Tragic Occurrence in Guelph.

SHOOTING WITH INTENT TO KILL

A Young Man and Woman Shot on the Railway Track.

A CASE OF MISTAKEN IDENTITY.

The town has been thrown into a state of excitement by an occurrence last (Thursday) evening on the track of the V. G. & B. Railway near the Roman Catholic Cemetery, which might have resulted in the tragical death of a young man and woman.

Mary Calver, a young woman aged about 20, whose father is caretaker of the Union Cemetery, had been visiting on Thursday afternoon at the house of Mrs. Hurley, who lives in the house adjoining the Roman Catholic Cemetery on the north side of the track.

At about 8 o'clock p. m., Miss Calver prepared to return home, and Daniel Hurley, one of Mrs. Hurley's sons, aged about 25, offered to accompany her. They started homeward on the railway track, intending to turn east when they came to the first cross road.

They had proceeded only about two hundred yards when they heard a sound behind them of some one running on the track. They did not mind it for some time, thinking that it was caused by boys in the vicinity, but as the footsteps approached they turned to see what was the matter.

Immediately on doing so Hurley saw a flash just in front of him, and in a moment felt a ball enter his head just above his eye. Immediately after, two other shots were fired, one entering the cheek of Miss Calver, and the other entering her neck.

In the meantime the family at the house had been listening to the story of the injured man Hurley, and someone there started out for the girl, and brought her into the house, while two others ran to town for a doctor.

BY TELEGRAPH TO THE MERCURY

Tilton-Beecher Scandal.

BEECHER'S STATEMENT.

The following, the remainder of Mr. Beecher's statement, came by telegraph this forenoon. As the first part, which came by midnight telegraph is not completed in the Toronto papers, we defer giving it till to-morrow.

New York, Aug. 13th. - Is it likely, that with Mrs. Tilton's retraction in my pocket, I should have thus stultified myself. On the next day at evening, Mr. Moulton called at my house and came up into my bedroom; he said Mrs. Tilton, on her husband's return to her after our interview had informed him what she had done and that I had her retraction; Moulton expostulated with me, said the retraction under the circumstances would not mend matters but only awake fresh discord between husband and wife, and do great injury to Mrs. Tilton without helping me.

He said he had already recanted in writing, the retraction made to me, and of course there might be no end to these contradictions. Meanwhile Tilton had destroyed his first letter acknowledging the confession. Mr. Moulton claimed that I had taken a mean advantage, and made dishonorable use of Theodore's request that I should visit her. In obtaining from her written contradiction to documents not in existence, he said that all difficulties could be settled without any such papers, and that I ought to give it up; he was under great excitement; he made no verbal threats, but he opened his overcoat and with some emphatic remarks showed a pistol, which afterwards he took out and left on the bureau, near which he stood.

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his own accord said, that after using it he would in two or three days bring the memorandum back to me, and he cautioned me about disclosing in any way that there was a difficulty between Mr. Tilton and me, as it would be injurious to Tilton to have it known that I had quarrelled with him as well as to me, and he would not be able to do so.

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that I should contribute to Mr. Tilton's pecuniary wants as savouring of blackmail. This did not occur to me until I had paid perhaps \$2000. Afterwards I contributed at one time \$5000. After the money had been paid over in five \$1000 bills, to raise which I mortgaged the house I lived in, I felt very much dissatisfied with myself about it. Finally a square demand and a threat were made to me, of my confidential friend, that if \$5000 more were not paid, Tilton's charges would be laid before the public.

This I saw at once was blackmail in its boldest form, and I never paid a cent of it, but challenged and requested the fullest exposure, but after the summer of 1873 I became assured that Tilton was inherently and inevitably a ruined man. I no longer trusted either his word or his honor. I came to feel that his kindness was but a snare and his professions of friendship treacherous. He didn't mean mean well by me, nor by his own household, but I suffered all the more on this account, as he had grown up under my influence and in my church I could never free myself from a certain degree of responsibility for his misdoings, such as visits to a father. I wrote a letter of resignation to the Church, but did not send it in as I considered it a self sacrifice, which would not stop the trouble. Mr. Beecher concludes as follows: "Gentlemen.—In the note requesting your appointment, I asked that you should make full investigation of all sources of information. You are witnesses that I have in no way influenced or interfered with your proceedings or duties. I have wished the investigation to be so searching that nothing could unsettle its results. I have nothing to gain by my policy of suppression or compromise. For four years I have borne and suffered enough, and I will not go a step farther; I will be free; I will not walk under a rod or yoke. If any man would do me a favor, let him tell all he knows now. It is not mine to lay down the law of honor in regard to the use of other persons' confidential communications, but in so far as my own writings are concerned there is not a letter or document which I am afraid to have exhibited, and I authorize any and all upon any living person to produce and print forthwith whatever writings they have of any source whatever. It is time for the sake of decency and public morals that this matter should be brought to an end. It is an open pool of corruption, exhaling deadly vapors. For six weeks the nation has risen up and sat down upon scandals not a great war or a revolution could have filled the newspapers more than this question of domestic trouble magnified a thousandfold; and like as one spot on the human body drawing to itself every morbid humor in the blood. Whoever is buried with it, it is time that this abomination be buried below all touch or power of resurrection.

#### The Governor's Visit.

The Mayor and Mr. Swinford went to Toronto yesterday, and had an interview with Col. Cumberland about the visit of the Governor to Guelph. He was unable to say whether His Excellency would be able to defer his visit till the Exhibition week, but promised to make inquiry as soon as possible, and the deputation left with that understanding. This morning, however, the Mayor received a telegram from Mr. Cumberland, that if convenient he might have His Excellency here on the 22nd, to remain over Sunday. Meantime inquiries are being made whether it is not possible to have him here some day of the Exhibition, and failing that, what arrangements can be made for his accommodation on the 22nd, should he make his visit on that day.

We have learned since the above was written, that the Governor will positively be here on the 22nd.

No ANSWER YET.—The Herald has not yet answered our question, what it means by calling the Governor General a "bloated aristocrat," or how it reconciles the calling him by such epithets with its eleventh-hour professions of respect for His Excellency. We have no more to say to it until it satisfies us and the public on that point.

DEBENTURES TAKEN UP.—On Tuesday last the Reeve and Treasurer of the Township of Arthur returned from Toronto, whither they had been on business connected with the portion of the Surplus coming to their township. In accordance with a resolution of the Council they purchased \$20,000 worth of their railway debentures at a discount. This will leave the municipality with but \$15,000 of indebtedness, against which they have three years' sinking fund already provided.

TOWN DRUMMER OF DUNDAS IN 1650.—The following notice is a reprint of a copy of an announcement made by that useful functionary the Town Drummer of Dundas in 1650. We consider it would be a sin and a shame to translate it. As a specimen of "quid pro quo" Scotch of the olden time it is unique:—"Tint yestreen, some wai o' the cause, a knave little an, pish three tomans auld; the kerent o' his onyie skairt black an' kythin w' bubbles, an' has a swass w' his kerie o'e. Whaever has fun' him will mak' me the wiser, or his daddie, the snishin merchant if the horse wyn', and they'll get a bunie for their fash.

In no country in the world is there so large a number of booksellers compared with the total population. Scotland, perhaps, would take the next rank.

As Mr. Charles Mackay of Ayr, in company with another young man, was driving to Berlin on Friday the 7th inst., his buggy collided with a milk wagon on the Strasburg hill, throwing Mackay out of his vehicle, thereby dislocating his shoulder.

Mr. J. L. Toole, the most comic of England's comic actors, has lately arrived in New York.

London, Aug. 14th.—The Times Madrid correspondent positively confirms the reports of recognition of Spain by England, France and Germany. The announcement caused general rejoicing in the capital.

The Post's special despatch from Berlin reports Austria and Italy have also recognized the Republic.

The Times in an editorial article says:—England would have recognized Spain some time since but the reluctance of France and indifference of Germany prevented.

#### English Conservatism.

Mr. Goldwin Smith, in his address to the Ontario Teachers' Association, of which he is President, gave an outline of his opinion upon the enfranchisement of the lower classes in England, who are not educated to understand their duties as voters. It contrasts strongly with the sentiments of gratitude recently expressed by a Canadian journal upon the return to power of a Conservative Government. Mr. Smith said:—

I was impressed with that fact by another thing which I witnessed in England, and which it pained an English heart to see. I mean the polling of the *residuum*, which, as I have already said, was enfranchised for a party purpose by the Reform Bill of 1867. These miserable possessors of a misbestowed power flocked to the poll, drugged with beer and inflamed with senseless fury, ignorant of everything, devoid not only of the rudiments of political knowledge and duty, but of the knowledge which is imparted in an infant school. Swarms of them were unable to make a cross opposite a candidate's name, and had to vote by the form appointed for illiterates. In the trial of a controverted election a witness was put on the stand who had never heard the names of the leaders of the two great parties, and only knew that in his own town one party was blue and the other yellow. In another trial the judge said that the sum spent in bribery altogether had been very small, but that, nevertheless, there had been a great deal of corruption for the voters were so ignorant of what they were doing, and of their duty as citizens, that they could be bought for a pot of beer. Yet these men are arbiters of the destiny, not of England only, but of the Colonies and India. And it was Conservatism, self-styled, that had invested them with power, and was now appealing to their votes. We need Conservatism here to temper the rawness and wildness of Colonial freedom; but let us hope that it will be Conservatism of a different kind; a Conservatism of the school-house and not of the pot-house, a Conservatism of intelligence, of morality, of honor, not of party victory by committing moral treason against the country.

The Methodists have held their first conference in Rome. Besides the English missionaries who direct the Methodist work, there were twenty presbyters present, representing as many centres of religious labor. There were reported 1,007 communicants, 111 probationers, 472 Sunday school scholars and 532 day scholars.

**JESUITS IN GLASGOW.**—It is claimed that in Glasgow, as elsewhere in Scotland, there has been a great "Catholic Revival," and that this is in a measure owing to the unremitting labors of the Jesuits. There are in and within a short radius of the city no fewer than twenty Roman Catholic places of worship. Connected with these there are upwards of fifty priests. Sittings are provided in these churches for about 20,000 people, and there are nearly 20,000 children taught in the Sabbath Schools conducted by the adherents of these churches. Glasgow boasts of the Catholic Cathedral of St. Andrew, a large church seating 2,500 people, and that city is also the abode of the Most Reverend Archbishop Eyre, Administrator Apostolic of the Western District. Statistics show the number of Roman Catholics throughout Scotland to be almost in the proportion of one to seven of the entire population. The whole number of Romanists, as lately ascertained by themselves, in that section of the Empire is 360,000. The number of priests is 277; of churches and stations, 222; and convents 23. There are no less than 150 congregational schools, and a college at Blair, for the education of priests, which has an average number of 58 students.

**METHODIST UNION.**—The Methodist New Connection adjourned Conference met at Milton, on Wednesday, pursuant to the call of the President, who took the chair at nine o'clock. After devotional services, the roll was called by the Chairman. About seventy answered. The busy season of harvest detains many of the lay representatives who were present in June. The principal business of this session will be the reception of the report of the deputation to the Wesleyan Conference and to the English Connection in relation to union, and to take final action thereon; to appoint delegates to the General Conference which meets in Toronto, in September, for the re-construction of the Methodist Church.

On Monday, 10th inst., the wife of Mr. Jacob Gankel, of Petersburg, attempted to commit suicide by cutting her throat with a razor. She had shown symptoms of insanity for some time past. Hence the rash act.
