(4) An applicant in the Ordinary or Hazardous Class who has passed his *fifty-fifth* birthday, may be admitted to Beneficiary membership as provided in Section one hundred and twenty, sub-section six.

Sick and Funeral Benefits.

The Sick and Funeral Benefits as already stated are optional, and are \$5 per week during 12 weeks of any one illness and \$50 on death towards funeral expenses.

The Supreme Chief Ranger

As the Supreme Chief Ranger purposes leaving for California, Oregon, Washington, British Columbia and Manitoba to look after the interests of the I. O. F., and his departure will take place about the end of the month, the Past Supreme Chief Ranger, Brother E. Botterell, House of Commons, Ottawa, will take charge of the Order during the Supreme Chief Ranger's temporary absence. All communications on questions of law should be addressed to the Past Supreme Chief Ranger on and after the 1st April, and until further notice.

Certificates of Endowmen and of Membership.

During the absence of the Supreme Chief Ranger his office work will be attended to by the Supreme Physician, Brother Dr. Millman. Any brother who is entitled to the Endowment Certificate or Certificate of Membership and has not received the same within a reasonable time will please write to Dr. Millman about the matter.

Applications for Membership.

If any Court in Canada has any Application Form which has not the endorsement in red ink required by the Act of Incorporation, we advise them to supply themselves with the proper Form forthwith.

If any High Court in Canada has any Applications for Membership without the endorsement in red ink required by the Act, they will please return them to the Supreme Secretary and he will replace them with the Form required by the Act.

Unfounded Charges.

The Supreme Officers sometimes receive very curious letters. They are always glad to have any errors they make pointed out so that the errors may be corrected and avoided for the future, and always treat with kindness and consideration the blunders of Subordinate officials, till such blunders are again and again repeated or are of such a nature as to make it utterly inexcusable. The subjoined letter if written by a totally illiterate brother would not be altogether excusable, but when it is learned that it emanates from a professional gentleman we think the unanimous verdict of our readers will be that the letter is without one redeeming feature. Had the brother written to us for any explanations we would have gladly given them to him, but he deliberately rushes into print, "where angels fear to tread," and therefore he must bear the consequences.

It will be remembered that the old Monthly Report Form required each Financial Secretary to give the name of each member of the Court in good standing as well as his rates of Assessment. As each Financial Secretary was required to make the Report in duplicate, it compelled the Financial Secretaries of our larger Courts to write from two to seven or eight hundred names with all the corresponding entries each month. The cry came up from all over our jurisdiction that some change must be made to relieve Financial Secretaries of the great burdens put upon their shoulders. It was at this time that the suggestion of Brother A. H. Fessenden was taken up and which led eventually to the adoption of Form No. 3 A. While it is true the first edition thereof was not as perfect in all the details as they now are, there has been no substantial change made in the Form as first issued. The Form No. 3 A has received the endorsement of nearly all our Financial Secretaries, from many of whom we have received cordial letters of thanks for making the change. It will also be remembered that it was proposed to use the old Monthly Forms for making the reports for January and July in each year. This was done in the interests

of economy. But the very first half yearly reports received convinced the Executive Council of the utter folly of attempting to use the old Monthly Report Form for the half-yearly reports, and then the Form No. 12 was prepared, not as a change, but simply to put the Form in proper shape so that the Form itself would be a sufficient guide to any intelligent Financial Secretary as to what was required of him to do.

We say, then that the changes that have been made in the Monthly Report Forms were absolutely necessary and were required and have been approved by all the most intelligent Financial Secretaries. When, therefore, Brother Cowan asks "Of what possible benefit are the frequent changes made in the Monthly Reports," he shows an utter incapacity to comprehend the needs of the Order of to day. And when our brother asks "Of what possible benefit is the command to pay all moneys to order of Manager of Molsons Bank, Toronto, with notifications to Supreme Secretary that such moneys have been paid" we are forced to the conclusion that the brother does not understand what he is talking about; but when he exclaims, "Is it necessary to send two Monthly Reports, one to Manager of Molsons Bank, one to Supreme Secretary," in the language of a friend of ours 'we stand prostrate with amazement' that any brother could have, by any process of reasoning, extracted any such meaning from any circular or notices ever issued by the Executive.

If Brother Cowan will study the Constitution he will find therein provided that "the miltances should be made payable to the order of the Manager of the Bank where our deposits are made," and is the one feature of our financial system that commends itself to all shrewd business men, and is one of the glories and strength of our Order. When, therefore, the Executive decided to change our Bankers they were compelled by the Constitution to issue the order referred to by the brother. The change, to the Molsons Bank, Toronto, was made because by the change the Order will receive 1 per cent. more interest on their deposits than heretofore, and is a decided feather in the caps of the Executive Council for having brought it about.

Of course it is not necessary for us to say that we have never issued any order requiring Financial Secretaries to "send two Monthly Reports, one to the Manager of Molsons Bank and the other to the Supreme Secretary." Whether the intelligence that could evolve any such meaning from any of our

official circulars or notices be considered by Brother Cowan as inferior or superior to that possessed by the Executive is not a matter for serious consideration. We can only say that the Financial Secretary who would send a remittance to the address of E. S. Cummer, as Supreme Secretary, six months after that good brother had ceased to be the Supreme Secretary, is decidedly of the Rip Van Winkle type of Financial Secretary.

No! Brother Cowan, we do not regard Subordinate Court officers as one iota inferior to us in any respect. We are constantly learning from them. Some of the most valuable features of our Constitutions and Laws have been suggested by brethren in Subordinate Courts. We are always ready to listen to their views respectfully, and to take advantage of their advice; but we are free to confess that once in a while we come across a brother who is so profoundly stupid that it is difficult to convince ourselves that he is serious in what he says, and these are the very fellows who scold and find fault with everything that the Executive do. THE LETTER.

To the Editor of the Forester :

MR. EDITOR,—The various notices, explanatory and otherwise, from time to time appearing in FORESTER, together with official circulars, seem to me little less than official blunders, or connected schemes to baffle and nonplus Financial Secretaries. For instance, of what possible benefit are the frequent changes made in the monthly report; also the command to pay all moneys to order of Manager of Molsons Bank, Toronto, with notifications to Supreme Secretary that such moneys have been paid. Is not you Supreme Secretary a bonded officer responsible for moneys received? Is it necessary to send two monthly reports—one to Manager of Molsons Bank, one to Supreme Secretary, and intermediary notifications of moneys received between dates of meetings? It seems to me the old method was far superior to the one now used. Officials seem to regard Subordinate Court officers as possessed of infinitely inferior intelligence to their own, as instanced by paragraphs appearing in FORESTER. It is evident that blunders are made in the *sanctum sanctorum* of the head office as well as in other places. Please be more explicit, remembering that Financial Secretaries of Subordinate Courts are unpaid officers, and have not the time at their disposal to perform the multifarious duties required by the exacting and intricate instructions lately issued them by their superiors in the Order.

Our Act of Incorporation.

By some accident it appears that the wrong copy of our Dominion Act of Incorporation, probably the copy as it was when it first left the House of Commons, was sent to us for publication, and which we inserted in the new book of Constitutions and Laws of the Order as the Act of Incorporation. The variations occur chiefly in Sections 3 and 7 of the Act. A comparison of the Act as it appears in the Constitution with that which appears below, will show that the Act as revised by the Senate and as finally passed was much more favorable to the Order than otherwise. We regret very much that the mistake was made, and we would advise each of our members to cut out the Act as it appears in this issue of THE FORESTER and paste the same into the copy of new Constitution :

AN ACT TO INCORPORATE THE SUPREME COURT OF THE INDEPENDENT ORDER OF FORESTERS.

[Assented to 2nd May, 1889.]

WHEREAS the persons hereinafter named have, by their petition, prayed to be incorporated under the name of "The Supreme Court of the Independent Order of Foresters," and it is expedient to grant the prayer of their petition : Therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows :

Ross, Barrie, Ont., members of the Supreme Court of the Independent Order of Foresters, together with such persons as are or become members of the said Supreme Court, are hereby constituted a body corporate under the name of "The Supreme Court of the Independent Order of Foresters," hereinafter called the Society, for the following purposes and objects :

(a.) To unite fraternally all persons entitled to membership under the constitution and laws of the Society ; and the word "laws" shall include general laws and by-laws ;

(b.) To give all moral and material aid in its power to its members and those dependent upon them ;

(c.) To educate its members socially, morally and intellectually ;

(d.) To establish a fund for the relief of sick and distressed members ;

(e.) To establish a benefit fund, from which, on satisfactory evidence of the death of a member of the Society who has complied with all its lawful requirements, a sum not exceeding three thousand dollars shall be paid to the widow, orphans, dependents, or other beneficiary whom the member has designated, or to the personal representative of the member ; or from which, upon the completion of the expectancy of life of a member, as laid down in the said constitution and laws, such sum shall be paid to himself ;

(f.) To secure for its members such other advantages as are, from time to time, designated by the constitution and laws of the Society.

2. The head office of the Society shall be in the city of Toronto.

3. Subject to the constitution and laws of the Society, branches under the names of "High Courts," "Subordinate Courts," or "Encampments of Royal Foresters," may from time to time be established, under the title designated in the charter granted by the Society constituting such branches ; and the trustees of each branch already established, and to be hereafter established, in Canada, shall be a body corporate and politic, subject to the constitution and laws of the Society ; but no such branch shall have power to establish benefit funds under paragraphs (d) and (e) of section one of this Act ; and each of such branches shall be so incorporated under the corporate name of "The Trustees of (giving the title of the branch) ;" and, upon being established and before proceeding to act as such corporation, shall cause to be registered at full length, in the registry office o

the city, county or registration division within which such branch is established, a declaration signed by the trustees stating the fact of such establishment, the date of the instrument effecting it, the corporate name, and the names in full of the trustees thereof.

4. The value of the real property which the Society or any branch thereof may hold shall not exceed, in the case of the Society, one hundred thousand dollars, and, in the case of any branch, twenty-five thousand dollars; but in towns having less than six thousand inhabitants the value of such real property shall not, in the case of any one branch, exceed five thousand dollars; and the Society may, by laws, determine the manner in which such real property shall be held and conveyed, subject always to the laws of the Province in which such real estate is situate: Provided always, that no part of the endowment funds shall be used for such purpose.

5. The property of each branch or any shall be liable for the debts and engagements of such branch.

6. The surplus funds of the Society shall be invested in mortgages which are a first charge on land held in fee simple in Canada, or in deposits with or in registered debentures of loan and investment companies incorporated in Canada, or in debentures of municipal or school corporations in Canada, or in securities of the Dominion of Canada or any of the Provinces thereof, or shall be deposited in a chartered bank in Canada; but the Society shall sell such real estate and property as it acquires by the foreclosure of any mortgage, hypothec, or lien within seven years after it has been so acquired, otherwise it shall revert to the previous owner or to his heirs or assigns.

7. Whenever, under the constitution and laws of the Society, any branch becomes dissolved, the Society shall have the option of taking over the property of such branch, provided it exercises such option within three months after the dissolution of such branch, evidenced by an instrument under the hand of the chief officer of the Society for the time being, and the seal of the Society, and registered in the registry office for the city, county or registration division within the limits of which such property may be situate, whereupon the said property, whether real or personal, shall become vested in the Society, subject, however, to the payment of all the debts and liabilities of such branch, which it shall be incumbent on the Society to liquidate and discharge as the same may mature, and thereupon each creditor shall have a direct right of action against the Society for the enforcement of his lawful claims upon such branch; and provided also, that in the case of real estate, it shall be sold within seven years after the dissolution of such branch; and provided further, that pending the exercise of such option by the Society, the corporation shall continue in existence, and the trustees thereof shall continue their duties for the purpose of liquidation only.

8. There shall be printed in legible type and in red ink upon every policy hereafter issued by the Society, as well as upon every application therefor, and upon every receipt given for payments in connection therewith, the following words: "The insurance undertaken by this Society comes under the exception contained in section forty-three of 'The Insurance Act' applicable to fraternal and benevolent associations, and is not subject to Government inspection."

9. Every officer of the Society and every other person who transacts business on behalf of the Society and who issues, circulates or uses or who causes to be issued, circulated or used any policy of insurance or endowment certificate, or application for membership, on which the notice provided for in

the next preceding section is not printed shall, on summary conviction thereof before any two justices of the peace or any magistrate having the powers of two justices of the peace, incur and be liable to the penalties mentioned in the twenty-second section of "The Insurance Act," and every pecuniary penalty so recovered shall be applied in the manner provided by the said section.

10. Within three months from the coming into force of this Act, a certified copy of the present constitution and laws of the Society and of its form of insurance policy or contract shall be deposited in the offices of the Secretary of State of Canada and of the Superintendent of Insurance, and copies of any future changes or amendments thereto shall be so deposited within three months from their adoption by the said Society, and in default of compliance with any provision of this section the Society shall incur a penalty of ten dollars for each day during which such default continues.

11. Nothing herein contained shall be held to exempt the Society from the effect of any legislation hereafter passed by the Parliament of Canada in respect to any insurance powers exercised by friendly societies.

To the Editors of the Independent Forester :

DEAR BROTHERS,—In the event of the sum insured being due to the beneficiary (or beneficiaries) by the decease of the insured brother, would it be advisable for our Order to permit the option of a ten year, a twenty year, or a thirty year annuity and so exhaust the value of the policy with earned interest? Where the sum insured is the main or only means of support the interest thereon is generally inadequate. If preferred, instead of receiving the total sum insured an annuity for a given number of years might be substituted, and would be justifiable as it would in many instances be the income necessary for the general family expenses during the required period to enable sons or daughters to obtain such education as should equip them for becoming the bread winners by the time the annuity would cease. It would save the widow or children, usually unacquainted with business, the annoyance and risk of investing the sum of the policy.

The hardships and discomforts endured within its walls have passed away like mist before the sunshine, and memory only recalls the delights of contriving, managing and arranging; the fun endured over amateur attempts at carpentering, and surprises in cookery. The brief, sweet holidays stolen from weeks of toil, saved for so anxiously and look for so eagerly. These and a hundred other simple joys are the pleasures of poverty, in fact, undreamt of by the rich and worldly.

Agreeable People.

We all know people whom it is pleasant to meet; people from whom we are sure to receive a smile, a kind word, a cordial hand-shake, or some other token of good-will. When one is depressed in spirits, or, as the common saying is "blue," the meeting with a genial, merry-hearted friend has a magical effect; indeed, I have known the encounter with such a person to turn the whole current of one's life.

Agreeability is dependent upon many conditions; it may be inherent, it may be the result of judicious early education, or of pleasant surroundings, or of a happy combination of circumstances, but all will agree that it is a desirable quality, and whether inherent or not, should be carefully cultivated. I believe that the young man's disposition was the result of continued indulgence by his mother and sisters. He had tyrannized over them for years, and had become a powerful despot in the household.

"Tired and cross" is a common expression, and most of us know what it means. A friend of mine, a most agreeable woman, says that when she finds herself getting "tired and cross," she takes a nap, a bath, a walk, or a drive, goes to see someone whose walk in life is less pleasant than her own—does anything different from the work that has tired and worried her. In this way she preserves health and temper, governs well her children, and keeps her entire household in a state of peace and happiness.

Many parents do not realize that in training their children a regard for others should be instilled in their minds. A spoiled, selfish child may be very dear to its parents, but after the parents have passed away and the child has become a disagreeable man or woman, what disinterested parties will tolerate the selfish, tyrannical ways of such a person?—*American Agriculturist*.

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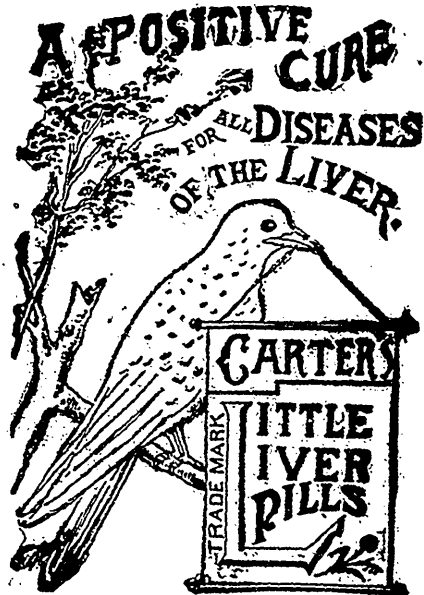

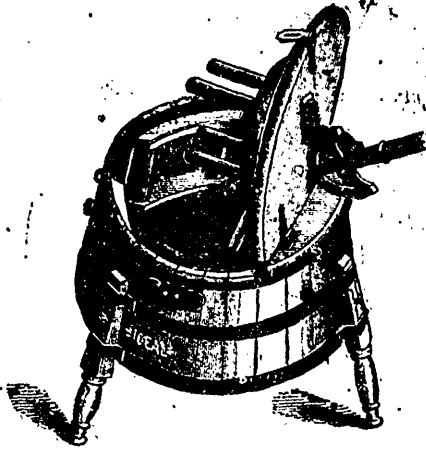
