; but according to the accounts rendered, the President of the P.F.U. drew from the Treasury only \$2,500.00 to pay his expenses.

Magistrate's Court.

There are fully 2,000 troops in the strike areas at present and it is quite evident that law and order has been restored.

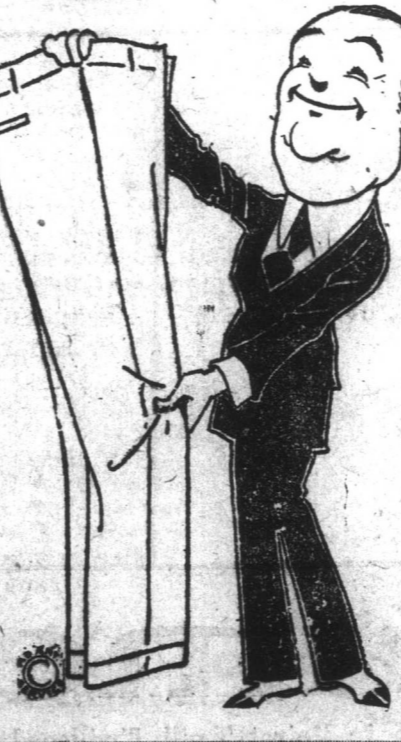

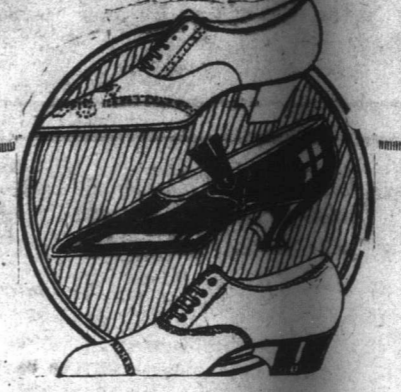

New Remedy for Rheumatism.

Medical School Doctors Report Surprising Success.

New York, June 23.—No more pain and no more cripples because of rheumatism is a possibility of the future, judging from the results obtained in the last four years from an entirely new method of treatment of the disease at the clinic of New York University medical school. This treatment consists of serum injections administered twice a week.

More than 5,000 cases have been handled with 80 per cent. improved to a point just this side of what can be termed a positive cure, according to a statement from the school today. Many of the patients, however, have reached the point of calling it a cure because they no longer suffer pain and the conditions which hindered or prevented their movements have entirely disappeared.

The serum used is a graduated series of streptococcus viridans which the doctors in the clinic acknowledge to be the underlying cause of rheumatism. A small amount of the serum is used at the beginning and gradually built up to a comparatively large dose. At least 20 treatments are administered and the immediate results are astonishing in some cases. One man who was brought to the clinic two weeks ago could not walk a step and recently he hopped off the floor with both feet. The improvement followed four doses of the serum.

The doctors in charge of the clinic regard his reaction as an unusually quick one and due to his particularly body acceptance of the serum. Other patients show an equally great improvement, but after a longer period of treatment.

Chronic sufferers from rheumatism or "multiple infection arthritis," as medical science calls the disease, have heretofore received various kinds of treatment, ranging from barking the affected part and many forms of massage, to the home remedy of rubbing with snake oil.

THE TOURIST SEASON.

The merchant princes pass the word, when such a jay's approaching: "Here comes another stranger bird—we'll give him some roasting!" And every thing he has to buy is priced so high he'll shiver, and wring his hands and long to die beneath his rusty flapper. All towns would find it worth their while, emerging from their blindness, to greet the tourist with a smile, and load him down with kindness. The stranger who's within our gates should not be cinched or beaten; let's feed him costly figs and dates, and bless him when he's eaten.

House-Fly Does Wonderful Feats.

BEATS THE BUSY BEE IN WING MOVEMENTS.

When a man walks four miles in an hour, he takes about 1,760 paces in fifteen minutes, or nearly a hundred and twenty a minute.

If this walk were quickened to a run, a thousand paces would be taken in five minutes. Sprinting, the rate might be raised to nearly three hundred paces a minute.

But if a human being could move his legs as fast as the ordinary house-fly moves his wings, the pace would rise from three hundred paces per minute to 19,000, and the ground would simply be dashed over! Supposing that you stride a yard in walking, you would cover 19,000 yards, or more than eleven miles, in a minute.

If we had the quickness of muscular movement possessed by the fly we would indeed be wonderful athletes. This insect is able to move its wings at the rate of three hundred and thirty beats to the second. He is busier in wing-beat than the bee, for the latter has a wing-beat of only one hundred and ninety to the second.—Tit-Bits.

Evidence of Buccaneers Days Unearthed.

BIRDS, SEALS AND REPTILES TAME.

NEW YORK, June 28.—The expedition to the Galapagos Islands, headed by Prof. Wm. Beebe, curator of the New York Zoological society, has returned with a wealth of material.

The yacht Norma which carried the expedition brought many rare specimens of animal life, including a giant tortoise of the species which attains a weight of 400 pounds and lives for hundreds of years. These tortoises are practically extinct. The cargo also will include giant land and marine lizards which are peculiar to the Galapagos, and live flightless cormorants and penguins which heretofore have only been found in Arctic regions.

The expedition also found evidence that buccaneers had landed on these remote islands generations ago, for the members found numerous wild dogs, wild hogs, wild cattle, wild cats and wild goats. The zoological life, however, still belongs to the age of reptiles. The expedition found the birds, seals and reptiles tame. Apparently they considered man just another species of animal life and showed no fear whatever.

The Galapagos Islands are of volcanic origin and are about 600 miles west of the coast of Ecuador. They extend about 200 miles, comprising fifteen islands directly under the Equator. The climate on the south coast is tempered by a cold current from the Antarctic Sea which causes the water on this side of the mountain a temperature of about 60 degrees, while on the north side the temperature of the water is 80 degrees.

Only one of the islands is inhabited, and the rest show practically no influence of man and are still in their natural state.

Hints for Housewives.

To clean rusty knives, drop them into thick sour milk and let remain overnight. In the morning they can be cleaned very easily.

The secret of removing a grease spot from silk, without any ring or shadow remaining, is to rub French chalk on the wrong side of the goods. Put away for a few hours, then brush off the chalk and apply it again on the back of the spot if necessary. The powder absorbs the grease and leaves the surface of the fabric as good as new.

When you wish to mend a slightly worn table-cloth, use an embroidery hoop. In this way it can be nicely darned by using threads drawn from the linen itself.

To mend hot-water bottles, clean the torn place with gasoline. Place a piece of vulcanizing rubber over the hole with glue on it. Then put a hot iron on the rubber and let remain overnight. This will make your bottle like new.

Never pick up tiny pieces of glass with the fingers. Wet a woollen cloth and pat it over the glass particles which will then cling to the cloth. Burn the cloth.

When making lemon pies, let the filling get cool before putting in the pastry shell and you will find that it will not run as it does when it is put in hot.

To loosen rusty screws, hold a red-hot poker on the head of the screw for two or three minutes. It can then be easily removed with a screw-driver.

When a castor becomes loose fill the hole with putty, then insert the stem of the castor in the soft putty. When the putty becomes hard it will hold firmly.

The common nut-cracker makes a splendid household wrench to remove the tops from cans and bottles, with screw tops. Even glass stoppers will yield to it.

When hanging small curtains over floors and windows and you haven't any rod, use narrow elastic. It prevents sagging.

If you use an oil stove and should turn a burner too high that you cannot turn down again throw a handful of salt on the flame. It will go out at once.

To prevent a rocker from moving along on a carpet when rocking, paste a narrow strip of old velvet on each rocker.—From The Designer Magazine for July.

Britain's Wonder-Working

In four years Great Britain has reduced her foreign debt by more than 1,000,000,000, in spite of the addition of more than \$1,500,000,000 of indebtedness to her by other foreign countries which owe her almost \$5,000,000,000 more than the total debt which she owes abroad, principally to the United States. This credit should be due to the managers of British finance—and to the British taxpayer.—London Globe.

THE RIGHT TO BE HAPPY.

"Youth expects a perpetual banquet of happiness and at the first disillusionment charges the universe with falsehood and ingratitude."

Where do we get that idea that someone has promised that we should be happy? That it is our right to be happy and that if we aren't happy we have been somehow cheated.

What is happiness anyway? It doesn't bear thinking about too closely does it? It's like beauty. If you try hard to define it and understand it and analyze it you drive it away. "If you touch them they vanish."

Are You Happy?

Ask anyone if he is happy and he will have to stop and think. Ask him if he is perfectly happy and you will get a positive answer from one in a thousand.

Happiness is something you think the other person has. That other person who has none of your trying problems and annoyances, and at least as many of his own, only you do not know that.

"If we only wished to be happy," says a French philosopher, "this could be easily accomplished but we wish to be happier than other people, and this is always difficult for we believe others to be happier than they are."

Part of our unhappiness comes from this feeling that others are happier than we are and a great deal more from our sense of being cheated when we aren't happy.

To the Good.

If we didn't expect to be happy all the time then whatever happiness we did wring from life would be to the good.

But if we expect to be happy, all the time then every time that our happiness is interfered with we feel cheated and resentful, and often that resentment is harder to bear than the inconvenience or annoyance that caused it.

One of the greatest obstacles to happiness in marriage is the fact that both parties expect too much happiness.

They were born with that expectation of perpetual happiness, which the author I quoted above refers to. Of course they have had frequent disappointments and disillusion. But they have by no means given up the idea that as soon as certain temporary disabilities, such as lack of money, control of parents, etc. are done away with they are going to be perfectly happy.

And Along Comes Love.

And then along comes love, and Nature for her own purposes promises them that perfect happiness is now close at hand. A wedding is to usher it in and after that they are never to be unhappy again. What wonder that when they find themselves still liable to moments of intense unhappiness their resentment exceeds all previous resentments, and they are inclined to blame each other instead of life.

It seems like a depressing philosophy to urge people not to expect too much happiness. And yet how often the party we have planned and looked forward to proves a disappointment because of the intensity and height of our expectations. Whereas the little impromptu party from which we expect little brings us much pleasure.

"Life is full of sweet savor to those who do not expect what it cannot bring."

I cannot remember who it was said that but he, too, plainly believed that one can heighten one's enjoyment of life by controlling unreasonable expectations as well as by trying to control events.

The Costliest Film Ever Produced.

WILL BE SEEN IN THE CITY ON MONDAY.

The Rex Ingram production of "Turn to the Right," at the Nickel Theatre on Monday next, is the highest priced motion picture ever produced. Before any screening was attempted \$500,000 was paid for the screen rights.

The play, by Winchell Smith and John E. Hazenard, was produced on the stage by John Golden.

The picture production bill was made by Metro, and presented on the

screen by John Golden and Marcus Loew. In the transaction Mr. Golden retains a one-half interest.

When given at the Gaiety Theatre in New York a few seasons ago, "Turn to the Right" broke all records for box-office returns. It's run totaled 443 days. Mr. Golden sold one-half of his interest in the production to Marcus Loew for \$250,000, retaining a \$250,000 interest himself. Household Notes.

Parsnips, salsify, beets, potatoes and large carrots are delicious when sliced and fricasseed.

Canapes may be served in the library before dinner, or at the table before the cocktail course.

Oyster plant is extremely savory when boiled in salted water, drained, and served with white sauce.

A small blackboard eraser is handy for polishing the stove after each meal has been prepared.

If you wish your strawberry jelly to have an especially good flavor, purchase fruit that is not quite ripe.

For the Sunday night supper serve a cool, crisp salad with triangles of brown bread and egg lemonade. Chopped celery, thinly sliced, toasted almonds and balls of cream cheese make an ideal luncheon salad.

For either the fruit course at breakfast, or as a dessert, serve halves of grapefruit heaped with ripe cherries.

If you buy your breakfast bacon

sliced, use the kitchen shears, rather than a knife, for cutting off the rind.

Equal parts of cubed cooked chicken and cubed cucumbers mixed together and seasoned with French dressing are nice served in cucumber cups.

A small serving of red cabbage salad should accompany soft-shell crabs, as well as the inevitable tartare sauce.

When preparing iced tea, add the sugar while the tea is hot. The fla-

We notice this month the Chaplain on duty is the Rev. E. J. R. Nicholls of St. Michael's Parish.

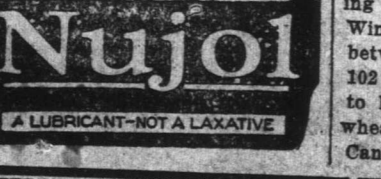

Our Weekly Market Report.

Codfish—The foreign markets show very little improvement. Consumption is fair but prices are no better. The exports this week were 17,208 qts. as follows:—

From Outports—By schr. Bryant from Union Export Co., Port Union, 1188 qts. to Barbados.

From St. John's—By schr. Humorist 4721 qts. to Alicante from the Monroe Export Co. By schr. Casarina 5143 qts. to Pernambuco from Monroe Export Co. By schr. E. D. Bailey to Alicante 2883 qts. from W. J. Moores and Nfld. Produce Co. By S.S. Silvia 3293 qts. to New York for transhipment to West Indies from Jas. Baird, Ltd., Geo. M. Barr, Bowring Bros., T. Hallett, Harvey & Co., Job Bros. & Co., A. E. Hickman Co., Ltd., Kennedy Co. and Monroe Export Co. Total 17,028 qts.

Common Cod Oil—The supply in sight is in adequate for the demand and we look for firm prices.

The Menhaden fishery in Chesapeake Bay where the principal substitute for Cod Oil for tanning purposes in the United States comes from has proved a failure.

It was reckoned that over 60 million of these fish were caught last year and less than 8 million this year.

As the season is now well advanced there is no likelihood of any good catches being made and therefore the supply from this source will not be equal to requirements.

We would not recommend our fishermen holding back their oil but we think they will get good prices for all they have right through the season.

Cod Liver Oil—The report published by Dr. Zilva is having a good effect, but it will take some time to convince the wholesale buyers that they must change their ideas of Norway oil being equal to the Nfd. oil.

They have been prejudiced in favor of Norway for some years and it may take a little while to overcome it, but we hear that some of the principal manufacturing chemists are now visiting Nfld. to investigate the facts published by Dr. Zilva for their own satisfaction.

We hear of enquiries from many sources and are not surprised to hear that some of our refiners have as usual notwithstanding the poor encouragement from all quarters.

Lobsters—More new stock arrived in town this week from Placentia Bay and other points on the South Coast. A great deal of what has been examined so far are of poor quality owing to the use of an inferior paper for lining instead of the regulation parchment. This inferior paper turns the fish in the cans to a rusty brown color. Some of the cans too are rusty. The suggestion which a leading lobster dealer asks us to make is that the Fisheries Department issue a pamphlet of instructions with the license to packers who could prevent many mistakes in packing. The fishery on the whole is so far poor and this is attributed to allowing fall fishing. No regular price has yet been fixed but buyers in Placentia Bay are giving \$24 per case. It is to be hoped that the Marine and Fisheries Dept. will bring lobsters up to the excellent standard that has been achieved in the case of Cod Liver Oil. Instructions to packers will do this. Some of the tins received this week were found to contain only 9 lbs. of fish instead of the legal weight of 16 lbs.

Wheat—Chicago July wheat declined to 101 1/2 this week and kept hovering between this figure and 103, while Winnipeg July quotation accelerated between 110 and 112, and September 102 to 103. All the indications point to lower flour the coming fall. The wheat crop is looking good so far in Canada and the States and a splendid

harvest is expected should pests and bad weather not come to spoil the ripening grain. The local price for leading brands holds at \$3.80 per barrel wholesale. Imports to St. John's this week were 2400 barrels. Total to date 121,400 barrels.

Sugar—The sugar market is firm at the recent advance. The consumption in the United States has increased greatly the past month, and lower prices are not now expected. Refiners are overwhelmed with orders and are unable to keep pace with the demand.

There is also a good demand from Great Britain and refiners have started in to bid for the crop of Cuban Raw Sugar in anticipation of a big trade. The local quotation is \$10.50 to \$10.75 per 100 lbs. for American Granulated. The imports to St. John's are now 33,000 cwt. against 37,000 last year.

Melasses—The schr. Jean Donald Duff arrived from Barbados to Daine Johnston & Co. this week with 12 hhdns., 75 herces and 100 barrels of molasses. The available stocks at the Island are running short and the price is keeping firm and steady. Stronger market is looked for later in the season. The local quotations are 90 cents per gallon for Fancy in the puncheon and 80 cents for Choice. The imports to date are about 5,500 puncheons, as against 4,000 last year.

Time—There is no change this week in Beef quotations, and the same activity prevails as in the case of Pork. The imports are ample for all requirements for some time and total 15,700 barrels, as against 15,900 this date last year. The tendency is for easy prices all the summer. We quote the local market at \$26.50. Beef Flank, \$19.50 Family Special, and \$20 Boneless per barrel wholesale. The S.S. Rosalind brought in 350 barrels this week.

Pork—There is no activity in the market and prices are ruling low. The supply of hogs coming in to the Packing Houses is greatly in excess of that of last year, and the demand is inactive for bottled beef, which will till the autumn, more or less. The imports have fallen off and were only 295 barrels this week by the S.S. Manoa and 230 barrels by S.S. Rosalind. Local quotations are: \$25 Spare Ribs, \$28.50 Ham Butt, and \$26.50 S.C. Clear per barrel wholesale.

Hay—The market is quiet and there is nothing doing. The Canadian hay crop is promising well. There are no quotations yet for new hay and will not be disposed of when the new crop comes on the market. Prices for 1922 hay are consequently low. In the local market the quotations are \$34 to \$36 per ton, according to quality. The demand is now at its lowest point. The local hay crop is looking better owing to the cold weather of May and June, but may recover with favorable weather. The S.S. Manoa brought in 1935 bales last trip.

Oats—The oats market is weak in sympathy with other grains. The prices are the same as last week and there are ample stocks in the market. The S.S. Manoa from Montreal and Charlotteville this week brought in 3998 sacks, which together with what was already on hand gives an ample supply to the market. The quotations are \$3.70 to \$3.80 for Mixed; \$3.80 to \$3.90 for White, and \$4.00 to \$4.20 for Black per sack of four bushels. The Canadian crop is looking prosperous.

Potatoes—The new American potatoes will be arriving here about the 28th of July. Meantime the local market is well supplied with imported P.E.I. stock of 1922 growth, which are selling at \$2.30 to \$2.50 per 90 lb. sack. The last heavy shipment

Caribou Steal Reindeer Herds.

Carry Them Off and Prevent Their Domestication, as Caribou Are Never Tamed.

The reindeer has long been domesticated, but its very existence as a domestic animal is threatened, we are told by Stratford F. Corbett, by vast herds of wild caribou. These animals cannot be tamed, and yet they are so nearly related to the reindeer that the two varieties will interbreed. A migrating herd of caribou, meeting one of domestic reindeer, will carry them off and withdraw them from domestication. The results of crossing, although half reindeer, are wild caribou to all intents and purposes. The U. S. government has recently moved one of its finest reindeer herds eleven hundred miles, to get it out of the track of migrating caribou. How necessary this was may be realized from what happened on the way, as told by Mr. Corbett in Popular Mechanics. We read in this magazine:—

"In the Yukon district of Canada, and in Alaska, are thousands upon thousands of caribou, large, splendid animals, defiant of man's efforts to domesticate them. So many of them are there, in fact, that herds swimming the Yukon have seriously interfered with the progress of river steamers on route to Dawson City. Captains have found that, until they have passed, it is useless to attempt going ahead—even though the delay might be a matter of hours.

"During the stop, many of the animals are shot by passengers, for a caribou in water is quite helpless.

Largest Wild-Animal Herd.

But in spite of relentless hunting by white man and Eskimo alike, the vast herds still continue to be the largest evidences of wild-animal life in existence in the Far North. As they trek, each year, through forest and mountain stream on their long journey to new feeding-grounds, they present a strange and magnificent spectacle.

"Another great migration of a slightly different nature, but throwing interesting sidelights on the

habits of the caribou, recently took place under the direction of the Alaskan division of the bureau of education. The herd, in this case, was a band of 1,500 reindeer owned by the government, and the route lay from Goodnews Bay, on the Behring Sea, to Cantwell Station, in the Broad Pass District.

"One of the principal reasons for this move was to take the reindeer herd, considered one of the finest in Alaska, out of the vicinity of the annual caribou migrations.

"While resting near Bethel one of the most exciting incidents of the journey occurred. Early one morning, a passing herd of caribou was sighted. In a few minutes the entire herd of reindeer became nervous, in

restive, and eager to break away. The herders, working heroically, ran here and there endeavoring to calm the animals and distract their attention. Yet, in spite of their best efforts, a hundred or more of the deer succeeded in breaking away and joining their wilder brothers.

"Then followed a strenuous chase across country, in which the guards, assisted by men from the reindeer station in the vicinity, recovered all but fifteen of the traitor deer.

"Now, with the aid of the white man, there is being developed the reindeer industry, the most tangible evidence of which is found, perhaps, in the fact that reindeer meat can

Company to Operate Cold Storage Plant on St. Pierre Island.

THREE MILLION DOLLAR BUILDING ERRECTED DURING WAR.

North Sydney, June 28.—L. W. Parsons, vice president of the French Canadian Company for Fish and Cold Storage, was a passenger on the S.S. Pro Patria when she sailed for St. Pierre yesterday afternoon.

The company which Mr. Parsons represents has taken over the gigantic cold storage plant erected at St. Pierre during the war by the Bureau of Construction, Company of New York for the French Government. Their purpose is to use it to store fresh fish caught by the thirty-five or forty French trawlers which operate on the fishing banks on this side of the Atlantic for about ten months of the year. All the fish now caught is salted and shipped to France from St. Pierre where the trawlers and their fares. The new company will take the fish from the boats fresh, store it in the cold storage plant until ready for shipment and then send it to France, fresh. It is especially constructed cold storage carriers. In addition to shipping fresh fish to France the company will also supply bait, ice and water to all vessels desiring it. They will start freezing squid and hering immediately. It is also possible that a canning plant may be opened to prepare the large quantities of caplin that are landed annually at St. Pierre for the market.

The plant which will cost three million dollars when it was built has never been operated except for the twenty day trial required in the builder's contract. It is a concrete structure of six stories and there are concrete docks that form part of it that have a low tide depth of twenty-eight feet. It is said to have a capacity of two million tons of fish a year. During the war the French Government planned a great cold storage system to consist of three units, one at Bologne, one at St. Nazaire and one at St. Pierre to be used to help the food situation in France by transporting large quantities of fresh fish from St. Pierre to the plants at Bologne and St. Nazaire and to be distributed from there to the people of the country. The plant at St. Pierre was not completed until shortly after the end of the war and the plan was never put into operation. Cold Storage engineers and experts who have inspected the plant pronounce it as being as well equipped as any in the world. A cold storage engineer is now in St. Pierre working out details for its operation. Mr. Parsons will be general manager of the plant. He states that refrigerating engineers and fish experts have been engaged and they expect to have the plant in operation in thirty days. It is in excellent condition at present and it could be put in operation in twenty-four hours if necessary. The company has a five year lease of the plant.

The company has its head office in Paris and while it was formed primarily to operate in conjunction with the French trawlers in supplying France with fish, it will also cater to the fishing interests of both Canada and the United States.

Mr. Parsons was formerly connected with the Anderson Company of Canada which disposed of a fleet of trawlers in this country for the British admiralty. Later he was connected with the Anderson Overseas Corporation of France.—Sydney Post.

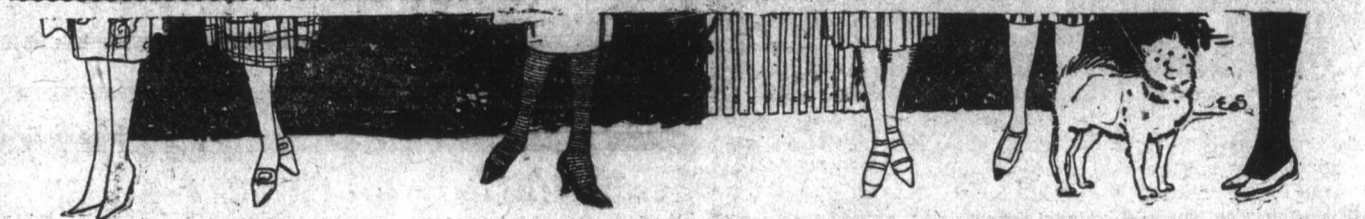

He has spent the best part of a night in a busy railway goods clearing yard, and has often listened to trials at the Old Bailey in the public gallery.

On one occasion, as the King was coming out of court, a boy standing near him shouted out to his companion, "Why, I'm blowed if that gent ain't the Prince of Wales!"

"Run and tell the gent that," exclaimed his companion, "an 'ell give yer 'arf a crown."

But the Prince, as he was then, had driven off before the boy could reach him.

The King and Queen have often travelled abroad incognito, usually as the Earl and Countess of Chester.

On one occasion a rather amusing experience awaited them. A suite of rooms at a hotel had been engaged for them, but by some error the rooms were booked in the names of Mr. and Mrs. Chester.

Curiously enough (writes R. C. Reed in the Daily Express) the proprietor of the hotel had patrons of that name who were very well-to-do and he concluded that they were the people who had engaged the rooms.

When their Majesties, with whose identity he was quite familiar, arrived, he rushed forward in despair to inform a member of their suite that he had no rooms available; but a little explanation soon put the proprietor at his ease, and the names in his register were quickly altered.
