Dear Sir Arthur:

Since I have been Chairman of the Budget Committee of Financial Federation I have felt strongly that it is most advisable for Federation to have immediately connected with it in an Advisory capacity a few of the outstanding men in our community.

At the last meeting of the Board of Directors the following new by-law was passed creating an Advisory Board:

By-law No.7. At the First Meeting of the Board of Directors held following the Annual Meeting of the members, the Board of Directors may appoint an Advisory Board to hold office for one year or until their successors are appointed, consisting of not less than seven (7) and not more than twelve (12) persons, which number shall be in addition to the Chairman of the Board of Directors, the Chairman of the Executive Committee and the Chairman of the Budget Committee, who shall be ex-officio members of the Advisory Board. The Chairman of the Advisory Board shall be appointed by its members and meetings thereof shall be held as and when called by its Chairman or the Chairman of the Board of Directors, and at such meetings a quorum shall consist of four (4) members. Vacancies on the Advisory Board shall be filled by the Board of Directors. The Advisory Board shall advise on all matters submitted for its consideration by the Board of Directors.

The reasons for this by-law are (1) To impress upon the public that Federation has the moral support of citizens who are pre-eminent in their standing in the community. (2) To secure the guidance of the Advisory Board on questions of major importance and policy, especially in cases where the interests of Federation are considered in relation to similar interests in the community.

Mr. E.W. Beatty has already consented to act as Chairman of the Advisory Board and Mr. J.W. McConnell has expressed his willingness to become a member.

The other men we have in view are Colonel Herbert Molson, Lord Atholstan, Sir Charles Gordon, and Mr. C.W. Lindsay.


We shall trespass but little upon your time, as nothing but questions of prime importance to Federation will be brought before the Advisory Committee.

With reference to my telephone conversation with you in regard to the duties of the Chairman of the Budget Committee, I would like to present to you a picture of the work as accurately as I can.

The Budget Committee consists of eighteen members, half of whom are appointed by the Board of Directors of Financial Federation, and half by the agencies financed by the Federation. The technique of the election is unimportant, but the principle underlying it is of considerable importance, for by this method of election neither the financial nor the social work group, in theory, dominates the expenditure of Federation monies.

The Budget Committee is given the sole responsibility for the distribution of the funds of the Federation, and for this reason I think it is quite correct to say that the position of Chairman is one of the most important, if not the most important position in our organization.

The Chairman of the Committee is supplied with an office of his own and with a highly competent secretary who is thoroughly familiar with all the work of the Committee. Meetings are usually called monthly, except in the summer time, and at these meetings all matters of importance are dealt with. For some years now the Budget Committee has been divided into six Groups for administrative purposes. To each of these Groups are assigned four or five agencies, and the members of these Groups are expected to have special knowledge of the work of these agencies. When a question of change in policy or of increased or decreased expenditure for a particular agency comes up, the matter is referred to the Group concerned with the work of that agency. The Group is expected to investigate and turn in to the Chairman a report with a recommendation. In this way the Chairman is relieved of a great deal of detailed work.

The amount of time which it is necessary for the Chairman to devote to the work depends considerably on the personality of the Chairman himself. He has a group of active and interested laymen who are willing to accept responsibility. He has a competent secretary, and Mr. Brittle, Secretary of the Federation, and I, as Director, are constantly available for assistance. I believe under ordinary circumstances it would be possible for the Chairman to discharge his duties without averaging more than an hour a day in the office. It would also be possible for him to absent himself from the city

during some of the winter months, and during the greater part of the summer. The last two weeks in August and the month of September are normally weeks of considerable activity since the Budgets of all the agencies for the forthcoming year are studied and approved. This is the busiest season for the Budget Committee. At other times the work can be accomplished without the expenditure of undue time. Naturally, on taking over the position the Chairman will desire to familiarize himself with the work of the agencies, and this would entail visits to them all, but after this is accomplished the work is largely of a directional nature.


The first meeting of our Campaign Committee was held on the 22nd of May, when tentative plans were agreed upon for the development of our Campaign organization for this year.

To Members of the Special Committee on Unemployment

In view of the critical financial situation of the Special Committee on Unemployment, of the Montreal Council of Social Agencies, you are asked to make a special effort to take part in a delegation to the Executive Committee of the City Council in the Executive Chambers, 2nd Floor, City Hall at 11 A.M. Wednesday, November 4th, 1931.

The purpose of this delegation is to place before the City Executive as strongly as possible, the necessity for immediate financial assistance if 2,000 Protestant families are to be kept from starvation. I am setting down herewith some facts for your information:-

The Emergency Unemployment Relief Committee (Gen. G.E. McCuaig, Chairman) which is carrying out relief services for Protestant families at our request, has incurred, as of October 24th, 1931, a deficit of \$7,231.00 and this deficit is increasing at the rate of \$1,000 or more, a day. More than 1,800 Protestant families are on relief. The only source of revenue for this activity is from the City of Montreal.

As you are well aware, the Dominion of Canada has advertised widely that no family need suffer hunger or exposure in Canada this winter, and this statement is backed by an unspecified sum of money voted by Parliament at its session this summer. The method of distributing public relief money is the same this year as last year, that is, the cost will be borne equally by Federal, Provincial and Municipal funds.

So far as the City of Montreal is concerned, it has expressed its willingness to co-operate with the Federal and Provincial Governments in this scheme but it will have no money to devote to the relief of married men until January 1st, 1932. Funds for caring for single men, many, if not most of whom are not residents of this City, are available.

It has been generally understood that public money would be available for unemployment relief and Financial Federation did not include in its campaign budget for last year, nor has it included it in its present campaign budget. The funds collected for Federated Charities are earmarked for the work of the 32 agencies in Federation, most of whom have had their activities materially increased by the present economic crisis.

The difficulty confronting the City is its shortage of funds. It cannot incur a deficit without rendering its aldermen liable to disqualification. Nevertheless, in view of the publicity given to public unemployment relief, we believe that this matter of securing money is the City's problem, and not ours. We wish to have your assistance in bringing this home to the City.

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

At the last annual meeting of this Council, a report on unemployment relief was presented covering the activities of the Special Committee on Unemployment of this Council from its formation in the fall of 1930 to the close of that year. This Committee had arranged for relief to the following groups of unemployed among Protestants: families, single, homeless men and office workers.

Families, except the unnaturalized foreigners, were cared for by the Emergency Unemployment Relief Committee, unnaturalized foreign families by the Family Welfare Association, homeless men by the Dufferin Square Refuge (operated by the Protestant Bureau for Homeless Men), and office workers by the Central Registration Bureau for Office Workers (operated by the employment staff of the Sun Life Assurance Company). All these activities were financed in large measure by public money, but the Emergency Unemployment Relief Committee conducted two campaigns privately by mail, and the Sun Life Assurance Company made a contribution of \$2,000. to the work of the Central Registration Bureau. This in addition to the expenses for staff and quarters which they also provided. The audited financial statement of the Special Committee on Unemployment from the commencement of operations until ~~April 30th~~, 1931, is attached.

December 31st
At the request of the Advisory Relief Committee of the city, unemployment relief activities were discontinued as far as possible on April 30th, 1931. The Emergency Unemployment Relief Committee closed on May 2nd, 1931; the Central Registration Bureau closed on April 30th, 1931; and the Dufferin Refuge closed on April 22nd, 1931. The season's activity closed with an amount of \$1,000.00 owing to the Family Welfare Association. This indebtedness to the Family Welfare Association was later reduced to \$210.80.

A brief period of inactivity occurred but about the middle of May the Anglican Church at the Andrews Home, began to be besieged with applicants for relief and the case load of the Family Welfare Association increased far beyond the capacity of that Agency's budget.

At the request of the Bishop of Montreal and of Lord Atholstan, a conference was held in regard to the homeless man situation, and it was decided to organize a bureau which would register all homeless men except French Catholics, and provide relief for them if necessary. The personnel of the Committee in charge of this Central Registration Bureau for Homeless Men was:- Dr. Grant Fleming, Chairman, Father Joseph Fallon, Brig. F. H. Knight, Col. J. F. Buckley, Dean Arthur Carlisle, J. S. Brierley, W. A. Tooke. The Protestant Bureau for Homeless Men agreed to operate the Bureau, and the Canadian National Railways generously made available quarters at 755 Vitre St. W. A tentative budget of \$20,000 was drawn up and a finance committee, composed of Rev. Dean Arthur Carlisle, Father Joseph Fallon, George Lyman, W. A. Tooke and R. P. Jellett, undertook to issue an appeal for this amount. The immediate results of the appeal were very disappointing, although ultimately \$12,920 was subscribed. With finances so uncertain, it was impossible to make adequate arrangements and the procedure was to issue meal tickets for a selected restaurant on Craig St. This was expensive and unsatisfactory, but obviated the necessity of a large capital outlay for kitchen equipment.

In August the City decided to take over the care of homeless men and appointed a committee - the Montreal Relief Committee - under the chairmanship of Gen. G. E. McCuaig, to operate a refuge for the purpose. This refuge at 756 Vitre St. was opened on August 10th, 1931, and has operated continuously since. At the present time, some 5,000 men are being fed there daily, or twice the number fed at the Dufferin Refuge last year, and about 1,600 men are being housed at night.

The Central Registration Bureau operated from June 22nd to August 9th, 1931, during which time 4,571 men were registered and given assistance. The Bureau thanks to the activity of the Finance Committee, closed its books without a deficit. The recognition of the City of its responsibility for the transient homeless man and the appointment of a committee to handle the matter is, we believe, a very favourable outcome of the work of the Dufferin Refuge and the Central Registration Bureau for Homeless Men. In all this the energy and capacity of Mr. J. S. Brierley played a most important part. Mr. Brierley not only had the ability to direct the work, but was able also to secure the services of a great many volunteers, who under his leadership contributed unsparingly of their time and energy. The Protestant Bureau for Homeless Men, under the presidency of Mr. F. R. Campbell, is continuing its case work service to selected homeless men, and the Protestant House of Industry and Refuge is co-operating in a very substantial way.

The Emergency Unemployment Relief Committee, which had closed on May 2nd, 1931, was compelled to re-open about June 1st, 1931, and has been operating ever since with a steadily increasing load. From the week ending May 31st, 1931, to January 2nd, 1932, 3,831 families had been registered of which 891 were foreign born and the weekly case load at the end of 1931 had risen to about 2,000 families.

In August the Special Committee on Unemployment, which had been inactive during June and July, reconvened with a slightly altered personnel. Plans for the winter were made and the present season's activities may be described under several headings.

Protestant Family Relief

All Protestant families in distress due to unemployment, regardless of race, are eligible for relief at the Emergency Unemployment Relief Committee, 1027 St. George St. The applicants are investigated and if genuinely in need,

are supplied with an order for groceries on a chain store. Coal is supplied when necessary. Protestant families, where the distress is due to sickness or some cause in addition to unemployment, may obtain assistance from the Family Welfare Association.

Clothing

Clothing is collected at the Central Emergency Clothing Bureau, 480 Lagauchetiere St., W., which is a joint activity of the Family Welfare Association, the Emergency Unemployment Relief Committee, and the Catholic Welfare Bureau. No fewer than 106 churches are co-operating in the distribution of this clothing for the Emergency Unemployment Relief Committee. Clients of the Family Welfare Association obtain clothing from the district offices of that Association. Special arrangements have been made for transporting parcels from the Central Emergency Clothing Bureau to the various points of distribution. The Central Emergency Clothing Bureau is a hive of industry. Ten women are employed in sewing; six in sorting. There are two shoe makers, one tailor and one handyman. In addition to these paid workers, a large number of volunteers are giving time and services. From the time of the opening of this Bureau in November, 1931, to the close of the year, 2, 090 parcels of clothing were given out. At the head of this important activity is Mrs. A. H. Dalrymple who has brought to the work great energy and the experiences of a good many years.

Office Workers - Men

The Sun Life Assurance Company has again this year, very generously made available office space in its main office building, but the Young Men's Christian Association has undertaken the operation of the Registration Bureau in co-operation with this Council. The Young Men's Christian Association's Committee in charge of this undertaking has for its Chairman, Mr. Will Southam, and your director is a member. The value of this facility can hardly be questioned. Men of the "White collar" class may apply for work here without stigma, and present their problems to an individual who has time to listen and discuss. Mr. Holliday of the Young Men's Christian Association staff is in charge of this activity. Only a small number of the applicants are actually in need of relief and they, if they have dependents, are investigated by the Family Welfare Association and supplied with food and fuel. To December 31st, 1931, 589 individuals had applied for work at the Central Registration Bureau. Employment has been most discouraging, some 56 individuals only having been placed.

Office Workers - Women

It may be recalled that last year distress due to unemployment in women was, as far as we could determine, negligible. This year the situation has altered and a special place to assist unemployed women has been arranged. The Young Women's Christian Association has undertaken this work under the supervision of Miss Finley and Miss Postill. Two bureaux are in operation, one for business and professional women, the other for industrial and domestic women. In addition a workroom has been provided where women may earn a little at sewing. Some 34 women are being provided with work in this way. During the year 5,592 women have been registered at the domestic and industrial bureau and 1,684 placements have been made. At the business and professional women's bureau 469 women have been registered since its opening in November. 14 full time and 13 part time placements have been made. Where relief is needed this is supplied.

Day Shelter for Unemployed Men

Last winter practically no provision was made for shelter during the day for the army of homeless men. As a result they walked the streets in cold and wet weather or sought shelter in stations, stores, taverns, etc. This was obviously unsatisfactory, but so rapidly had the need for actual relief arisen that our effort was concentrated on supplying the basic necessity.

It is largely to the credit of Mr. George Mooney and Capt. William Bowie that the present shelter on Vitre St., east of Bleury was created. These two gentlemen, impressed with the necessity of providing wholesome occupation for the hordes of unemployed men compelled to spend day after day and even month after month in idleness, drew the attention of the Council to the desirability of creating a place where, through recreation or education, some of the evils of prolonged inactivity might be mitigated. A committee was formed composed of the following:- Dr. Frank D. Adams, Chairman, Geo. S. Mooney, Father Jos. Fallon, Emile Benoit, Dr. F. G. Pedley, Carl Ruckman, Rabbi H. Stern, Wm. Bowie, T. Morley Ewing, L. E. Brittle, C. H. Colson, Dr. W. A. Gifford, A. Stanley Rough, W. F. Shepherd, Rev. G. Guiton, D. J. Van Bommel. Dr. Adams has approached the problem with great energy and efficiency and has, with the help of his Committee, created a centre of activity which is, I believe, unique on the continent. The actual conduct of the place is in the hands of the Parks and Playgrounds Association. Capt. Bowie has given a great deal of time to its organization and Mr. Stanley Rough has remained as supervisor.

The Montreal Tramways were public spirited enough to make available the old St. Laurent School on Vitre St., now their property, and have expended a considerable sum of money in refitting the place for its present purpose. The Montreal Relief Committee has also taken a great deal of interest in the enterprise and has voted a sum of \$2,000. towards its operation. In addition a large number of private subscriptions have been made by interested citizens. Three wings of this large structure are now in use and some 4,000 men use the place daily. The recreational activities there range from card playing and checkers to theatrical entertainment in a specially equipped theatre on the top floor. Among the thousands of men attending the place, a considerable amount of histrionic and vocal talent has been found and the concerts, which are conducted daily, are furnished with talent for the most part by the men themselves, although individuals in the community have been very generous of time and talent in behalf of the centre. The Anglican Church has assumed responsibility for this function of the Shelter and Mr. Guiton and Mr. Shepherd have undertaken the actual supervision. The United Church has created a large library and reading room where thousands of books and magazines are available to the men. Rev. Mr. Gifford supervises this.

Perhaps the most constructive part of the Shelter's activities are the educational classes which are being conducted daily in English, French, arithmetic, book keeping and automatic engineering. Some 400 men have already taken advantage of these classes and are pursuing their studies with energy and faithfulness. No disturbance of importance has occurred in the Shelter despite the large number of men attending.

This concludes the recital of the activities of the Special Committee on Unemployment and its associated sub-committees. It will be appreciated that since the last report, there has been an enormous expansion of work due partly to an increase in unemployment distress, an increase more than double that of last year, and partly to a desire to handle the matter more effectively.

We cannot fail to be impressed with the fact that despite the frequent condemnation of the dole, we have in fact the dole at the present time. We have been criticized for supplying relief and recreation without demanding work and the committee is quite aware of the undesirability of this practice. The truth is that there is no work. As is well known, plans have been made for development of public works throughout the city but financial difficulties have arisen which will be adjusted, we hope, in the near future. In this connection the name of Mr. Norman Holland should be mentioned. It is difficult to imagine what the City of Montreal would have done without Mr. Holland's help and we desire to record our appreciation of his advice and help in the many problems which have arisen. It is our belief that the great majority of individuals who have applied for assistance are anxious to work and would welcome an opportunity of becoming self-supporting. Prolonged idleness probably creates finally a disinclination to work and this is one of the worst features of a period of economic depression. It is to be hoped that the future will hold a better solution to the problem than that now in force. In this connection it will be of interest to know that the Council has appointed a special committee to study the question of Unemployment Insurance.

Once more we have to express our appreciation of the action of the Federal Government in making available public money for the relief of distress due to unemployment. Under the Unemployment and Farm Relief Act, 1931, a similar plan to that of last year has been put into operation. Under the Act the City of Montreal is reimbursed by the Federal and Provincial Governments to the extent of two-thirds of its expenditures for relief to unemployed families in distress. That is to say, if the City of Montreal expends \$60,000 on unemployment relief it may recover \$20,000 from the Provincial Government and \$20,000 from the Federal Government. The arrangement in Montreal is to make available to the Advisory Relief Board of the City a certain sum of money and this Board apportions the money to four groups of the population according to their relative population distribution. The Protestant group of the population receives 19% of money allotted. Difficulties arise in this method of distribution for there is no reason for believing that the ratio of destitution is the same as religion. It has been our contention that the only fair way of distributing the money is on the basis of need rather than creed. However, at the present time the money is allocated on the religious basis.

The Special Committee on Unemployment has met the Executive Committee of the City repeatedly by delegation in regard to the financing of its work, and has at all times been received sympathetically. During the year 1931, \$217,859.00 has been paid to the Montreal Council of Social Agencies by the City for unemployment relief.

In the fall a delegation from the Special Committee on Unemployment met the City Council of Westmount and appealed to that body for financial help. A most attentive hearing was given and as a result a very substantial sum of money was voted by the City of Westmount towards unemployment relief in Montreal. The Protestant share of the money already allotted is \$14,910.00. The contribution of the City of Westmount was actuated by the highest motives and we wish at this time to record publicly our sincere appreciation of its generosity.

The audited financial statement of the Special Committee on Unemployment now follows. We are indebted to the Sun Life Assurance Company for the services of the auditors in this work.



UNEMPLOYMENT RELIEF IN MONTREAL

1931 - 32

Many people will be interested to know what arrangements have been made or are being made for handling Unemployment Relief this winter.

The information below covers the agencies handling the bulk of the work. There are, of course, many other organizations intimately concerned in the relief of distress due to unemployment, but serving for the most part special groups. In general, it may be said that all classes of the population are covered so far as food and shelter are concerned by the following agencies:

SINGLE MEN

All single men irrespective of race or religion may apply for assistance at (a) the Meurling Refuge - 435 Champ de Mars St., - Pl. 6111 - from 6 - 7.30 P.M. (b) the Montreal Relief Committee Refuge - 756 Vitre St. W., Ma. 7812 - beds 6 to 8 P.M. daily - Breakfast - 7.45 to 9 A.M. Lunch - 1.15 to 3 P.M.

FAMILIES (Protestant)

Protestant families, where the breadwinner is unemployed but able to work, should apply to The Emergency Unemployment Relief Committee - 1027 St. George St. Ma. 4216 Week days 8 A.M. - 5 P.M. Saturdays 8 A.M. - 1 P.M.

If the breadwinner is sick or the applicant is a woman, application should be made to the Family Welfare Association, 1421 Atwater Ave., Wi. 1151 Week days 9 A.M. - 5 P.M. - Saturdays 9 A.M. - 1 P.M.

A Special Committee of the Montreal Council of Social Agencies is in charge of this work.

Dear Sir:-

The unemployment situation towards which the City gave such timely aid last winter, still exists in a very large measure, although it was hoped that the coming of spring would result in an increase in business activity of a degree sufficient to absorb most of the unemployment.

The Civic Advisory Relief Board expended all its allotment in April, and since then no public moneys have been available for purposes of unemployment relief. The burden of assisting destitution due to unemployment has therefore fallen upon private charity, and so great has this burden become that financial resources are now exhausted and in some instances debts have been incurred by private charitable agencies.

So far as single men are concerned, the Meurling Refuge is nearly full to capacity nightly, and even if it were not, the two slices of bread given there twice daily are not adequate for an individual without resources, so that unless private charity steps in, the occupants of the Meurling Refuge are forced into the illegal practice of begging, if they are to maintain life.

The Central Registration Bureau for Homeless Men has registered over 2,000 destitute men, and is issuing nearly 2,000 meals a day. To a certain number of young men who cannot get into the Meurling Refuge, beds are also being supplied. The cost of this work is in the neighbourhood of \$2,000.00 per week. The great bulk of individuals registered there are foreign-born, English or Central Europeans, who do not fit into the regular relief channels and who, on account of popular opinion, are experiencing great difficulty in securing work.

Among married men an even more serious state of affairs obtains. The St. Vincent de Paul Societies are supporting families, the Catholic Welfare Bureau 176 families, the Family Welfare Association 136 families, the Emergency Unemployment Relief Committee 366 families, the Jewish Family Welfare Association 100 families.

The total of families, the bread-winner of which is able to work, but unable to obtain work, are being supported by these named agencies.

We understand that many cities in Canada have assumed the cost of unemployment relief. We also understand that a considerable part of the moneys voted by the Federal Government for direct relief are still

available, if the City and Province will contribute their share. Further, it is reported in the Press that so far as the immigrant unemployed are concerned, the Federal Government will be prepared to pay half the expense of their relief.

We believe that unemployment is a civic, provincial and national problem not fairly to be relegated to the generosity of a small group of citizens. We therefore pray, the City of Montreal, to give this matter careful attention to the end that some way can be found to meet this serious situation.

Last winter the Montreal Council of Social Agencies appointed a Special Committee on Unemployment to co-ordinate unemployment relief activities among the Protestant group. This Committee was entrusted with the public moneys allotted to the Protestant group and disbursed these moneys largely through four channels, the Emergency Unemployment Relief Committee, the Protestant Bureau for Homeless Men, the Family Welfare Association and the Central Registration Bureau for Unemployed Office Workers.

We did not ask you to serve on this Committee last year because you were out of town, but we would consider it a great honour if you would let your name stand as a member for 1931-32. Generally speaking, the work of the Committee is conducted through a small executive group and meetings of the whole Committee are not ordinarily called more than once every six weeks or two months. FIGHT DON'T STARVE

Throughout the whole of Canada the unemployed workers organised into the National Unemployed Workers Association and under the leadership of the Workers Unity League have been carrying on a bitter struggle for relief. These workers understand the meaning of the slogan "Fight Don't Starve". They see that only by fighting can they possibly get something more than the garbage that is generally handed out at "Jimmy the Pig's".

The boss class howl and squeal about the "Idle" demoralising and degrading the unemployed, it is not good for their morale, that it destroys their "Soul", but there is howl or squeal about the damnable conditions that the unemployed have live under, to beg and bun, to eat swill not fit for the pigs, to become loused in the flops of "Jimmy the Pig", condemned to misery and degradation. FIGHT BENNETT'S HUNGER BUDGET

When the Millionaire Bennett presented the budget there was not one mention of the 500,000 jobless workers or of their 2,000,000 dependants. Bennett has kept his word that he would not put "a premium on idleness", and the 500,000 workless must get along as best as they can.

The Budget produces nothing for the unemployed, but the parasites that live on the backs of the workers are given further concessions. A substantial reduction on income tax on incomes over 25,000 dollars per year; five per bushel subsidy on all grain exported. On the other hand the workers are to pay more for the necessities of life. Wholesale increase in the tax on foodstuffs.

These increases in taxation only mean an increase on the cost of living. Side by side with this the workers are speeded up, wages are being reduced, and the working day lengthened. Fight this Budget by demanding Non-Contributory Unemployment Insurance. Fight it by joining the National Unemployed Workers Association.

IN MONTREAL NOT MOSCOW

Some workers are naive enough to believe that the bosses will not take advantage of the large numbers of jobless to get their work done cheaply. How is for a good illustration.

In the New Shop of the North Eastern Lunch two dishwashers were fired and four unemployed given their place. This is very good, BUT the two dishwashers received wages, the unemployed do not. In other words the North Eastern Lunch took advantage of unemployment to get the work done for NOTHING. Even the charity hogs (of the Sally Ann typw) cannot beat that.

This little game of the North-eastern and other such like outfits can be stopped if the unemployed join the National Unemployed Workers Association and build a scab proof Union.

CANADIAN CONSTRUCTION ASSOCIATION,

Believing that the most urgent problem before our Country today is that of unemployment, the Executive and Advisory Council of the Canadian Construction Association, after careful consideration, offer the following Resolution:-

WHEREAS unemployment is a serious deterrent to progress and greatly retards recovery of business to normal conditions; and

WHEREAS it is generally admitted that every competent person who is willing to work is entitled to employment; and

WHEREAS it is incredible that work cannot be found in a vast and undeveloped country such as Canada; and

WHEREAS in view of the great opportunities for employment we believe that Unemployment Insurance would be extremely injurious and greatly delay recovery of business and development of enterprise.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

THAT the Federal Government be asked to call an employment conference as soon as possible.

THAT leaders in industry, finance, insurance, together with representatives of workers, be called together to find the best solution of the problem.

THAT the findings of this conference be reported to the Federal Government with a view to having definite action taken at the earliest possible time.

THAT a copy of this Resolution, together with the proposed plan to regularize employment, be forwarded to the Federal Government and also to the Manufacturers Association, The Canadian Chamber of Commerce, President of Trades and Labour Congress and other like organizations.

PLAN TO REGULARIZE EMPLOYMENT.

(SUGGESTED BY CANADIAN CONSTRUCTION ASSOCIATION).

The following brief outline of a plan to regularize employment is intended as a basis for discussion at a conference which it is hoped the Federal Government will see fit to call immediately, with a view to adopting some permanent plan to regularize employment throughout Canada.

It is proposed that this plan be adopted and put into practice for at least three or four years, with a view to making it continuous, as a solution of the serious unemployment problem which recurs periodically under present conditions.

This plan should be a combination of the Federal relief measure passed last Fall, with the best principles of Insurance as practiced in other countries. The former should provide employment and the latter provide the means.

Under this plan every individual employee on a salary or wage basis (except those employed on relief work) would be required to contribute. Every employer would also be required to contribute an amount equal to the total assessed on his employees, and the Federal Government would also assist by contributing a like amount.

In order to establish a fund immediately, the Federal Government should be asked to vote an amount, which would be considered as a loan, to establish this employment plan.

A Federal Commission should be appointed to carry out this proposed plan, and might be organized on a similar basis as the Provincial Workmen's Compensation Boards.

All relief works performed under this plan should be in the nature of general improvements of all kinds, but otherwise should be non-productive, that is, nothing would be produced for sale. The result of these works would be to create an increased demand for the productions of existing industry, thus indirectly providing greater employment and more steady work for those who would be contributing to the fund.

The wages and salaries paid on all such relief work should be considerably below those paid on regular normal work, so that workers would be

attracted to existing industries whenever the demand for increased regular employment occurred. In other words, employment under this plan must always be considered in the light of relief work, which would practically cease in prosperous times.

It seems evident that the adoption of some such plan to regularize employment would do more to restore general confidence and to create demand for products than any suggestion yet formulated.

This plan would prove itself a positive one in its effect, while the working out of Unemployment Insurance (Dole) at its best is a negative influence, as it works against the best interest of both the contributor and the recipient. In fact, this plan, while being a burden to no one, would benefit him that gives and him that takes, as well as Canada as a whole.

An indirect result would be to remove a great deal of the emergency relief assistance handed out by charitable organizations at the present time, and would tend to reduce want, suffering and crime.

There seems to be no necessity to suggest in detail the nature of the various works to be performed as relief works, because it is evident that innumerable ideas and practical suggestions will certainly result in abundance of employment for many years to come. A conference such as suggested should, however, outline definitely many of the suggested works to be carried out.

As a basis for consideration this Association is of the opinion that the step taken by the Dominion Government last Fall, through which large sums of money were spent in providing work on projects of a non-productive character, such as roadwork, grade separations, etc., indicates the proper course to be followed. It suggests, with some modifications, the recent Federal relief plan might well form the basis of a scheme to regularize employment.

It is suggested that some index of unemployment shall be maintained and that when it reaches a certain level, either general across the country or in any particular locality, then, and only then, work under this fund shall automatically be provided and improvement work put in hand.

My dear Minister,

With further reference to our telephone conversation yesterday, I hope nothing will occur to prevent your coming to Montreal on Wednesday evening. I would suggest that you take the late afternoon train down, dine with me at my house, 3450 McTavish Street, and after dinner we could have a chat with men who are interested in this matter of unemployment. I would gladly put you up for the night and you could take the early train back in the morning. This would be better than asking you to receive a deputation in Ottawa: I do not think the publicity attached to these deputations moving on Ottawa does any good.

I beg to give you the assurance that the situation here is very serious. There are very many single unemployed men who have nowhere to sleep and nothing to eat except what is given them, and the police have been very severe upon anyone caught begging. Certain funds have been raised privately but the response has not been as generous as in the past. The married unemployed are better looked after, the organization dealing with them having been in existence for a good many years and now works very effectively. It is the single men, who have no ties who are a problem. They are becoming truculent, articulate and aggressive. I honestly believe that many of them have most courageously and uncomplainingly put up with conditions, until now when they are becoming convinced that the situation is hopeless. I would gladly do anything to help you in what I know must be an anxious time for the Minister of Labour.

My dear Sir Arthur,

Referring to our conversation over the telephone this evening I would like to say that we have not had the ordinary hobos around our house this summer. They are for the most part young men from 16 to 21 or so, who have been brought out from the old country by various organisations, attracted by the promises held out of the wonderful opportunities in this country. There may be some among them who have been foolish, but those who have interviewed them here have been impressed with the character of the men. Such young men as Lindsay Hall, Beoth Claxton, Ernest Common (all story), W. Dr. Sawyer of your McGill University; then too Dean Carlisle, Canon Gower Rees have also talked to the men I have been convinced of their genuineness ~~of the men~~. They are young, full of life & cheerful, though often telling us that they are suffering from hunger. Our Wright saw five of them on our steps on Friday, took two (2) of them off & rigged them out with clothes so they could go for a job. We have never had any of this foreign element here, nor do we have the old "tramp" type. I have been impressed with the

large number of Scotch boys among them. I do wish some of our leading business & professional men would interview a number of these boys so they could see the type. I think they would be impressed. Certainly those men who have been here & have talk with them have been convinced that they should be encouraged & helped. I feel sure if the committee would get in touch with them they would understand the problem better. They need a helping hand and sympathy & kindness. Youth requires that if it is to develop aright; with harshness & injustice these young fellows may be forced into wrong courses. They have no place to go but the streets, no place to rest, but are being forced from place to place. If they do not go wrong under their present treatment it will be one of the miracles of the ages. I know there are many foreigners in the line up on Viter St, quite a number of the middle aged men, but these have not come to our house.

I thank you so much for all you have done in this matter, for your kindness & help. I am very anxious about the Conference for Wednesday evening. I have postponed my services & will be home on Wednesday morning. I hope those who know the conditions will be at the conference. May God direct us all aright!

You will remember that in October, 1930, your Government voted an extra sum of \$10,000. to the Family Welfare Association bringing the total grant for that year up to \$15,000.00.

We understood that this would establish the annual grant at \$15,000. and expected the amount would be forthcoming this year, and therefore the Family Welfare Association for 1931 was drawn up on this basis.

There have been so many extra demands this year on the Association that they will show a deficit of approximately \$30,000. which will be increased by \$10,000. if you decide to cut the grant to \$5,000.

We would therefore ask you in view of present conditions to make the grant at least the same as last year, but hope you will feel justified in adding to this amount for the reasons set forth in our previous letter.

Dear Mr. Taschereau:-

Last year about this time, I approached you with a view to obtaining an extra grant for the Family Welfare Association and you kindly raised their allotment from Five thousand to Fifteen thousand Dollars --- we asked for Twenty-five thousand.

The unemployment situation is, as you know, quite serious, and the Family Welfare are doing splendid work in looking after distressed families. Their Investigation Department is well run so they are quite sure any help that is given is deserved.

The main object of this Association is to help the families to keep together and if they have broken up, to try and bring them together again, - in other words - to maintain the home, and in this they have been successful.

In 1928 a calculation was made which indicated that had the children in the families under the care of the Family Welfare Association been placed in institutions, as they would have been had the Family Welfare not been in existence, the cost to the Government would have been \$31,536.00.

In 1930, owing somewhat to an increased number of families, and also to the fact that they were under the care of the Family Welfare for a longer period, Mr. Clarke informs me that the cost of keeping these children in institutions at the Provincial rate of \$7.20 per month, would have totalled approximately \$48,000.00. In addition to this money, which was saved to the Government by operation of the Family Welfare in 1930, a sum of about \$9,000.00 would have been chargeable to the Government for the care of old persons, who would have been sent to institutions instead of being kept in their homes.

You will see therefore, by these figures that the work of the Family Welfare saved the public authorities \$57,000.00 in 1930. In return for this, the Government made a grant to the Family Welfare of \$15,000. These calculations have been made with considerable care, and are based on the number of persons who are dependent due to sickness, widowhood, desertion or imprisonment, and not on account of straight unemployment.

In view of these figures do you not consider that this Association should be reimbursed at least what the Government has been saved through their efforts.

Financial Federation will have their usual campaign at the end of October, and owing to present conditions and if we are to maintain our Agencies on the same basis as heretofore, we will need to add \$80,000.00 or \$90,000.00 to our objective, which, last year, was \$660,000. We are looking forward to the results with some misgivings but intend to do the best we can as usual.



Re: Provincial Grant.

During the year 1931 the Family Welfare Association dealt with 3,571 families, of whom 2,643 were resident in Montreal and 928 in Verdun.

Of these 3,571 families 1,301 received service only and 2,270 relief and service, relief costing \$229,762.23.

The expenditure on relief excluding the Atholstan Educational Fund of \$5,666.75 was \$224,095.48, made up as follows: -

The following figures regarding the cost of children under care in families during the year 1931 are based on a study of Montreal families that were accepted for long term care because the male breadwinner was either dead or totally incapacitated because of sickness, old age or imprisonment. They do not relate to the larger group of cases where the male breadwinner had deserted, or was a behaviour problem, or where there was a labor and wage condition, or to families resident in Verdun.

It is the custom under the Quebec Public Charities Act to leave one child in the care of its mother when the remainder of the family is placed in institutions, so that from the 769 children mentioned above 258 should be deducted, leaving 511 children who would normally come under the provisions of the Act. These 511 children at \$7.20 per month or \$86.40 per annum would amount to \$44,150.44.

In addition, 112 individuals who are eligible for care in an Old Folks' Home, would if institutionalized at \$9.00 per month or \$108.00 per annum, cost \$12,096.00 under the Act, - making a grand total collectable under the Act of \$56,246.00. The Provincial Government Grant to the Family Welfare Association is \$15,000., (of which \$5,000. of the 1931 grant is still outstanding) so that the saving to the Government amounts to over \$41,000. per annum.


There is no doubt in my mind that children of deserted mothers and of those families who come under our classification of "behaviour problems" would if Roman Catholics be admitted to institutions and benefit under the Quebec Public Charities Act, so that the figures quoted show a conservative estimate.

In conclusion, with only one Protestant Old Folks' Home, and that with a long waiting list and with no prospect of a building programme for at least five years, this Association should not be asked to carry the whole cost of caring for old people, and our Association would urge that this question as well as a per capita grant for dependent children should be pressed by your Council when placing our request before the Provincial authorities.

Data Comparing Salaries of Federation
Agencies with Comparable Positions
Elsewhere. (Collected by the Federa-
tion Executives' Group Conference).

1. General Statement Regarding Pay-Roll

There are approximately 410 individuals employed full time by the 33 agencies in Financial Federation. In addition there are some 250 individuals who give part time and occasional service, such as doctors, recreational workers, camps staffs, settlement workers, Daily Vacation Schools staff, Murray Bay Convalescent Home staff, etc. Of the 410 full time employees, 184 are domestics, janitors, furnace men, and the like. There are about 90 trained nurses employed by the Victorian Order of Nurses, the Child Welfare Association and one or two other organizations. 55 trained social investigators are employed by the Family Welfare Association, Children's Bureau, Women's Directory, and the Society for the Protection of Women and Children. The remaining 100 employees consist of settlement workers, the staff of the Parks and Playgrounds Association, executive officers of the 33 agencies, stenographers, bookkeepers, and clerks. 71 of these 410 full time employees receive less than \$600. a year, 85 receive between \$600. and \$1,000. per year, and only 27 receive more than \$2,000. a year.

2. Office Workers

Figures have kindly been supplied by several large corporations of the city for purposes of comparison with office workers' salaries paid by our agencies. A chartered accountant has also given us an estimate of the usual range of salaries paid in downtown firms.

The figures supplied represent current business salaries all of which have already been cut directly or reduced in effect by postponement of increases or discontinuance of bonus or other emoluments. Figures quoted under No. 5. represent reduced salaries following cuts of 10% effected this year. Notwithstanding, the range of salaries paid by our agencies for the eight classes in which comparison is possible, is lower than all the others for three categories. For junior bookkeepers and junior clerks our salaries are higher but it is believed that a greater responsibility is carried by workers whom our agencies classify as junior bookkeepers and clerks.

Certain other emoluments are included with the downtown salary schedules as shown in this table.

For salaries within Federation the median salary is shown together with the maximum and minimum. The median represents the middle figure of the series, i.e. an equal number of the salaries in the class are below, and an equal number

above the median. The median therefore gives a fair indication of the dispersion of salaries within the group.

Secretary-Stenographers - The median is low, showing that the bulk of salaries in this group are close to the minimum. Office secretaries with responsibilities in bookkeeping, purchasing, and office management are included in this category.

Telephone operators - The median is the same as the minimum. The maximum figure here represents the salary of an employee who has important responsibilities not usually placed upon a telephone operator, and therefore is high compared with the remainder.

3. Dietitians and Nutrition Workers

These are low compared with the examples given. The following important responsibilities placed upon our dietitians and nutrition workers in social work should be noted; instructing nurses and workers who are in turn teaching in the homes of the people; preparation of minimum health budgets; preparation of special diets - for the sick, for infants, etc.

4. Nurses

The high median for staff nurses indicates that the majority of nurses employed are close to the maximum. It should be noted that a rating scale for nursing salaries providing for routine increases has been in effect for some years within Federation. This has afforded a protection to the nursing group which other workers, notably the case working group, have lacked, with results that will be seen below. It is felt that the establishment of definite ratings for all types of positions is the only fair way of according protection and equitable treatment to workers, and particularly new workers, in our agencies.

Of interest in this connection, some figures are given from the Survey of Nursing Education in Canada by G.M. Weir, Professor of Education in the University of British Columbia. From data collected largely in 1930, median salaries are shown for the five geographic areas and for all Canada. It should be noted that rural public health nursing salaries are included.

The standard training for public health nurses consists of one year of graduate work in a school of public health nursing following the three year nurses training period.

5. Case Workers

A comparison has been made with teachers' salaries since this is a professional group that is comparable in some respects in regard to educational preparation. Comparing case workers' salaries with those of teachers in elementary schools and district secretaries' salaries with those of high school teachers in Montreal, it will be seen at once that the social work salaries compare unfavourably.

Elementary school teachers may secure their certificates with grade XI high school standing and one year of normal school. High school teachers are university graduates who have included certain specified courses in their undergraduate work. A permanent diploma is granted after two years' successful teaching experience.

Figures are also quoted from a report on salaries and vacations in family case work in 1929 issued by the Department of Statistics of the Russell Sage Foundation. 260 family societies in the United States and Canada are included in this study.

The standard educational equipment of a case worker consists of a university degree together with two years of post graduate training in a school of social work or the equivalent in special training and experience. The building up of such standards in our agencies has been a slow and arduous process but we have so far progressed that the vast majority of our case workers now have a university education (most of them a degree), together with a diploma from a recognized school of social work, or a reasonable equivalent in special training and experience.

In the table of case work salaries it will be noted that both for case workers and district secretaries the median salary is the same as the minimum, while for senior visitors the median salary is actually below the minimum set for that class.

These figures speak for themselves. Though standards were established by the Committee on Standardization of Service and Salaries, there has been no adherence to a definite rating schedule such as has been recognized for nurses, and budgetting policies for the past three years have even denied to senior visitors their proper rating, with the result noted above. There are also district secretaries who are only receiving the salaries of senior case workers. It is a fact that if many of these workers were given their proper ratings according to recognized standards, they would be better off with a substantial cut in salary than they are at present.

6. Educational, Recreational, and Settlement Workers

No part time positions, of which there are many in the recreational field, are included in this table. Of the 21 positions considered, other emoluments are included in 5 cases. The educational preparation of those engaged in recreation leadership should be practically equivalent to that of a case worker. While such standards have not yet been attained in all our recreational activities in Montreal, a large proportion of our recreation workers have had university training or special preparation for their work.






Once again we are appealing to you on behalf of the Federated Charities of Montreal, whose eleventh annual campaign opens Monday, October 31st.

McGill has this year been asked to subscribe \$19,500, which is an increase of \$2000 over our total contribution of last year. It is obvious that to secure this larger amount will be no easy task, but we feel that we must succeed, so that want and suffering may not come to those depending upon us.

The additional \$2000 which McGill is asked to give is our share of a \$25,000 increase required to enable the 32 agencies of the Federation to carry on their work in the city, even though this work has been reduced to a basis of essential service. Never before have such heavy demands been made upon the resources of these agencies. To instance but one organization: The Family Welfare Association is at the present time caring for approximately 1200 families per month, which is almost double the average for the year 1929. Not only is there an increased number of calls, but there is a great per capita increase in relief. Families must be cared for over longer periods. There are few odd jobs to tide them over. Landlords, grocers, employers, creditors, friends, relatives, churches, etc., are unable to help relieve the distress, and the Welfare Association is the last resort. For this organization alone it is estimated that an increase of at least \$36,000 over last year will be required.

Knowing your sympathy with the cause, and your generous response to our appeals in the past, we feel that it is unnecessary to do more than remind you that this year the need is greater than ever before. We are enclosing your card and would ask you to complete it and return it in the enclosed envelope, at your very earliest convenience.

My dear Minister,

The request which I hoped to prefer in person this morning is an important one, and I believe well worthy of your favourable consideration.

I am this year the Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Financial Federation, and I wish to make a plea on behalf of that body and on behalf of the Catholic charities as well.

The need is greater than ever before. We cannot hope to collect much larger subscriptions from friends who have contributed in the past, and so our hope lies in increasing the number of our subscriptions. In previous years we have been allowed to circularize the employees of the Post Office, but the results are practically nil. In fact, the cost of postage has always been more than the money received. 

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

My dear Captain Lascelles,

I am this year Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Federated Charities of Montreal, and in that capacity I have been asked to approach His Excellency the Governor-General to ask him if he would be willing to make a nation-wide broadcast appeal on behalf of the Federated Charities throughout the Dominion.

If His Excellency is willing, the broadcast would take place at 6:45 p.m., on either the 19th or 20th of the present month. It would be arranged for him in whatever place he happened to be at that particular time: should he be in Ottawa, it would be arranged for him to speak from Rideau Hall.

I believe the idea arose from some remarks His Excellency made when addressing the Service Clubs in Vancouver, where he referred to the necessity of avoiding any overlapping in the work carried on by these Service institutions.

As you may know, some ten or eleven years ago, we induced the principal charitable organizations to federate, and instead of each one making a separate appeal in Montreal on its own behalf, we have now one appeal on behalf of thirty-four organizations. You can readily appreciate the great convenience that is for those who subscribe to charities, and the tremendous advantage to the charities themselves. We have found that people subscribe more willingly, because they realize that it is a business-like way of conducting these organizations, and much waste and extravagance is avoided. People have grown to have confidence in these federations, believing that the money given will be better spent, and that a stricter supervision will exist in connection with budgets. Last year in Montreal we raised \$751,000, and this year we are attempting to raise \$776,000, so that you

can readily appreciate the great organization it has grown to be.

The leading cities of Canada have followed Montreal's example, - Toronto, Winnipeg, Calgary, Vancouver, etc.

We have here the Protestant Federated Charities, the Jewish Federated Charities, and the Roman Catholic Federated Charities, so that His Excellency would have the assurance that in making such an appeal it could not be said that he was making it on behalf of one section only of the Dominion, or one class of the community.

We should be glad to furnish His Excellency with sufficient data regarding the scope of Federated Charities activities and with reasons why these institutions have been forced to extend their operations.

I feel that an appeal on behalf of charity is one which His Excellency could make with every propriety, and he would have the additional satisfaction of knowing that he is speaking on behalf of a very worthy cause.



I am much interested to hear of the progress that has been made in the co-ordination of charitable work in so many of the leading cities of the Dominion: One of the worst evils in the world to-day is the evil of waste: waste of substance, waste of opportunity, and most important of all, waste of energy. Dear Mr. Premier;

On February 7th., 1927 a petition was sent to you by the Montreal Council of Social Agencies in respect to the administration of the Public Charities Act and the erection and maintenance of a non-Catholic Training School for Mental Defectives.

The undersigned constituting the Advisory Board of the Financial Federation of the Montreal Council of Social Agencies have been acquainted with the character and circumstance of the petition and feel that the requests made were and still are reasonable and fair, and should in justice be conceded to the English Protestant and Jewish minorities of the Province.

We have set out hereunder the four requests made and certain statistical facts in respect to the distribution of the Public Charities Fund, and are confident that you will see the justice of the claims of these minorities and will take such action as is necessary to bring about a fairer distribution of the Fund.

The following table shows the total disbursements from the Public Charities Fund; the total subsidies from the Public Charities Fund, the Reformatory and Industrial Schools' Act and the Consolidated Revenue Fund to eleven Federation agencies; the total allotments to these eleven agencies from the Federation Fund and the total subscribed by the Citizens of Montreal to the thirty-two agencies in Federation.

From the above figures it seems very evident that the Federation Charities have not secured very much support from the Public Charities Fund and that the amount of support has not grown year by year in proportion to the increase in the total amount redistributed. There are two main reasons for this situation.

First, the Act was framed with the intent to benefit primarily institutions or hospitals providing bed and board for indigents and hospitalization for the sick.

The policy of Protestant Charities has been for many years to maintain the integrity of family life wherever possible, rendering assistance in the family home in preference to placing the dependent members of the family whether adult or juvenile in institutions.

As a consequence the Family Welfare Association, the charity in Federation which cares for family dependency, has increased its relief budget from \$80,500 in 1923 to \$137,515 in 1929.

Second, by Order in Council a regulation has been passed which does not permit an indigent to benefit from the fund unless he has been five years resident in Canada.

The petition presented to you in 1927 urged that the per capita per diem allowances for dependent children should be paid on the basis of the child's dependency, irrespective of the type of care afforded. If this principle was recognized many of the 1,652 children under 15 years of age who were cared for by the Family Welfare Association in their own homes in 1929, would have been eligible for the 24 cent per day subsidy from the Public Charities Fund.

The petition further urged that the Order in Council barring indigents from benefitting unless they had been five years in Canada be amended by reducing the residential qualification to one year's residence.

The petition further urged that assistance be given to the non-Catholic population to enable them to establish a training school for mentally defective children. Assistance has already been given to the Sisters in the development of such a school at Le Jammerais. The non-Catholic population finds itself greatly handicapped in its work by being forced to house in orphanages and other institutions subnormal children, who cannot be trained alongside normal children, and whose presence is inimical to the interests of the normal children.

Lastly, the petition urged that the Act make it obligatory for each and every municipality to pay for indigent patients admitted to any hospital or charity recognized by the Act, provided that legal residence has been established, and that in the case of patients admitted from unorganized territory, or for whom no legal residence could be established, the Provincial Government should make payment from the Government's share of the proceeds.

Federation Charities are largely non-sectarian in their work

The impression has prevailed in some quarters that the Federation Charities confine themselves to helping Protestant people. This is far from being true.

Of the thirty-two charities in the Federation only ten confine their work solely to persons of the Protestant faith. Some of them notably the Victorian Order of Nurses, the Child Welfare Association and the social settlements, are doing a large proportion of their work with Roman Catholics.

It has been estimated ^{that} the cost of the work done for non-Protestant persons is at least \$140,000 per year.

In this case we ask that assistance should be given in a practical form by increasing the present grant of \$5,000 per annum to the Family Welfare Association to \$25,000 which figure is a conservative estimate of the amount which would be paid for the care of dependents, who might be legitimately placed in institutions if the Family Welfare Association refused assistance to them in their own homes.

Taking all these facts into consideration we sincerely trust that you will see your way to rendering assistance at an early date in some form. We understand that at the last session of the legislature it was decided to appoint a commission to enquire into various social questions which may have some bearing upon the situation and make you disinclined to take any action in regard to the working of the Public Charities Act until the Commission has reported.

We feel that the unusual conditions which will almost inevitably be met with during the coming winter will make heavy demands on the charities in Federation, and will make the collection of the generous amounts secured from the citizens of Montreal somewhat more difficult this year than in previous years. We therefore, earnestly hope that the petition in this letter will receive the sympathetic consideration of yourself and your colleagues.

Dear Mr. Prime Minister:

In previous years the Chairman of the Board of Directors of Federated Charities has presented to you the claims of the Family Welfare Association for special consideration on the part of the Provincial Government.

We have pointed out to you that the principle upon which the Family Welfare Association operates, is somewhat different from that recognized under the Quebec Public Charities Act, for the Family Welfare Association endeavours to maintain dependent children and old people in their own home rather than maintaining them in public institutions. It is of interest to note that the Quebec Social Insurance Commission has recently endorsed this procedure in recommending for your favourable consideration, Mothers' Allowances legislation.

Each year, for the past two or three years, we have calculated the saving we have effected for the Provincial Government by our procedure, and we find that for the year 1931, which is the last year for which we have complete records, 511 children under our care were entitled to \$7.20 per capita per month if they had been placed in institutions. That is to say, the Provincial Government was saved an expenditure of \$44,150.44. In addition to this large group of children who were cared for during the whole of 1931, there were 112 aged individuals who under the Quebec Public Charities Act would have been entitled to \$9.00 per capita per month if they had been placed in an institution. This group would have cost the Provincial Government \$12,096.00

I would like to make it quite clear that this expenditure does not by any means represent the cost to the Family Welfare of its work among the poor and destitute of the City of Montreal. Actually that organization spent \$229,762.23, exclusive of all administration expenses, on the relief of the needy in 1931.

You will appreciate, I am sure, the very great difficulty which confronts us this year of raising the large amount which will be necessary for the relief of destitution among Protestants in the City of Montreal. I am well aware of the large sums of money which your Government is contributing towards the relief of distress due to unemployment, but I can assure you that none of this money finds its way to the Family Welfare Association. Its work is entirely among the group of destitute people who are not considered entitled to unemployment relief.

May I bespeak your very favourable consideration of this letter. I would be pleased to call on you at your convenience and discuss the matter in greater detail.

It is customary at this time of year for the Chairman of the Board of Directors of Financial Federation to make an application to the Prime Minister of the Province for an increased grant to the Family Welfare Association. Last year Mr. Dawes applied for \$50,000.00 and you will see by the enclosed letter the reasons he gave for this. Unfortunately the Provincial Government did not see fit to make any such grant. In fact it was doubtful for some time whether more than \$5,000.00 would be paid. It was only after a letter was sent signed by all the Advisory Board and after you took the matter up yourself, that any action was taken by the Provincial Government. So far, we have received \$10,000.00 which we are assuming is for our 1931 work, and we understand that another \$5,000.00 will be forthcoming, making \$15,000.00 in all, which as I say, we are considering as a 1931 grant.


Under the system operating in the Province of Quebec, institutions harbouring indigent people are entitled to a per capita grant, half of which is paid by the Province and half by the municipality. This applies to children and old people.

It is a principle of the Family Welfare Association not to institutionalize individuals if they can be maintained in their own homes. That is to say, old couples are not placed in institutions but are provided with shelter and sustenance in their own domiciles. Similarly children are not removed from their mothers but are left in the home and the mother is subsidized for their care. However, if the Family Welfare Association adopted the plan in effect among the French Roman Catholics, the Provincial Government would be under certain expenses, which are set down in a letter from Mr. G.B. Clarke of the Family Welfare Association to me, copy of which I am enclosing.

You will see that the activities of the Family Welfare Association in behalf of children and old people saves the Provincial Government \$56,246.00. It is our contention that we are entitled to this \$56,246.00 just as much as if we adopted the plan of institutionalizing these indigent people. In fact, it is our contention that our method of operation is superior to that of French Catholic charitable organizations.

I am enclosing a draft letter to the Prime Minister which may save you time, but doubtless you will want to word it in your own way.

My dear Prime Minister,

I know how you have constantly urged the moral obligation of everyone to give to the cause of charity. I think the people of Montreal generally have responded nobly. Last year we raised the sum of \$751,000, and this year we have set our campaign objective at \$776,000. I am sure you will appreciate the very great difficulty which confronts us this year in raising such a large amount. But I assure you it is necessary for the relief of destitution among Protestants in this City.

I am well aware of the large sums of money which your Government has contributed in the past and is contributing now towards the relief of distress due to unemployment, but I can assure you that none of this money finds its way to the Family Welfare Association. Its work lies entirely among the group of destitute people who are not considered entitled to unemployment relief. You will appreciate, too, that this well-organized and well-run Association makes its funds go farther than individual organizations could manage to do. There are now some thirty-four charities in the Financial Federation.

I fully appreciate the great task that confronts you in these days of falling revenues and a depleted Treasury. Yet I bespeak your very favourable consideration of the plea I am now making, - an especially potent plea, when you consider that if this Federation did not exist, many of those whom it helps would have a just claim under the Public Charities Act of Quebec. This claim, which I have set forth above, would in 1931 have amounted to a sum between \$56,000 and \$57,000.

Mr. Taschereau did not seem to appreciate that it would not be necessary for him to come to Montreal to broadcast for us, nor even to leave his house in Quebec. If you think he is under a misapprehension in this regard, you might think it worth while to try again. However if you think he really would rather not broadcast, of course we shall be very glad indeed to receive a statement for use in the newspapers.

It is possible that Mr. Taschereau has his own ideas as to what to say, but if he desires any suggestions I think it might be useful for him to stress the need for the greatest co-operation between public and private bodies in these very difficult times. The Provincial Government has always endeavoured to stimulate private philanthropy and in nearly every field, in which the Provincial Government has entered in connection with the relief of destitution, it has always been on a partnership basis with private charity. The Quebec Public Charities Act is based on a tri-partite responsibility - Province, municipality and private organization. Unemployment relief, so far as the government is concerned, covers only food, fuel, clothing and shelter to those who are employable. It makes no provisions for medical care or for leisure time activities for the unemployed, and does not apply to destitute children, old persons, or unemployable persons of working age. Nor does public unemployment relief make any provision for the prevention of delinquency, for the care of discharged prisoners, for bedside nursing and all the other activities which are embraced in the appeal of the Federated Charities.

The Premier, in his remarks, might quite fittingly mention the English Catholic and the Jewish appeals.

We were glad to get Lord Bessborough's note and shall have it inserted in the papers probably on Monday, the 31st.

I was away in Ottawa when your movietone was reviewed, and I have not had an opportunity of seeing it yet. I understand, however, that it is very good. We are very appreciative of all your efforts in behalf of the Federation publicity.



Some Notes for Movietone Address - 1933 Campaign

The attainment of the Federated Charities objective of \$776,000 means much more than just food and shelter to the thousands dependent on these thirty-two agencies.

It means also all those forms of assistance that are helping people back along the road to health and decent living. It means nursing and convalescent care for the sick, protection for homeless children, playgrounds and neighbourhood clubs to keep boys and girls off the streets. It means "another chance" to the discharged prisoner and to the boy or girl in trouble.

It means employment services and legal aid for the destitute, health clinics for babies and children, and security for old people in their declining years.

The Federated Charities require more funds to meet the increased calls upon them and it is unthinkable that we should fail to stand behind these charities when their services are most urgently needed.



Some notes for Sir Arthur Currie - Article for McGill Daily

The Federated Charities of Montreal are now making their tenth annual appeal for funds to carry on the work of thirty-two welfare agencies. To meet the anticipated distress of this coming year they must raise \$728,000. - \$54,000. more than they have ever raised before. They must raise this amount in the face of conditions which have so affected the circumstances of many former subscribers that they will be unable to give at all this year.

Last year ¹⁹³⁰ these thirty-two charities made their appeal when in men and women were being thrown out of employment/steadily increasing numbers. They knew they were facing a year ahead when calls of distress would be multiplied many times over. The demands upon these charities have far exceeded even the anticipations of those intimately connected with this work. The needs have never been as great as they are ^{in 1931} to-day.

One year ago the Federated Charities appealed especially to those who had an assured income, or had more than enough spending money for their essential needs, to give generously for the sake of those who had been made suddenly destitute and homeless through force of circumstances entirely beyond their control. ⁵ This year

McGill has been organized for a number of years as a separate division in the Federated Charities Campaign, and the response from both students and faculty has been most generous. The thirty-two Federated Charities are rendering ~~essential~~ ^{vital} public services important to the welfare of our ~~whole~~ city. They are giving medical and nursing care to the destitute sick, safeguarding the health of children, ^{helping to} ~~keeping~~ up morale, and

supplying the necessities of life to thousands of people dependent on them. *They must have* ~~It is unthinkable that we should not supply them with~~


Dear Sir Arthur:-





Appeal to Bennett re Grant

January 17, 1933.

My dear Prime Minister,

This year I happen to be Chairman of the Federated Charities of Montreal, and I have been urged to write you concerning the possible reorganization of direct relief methods throughout the Dominion which, according to press reports may be dealt with at the Federal-Provincial Conference in Ottawa to-day.

I believe the "charity" organizations would support the proposal which I hear is likely to be made. I ^{am} told there is a probability that this matter of relief ~~would~~ be taken out of the hands of the "charity" organizations and placed under the control of public bodies or commissions. If that is done, it will only work if the right type of personnel is selected to administer the relief. This is a matter of fundamental importance. It is reported that provincial commissions of business men are to be appointed. Unquestionably, in any administrative work business principles should prevail, but in this matter of relief there is a good deal more than that. Any assumption that business men are best qualified to conduct a programme of relief is in my opinion not warranted.

Whatever form of organization is the result of the Federal-Provincial Conference, the Social Agencies feel that the actual administration of the relief should be placed in the hands of trained social workers or individuals who have had practical experience in the field of social work administration. There is an idea prevalent that anyone can administer relief; that is not correct, if the matter is to be dealt with in the wisest way. Those

who have been specially trained as social workers, or those business men who have had a long experience in this special work, are easily the best qualified. Only recently I heard a business man boast that he had fed the unemployed on six cents a day. It can't be done, and if it is attempted the morale of the men must be completely destroyed. One of the greatest problems coming out of the long-continued economic depression is the maintenance of morale among those who are suffering so severely. This is best accomplished if the direct relief is administered by trained workers, who have had experience in handling the difficulties of the situation.

I have every sympathy with you in the gigantic burden you are carrying. I wish you good health and every success.

My dear Sir Arthur,-

I have read your letter, regarding relief methods, with great care.

We discussed the matter at the conference with the Provincial authorities a few days ago and I believe there is no disposition on the part of the responsible authorities to do other than ~~to~~ maintain relief on such a basis as will at least preserve the morale of those who find themselves compelled to accept assistance from the State. There have been abuses under Provincial administration, but, on the other hand, the abuses have not been as great as might have been expected. I strongly hold with you that the trained worker is the only safe guide in the distribution of family relief; and I am of the opinion that the Provinces, who must accept the primary responsibility in the premises, are fully seized of the necessity for action being taken along that line.

I confess to you that I have worried greatly over direct relief being granted at all -- and yet what else is there left for us to do, in the face of existing conditions.²



Dear Mr. Morgan,

As a result of our Survey Committee's recommendations, the Board of Directors of Financial Federation has been reduced in number from 42 to 21 and will in future replace the present Executive Committee of Federation with designated executive powers.

In place of the old Board of Directors a senior Board of Governors is being created whose function is defined by the constitution as follows :-

"Duties: The Board of Governors shall have general supervisory powers over the affairs of Federation. The Board of Governors shall not exceed eighty (80) or be less than thirty (30) in number. The Governors shall hold office for one year and shall be eligible for re-election."

It is not the intention of the Federation to demand a great deal of work from this Board of Governors. One meeting a year is required by constitution and probably one other meeting would ordinarily be called.

The Nominating Committee of Federation is anxious to have you serve as a Governor and I am asking for your permission to present your name for election at the annual meeting of Federation on February 15th, 1937.
