INTERIM SESSIONS. The Kelly Larceny Case, HE PLEADS GUILTY.

Wm. H. Kelly was brought up this donald for trial on a charge of entering the store of Wm Stewart, Wyndham St., between the 6th and 9th of January last, and stealing therefrom several pieces of silk, the property of the said William Stewart. Mr. Peterson, County Attorney appeared for the prosecution along with Mr Geo. Palmer, and Messrs Macdonald & Oliver for the defence.

After the charge was read, Mr. A. H. Macdonald, Counsel for the prisoner, said he was instructed by his client to withdraw his plea of not guilty, and to plead guilty. He did so of his own free will, and without the advice of his Counsel. He feels he is guilty, and is willing to bear the punishment which the Court awards. Under the circumstances he (Mr Macdonald) would ask the permission of the Court to present a petition in favour of leniency of sentence. the prisoner's first offence, and he had hitherto borne a good character for hones-

New TERRITORY .- The new Territory of Ojibway, which it is proposed to set off in the northern part of Dakota, will contain about 74,000 square miles, being nearly one half of the present area of fertile and well-wa-tered lands, but its inhabitants con-sist almost entirely of Indians, # It sist almost entirely of Indians. It will be crossed midway, however, by the Northern Pacific Railroad, which will build up settlements and towns rapidly along the route, and from the line of the railroad population, agricultural development will be diffused in all directions.

THE SILVER MINES OF LAKE SUPERIOR The most wonderful reports are circulated of the richness of the silver and gold mines upon the northern shore of Lake Superior. At the Silver Island mine enormous quantities of ore are taken out every day, the amount being limited only by the force employed. The quantity of silver seems inexhaustible, and it is believed that several million dollars worth will be taken out this winter. Several other mines are coing very well. The number of labourers employed in and about all the mines, is about 450. Gold-bearing quarts has also been found in the neighborhood. The total population in the vicinity of the mines is about \$0,000, but it is believed that in a short time the people of the region will number 100,000. ver and gold mines upon the north-

Gold Diggings in Australia.—The Australian gold fields still offer inviting prospects to investors. The Melbourne Argus of Nov. 6th says that it would appear from fine discoveries of new auriferious ground which are made from time to time in Victoria that nearly the whole colony is suriferous, and that gold will be extracted from it for all time to come. Only recently a payable gold-field was found at Stockyard Creek, near Port Albert, in the most south-eastern portion of the colony, far from the region of what had hitherto been termed gold country, and now reports come to hand of the discovery of gold quartz reefs in the south-western portion of Victoria, at some distance beyond the existing western gold-fields.
