tains a class of news of vital importance to every merchant that no press association can furnish him with, simply because it is not of sufficient importance to the mass of readers to render it necessary for them to handle it. Above all it contains the advertisements, or practically the business signs of every manufacturer, dealer, insurance company and banker from Cape Breton to Vancouver. Every man puts a sign up over his store. The man who puts an advertisement in a good trade journal puts up his sign in every town and village in the Dominion, every week in the year, at a cost probably far less than the one that stands over his own door and appeals only to his immediate neighbors.

The power of a trade journal in thus bringing together notices of the business interests of the most diverse sections of our great country for the benefit of all, is of incalculable value to Canadian commerce. (The farmer of the North knows exactly what the merchant or manu'actu er of Nova Scotta, Quebre, or Ontario can offer him, The miner of British Columbia and the fisherman of the Maritime Povinces know what Ontario produces suitable to their requirements, The advertising columns form a business directory far more valuable and complete than any other, since they contain the signs of live, enterprising, active business men, with all the slow, miserly fossils climinated by a species of natural selection. It is the alert man that advertises, and it is the shrewd man that selects the medium most suited to his wants and most adapted to push his business. That the Americans understand this, it is only necessary to look through our columns and notice the number of Chicago advertisements they contain intended to attract the Canadian buyer. If there is one thing that the American merchant or manufacturer understands and confides in, it is advertising. He is a thorough believer in the "silent salesman" who is never obtrusive and yet is always at work, and he knows how to select the channel through which a knowledge of his wares shall reach the class he desires to secure as customers.

"Circulation" attracts him hardly at all. He is perfectly able to estimate it at its true value. He knows quite well that a good trade paper with a circulation of 10,000 hona-lide subscribers may be far more valuable to him than a large daily whose circulation runs up into the hundreds of

thousands. Men read a daily paper for news. The advertisements, excepting perhaps the "Wants" column, do not attract them at all. The eye only falls upon them by chance. Whereas the readers of a trade journal deliberately search its advertising columns for the opportunities it may offer of them. Its advertising columns are as valuable to them as the reading matter, and therefore they persue them equally carefully. They form one of the trade paper's most valuable features, and hence render it the best medium through which goods can be bought under the notice of the storekeeper.

To the firm or institution that housts that it is so well known, or so thoroughly established as to be independent of this means of attracting new customers, it is only necessary to point out that some of the wealthiest and oldest-established banks and houses in this country are the most stendy advertisers in good trade journals. Their success has been largely due to the way in which they have kept themselves prominently before the public, and they recognise that fact perfectly, The advertisement may not do them much good; but they regard it as a badge of their standing in the community. They would just as soon take the brass-plate off their doors as their advertisement out of its accustomed column. It is a quiet but continuous herald of their progress, and it shows that they still possess the energy and activity which first placed them in the front rank of commerce. And if they find it pays to advertise, surely their smaller competitors will.

bee, for the current year, will not meet the expenditure. One of the principal arguments used by the Provincial Government to induce the merchants and manufacturers of Montreal to accept the odious tax on capital and entery prise was the statement that it would place the finances of the province upon a sound financial basis and thus enable them to rehabilitate its credit in the eyes of the great European financial centres sufficiently to reduce the present burden of interest by replacing the existing loans with new ones at lower figures. 1 1 1 1

This promise has unfortunately not been kept; for although Hon. J. S. Hall claims a surplus of \$98,844 in revenue over expenditure, it disappears the moment it is enquired into, since it is only arrived at by deducting the item. of \$755,000 for railroad subsidies from the expenditure and providing for them by a temporary loan. The fact is that "even with the burden of special taxation now levied on this city, the province cannot yet pay its way, and as the burden of interest is increasing every year it is difficult to see upon what grounds Mr. Hall bases his state. ment that in a few years he will be able to make a reduction in taxation and still meet all the requirements of the province.

The encouraging features in the budget speech are the evidences it contains that the treasurer has faithfully carried out his promise of strict economy. Within eighteen months the expenditure has been reduced by three quarters of a million annually, and liabilities to the extent of \$2,500,000 have been removed. This is a statement that will recommend itself at once to the commercial world and if the government follow out this policy it should not be long before the moment arrives when our provincial income will meet our expenditure. But that moment has not yet come, and therefore it behoves

the treasurer to watch every loophole for extravagance closely, and to prune down his expenditure to the lowest point consistent with the well-being of the country.

Mr. Hall's statement that the commercial tax, which bears so heavily upon this city, will be retnined in its main features is a disappointment; but he promises that it shall be graded on a basis of rental (which will lighten the burden on the smaller business houses) and also intimates the intention of the government to reduce the present tax on transfers of real estate, and to re-adjust the tax on successions. In fact he speaks hopefully, perhaps a little too hopefully from a business stand-point; but he evidently intends to make every effort to verify his predictions, and if he is sustained by his colleagues in his present policy of economy he will doubtless do so.

#### CANCELLATION OF ORDERS.

It might be thought that in a large wholesale dry goods house, firmly established, and possessing a large and assured clientele of customers, matters would go on so smoothly that not even a ripple in the level current of business would ever be felt. And yet there are numbers of petty troubles and annoyances to lar the course of their trade. and one of the most irritating of these is the practice of certain of their customers of cancelling their orders, or returning the goods they have purchased, upon the slightest pretext, or even upon no pretext at all. No doubt cases exist where the return of the goods is warranted by the circumstances. the case of substitution, for instance, the purchaser is quite right to refuse goods which he considers are not according to the samples from which he purchased-and that a good deal of substitution is done by wholesale houses whether intentionally or not, cannot be gainsaid. In fact at times it is impossible for them to avoid substitution and fill orders in time. At this cause for the return of goods no wholesald house can complain. But when the goods are returned because some dyspeptic customer dislikes them, because the weather has changed, or because the buyer finds that he can purchase them (for some irregular cause) more cheaply elsewhere, then the wholesale houses feel that they have just grounds for remonstrance.

The first cold weather of this season farnished some instances in point. Two or three days of severe cold brought orders rapidly in from retailers for winter weights. The weather turned mild again, and instantly the goods began to come back. "They were not according to sample, the colors did not suit, the quality was not up to their standard, etc., etc." Anyway the goods came back; and the wholesale houses had to take them and put the best face they could upon it.

Another fruitful cause of the return of goods is the system of undercutting employed by some houses. A retailer purchases a line of goods at say 191-2 cents. He is quite satisfied with the goods when they arrive, and is unpacking them with pride, when the opposition traveller comes in, flugers the the goods disparagingly, and asks the price. The moment he hears it, he laughs and says, "Why, our house will give you all you want for 1914!" His orders are to sell at 191.2, the same as his opponent, but he undercuts at once in order to make a sale. The retailer may be honest enough to stick to his original bargain. But if he is not, the goods are returned upon some pretext or other and the second traveller books an order for them.

A third and perhaps more excusable cause is responsible for a good many returned goods, and this is when a clever salesman unloads upon a remote good natured retailer a line of goods

unsulted to his particular class of trade. When he is buying the goods the arguments of the salesman appear convincing. The shades may be somewhat out of the ordinary, the quality may not be what he would have bought were he left to his own choice, but the salesman makes it clear to him that if he does not take the goods he is missing a rare opportunity, and he makes the purchase. Next day the glamour of the drummer's arguments has disappeared, and the idea begins to dawn upon him that, although the goods would be a bargain to some houses, they will prove only a dead weight to him. 'Naturally he either cancels his order or sends back the goods as a measure of self-protection.

To the average wholesale house the return of goods (unless they are soiled or shop-worn) is more of an annoyance than a loss. They can usually be resold to others at practically the same figures. But in the case of manufacturers agents, or Jobbing houses who import goods from abroad to fiil orders, It becomes a serious evil. They have to pay freight and duty on the goods, and as they are usually special lines they are often almost unsaleable except at quite a reduction. Still more heavy is the loss in a case like one in which one of our leading into porting houses is interested. The firm received an order for a quantity of expensive laces to be specially made jubroud. Before the laces arrived the customer cancelled his order; but by this time the goods had been manufactured and the question is now upon whom the loss shall fall. Another line in which the cancellation of an order involves a heavy loss to the importer is that of ladies wraps or mantles. If the styles chosen do not happen to suit the public's taste, and the retailer coolly returns them, there is very little chance of the seller avoiding a serious loss. No one else may want them, and so they are simply a drug in the market.

It will of course be asked, why ido not the wholesale houses band together to resist the return of goods. The reply is simply that competition is too keen to permit of it. Two years ago a rather spasmodic effort was made by the dry goods section of the Board of Trade to grapple with the question But the weak links in the chain were too numerous, and the retailers easily snapped it asunder. Some of the houses continued to accept return goods from certain customers and when once that became known others demanded and obtained the same privilege. So the effort to prevent the return of goods fell into innocuous desuctude and only one or two of the staunchest and most conservative of our wholesale houses now have the courage to stem the tide and refuse to take back goods fairly purchased and equal to sample.

#### THE PRESIDENTS MESSAGE.

President Cleveland's message to Congress bears the imprint of sincerity and sound common-sense. In fact it is more a business than a political document, and deals more with the details of the various departments than with the policy of the administration or the principles of government. It is commendably free from the bluster and clap-trap so often found in presidential messages, and throughout it is calm, simple and judical in tone. It is written for the better class of American voters evidently, for it contains none of the usual appeals to their patriotic vanity or racial hatreds which prove so effective with the lower classes. For this reason alone it is worthy of careful perusal.

The portion of the message most interesting to Canadians is naturally that devoted to the tariff, and here Mr. Cleveland's utterances are very guarded. He gives his frank adhesion to the principles of the Wilson Bill, and urges its adoption; but he recognizes that industries that have been fostered by the existing tariff must not be suddenly deprived of the protection that called them into existence. The ideal tarlif is not the creation of a moment and so, while heartly approving of the placing on the free list of crude raw. materials for the benefit of the manufacturer and artisan, and of the necessaries of life for that of the consumer, he leans towards caution in any revision of the duties on manufactured goods. To this no Canadian can object. The only exports our industrial and financial condition enable us to make to the United States are the products of our farms, our mines, our fisheries, and our forests. In manufactures we can never hope to complete, with them. It is our raw material and agricultural products that they desire, and that we are best able to sell. If these be placed on the free list, or admitted at a nominal duty, trade between the two countries will receive an impetus whose value it is impossible to underrate, and

the fact that a man of the personal magnetism and political force of President Cleveland endorses such a policy will go a long way towards its ultimate adoption by the people of the United States.

At the same time it would be well if the Canadian press remained discreetly reticent in giving publicity to such views. The Anglophobe sentiment is very strong in a large section of otherwise intelligent American citizens, and the fact that the Wilson Bill unavoidably fayors Canada has already been made use of as an argument against it in the Republican, and even in some of the Democratic papers. It is too early yet to congratulate ourselves. Even if the bill were to pass intact, we should feel no advantage from it until next year. And that it will pass in anything like its present shape is hardly to be hoped. Too many powerful interests are arrayed against it not to ensure its mutilation in committee. But even if it pass in its most mutilated form it is still a step, and a long one, in the right direction; for it will tear down a portion at least of the tariff wall that now cuts us off from our neighbors at the South, and by fostering commerce between the two countries will at the same foster mutual amity and esteem.

#### ONE ENCOURAGING FEATURE.

The cycle of depression, from which this continent is now emerging slowly, has left behind it one lasting benefit. It has completely broken the power of the labor organizations and it has thus enabled thousands of men to secure work who in earlier days were refused that privilege simply because they did not belong to the unions. At the commencement of the period of stagnation organized labor was almost in a position to dictate its own terms to its employers. Its members formed a drilled army, under strict discipline with a closely guarded membership and ironclad rules. It narrowed the privileges of apprenticeship to the lowest possible point. In one branch of trade (the hatters,) it decided to permit no new apprentices for five years. It fixed the scale of wages to be paid by the capitalists who used it, and it dictated the length of the labor day. In fact it arrogated powers to itself that even the nation did not possess, and it used them mercilessly. Then the change set in. As the depression increased capital found itself forced out of investment

in proportion as the demand lessened. Production had to be curtailed, and organized labor found its iron-clad rules impotent to check the forces at work against it. Labor had the alternative of either accepting less wages or going idle and hungry. It could no longer maintain its grip upon the throat of capital. One by one the great industrial centres shook off the control of the walking delegate. They found themselves able to reduce their forces, adjust wages, permit apprentices to learn the trade, and employ free labor, in a way that would have been impossible a year before, and they availed themselves fully of the opportunity. Many are now free from the union yoke altogether, and still more are following in their footsteps to that end.

No doubt the organization of labor did much in bettering the position of the workingmen in the early days when it was controlled by the men themselves, and before the professional agitator had succeeded in alienating public sentiment from its support. when once the fair-minded men originated the movement were onsted from its control, and their places filled by irresponsible demagogues who fattened upon strikes and consequently provoked every collision possible between masters and men, the advantages of organized labor were largely neutralized, and a spirit of antagonism was provoked that only needed the opportunity to display itself. That opportunity has now come. The financial depression has given the great employing companies the power to shake themselves free from the yoke of the leaders of organized labor, and they are doing so rapidly and thoroughly. In future both capital and labor will be emancipated. Capital will be able to employ whom it likes, and the workman will be able to work when he likes, and where he likes, without paying tribute to a union and swearing obedience to rules framed by men who never did a stroke of work in their lives and never intend to, if they can help it. The benefit to the good workman, and the investor in his brains and skill is incalculable; but the poor, lazy, shiftless workman and the walking delegate will find their occupation gone. Their day is over. They can no longer rely on the efforts of others. They will be compelled to go into the open market and fend for themselves. It is hard on them; but the laws of supply and demand are no respecters of persons.

#### HAVE YOU READ YOUR POLICY?

"Please read your Policy." These words are printed in large type on the outside of almost every policy issued by the Fire Insurance Companies. Yet strange as it may seem, hardly one insurer out of a hundred takes the trouble to do so.

A lease, deed of sale, or any other important document is carefully read and discussed by the contracting parties, and all errors carefully corrected before being finally executed. Every one will acknowledge that it would be a gross piece of neglect if this were not done, and yet an important document called a Fire Policy, frequently involving thousands of dollars and the interests of more than one party, when received from either the company direct. or the broker, is hurriedly glanced over and shoved into the safe without further concern for its contents, beyond possibly the sum insured, premlum and date of expiry. These are examined and seen to be correct—but as for the wording, clauses and conditions, the policy

might as well be a Russian Ukase for all the insured knows or appears to care about it.

Still when a fire occurs and any difficulty arises in adjusting the loss on account of any of the conditions not having been complied with on the part of the insured-an ambiguity of wording or non-concurrent wording with other policies running -the company is in all likelihood, threatened with an action at law if the claim is not paid forthwith. Now we put it to any rensonable person-not to say a business. man-is this as it should be? Where only one policy exists all the conditions should be carefully read, not to say studied, for where the insurer accepts the conditions as he certainly does when he accepts a policy, he should be eareful to see that he, on his part, carries out those conditions.

Where several policies cover on the same property, it is not only most important that the conditions be complied with, but that the written description be concurrent in each and every item with all the other policies running.

Where these matters are adhered to, no possible trouble can arise when a claim occurs; and here we may remark that the insuring public should be careful as to whose care they commit their insurances in the way of brokers. It is unfortunately thought that any ordinary man of intelligence can place and manage a large line of insurance, but this has oftentimes been shown not to be the case. The insurance broker must be a man of experience in the business as well as being reliable. Consequently he will take care that the parties for whom he acts have their interests carefully watched at the same time that he gives all care to the rights of the company or companies whom he represents. Broker or no broker, we say, "Read your Policy."

#### BANK DEPOSITS.

The law as to bank deposits differs but slightly, in essential points, in English speaking countries, and recent British and American decisions which elucidate the subject, and comment upon the respective rights of bankers and depositors, consequently possess a degree of interest for our readers.

A bank is not a mere trustee of the funds deposited with it. That is, it does not contract to keep on hand any particular money, or pay the depositors cheques out of it. The amount passes into the funds of the bank, and is carried to the customer's credit, in account with the bank. Unless there is some agreement to the contrary, the deposits received by a bank become its property. They belong to it, and can be loaned, or otherwise disposed of by it, as any other money belonging to the bank. If the money be stolen or destroyed the loss must be borne by the bank, though it be free from negligence, or fault. It is accountable as a debtor, and the relation between it and the general depositor is essentially that of debtor and creditor.

In legal effect, the deposit is a loan to the bank. A cheque is merely an order drawn by a creditor upon his debtor, requesting him to pay part of what is due the creditor to the payer, or holder. It no doubt evidences an intention of the drawer to have the sum specified paid to the holder, but does not transfer the title to any fund, or part of it, or the bank's liability to the drawer, while in New York, it is said, that the implied engagement on the part of a bank to pay the cheques of its depositor, does not inure to the

benefit of a holder of a cheque, so as to enable him to enforce payment there of and against the bank, prior to its acceptance.

In such case, in the absence of assent by the depositary, the giving of a cheque by a depositor does not operate as a transfer, or assignment of the debt created by making a deposit. In Illinois, on the other hand, it is held that where a depositor draws a cheque against funds to an account sufficient to pay it, it operates as an equitable assignment to the payer of funds to the amount for which it is drawn, though the cheque operates as such assignment only as of the time of presentment for payment, the rule being "first come first served."

There is confusion in some minds with respect to cheques as payment. The presumption is that a cheque is not taken absolutely, but is only intended as conditional payment, so that if dishonored, and the holder is not. guilty of laches, causing loss to the drawer, the latter will be liable upon the original cause or debt for which the cheque was given. The same is true with regard to the mere acceptnnee by the creditor from his debtor, of the cheque of a third person to the creditor's order for a pre-existing indebtedness. Nor will the fact that a receipt has been given for a gross sum represented by each and such cheque or cheques be conclusive that such cheques were accepted as absolute payment in the absence of a recital to that effect in the receipt.

Where it is so agreed a cheque may undoubtedly be given and received in absolute discharge of a debt. It is important when giving receipts for indebtedness partly, or wholly settledeby cheque, to make the meaning clear. After delivery of a cheque in payment the debt for which it is given is not the subject of garnishment, especially where the cheque has passed into the hands of a third person as absolute owner, although it has not yet been collected. We have known cases where a cheque has been accepted by creditors innocently enough, in settlement of a judgment, the result being to "hang up" the judgment.

The use of a deposit slip is that of a receipt and nothing more. It is not expected, either by the depositor or depositary that it will ever be presented to the bank again, unless a dispute should arise as to the amount of deposit. Hence, delivery of a deposit slip

to a third person does not operate as an assignment of the deposit. A bank has a kind of general lien on all the funds of a depositor in its possession, or rather on the credit given therefor, for any balance due on general account of other indebtedness, contracted in the course of their dealings.

It is a moot question whether, under the law merchant, a bank at which a customer's note is made payable, can without special authority, pay the same from deposits on hand at its maturity. The banking acts of different countries and States, are not uniform on this point.

#### THE REPORT DENIED.

A report was published in the "World" of New York on Tuesday last that Mr. A. M. Chatclard, president of the Banque Francaise at No. 5 Broadway in that city, had disappeared. The same report appeared also in the "Sun" and "Times;" only that the name of the absconder was given by them as Ricard Rousseau, manager for Mr. Chatelard. As the latter gentleman is well-known in this city, and as he has a branch of the Banque Francaise here, and has been publishing a financial and social paper called "Le Petit Figaro" in this city, a swarm of reporters ascended at once to the modest offices of A. M. Chatelard & Cog on the second story of No. 103 St. Francois Navier street. Only one French reporter was fortunate enough to find Mr. Bellay, the manager of the firm iv. Mr. Bellay denied the story point blank, saying that there was not one word of truth in it, that Mr. Chatelard was in France endeavoring to float a new financial concern and that he would return at the end of this month. As to the Mr. Ricard Rosseau mentioned. the only one he knew was Mr. Alphonse Rousseau the partner of Mr. Chatelard who certainly had not skipped.

Mr. A. M. de Chatelard, the president of the Banque Francalse came to this city about two years ago and opened a branch in the basement of the British Empire building. He was a gentleman past middle age, always beautifully dressed, and seemed a shrewd business man. He became a member of the Chambre de Commerce, and soon was admitted to the best French society. In fact at one time he was believed to be engaged to a daughter of a prominent merchant. He endeavored to float a financial concern here to be called

the Credit Foncier de la Province de Quebec; but the title was so similar to that of the Credit Foncier France Canadien that the charter was refused. In October 1892 he applied for a charter for the "Compagnie Hypothecaire Canadienne," and it was to obtain the capital for this company that he sailed for France last April.

#### THE ORDER OF SOLON.

Another benefit order has been declared a fraud by the Insurance Commissioner of Pennsylvania. It is the Order of Solon which started in 1888, promising to pay its members \$25 per week for sick benefits, \$500 in case of total disability, and \$1,000, less any payments for sick benefits and disability claims, at the end of seven years. All this was to be done for a payment by each member of \$2.50 per month, or a lump sum of \$210 for the endowment period of seven years.

Ten thousand six hundred people, of whom not a few are Canadians, were found foolish enough to join, the Order. In four years and a half they paid into the treasury \$585,244, and hugged themselves in the belief that the Order of Solon was bound to pay them \$5,484,000 at the end of the seven years period. In the meantime the Insurance Commissioner became aware that the Order was doing business in a very peculiar way from an insurance standpoint. He investigated at once, and found that the net available assets of the Order of Solon were only \$144,550. He unhesitatingly pronounced it a fraud, and now the members want to know how it is that the treasurer can only show \$144,500 of the \$585,000 they paid in. Where has the other \$440,000 gone?

SUSPENSION OF T. & W. MURRAY. T. & W. Murray, general merchants, having important business relations both in Ontario and Quebec, are in trouble, and a meeting of creditors took place in Montreal this week. Their principal establishments are at Pembroke and North Bay, Ont., and at Rapide des Joachim, Que. Branches exist at Mattawa, Ont., under the style of Murray & Loughran, and at Chapleau, Ont., under the name of Murray & Mulligan. Originally the firm was known as Murray & Bros., the partners being Michael and Thomas Murray, the former of whom died in 1861. Thomas soon afterwards compromised

with the creditors at 10s 6d in their and, in 1862, admitted his brother William under the present style. They got beyond their depth in 1877 and obtained an extension, but were unable to carry it through, resulting in a writ of attachment, when a settlement was effected at 25e on the dollar. The next interruption was caused in January '91 when Thos. Murray was made a sheriff and William continued as W. Murray & Co. Thomas did not hold the posttion of sheriff more than a few months and, in January 1893, rejoined his brother under the old style of T. & W. Murray. The firm sustained a heavy loss by a recent fire at North Bay. which brought on a crisis as, prior to this, their affairs were not in a flourishing state. A couple of creditors sent on representatives to investigate and the call for a meeting in Montreal was the result. At this meeting the firm offered 45c on the dollar, which they subsequently increased to 50c, payable in 4, 8, 12, 16, 20 and 24 months, secured. It is not unlikely that a settlement will be effected on this basis. The liabilities are estimated at \$290,000. The firm has been long identified with the trade of the Ottawa valley and many will, no doubt, regrett to hear of its present difficulties.

#### SEEKING MUNICIPAL HONORS.

The announcement that Mr. Warring Kennedy, of the well-known wholesale dry goods house of Samson Kennedy & Genmell, was favorably considering a requisition signed by \$,000 citizens of Toronto, asking him to become a candidate for the Mayoralty of the Queen City, caused some comment in business circles here. The general impression seemed to be that merchants actively engaged in commerce could not afford to give up the time necessary to perform municipal work satisfactorily without neglecting their own business to a greater or less extent, and that the firm of whom Mr. Warring Kennedy is so indispensable a member would regret even the temporary withdrawal of his attention from their affairs. There is no doubt a good deal of truth in this. Municipal politics demand a larger share of a civic officer's time than a busy man can afford to snare. Either he must neglect his civic duties or his business; for there are few men whose capacity for work is sufficiently large to enable them to prosecute both successfully.

#### NEW STATIONS WANTED.

Fire Chief Benoit wants some additions and alterations to his department that will recommend themselves at once to insurance men. He wants the new station in the west ward built at once. The new water-tower and aerial ladder purchased expressly for use in the business portion of the city, are compelled to be housed in outlying districts whence their transport to the scene of action will occupy considerable time, simply because of the lack of accommodation at the Central. Until the new station be built they cannot be stored nearer than Gain street, and a conflagration starting in the centre of the business district might thus gather considerable headway before they become available.

Then he wants the \$10,000 appropriated for the improvement of No. 13 station, applied to the construction of a new station to be called No. 18 instead. This station would be in the district between No. 8 and No. 13 stations. He also wants another new station, to be called No. 19, to protect the district between Sherbrooke street and Pine Avenue. This he considers urgently needed.

#### CONSUMERS' CORDAGE CO.

The remodelling of the Consumers Cordage stock has been the principal topic of conversation The Company will issue \$1,week. 000,000 in preference stock to take the place of the \$1,000,000 in common stock now out, and will issue another \$1,000,000 of common stock, in order to bring the total capital up to \$2,000,000. Local subscribers, who hold about \$300,000 in common stock, will have the privilege of exchanging it for this new guaranteed 7 per cent preference stock. The balance not thus taken up will be held as security for loans, and no dividends will be paid on the common stock until the preference dividend has been paid.

#### THE LATE THOS. LOGAN.

Thos. Logan, president of the Canada Paper Co., died somewhat suddenly last Saturday at the age of 68 years. Mr. Logan came to this country in 1842, and secured employment in the paper mill at Chambly where he learned the trade. He next became a partner in the firm of Angus, Logan & Co. of this city, and on its dissolution founded the Canada Paper Co., of which

he was the chief officer at the time of his death. Mr. Logan was also president of the Montreal Steam Laundry, a shareholder in the Montreal Cotton Co., in the Paton and Hudon Manufacturing Co's. and in the Magog Textile Co. He was a large property holder in Cote St. Antoine. The funeral took place on Wednesday last and was attended by a number of prominent citizens.

#### SMALL DEBT COURTS.

Every large employer of labor in this city must have recognized long since that the expense attached to the recovery of small debts incurred by his workmen constituted ghardship under which the artisan class do not suffer in any other country or province but our own. In England the County Court judges decide all cases of petty debt at a minimum of cost. In addition they consider the full circumstances of the case, the conditions under which the debt was incurred, and the debtor's capability of repayment. They interpret the law from the broad stand-point of equity, and thus the law has come to be regarded as the protector of the debtor as much as of the creditor, instead of his merciless perseentor as in this province.

In Montreal the cost of recovering a small debt is out of all proportion to the amount at stake. It frequently runs from 50 to 90 per cent.of the whole debt, and at times actually exceeds it. We may cite a case in point. A workman starting in business for himself leased a portion of a flat from a large firm. He ran behind \$30 in his rent, and to secure themselves the firm took out a se zure against him, but at the same time asked the lawyers not to pile up any unnecessary costs, as they had no desire to press heavily on the debtor. Ten days later the tonant was able to pay the rent due, when he found that the costs amounted to \$32.75, or more than the original debt. As an example of the expensive and complicated method of this province, the bill may be interesting. It runs as follows :-

And yet this was a case in which the costs had been kept down as much as possible, and where the debtor had paid the

whole debt and costs within ten days of the proceedings being taken. In England the costs would not have exceeded 60 cents, and they would have been but little higher in Ontario. Besides this; in either England or Ontario he would not have been forced to pay the entire costs and debt at once, but would probably have been allotted a fair proportion of time in which to do so.

This is not an isolated case, although it is a striking one. Hundreds of similar ones can be cited by any lawyer handling the collection of small debts. Suits where the costs exceed the debt are common, and in the case of sums of three and four dollars the costs rarely fall under sixty per centt of the amount at issue. It is in these cases that the number of petty lawyers, whom the province annually creates, find their most lucrative business. In most instances the defendants are hard-working clerks or mechanics, to whom the garnisheeing of their salaries means serious inconvenience, if not actual discharge from their posttions. They are only too eager to brace the least chance to secure time in which to pay their liabilities, and never question the most exorbitant bill of costs p. oviding they can have a brief breathing space in which to husband their resources. These form a rich harvest to the lawyer. They are sure pay in the long run, and so his client always recovers the amount of his bill eventually, while he himself has secured a still fatter bill of costs.

The blessing the institution of a cheap small-debt court, modelled on the lines of the English county-courts, to this class of debtor, could hardly be overestimated. The delay so precious to him could be obtained from the judge in open court instead of having to be sued for to his creditor's lawyer. Above all, the costs would not bear the disproportion to the amount of the debt that they do now. No doubt the formation of such a court would be bitterly opposed by the legal fraternity, who would naturally object to seeing a rich harvest of fees swept away from them. But the creditor would get his own, without being obliged to force his debtor to pay twice the sum he originally owed. It would be an advantage to both to have a theap and expeditious method of procedure and, as the law is made for the people, and not for the lawyers, the opposia tion of the latter should carry but little

#### A TRIBUTE TO CANADA.

It might possibly hurt the national pride of our cousins across the border were they to be told that the proposed new scheme of currency legislation which has been so favorably received by the President and

the highest financial authorities in United States, is simply a copy, even to its minor details, of the system which has proved so successful in this country. Yet such is the fact. The new plan elaborated by the financial experts of the United States is merely a copy of the Canadian Banking Act. It provides for the issue of notes to the full extent of the bank's capital without the pledge of bonds. It makes the circulation a first claim upon the entire assets of the bank issuing it, as well as upon an extra liability of the shareholders equal to the amount of the capital stock. It provides for a tax on the notes to create a redemption fund available for the payment of the notes of any insolvent bank, and it advocates periodical examination of the banks and the publication of statements of their condition.

What is this but the Canadian system? The double liability of shareholders, making of the notes a first charge on the assets, the sinking fund for their redemption, and the obligatory monthly bank statements are all copied from Canada's financial policy. Our clastic system of currency is the basis of the much-heralded financial reforms of the United States. And therefore to read the comments in American financial papers on the advantages of this "novel" proposition for improving the clasticity of the National Bank issue, and averting the danger of any currency famine in the future, is to enjoy one of the most gratifying, because unintentional absolutely compliments that our Canadian bankers and bank legislators have ever received. No doubt this adoption of Canadian methods of currency regulation is due in some measure to the efforts of American bankers like Mr. Cornwell, president of the Bank of Buffalo, and other gentlemen who have visited this country and paid especial attention to the clastic, and yet substantial, system which experience has shown to be the most suitable for the requirements of a young and growing country.

#### A NEW SAINT FOR CANADA.

A committee of prominent Irish gentlemen, not yet fully chosen, but which will probably include Dr. Hingston and Messrs. A. F. Gault, J. O'Brien, Jas. Wilson Jr., and B. J. Coghlin, is suggested to carry out Lady Aberdeen's desire to open in this city a store for the sale of Irish lace an manufactures. zeal and business ability, the store opened in Chicago during the World's Fair took in over \$60,000, it is hoped that a similar will be fushionable or not remains yet to one in Montreal may also prove successful, be seen, but the demand for narrow satin This project has naturally brought Lady Aberdeen into comparatively close contact with the leading Irish gentlemen of this city and deepened their respect for her many good qualities.

#### THE MOVEMENT IN CHEESE.

The comparative statistics of cheese exports from Montreal during the past season, furnished by D. A. Macpherson & Co., show that the total shipments amounted to 1,690,274 boxes, or 38,476 boxes more than those of last year. This represents an increase of 117,207 boxes to London, Liverpool, Dundee and Newcastle, offset by a decrease of 78,731 boxes in the shipments to Bristol, Glasgow and Leith. London now appears to be the printipal objective point for Canadian cheese. The shipments to that port have grown from 239,284 boxes in 1889 to 651,247 bloxes in ASOS. It is interesting to note, too, that shipments have been made to Duúdec. Newcastle and Aberdeen to the extent of 25,000 boxes for the first time in the history of the trade. The firms shipping over 100,000 boxes during the season are: A. A. Ayer & Co, 240,559 boxes; J. C. Avarriagton, 175,781 boxes; Hodgson Bros. 171,185 boxes; A. W. Grant, 130,083 boxes, and D. A. Macpherson & Co 121,526 boxes.

#### SPRING RIBBONS.

Among pretty novelties in ribbons for the spring trade are lace effects. #### THE BANK OF ENGLAND.

Bankers and brokers in London receive the official statement that the Bank of England's losses by the errors in judgment of ex-Chief Cashier May, will not exceed \$100,000, with derision. They say that the bank was induced by him to accent many of the Murietta securities before their collapse, and that the stock of a since bankrupt insurance company is also in their hands posing as good collateral. The depreciation in these securitie: is figured out as at least \$5,000,000, although it does not follow that the bank will lose the whole of that amount. Outside of the bank itself, Cashier May unlonded a quantity of these securities on trustees and executors of estates, dealing with the bank, who came to him for advice in investment, and who now stand to lose heavily in consequence of accepting

#### MONTREAL WHOLESALE MARKETS.

Thursday Evg., Dec. 7, 1893.

The sudden change to sensonable winter weather has made a striking difference, in sales, in many retail departments. Steighs have been used over quite a large area, but there is not enough snow to ensure the permanence of winter roads, especially as the temperature seems inclined to rise. This is a dull season with many branches of wholesale trade. The business year ended with some on the 30th ult., others close on the lath inst, and more at the end of the calendar year. Stock taking, and preparations for doing so, are keeping clerical and warehouse staffs busy, and the keen eyed curators to insolvent estates are on the alert. The holiday trade, so far, has been fair. Distant bayers have been visiting the city and the larger establishments, especially, are presenting an attractive appearance. The rush from city customers will scarcely be left before the middle of the month.

Ashes .- Receipts are moderate, Liverpool market is lower, and prices easier here. We quote first pots \$4.50 to \$4.60. Second \$3.80. Pearls dull, nominal, at about \$5.40 for firsts. Received since ist Jan., 1893, 1,322 pots, 150 pearls; delivered, 1,560 pots, 161 pearls; in store 6th Dec. at close, 57 pots, 47 pearls.

Apples .- The shipments last week were 0,000 brls. British markets are strong, but dealers expected a bigger gain in prices before this, considering the heavy decline in shipments. Recent figures show exports of 77,000 brls. from all ports on this continent, against 700,000 a year ago. A London cable quotes the market there strong with upward ten-
