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WILL METHODISTS OBJECT?

Evangelist Horner and His New Sect Seeking Incorporation FROM THE DOMINION GOVERNMENT

As the Wesleyan Methodist Connection of Canada.

A Step in Opposition to the United Wesleyan Bodies-Peculiarities of the New Sect-How Canada's Finances Stand-T. H. & R. Railway-A New Journal in Ottawa-General Notes From the Capital.

Ottawa, June 5-(Special).-An application for Federal legislation was filed to-day which will likely receive the careful attention of the authorities of the Methodist Church of Canada.

Some years ago all the different Wesleyan bodies-the Canada Methodists, Bible Christians, Methodist Episcopal, Methodist New Connexion, the Primitive Methodists, etc.-united, and since then the united church has prospered greatly. Now a cloud, although little bigger than a man's hand, but which may grow, appears on the horizon.

The prime mover in the new denomination is an Ottawa evangelist, Rev. Mr. Horner. This gentleman was engaged in evangelistic work in the Ontario Conference for some years, but owing to his peculiar methods the conference withdrew him from evangelistic work and assigned him to a pastoral charge. This he refused to accept, and since then has been considered out of the Methodist body.

The revenue for the month of May is \$60,000 less than for the corresponding month last year, while the expenditure is augmented by half a million dollars. Notwithstanding this fact, the gratifying increase of two millions and a half as compared with the corresponding quarter of the year is a net increase of three millions.

SIR CHARLES IS SANGUINE.

The Premier Talks to The World About His Maritime Trip.

NOVA SCOTIA, HE SAYS, IS RIGHT

And the Outlook is Bright in Prince Edward Island.

Business is Booming in the Maritime Provinces-Sir Charles Expects 1000 Navies in Cape Breton-Hon. John Costigan, the Strong Man in New Brunswick, Says the Liberals Won't Get Here Than Two Seats in That Province.

Montreal, June 5-(Special).-Sir Charles Tupper arrived to-day from the Maritime Provinces and was engaged all day either in council with his colleagues or receiving leading party men of the commercial metropolis.

The Prime Minister took time, however, to give to your correspondent his impressions as to the political outlook in his native Nova Scotia.

"Since I left Montreal," began Sir Charles, "I have visited my own province, and I found the people with the Liberal-Conservative party, and I do not know one county now held by us that can in any way be looked upon as in danger, while there are good reasons for expecting that we shall capture every one of the six seats in the last Parliament by the Liberal party. Three of these," continued the Prime Minister, "Guysboro, Antigonish and Kings, we are sure to redeem, and, as I have just said, the chances are very strong in our favor in the other three-Digby, Yarmouth and the united counties of Yarmouth and Shelburne. I also visited Prince Edward Island, and there I found our friends splendidly organized and most hopeful of sweeping the island. There is certainly no settled feeling that three counties out of five are absolutely safe for the Government, and that the other two are excellent for taking the other two."

Sir Charles claims are silly. The stuff being sent to the Grit press by the Upper Provinces, claiming a change of feeling in Nova Scotia, he says, will strike Kenny and Borden over a thousand majority, while the Premier expects that his own majority in Cape Breton will be less than 1000, as Dr. Kendall is not by means as strong as Hon. Mr. Murray, while his colleague, McPherson, is simply not in it at all.

Business is Booming Down East. "How is business?" Sir Charles was asked. "All the places visited, such as iron and coal industries, are working full blast, and Nova Scotia is a working field of good measure of prosperity."

It should be added that the veteran Prime Minister is even in better health than when he left Montreal. His voice never was better, and his energy is quite ready to begin one of the most vigorous campaigns in Ontario ever entered upon by a Canadian Premier.

New Brunswick's Strong Man Talks. Sir Charles Tupper having addressed your correspondent to see Hon. John Costigan as to the outlook in New Brunswick, the Minister of the Interior spoke as follows: "We will surely carry the two seats now held by the Grits, Charlotte and Caraquet, and notwithstanding the winter port agitation, the Government candidates are all right in St. John."

Hon. Mr. Costigan confirmed the report that he is of slight stature and does not anticipate any difficulty whatever in securing re-election for a second term. In Albert Dr. Weidon's opinion is a Conservative, and in several other instances the Liberals were not able to secure candidates.

The Minister concluded by saying that at the very best the Liberals would not have more than two seats from New Brunswick in the next Parliament.

Government to Take Over All Feeders to the Intercolonial.

Montreal, June 5-(Special).-Your correspondent understands that the reports submitted to the Chief Clerk to-day by the Conservative leaders from Ontario were of the most encouraging nature, and rejoiced the heart of the Cumberland War Horse. It is stated that Mr. Robert Birmingham was furnished by a member of the Cabinet to ask an estimate of the Government's prospects on the 2nd of the month in the premier province of the Confederation. The Conservative organizer replied that Ontario would send at least 54 straight Government supporters, and this calculation did not include men like McKeague and others who were others who opposed the Remedial Bill in the last session.

"If Ontario will do this," said Sir Charles with a triumphant smile, "I will have over 50 of a majority at any back in the House of Commons when Parliament meets."

Government's Railway Policy. An important announcement regarding the railway policy of the Dominion Government will be made to-morrow by Sir Charles Tupper, who will inform Hon. E. J. Flynn that he proposes to take over all feeders of the Intercolonial, such as Bale des Chateaux road and several lines in New Brunswick, as a portion of the Canadian Government railways.

That Alleged Deal. Sir Charles Tupper was asked this evening by The World what he thought of the alliance between the Patrons and the Liberal.

"The exposure," replied Sir Charles, "took place while I was in Nova Scotia, but as far as I can learn it was one of the most corrupt and disgraceful alliances ever before made in any part of Canada, and if I know anything about public sentiment in Ontario it will certainly react upon both Liberals and Patrons."

The Cabinet Meets. Sir Charles Tupper, Hon. Messrs. Costigan, Haggart, Montreal, Messrs. Atgers, Tallon, Desjardins and Wood took part in the Cabinet Council to-day at the Windsor Hotel.

They Have Made an Example of a Toll-gate Keeper Near Kingston-He Must Pay the Costs. Kingston, June 5.-Toll-gate Keeper Calvey, before Hon. J. Walker, J.P., for barring the public, had a preliminary hearing at Portmouth this afternoon. Messrs. Kirkpatrick and Rogers acted in the interests of the Canadian Wheelmen's Association. The toll man was convicted. He was not fined, but must pay the cost of his defence in the bar. He must be confined in the jail seven feet from the level at the point where the toll was taken. This will permit cyclists to ride through and bar charges.

"Old Probs" interviewed. "Old Probs" was in a less cheerful mood last evening, as he had no surprises in the way of deviating storms or blustering waves of air to spring upon the city. THE EXHIBITION MUDDLE.

ANOTHER WRANGLE AMONGST THE CITY FATHERS.

Relations of the Exhibition Board and the Parks Committee—Year Acres Represented—A Contingent of \$150,000—The Board's Defence—Twelve Thousand Dollars Wanted From the Board of Control.

At the meeting of the Exhibition Committee yesterday afternoon, there was another struggle between Ald. Hallam, chairman of the Parks and Gardens Committee, and Ald. Leslie, on the one hand, and Ald. Leslie on the other, upon the question whether the Exhibition Committee had any jurisdiction. Ald. Hallam has contended that the Exhibition Committee has jurisdiction whatever in matters referring to the land granted for exhibition purposes, but only in connection with the holding of the fair.

Ald. Leslie asked that the bylaw appointing the committee be read, but Ald. Hallam demanded the reading of the deed conveying the land. A wrangle ensued, and Ald. Leslie losing all patience, remarked to the committee, "It is all very well, you have had a new head ever since this committee was appointed."

Ald. Hallam—There is nothing the matter with my head. It is all right. Ald. Boustead—The bylaw appointing the committee was never read, and was not understood.

Ald. Leslie—What was the committee appointed for? It was not to deal with all matters relating to the exhibition? Ald. Hallam—It was appointed to give you another \$100 per year.

After some further wrangling the opinion of the City Solicitor was asked on the matter. Mr. Caswell stated that this being the larger committee, embraced the smaller, the Parks and Gardens, and had full power to deal with all matters relating to the exhibition.

The report of the Park Commissioner and City Surveyor, endorsed by the City Treasurer and City Solicitor, on the question of the land available for exhibition purposes, showed that all the assets in sight of the \$150,000 bonds for which the city became responsible is 4.35 acres, instead of 200 acres, which was stated by the exhibition. The report further stated that, when asking the city to guarantee the interest on this loan, the association should have informed the council that only about four acres remained, and the council would then have considered upon what terms it would have guaranteed the \$150,000.

The Board's Statement. A long statement in reply, signed by Mr. J. J. Whitrow, president; H. Hill, secretary; and W. G. McWilliams, solicitor of the Industrial Exhibition Association, was read. The statement set forth that only \$2000 cash had been paid by the city to the association, although admitting that the erection of buildings, draining of the grounds, etc., had cost the city \$100,000.

Work on the dancing pavilion for Munro Park begins to-day and 100 men are expected to be in place by to-night. A monster mass-meeting and banquet will be held by the Salvation Army on Monday next at Victoria Park, when Commandant Booth will be tendered reception by some 1500 members of the Army from all parts of Canada and the States.

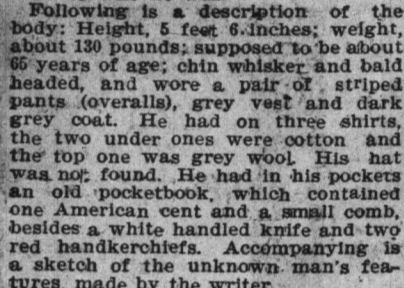

None Better Made. WHO IS THIS MAN? A Body Fleets Ashore Near Brents and the Cooner Would Like to Have It Identified.

Brents, June 5.—A drowned man was discovered in Lake Ontario by Charles Giles of this place yesterday morning, about one mile east of here. He immediately notified William Sargent, constable, who consulted Dr. Buck, coroner, and the body was brought here. STABBED AND SHOT WOMEN

Many Brutal Murders in Cuba by Col. Molina's Spanish Guerrillas.

A WIFE DISROBED AND SLASHED.

How an Unprotected Mother and Her Young Babe Were Killed.

Because Relatives Secreted Themselves—Two Men Executed for Complaining of Bad Treatment and Their Heads Hung from a Grocer's Door—A Man Who Had Not Seen Insurgents Had His Eyes Gouged Out by Spanish Fiends—An Awful Story.

Macagua, near Colon, Province of Matanzas, Cuba, June 1.—Reports have reached here of a number of recent and warranted murders and outrages by bands of Col. Louis Molina de Olivera's Spanish guerrillas.

Beharrio Nodarse of this town relates the particulars of a fiendish attack upon a Cuban woman.

"The guerrillas of Colon," Mr. Nodarse says, "while on their way to Calliste, stopped at the house of Mateo Martinez, a native of the Canary Islands, who had been forced to enlist in a body of insurgents under the command of Juan Pablo Jabio.

"The Spaniards stopped at his house and the officer in command inquired from Senora Martinez the whereabouts of her husband. 'Indeed, I can't tell,' she replied.

"I'll make you," said the Spaniard, and he proceeded to tear off her clothing. He then questioned her anew, and, receiving no answer from the woman, who was crying hysterically, he unhesitatingly arrested and cut her throat with a dagger, until her blood covered the floor and she fainted in a corner. Her shrieks and entreaties only served to provoke the brutal laughter of the soldier."

"Col. Molina left his headquarters a few days after the attack on Senora Martinez and marched his troops south to effect a junction with Gen. Melgosa's corps. The Spaniards were attacked and forced to retreat by a Cuban band. In making a detour to avoid the Cubans, Col. Molina's command arrived at a shanty occupied by an old farmer, his two sons, a daughter-in-law and three grandchildren. An eye-witness of the tragedy says:

"At the approach of the soldiers the men took refuge in the jungle, carrying off the two oldest children, and only the daughter with her baby remained in charge of the house. She hoped her sex and the sight of a child would save her from the hands of the robbers and spare the house."

"Col. Molina halted his command by the roadside and, dismounting, walked into the house.

"Where are the men?" he demanded. "I have been fired upon by your people at Arroyito, and I intend to send a detachment to punish them. Where are the rascals that live here?"

"They are out there," she trembled, "and you will guide a squad of men to their hiding-places and bring them quick. No trifling."

"I have not the least idea where they can be," sobbed the woman. "Haven't you? Very well. Ho, there! a corporal and four men."

"As the platoon entered the cabin Molina pointed to her and said: 'Pull out that rebel hag and shoot her.' The mother and child were dragged some twenty yards from the hut and the squad moved away a few paces.

"Will you speak now?" the Colonel demanded. "For God's sake, I don't know," cried the woman, who was nearly dead with terror.

"Then fire!" ordered Molina. "With a convulsive movement the woman tried to shield the child with her own body, but the merciless bullets did their work.

"The baby was not killed outright, and one of the soldiers, moved by a kind of barbarous pity, crushed the little one's skull with the butt of his rifle. The bullet struck the child in the forehead, after setting fire to the hut, and the squad moved away a few paces.

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The officer then bade the soldiers punish them as they deserved. A score of machetes flashed and in a few moments the prisoners were a mass of blood and rage. A drunken fancy seized the murderers, cutting off the heads of the victims they hung them to the key of the grocer's door, while the horror-stricken neighbors looked on without daring to interfere. Only under cover of night were the ghastly remains removed and buried.

A resident of the town Cascajal says one of Molina's buerilla bands recently left Barrio de Mostacilla, and was marching to "Regilla," the sugar plantation of Senor Sardinias, for the purpose of escorting a train of pack mules. As the guerrillas approached the town of Cascajal they passed the farm of a Cuban named Garcia, whose two brothers were in the insurgent force under Dimas, which was operating in the district between Recreo and Roque.

A portion of this force occasionally camped near Garcia's house and he was then visited by his brothers. When the guerrilla band arrived, however, the insurgents were not in the neighborhood. Garcia was alone in his house, his brother-in-law, who lived with him, having gone to San Jose de Ramos.

The lieutenant commanding the guerrillas rapped loudly upon Garcia's door and then entered, followed by sergeant and two privates.

"Where are the insurgents encamped?" the lieutenant demanded of Garcia. "I really don't know," the man replied. "The him to that chair!" the officer commanded and the soldiers lashed Garcia severely.

"Now will you tell me where your brothers are?" angrily enquired the lieutenant. "I can't say, I have not seen them," Garcia tremblingly replied.

"I'll know they slept here last night, but since your eyes seem to be useless, I will relieve you of them. Pull them out," the officer cried, turning to his soldiers.

The sergeant thrust the point of his bayonet under the question of his man's eyes and burst them out, despite the agonizing screams of the victim.

As they left the house the lieutenant jokingly remarked that the next time Garcia would be able to say truthfully that he "had not seen the insurgents."

Wounded at Chicago. Chicago, June 5.—After having been once respite with sight of the gallows in order that the question of his mental condition might be passed upon by a special jury, with the result that he was found to be sane, Joseph Winzath, one of the slayers of Carrie B. Church, receiver of the West, Chicago Street Railroad Co., was hanged at the County Jail this afternoon.

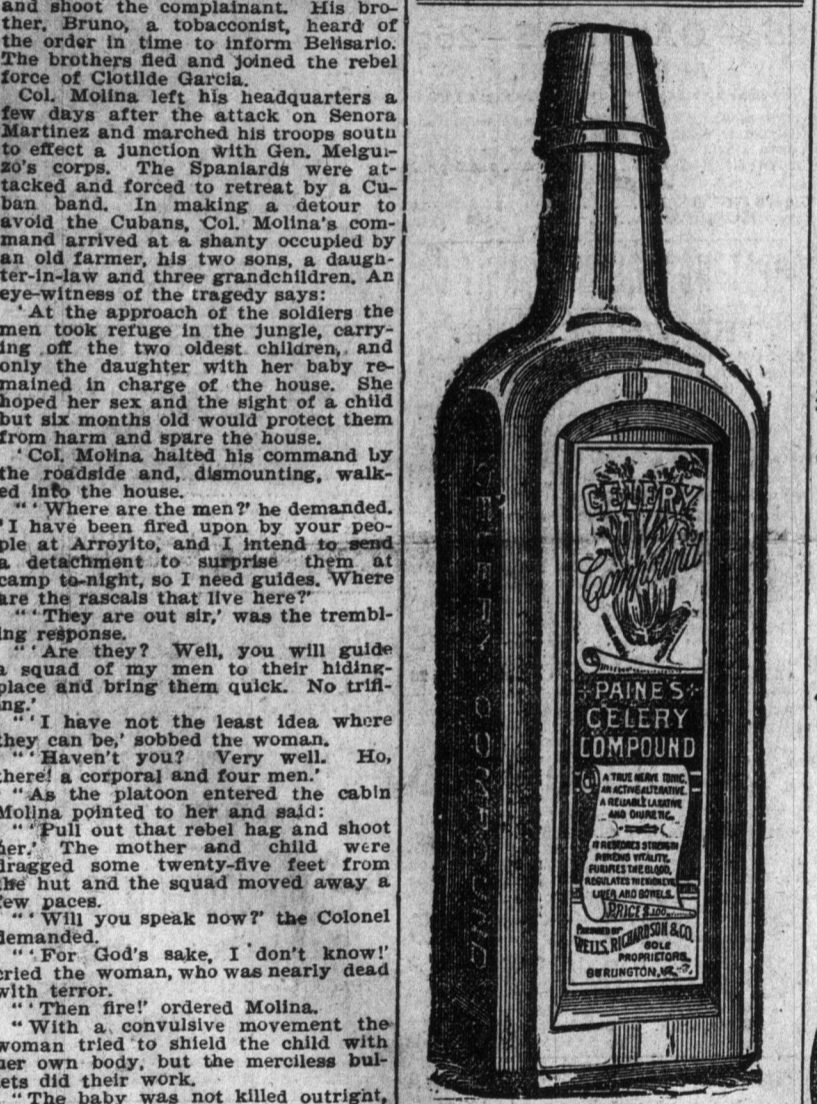
