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
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TORONTO LACROSSE TEAM

ABOUT THE TEAM THAT IS EXPECTED TO WIN.

A New Stand to be Erected at Rosedale. The first trial was made with the schedule. Our visitors decide to have a track of their own. General Report.

President Suckling of the Toronto Lacrosse Club dropped into The World office yesterday afternoon to relieve his mind of a troublesome burden. Said he: "We are going to build a new stand. I suppose you would call it a bleaching board," and he winked his baseball eye. "It will be free to every one who chooses to sit in it, but we don't know where to put it. We have two sites in course, the southwest, beside the grand stand and the northwest. We want to please the public and if they will tell us through The World (and here he paid us a compliment that we are too modest to repeat), what they want the bleachers there we'll build it."

Thus short communication are in order stating simply which corner is wanted and a pointed reason therefor. The committee to build a stand to hold 1000 persons at a cost of \$1000.

At Rosedale Next Week. According to the T.L.C. constitution the Rosedale grounds cannot open before May 1. That is next Monday. So next week scores of lacrosseists will be on the pretty field, kick in hand, getting down to championship form.

"No, I may not be out for sometime myself, but I'll have my men on the field early in May," stated Capt. Joe Irving, majestically.

Captain Joe on the Schedule. "Yes, the schedule is all right," he commented. "We might have opened earlier to advantage, but we'll have some great fights towards the close."

About the personnel of the T.L.C. team. All the old players will be out, but a new quartet of outsiders and inclusions from some of the city teams. There will be Capt. Joe Irving, Dixon, S. Martin, L. Livingston, P. Knowles, Keith, Carmichael, Warbrick, Hartley, Davis, Macdonald, Langley, W. Gale, Lennox and McCarthy of Barrie and Draper of Vancouver. These men have all stood their real time for the fray and will be out at Rosedale next week. The opening match will be with one of the Montreal teams on May 24.

HALL TO CHANDLER. Who Selects the International Team?—Those Individual Members.

In referring to Mr. Chandler's arrangements of the Canadian Cricket Association, Mr. John E. Hall, hon. secretary of that body, writes as follows: "My worthy friend Mr. Chandler, like many a good man before him, has allowed his imagination to run away with him. His letter in your issue of this morning is an illustration of this fact, as he talks of things which evidently he does not understand. If he only knew what he was talking about, or if he had spoken to someone connected with the Canadian association, 'before rushing into print' he would probably never have written the letter. It was most kind of you to give me a copy of it, and I know what he was talking about. He is a man who is too much for him. He wants to know whether 'the association is in want of funds' that is, whether he is to join the association, or is it with 'the intention' of killing the Ontario Cricket Association? He ought to know better, but I suppose we will have to forgive him. We want all the individual members of the Canadian association we can get, in order that we may be able to pay the expenses of our eleven in the annual international match with the United States. We think he ought to be more reasonable in his demands to pay every man's expenses, because he cannot afford the expense, has to decline a place on the team. If we were to decline to pay every man's expenses, we would become an object for players to work hard, with a view to securing a place on the team which they do not wish to lose. We have no desire to kill the Ontario association—the stronger the provincial association the stronger the Canadian association. If Mr. Chandler will read the annual report of the organization he complains of he will find the following reference to the Ontario Association: 'Our committee hail with pleasure the fresh stimulus given to the Ontario Cricket Association, which, under the new constitution, cannot fail to be conducive to the welfare of cricket in Ontario and they hope that all the Ontario cricketers will heartily co-operate for the general good of the great game.' To kill the Ontario Association would practically cause the demise of the Canadian Association. Mr. Chandler knows as well as anyone that it was the officers of the senior body who were the cause of the change in the constitution and bylaws of the Ontario Association, which has received the hearty endorsement of our good friends in the Canadian institution in one year old. It has so far worked most satisfactorily, and there is no reason why it should not continue to do so. Mr. Chandler says: 'Why a few cricketers in Toronto should say who shall be the three gentlemen to choose the international team, ignoring entirely the three provincial associations, seems to me rather too much of a one-sided affair.' Such a revolution of want of knowledge of the constitution of the Canadian association is, to say the least, ludicrous. I will, for Mr. Chandler's benefit, copy from the constitution the clause relating to the composition of the committee: 'The committee shall consist of the officers of the association and three representatives each from the Ontario, the provinces and the different provinces. The three representatives on the committee from the Ontario and other associations are elected by the association to which they belong and not by the Canadian association at all. This year Ontario is represented by the Ontario Association, the Southern of Toronto and Wells of Chatham. The other provinces have not yet sent in the names of their representatives, for the reason that they have not had their meeting. I trust that this explanation may be satisfactory to the honorable representative of East Toronto and that he may see 'one-sided' after all."

JUMPING AT BENNING'S. Unique Account of a Hurdle Race—Hurdles—The Spirit of the Times—Washington correspondent is evidently opposed to

jumping races. His report of the hurdle race on the opening day at Benning's says: "The fifth race was a mile and a half hurdle race. Ten horses started, but all did not finish. St. John, the favorite, got mixed up with a hurdle after the first half-mile, and laid down to take a dirt bath. Jersey Maid did not finish. Why? Because her rider was too used to ride farther than half a mile and gave way to the tender influences of the Jersey lightning that he had taken to give him. Dutch courage and screw his nerves up to the proper pitch, so that he would be able to take the terrible risk of riding a hurdle race. The almost all the jockeys that rode in that race were under the potent spell of that article commonly deemed so essential to the life of your true Kentucky cologne. So far gone indeed were the jockeys that but few of them wanted to leave the post. After the race started, the jockeys were plainly imposed on all those who were guilty of imbibing too often and too deeply. St. Luke eventually won after a good race from the other horses, but it was a long time before he was able to get up. Both horses were ridden for all they were worth. This may seem somewhat strange to you, but it is the way of the world. Races last fall at New Bergh, but it is nevertheless a fact."
